To my way of thinking, our public health program is just about the most important thing we have to consider at the present. What with a heavy growth of weeds all over the Twin Cities, unsanitary conditions around many business houses and homes, numerous caved-in cesspools, all fly and mosquito breeders of the first order, some drastic action should be taken immediately. We could wake up some of these days to find that we had a dozen or so cases of polio and then it would be too late to take the necessary advanced precautions. A committee of Farwell men met at the school house last Friday night and agreed on a permanent plan to safeguard the health of our citizens. It is recommended that a meter assessment of 50 cents per month be placed on each water meter in Texico-Farwell to finance a health program. Such a plan would raise in the neighborhood of \$1,800 per year, and would adequately take care of weed cuttings, spraying for insects, garbage disposal, and such items. This program may not suit you at all. You may be in favor of the old system of passing the hat with virtually the same group of businessmen digging up the money. But something must be done, and quickly. If you have a better plan to offer, let's hear from you. Certainly, unless a majority of our people are in favor of the meter assessment, the waterworks officials are not going to put it in force. No civic program is of more importance than the health of our citizenship. It doesn't cost anything to produce flies, mosquitoes and weeds, but it does cost to get rid of them. Is the health of your family worth an investment of 50 cents a month?

Being taken to a kidding about always carrying a walking cane, Uncle Tom Randol claimed that he did not really need it. But, he explained, he got in the habit of "always carrying a stick to kill rattlesnakes" when he first homesteaded southwest of Texico many years ago.

### County Invests More In Government Bonds

The Parmer County Permanent School fund now has a total of \$213,500 invested in Series G United States Government bonds, a check up at the county courthouse revealed here today.

The total investment was boosted an additional \$62,500 here on Monday when the Commissioners Court passed an order authorizing County Judge A. D. Smith to invest that amount in Series G securities. These bonds draw interest at the rate of 2½ per cent annually, payable semi-annually.

The most recent purchase was made possible when the Commissioners Court recently sold one-fourth of the oil royalties on League 117 Parmer County School lands, located in Gaines and Andrews Counties.

Interest from the bonds, amounting to over \$5,000 per year, will be distributed to the various schools of the county on a per scholastic basis.

### Joe Hromas Building Elevator On Farm

Joe Hromas, who lives southeast of Bovina, is building a small grain elevator at his farm to be used for storage. He said this week that he expected to have it completed before wheat harvest.

The elevator will have a capacity of "about 5000 bushels", with three bins above the ground and three below. It will be of wood construction and the lifts will be operated electrically.

### SUFFERS CENTIPEDE BITES

Ralph Humble, local implement dealer, is recovering from a series of centipede bites he suffered one day last week. Humble says he picked up a bunch of feed bags and put them under his arm. The insect, hidden under the bags, nipped him several times from his chest to the mid-section of his back before he could brush it off. He says he suffered considerable pain from the bites for several days.

Bringing in what was reported to be the first wheat cut in Parmer County, Orié Jones, Farwell lad who farms six miles south of town, told a reporter Tuesday morning that he delivered 77 bushels of grain to a Clovis elevator and received \$1.77 per bushel, in addition to a \$25 bonus for the first load delivered there.

Tuesday afternoon, his second load of wheat was delivered to the Lariat Elevator, reported Boone Allison, manager of the Lariat concern.

Jones, a Farwell high school student, and member of the Farwell chapter of the Future Farmers of America, said that the 15-acre field was a project in his agriculture work and would yield from 20 to 22 bushels per acre. He said the wheat tested 13.85 per cent, and he would finish cutting operations on his patch Tuesday afternoon.

Jones said that he had "dusted in" his wheat "about the last part of August."

### Aged Lady Sustains Broken Hip In Fall

Mrs. W. H. Osborne, age 80, for many years a resident of this city, is receiving treatment in a Clovis hospital for a hip injury she sustained the past Thursday morning, when she fell at her home in this city.

Her physician said today that she was getting along nicely and no complications had developed since undergoing surgery for the injury. Silver plates were fastened about the broken bone of her upper thigh bone.

Miss Bertie Osborne, who makes her home with her mother, said the aged lady tripped and fell as she was leaving the back door of their home early Thursday.

### Two New Houses Now Going Up In Texico

Two new residences got underway in Texico this week when construction work was started on homes for Supt. Agrie Jones and Coach Charles Stockton, both of the Texico schools.

