**Health Notes**  
By Texas Department of Health

**AUSTIN TEXAS**—With the report of 77 new cases of chicken pox, 11 cases of diphtheria, 320 cases of measles, 75 cases of polio, and 199 cases of whooping cough occurring in the state in the week between July 10-17, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, had made an appeal to all parents to have their children undergo a thorough physical examination before entering school next month.

The appeal was made to coincide with the announcements of the various opening dates of schools all over the state.

"It is a medically established fact that a child's health has a direct bearing on his progress in school," the health officer said. "It is no longer sufficient to provide the child with books and new fall clothing. Today we realize the health factor must be considered if the child is to reach his optimum level."

Dr. Cox said that since the child spends most of his time indoors with large groups of children, it is imperative that he be immunized against communicable diseases when such protection is possible. The spread of such diseases is facilitated in congested classrooms.

He said the examination should include a dental check-up and inspection of the eyes, ears, nose and throat. The best health insurance is by the family physician and dentist.

**VETERAN'S NEWS**

Next Saturday, July 31, is the last opportunity for World War II veterans to reinstate lapsed National Service Life Insurance on a "comparative health" basis, VA has announced.

All VA offices in the Dallas Branch Area of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi will remain open Saturday so that veterans may reinstate under present liberal regulations.

After Saturday, veterans whose insurance has been lapsed more than

three months must take physical examinations to qualify as insurable risks.

To reinstate on a comparative health basis, veterans need only fill out a simple application form, in which they certify that their health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months to reinstate their NSLI policies.

Eligible veterans may reinstate any amount of term insurance—from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500—regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed under present liberal regulations.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an Amendment to Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section

thereto to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

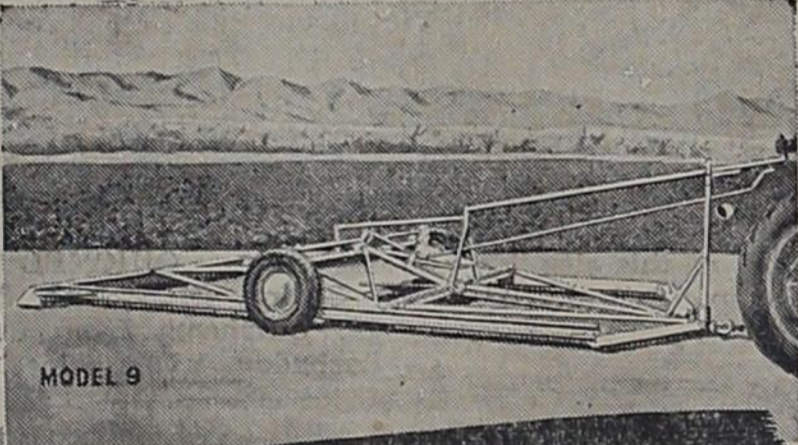

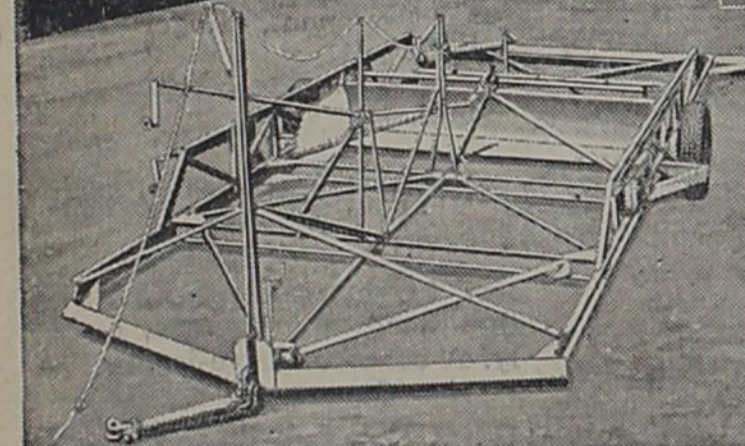
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

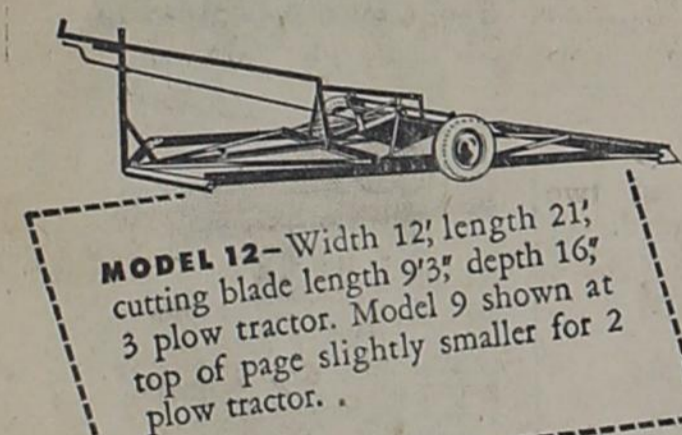

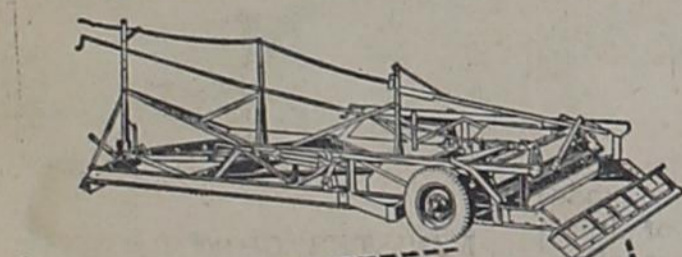

**What Is Your Stake In Social Security?**

"What is my stake in social security? Those words are becoming more and more important to every man, woman, and child who works for a living because each has a constantly growing stake in the program." John Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office said today. "To the worker who approaches the age of 65, the thought that he will have some financial reserve to depend upon, a reserve he has worked to build up, is a very encouraging factor in planning for a retirement which will be slowly but surely forced upon him." Sanderson said.

