IRRIGATION FOR PLAINS

COLLEGE STATION-What does agriculture on the High Plains of Texas need in order to stay permancently on an even keel?

Many Hockley County farmers think the answer is irrigation, says Hockley County Agricultural Agent, A. B. Forehand. They believe that irrigated pastures, hay crops, cotton and grain sorghums will keep Plains agriculture on it's feet, and tend to prevent the livestock industry from folding up in the future.

Since equipment and labor have become more plentiful, Hockley Cowunty farmers are becoming irrigation conscious. County Agent Forehand says that by the time the year is out thousands of acres of dry cropland in the county will be fed by irrigation wells.

Some of the problems to be worked out in putting a farm under irrigation are: separating types of soil on one farm into different plots or fields, so the use of water will be most efficient; laying out rows which will have the proper slope and still be spaced so they may be worked with four-row equipment; building elevated ditches and sub-ditches to carry the water; and locating well sites. The county agent says all these points must be considered if a farmer puts in a proper irrigation system.