The Jones home will have six rooms and two baths, while the Stockton property will consist of five rooms and a single bath. Both houses are located on lots directly north of the Leroy Faville home in north Texico.

Supt. Jones, who comes here from Grady, N. M., where he has been superintendent the past two years, previously taught school in Roosevelt County for a 20-year period and served as county superintendent there for two terms. He will assume his duties here July 1.

Coach Stockton has been at Grady the past four years and has developed some of the strongest basketball teams in Curry County in recent years. His duties will begin here with the opening of the fall school term.

## Two Road Petitions Tabled

### Rainfall Here Behind Record Set During Wet Year of 1941

Although the rainfall here for the current year has been far in excess of the average over a 20-year period, it is still short of the record moisture year of 1941 when 45.67 inches of rain fell here during the 12-month period.

Furthermore, the rainfall received here does not come up to the record established during the first six months of 1941, when the Weatherman dumped 27.20 inches of moisture into the local rain gauge.

Records kept at the Capitol Freehold Land Trust reveal that during the present year and up to June 14, a total of 14.36 inches has been recorded, which is 12.84 under the 19-

41 figures up to July 1 of that year.

A survey of the comparative figures for the years 1941 and 1949, show that the precipitation during the first two months of this year exceeded those of the same months for 1941. During the other four months, 1941 held a comfortable lead. Here is the way the two years compare:

## Two Unhurt When Train Crashes Auto

Two Hereford men are alive and unhurt this week as a result of the quick thinking and acting of Harrison Gee, young Friona farmer. Gee, returning to Friona last Wednesday night around 3 a. m., saw a car on the Santa Fe tracks about five miles east of Bovina and went to investigate, taking two men from the machine before the fast-moving west bound passenger train swooped down to demolish the vehicle.

Donald M. Holman, of Hereford, was the driver and owner of the vehicle, a 1949 Oldsmobile. The other man in the car was Holman's father-in-law, W. B. Richardson, of Amarillo. They were enroute to Hereford from New Mexico.

Recounting his adventure to a Tribune reporter, Gee said that he noticed the car on the tracks—at a spot where there is no railroad crossing—because the lights of the machine were burning. He braked his pickup and started to turn around to investigate, only to become stuck in the bar pit at the side of the road. Reaching the machine on foot, Gee found Holman sitting behind the wheel, wiping his bloody mouth with a handkerchief, and apparently added.

"I first thought the men were intoxicated," Gee said, but went on to explain that there was no liquor in the car, and that "neither of the men smelled as if they had been drinking". The occupants of the car, however, could offer no explanation as to how they had driven onto the track.

Gee got Holman out of the car and finally made him understand that a train appeared to be approaching, although a heavy rain interfered with vision. The two opened the trunk of the car and attempted to jack up the rear wheels onto some boxes to give the car traction, when they discovered that the train was coming uncomfortably close.

Holman and Gee then got Richardson "out of the car for about the third time" and got clear of the tracks before the train hit the machine. Gee took the two men on into Friona, where they contacted relatives in Hereford.

Texas Highway Patrolman McNeil of Hereford, who questioned Holman and Richardson about the mishap some 20 hours after it had happened, told a Tribune reporter that the men explained to him that they were (Continued on Last Page)

## METER ASSESSMENT MAY SOLVE HEALTH PROBLEM

A meeting of local citizens called for Friday evening of last week—and attended by a small representation—went on record as favoring an assessment of 50 cents per month on each water meter in Farwell to finance a permanent health program for the city.

Such a program would, in the opinion of those present, make funds available for the control of insects and the disposal of garbage within the city. Texico was not represented at the meeting, but it was believed that citizens of that city "would go along" with the movement.

Weed control came in for much discussion, but eradication, by spraying was ruled impractical because of the proximity of gardens, flowers, trees and shrubs; unless such spraying was done by small hand sprayers.

Viewing with much concern the experiences other cities of Texas have been having with polio during recent weeks, those attending the meeting recommended that a program to eliminate the weeds

The Parmer County Commissioners Court, in session here Monday, postponed any action on two petitions presented them on that day.

One petition asked for creation of a special road district, embracing all of the Friona and Black school districts, and portions of the Bovina and Luzbuddy school districts. Action on this petition was postponed until the next regular meeting June 27.

A second petition, asking that the County Commissioners call a second county-wide road bond election for the purpose of voting on an \$800,000 road bond issue, was also tabled for further consideration.

