Shortage Of Storage Looms In Southwest

With practically every grain elevator in the southwest filled to capacity with 1948 wheat, grain men are already becoming concerned over the possibility of a serious shortage of storage facilities when the fall grain sorghums begin to roll.

Grain men contacted here this week said that no wheat was being moved to the great grain terminals of the southwest, meaning that they had no outlet for unloading their storage space in preparation for the fall movements.

The grain sorphum crop, now rapidly approaching maturity is estimated as the biggest crop produced in recent years. Where to put the grain is already proving a headache to.grain buyers.

Buyer readily agreed that far-j mers had better begin now making preparations to store as much of the crop as possible on their farms.
