

Malnutrition and fatigue are productive of poor posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decrease lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously intefere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards.

"School children who have a poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands

The new line will have an initial capacity of 95,000 barrels per day with one intermediate station between Kemper and Satsuma. The capacity can be increased to 120,000 barrels per day by the addition of a second intermediate station.

The direct route to be followed by the new line from Kemper to Satsuma will pass through 16 counties. Kemper is a central point on Humble's extensive pipe line system ser-

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

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamaticn for said election and shall have the same published as re quired by the Constituiton for Amendments thereto.

The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

The foregoing Constitu-tional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as

The rows should be three feet 14 inches apart and cover three to four inches deep as soon as possible Exposure to heat and light increases the chances for decay and a poor stand, says Hutchison.

After the potatoes are up to a stand. they should be worked every few days. If the plants wilt during the day, it is an indication they need water and should be irrigated. Toward the end of the growing period when the potatoes begin to form, it is important that the soil be kept moist.

Fall grown potatoes keep well in storage-don't let them freeze. Cellars and sweet potato curing houses can be used for storage. The cotton seed house on the farm is a good storage place. Scoop out a hole in the seed large enough to accommodate several bushels of potatoes, then pile the seed back over them. They will keep well and will be free from dirt.
