


bearing heavy precipitation, have been falling over the county the past two weeks with the result that the county's big feed crop is taking on most favorable prospects for a heavy yield this fall.

Roy Daniels, who lives on the extreme eastern edge of Parmer county, was in town Tuesday and said his crop prospect was the best he had ever had here. He said crop conditions throughout the Lazbuddy section were excellent, although late. The same condition prevails in

the Oklahoma Lane section just east of this city. A Tribune reporter visited this area Tuesday afternoon and found all crops, while small, up to a good stand and most of it had been worked out. None of the feed has reached the boot stage, but all fields are in good condition and growing rapidly, farmers report.

Heavy rains of the past weekend, when most farmers reported an inch of moisture and upwards, and then additional showers Tuesday aftermoon have almost assured a good feed crop here this fall.

The appeal was made to coincide with the announcements of the various opening dates of schools all over the state.

"It is a medically establshed fact that a child's health has a direct bearing on his progress in school," the health officer said. "It is no longer sufficient to provide the child with books and new fall clothing. Today we realize the health factor must be considered if the child is to reach his optimum level."

Dr. Cox said that since the child spends most of his time indoors with large groups of children, it is imperative that he be immunized against communicable diseases when such protection is possible. The spread of such diseases is facilitated in conjested classrooms.

VETERAN'S QUESTION BOX

Q .- Will the Government deduct money it paid on the guaranteed portion of my loan or the payments made for schooling and subsistence allowance from my future bonus that may be authorized by Congress? A.-No.

Q-May a veteran, who is receiving disability compensation, receive (at the same time) subsistence allowance under the G-I Bill?

A.-Yes.

Q.-I am a World War II veteran and I desire to purchase a car to go to the coast and get a job. Will Veterans Administration guarantee a loan for the purchase?

A .- No. VA will guarantee a loan for a car only when the vehicle is to be used for business purposes.

Q.-How can I show that my parents are dependent on me for support?

A .- Dependency will be held to exist if your parents do not have an income sufficient to provide reasonable maintenance for themselves and members of their family under legal age, or members of the family otherwise dependent by reason of mental or physical condition.

Q.-I cashed the compensation check that VA sent me. Does that mean that I am satisfied with the rating given me? A .- No. The fact that you cashed the check does not waive any rights you may have in claiming greater compensation or pension than that which was awarded you.