"The entire program is built on the basic idea that a man who has devoted his life to production for society has a definite right to the freedom which comes from the knowledge that he and his family will have a regular money income. Even a modest sum, which comes regularly every month, looms large in importance as a means of helping to maintain a reasonable standard of living.

"The American worker seldom wants for nothing. It is a source of pride and satisfaction to him to know that the social security benefits paid to him will come from the security trust funds which his contributions helped build. Social Security has established such a fund from the con-

tributions of workers and employers in commerce and industry. Drawing on that fund is a right rather than a favor." Sanderson concluded.

The Social Security Administration will assist you in any way possible, to inform you of your rights under this program and assist you to apply for benefits. The office serving this area is located in the Post Office Building at Amarillo, Texas.

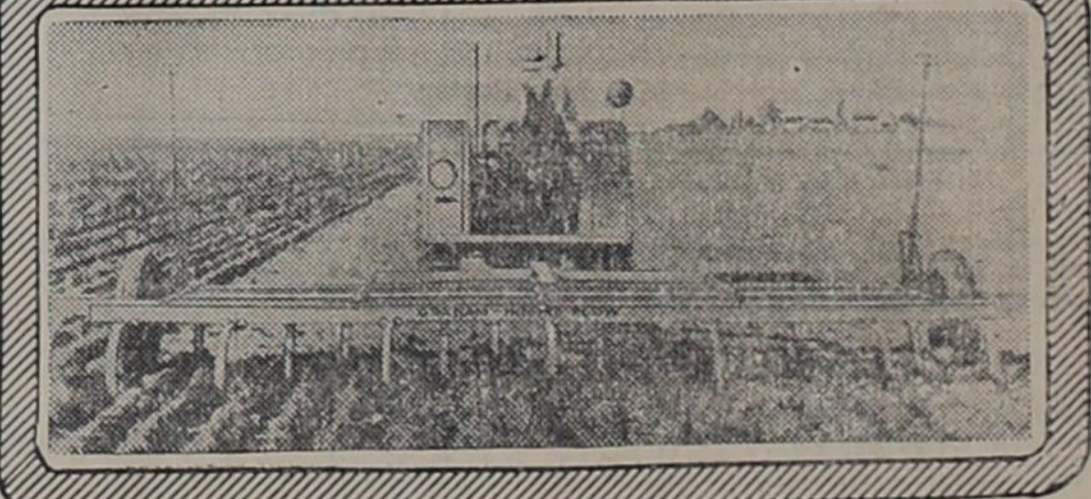

Producers who have prior approvals for summer-fallow, chiseling, irrigation practices, seeding permanent pasture grasses, and many other practices should turn these forms in at the AAA office as soon as the practices become complete. If you keep the approvals, there is a danger of losing them or forgetting to turn them in until after the deadline and as a result no payment is earned. In returning the prior approvals by mail be sure to execute the extent the practice was carried out and sign on the designated line.

We still have about \$15,000.00 in the county to spend on various soil building practices. In order to receive payment for any practice under the present program, you must get a PRIOR APPROVAL from the county office before the practice is started. Remember this and do not wait until after the practice is complete as no payment will be made if you do.

We will send out form letters in a few days requesting the amount of acres grain sorghum stubble to be left on the land and the acreage you intend to seed to small grains on the contour this fall. It would be appreciated if you would fill in the amounts on this letter and return to the office. In case you fail to receive this notice within the next few days you may report the acreage at the local AAA office.

**New Buildings For New Mexico Fair**

The building will be located at the north boundary of the Fair grounds, considerable distance from any other structures, to assure complete isolation.

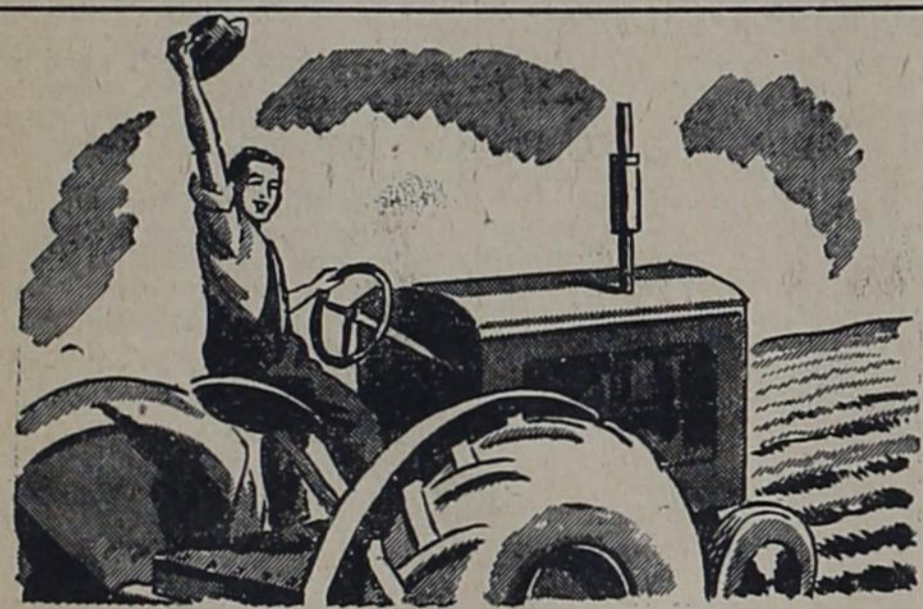
