County Will Provide New Right-of-Way

County Judge A. D. Smith stated today that a called meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court held on December 23, signed an agreement with the State Highway Department, agreeing to furnish the right-of-way for the extension of Farm Road No. 690, a distance of 10

The action followed an agreement on the part of the State Highway Department to pave the road when the county provided the right-ofway. Judge Smith said that the Court had previously agreed to furnish the right-of-way, but the action last Thursday made the agreement official. Documents to that effect were signed and sent to Austin.

Am 30-foot right-of-way has been asked for, and Judge Smith gave it as his opinion that all the additional land could be obtained by easements. with no land to buy. Utility lines along the route will have to be moved back, he said, and this expense will be borne by the county.

The new farm-to-market project in the county will be a ten-mile extension of the present route, which now terminates at the Oklahoma Lane school house. With the additional ten miles, the road will extend to five miles west of Lazbuddy, at a point where the Muleshoe-Friona farm-tomarket road, running north and south, crosses the new route, the location being commonly known as the "twin houses".

Contracts for the grade and drainage structures are expected to be let during the next few weeks, with the topping to be done next summer, The project has been estimated to cost \$82,000.00.



It included a record 3,650.548,000 bushels of corn, a wheat crop of 1 .-\$2.00 288,406(000 bushels, the second larg-\$2.50 est in history, a 14-937,000-bale cotton crop, and a tobacco harvest of 1,-897,726,000 pounds. Soybeans, pea-

VETERAN'S NEWS

Many subsistence checks mailed each month to veterans studying in schools and colleges under the GI Bill and Public Law 16 must be returned because the veteran failed to inform the Veteran's Administration promptly of his new address, VA reports.

Federal law prohibits mail carriers from forwarding a government check from one address to another. It must be delivered to the address on the check.

Checks which cannot be delivered must be returned to the Treasury Department and held there until the veteran submits a change of address to the VA regional office holding his records.

Veterans Administration has announced that its current dental work backlog is the lowest in two years.

Dr. Bion R. East, director of VA's Dental Service, said that during the three months ending September 30, 1948, the agency's dental workload was pared from 291,051 to 229,541, a reduction of 21 percent.

Dr. East said that he expected an even greater reduction by June 30, 1949, the end of the present fiscal year.

Veterans of World War II held National Service Life Insurance policies in force on October 1, 1948, representing more than \$40.5 billions of insurance protection, VA reports.

VETERAN'S QUESTION BOX

Q—May pension or compensation payments, accruing to a veteran and unpaid at the time of his death, be awarded to the widow, children or dependent parents?

A—Yes, in the order named. If it is not paid to one of these persons, it may be payable to the person paying the expenses of the last sickness and burial.

Q—My son was killed in action during World War II. Am I entitled to compensation?

A-You are entitled to compensation, provided dependency can be shon. Dependency will be held to exist if you do not have sufficient income to provide reasonable maintenance for yourself and your family.

Q—While in the Army, I had a dependency allowance for my mother. I am now attending school under Public Law 346. Is it necessary for me to re-establish dependency of my mother?

A-Yes. For further details, contact your local Veterans Administration office.






