The game was played before a huge crowd that braved the bitter northwest wind to see the two teams throw everything in the book at each other during the four quarters.

Final score of the championship game was 22-0, but that fails to tell the tale by a good margin.

Actually, Bovina was a consistent threat and came within 15 yards of scoring when the clock ruined their chances at the close of the half. Farwell was protecting an 8-0 lead at Telephone Company half time, and it was the final period before the Steers definitely had the upper hand, scoring twice in that quarter, and adding one conversion.

The game was outstanding and unusual in one respect—despite the keen rivalry between the teams, not called during the entire play.

New Mexico farmers were remindcd today that they have only a few more days before farm program elections are held. Elections must be completed in the State by Nov. 28.

When the elections are held farmers participating in the ACP, sugar program, or who are in the rederal Crop Insuranec program are eligible to vote. A community agricultural conservation committee will be elected and at the same time delegates to the county convention will be chosen. At the county meeting, held later, a county committee will be elected.

Priorities Applied To Conservation Work

Many New Mexico PMA committees and State technical committees which work with them in selecting farm practices to meet the conservation needs of the State have taken a practical and realistic view of adjustments needed in the 1948 ACP, because of the prospective cut in funds, according to Allen W. Manchester, head of PMA's ACP branch.

To make conservation funds go as far as possible in getting the job done, many committees have listed practices on a first, second and third choice basis. Those practices most urgently needed and which will result in the greatest conservation for ecah dollar spent head the list. Other practices-not so urgently needed or which have been daopted rather generally-are not given as much emphasis, and funds for assistance have been cut down. In some instances, practices have been dropped.

In a number of Wetern States, protected summerfallow on wheat land has been left off. In others it has been incorporated as a supporting practice. For instance, in some States protected summerfallow is a part of the stripcropping or contour seeding practices. No payment is made on the protected summerfallo wbut it is required as a condition

to earning payment on stripcropping. Under the 1948 program some states will not offer assistance for the application of phosphate, not because that it is not an excellent and needed practice, but because it is believed that available funds will get more results if used on other practices. These might include erosion control dams, terraces, contour farming. reorganization of the farm irrigation system, and establishing of sod wa

Health Notes By Texas Department of Health

AUSTIN-According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, there are to many persons who approach the choice of a family physician casually. Viewing the doctor much as a fireman, whose services are required only in an emergency, such families wait until an illness strikes and then get hold of the first doctor who can respond to the call. While such an attitude reasonably assures one of satisfactory medical services, it can handicap the physician somewhat and in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which can exist only by having a regular family doctor.

"Knowing his patients enables a physician to give advice on maintaining health and preventing disease, based on his intimate knowledge of the physical and mental make-up of members of the family," Dr. Cox stated. "The casuall summoney physician plainly cannot have this background or opportunity. It is well known to students of medical science that no one procedure or drug can be applied to the cure of every disease. It would indeed be fine if we could have some panacea for all diseases, but unfortunately. the healing art is not as simple as

"People are far from being alike," he continued. "Bodily and mental characteristics markedly differ in members of the same family. Reactions to medicines of various types, the habits of the individual, environmental influences, and personal factors vary widely. Armed with an intelligent appreciation of these facts, as applied to members of the family, a physician possesses the maximum opportunity to render his best advice not only in curing disease, but as medical counselor to the family as a whole."







Student Records Are Checked by Tech

LUBBOCK-In an effort to see if high school graduation is the best criteria for predicting success in college, a nation-wide study of records of students who entered college without completing high school in comparison with records of students of the same age group who received high school diplomas is being conducted, according to W. P. Clement, Texas Technological College regis-

The study is made possible on a large scale because many war veterans who did not complete high school are now attending colleges after passing general education develop-

ment tests, Clement explained. The Tech registrar, who is chairman of the committee on special projects for the American Association of Collegiate Registrars, is directing the study for the association.






