



According to Dr. Cox, the most commonly treated conditions are late effects of acute poliomyelitis, cerebral palsy, osteomyelitis, tuberculosis of joints, cleft palate, harelip and clubfeet. Although the services are provided for children from birth to 21 years, the largest group treated were from the age bracket of 4 to 14 years.

The help given these crippled children represents 3,747 clinic visits, 43,433 days of hospital care, 2,89' days of convalescent home care, and 4,986 doctor's visits.

"As long as sufficient State funds are available, and crippled Texas child of normal mentality, under twenty-one years of age, whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for proper care, is entitled to the help of the Crippled Children's Division," Dr. Cox said, "if his doctor believes that it is reasonable to expect that the child can be improved through hospitalization, medical or surgicacl care, artificial appliances, or through a combination of these services."

More Grasshoppers **Predicted For 1949**

COLLEGE STATION,-Grasshopper infestations tend to run in 10ear cycles-and 1949 is the tenth year, of the present cycle.

There may be as many or more hoppers this year than last-and 19-48 was pretty bad.

This prediction is made by H. G. Johnston, state grasshopper control Jeader and head of the Texas A. & M. College department of entomology, on the basis of egg counts made by USDA grasshopper control division workers.


Hoppers will begin to hatch in South Texas within the next two weeks, he said.

The worst centers of infestation of the differential grasshopper-the big yellow one with chevrons on his Jegs-will be along the Brazos betwen Waco and Richmond and along the Trinity as far south as Polk and San Jacinto counties. Scattered infestations are expected along creek bottoms in North Texas as far east as Titus county and west to the West Cross Timbers.

A lesser-but still above normaloutbreak of the migratory grasshopper is expected in West Texas, the South Plains and the Panhandle.

The differential grasshopper can be controlled by dusting along fence rows and ditches, when the hoppers first hatch, with either 15 pounds of 10 percent toxaphene of 15 pounds of 10 percent chlordane per acre. After the insects move into the fields, control is more difficult.

Toxaphene or chlordane can be used against the migratory grasshopper where there is enough foliage to hold the insecticide. 

He now knows the anguish that wrenched old Isaac's heart and caused him to cry out his misery, "When a man is bereaved of his children, he is bereaved."



COLLEGE STATION,-In a nutshell, there isn't much good news ahead for the Texas peanut grower, as far as the supply is concerned. That's the way Texas A. & M. College extension specialists in agronomy, and agricultural economics see it.

It just isn't favorable at all from the producer's standpoint. And here's why. The 1948 bumper crop gave the peanut people more goobers than they can market, other than for eating.

Large supplies of oil crops are on hand, and the world exports of fats and oils are increasing, say these specialists.


On the demand side, there are some favorable points, however. The level of employment in the nation's population is increasing two million persons a year. This year's support price of peanuts is 90 percent of parity, and world need for fats and oils is more than the supply can keep up with.

The rest of the picture doesn't look as good. Funds of savings are declining and the competition for the consumers dollar is more than in past years. Peanuts for food uses have dropped from the high wartime level.

That's the peanut picture for 1949, these specialists agree.


