· Health Notes

AUSTIN-The ordinary housefly is an enemy to health, and is one of the agents most commonly desponsible for the spread of disease over the nation, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Typhoid fever, dysentery, and many other intestinal diseases can often be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies will not endanger the health of your family. Keep flies away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit entranec of flies. Infections from this source can be picked up by flies and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or bur-1ed. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and per cent of the prewar base period. preventing unnecessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet outlining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly control.

Texas Business Drops Some, Bureau Says

AUSTIN—The volume of Texas business decreased slightly from January to February, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. The Bureau's composite index of business activity was 214 per cent of the prewar base period, 1935-39, or 1 per cent above

Gains made by three components -electric power consumption, 8 per cent; crude runs to stills, 4 per cent; and pay rolls, 2 per cent—pushed the composite index within 10 per cent of the wartime peak in January, 1945. However, three components showed declines from January to February: employment, 1 per cent; department and apparel store sales, 4 per cent; and miscellaneous freight carloadings, 1 per cent. These divergent trends, resulting in a 1 per cent monthly change in the composite index, indicate that the level of activity has probably about

reached its peak. According to Dr. John R. Stockton, professor of business statistics, if no new inflationary force becomes important, it would seem likely that a turndown could be expected before many months. The present unsettled state of the world, and the possibility that the United States may embark on an extensive program of rearmament make any forecast highly uncertain. A strong originating force, such as greatly increased expenditures for rearmament, would creat sufficient inflationary pressure to push activity back up to the high levels of the war period, and in effect offset the possibilities of a decline from the unbalance that has developed in the present business situation.

Compared to February 1947, the business situation in Texas showed a higher level of activity in all phases. All components of the index of business activity were higher in February than a year earlier as the composite index rose 11 per cent.

For the second consecutive month, total voluce of retail trade declined. February sales, adjusted for seasonal variation, were 5 per cent below January, however, sales gained 10 per cent from February 1947. Dr. Stockton said, "Two successive monthly decreases lend support to the theory that a rather general weakness is developing in the business situation, as this is the first time since the end of the war that the Bureau's index of retail sales registered two consecutive declines.'

Th level of manufacturing activity in February stood substantially above the same period in 1947. The index of industrial electric power consumption gained 9 per cent above a year earlier. Man-hours worked rose 3 per cent, and manufacturing employment increased 4 per cent. The activity of the petroleum refining industry was 21 per cent higher than February 1947, as measured by crude runs to stills, while the daily average production of crude petroleum was 18 per cent greater.