In the meantime, according to County Judge A. D. Smith, all members of the Commissioners Court will go to Austin next Monday, where they have an appointment with State Highway Engineer Greer, in order to gain a clear picture of what the road-building program in Parmer County for the next few years promises. Members of the Court seemed to take the position that there was no necessity of voting bonds to build roads that the State expected to build with State and Federal money.

"We don't want to interfere with the State's program," Judge Smith said, adding that there were other details "to be looked into" concerning bond issues and road programs for the county.

### Bovina Farmer Dies After Long Illness

Joseph (Joe) Miller, who formerly farmed south of Bovina and was a resident of Parmer County for the past 31 years, passed away in the Parmer County Community Hospital early Tuesday morning after a long illness. He was removed to the hospital only a day before his death.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Main Street Baptist church in Muleshoe Thursday afternoon at 2 p. m. and interment will be in the Bovina cemetery, under direction of Muleshoe Funeral Home. Miller was born at Clyde, Tex., Nov. 22, 1891.

Having never married, there are no surviving members of his immediate family. Two sisters, Mrs. J. R. Crowell of Pomona, Calif.; Mrs. J. E. Dunham, Selma, Calif.; three brothers, J. P. Miller, Farwell; F. C. Miller, Lubbock; and C. L. Miller, Farwell; one niece, Mrs. J. B. Gennings, Farwell, are listed as the survivors.

### Held On Desertion Charge For Florida

**Health Notes**

AUSTIN—During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as chambers of commerce, many civic organizations, and others in the arranging of fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that for taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant. "The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed? Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered? I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B. O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation, should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying.

Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly-tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably with one

or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed. A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

**Feast or Famine Is Good Description Of Feed Situation**

COLLEGE STATION—A feast or a famine is a pretty good description of the feed situation many cows face every year. Green growing crops have plenty of all the nutrients needed in a good ration, especially protein and vitamin A.

And the silo offers the best storage means for these nutrients until they're needed, says G. G. Gibson, extension dairy husbandman of Texas A. and M. College. Making good hay early in the season presents a problem because spring weather favors growth rather than drying out processes needed for silage.

As a result, lots of good hay is lost, or hay of poor quality is made into silage. With every crop, there's a best time for harvesting to get the highest nutrient value. Good silage can be made from hay and grass crops without the use of preservative by means of the wilting method, says Gibson.

With a little practice, farmers can learn to tell the best time the crop is ready for siloing. When a crop has wilted slightly, it appears a little lighter in color, and the leaves and stems will be limp but not dry and curled. Twisting will bring the moisture out of the stems, but no free moisture will run off.

**Farmers Hoping For Sunshine On Crops**

Anxious farmers of this section who for the most part in past years have stood out in the open and looked up to a cloudless sky in the hope of rain, are now just as anxious to see some good, warm sunshine and more of those cloudless skies.

Rains, mostly in the form of local showers, have continued to blast this section during the past week until the growers are beginning to express concern about their farming operations. The chief concern at this time is for the wheat crop, which is maturing at a slow pace on account of the continued wet, cloudy weather. Harvest, which was calculated to get under way early next week, is being delayed and is not likely to get into full swing for another two weeks, even with the most favorable weather.

Some wheat has been lost to hail; but, fortunately, these losses have not covered a wide area in any section, with most of the hail storms being reported light.

Thousands of acres of feed crops remain to be planted, and many farmers report plantings will be necessary where young growth was covered up by the excessive rainfall of the past weekend. Local seed dealers are reporting a shortage of planting seed, occasioned by the replanting operations. Much cotton, in the Lariat and West Camp areas, which showed good promise two weeks ago, has been destroyed by the rain, and many of the fields will not be replanted to the same crop because of the lateness.

Dirt roads have been badly washed by the rushing overflow of water, although most of them remain passable.

**Employment Service Foresees Plenty Of Help For Harvest**

John Knight and C. B. Garland of the Texas Employment Service, were in Farwell last Friday making a check-up on the number of combines, trucks and men that will be available for wheat harvest in this area.

Mr. Knight, who at present is located at Dimmitt, gave it as his opinion there would be plenty of combines and trucks in the two-county area (Parmer and Castro) under his jurisdiction. He also gave it as his opinion there would be a surplus of hands in this area. At present he maintains his office with the County Agent at Dimmitt and can be reached there by parties interested in harvest help or employment.

Knight said the demand for trucks was "slow," going on to explain that as a general rule combine operators brought their own trucks along, which were proving sufficient to move the grain from the fields to the elevators. Truckers and men wanting work in harvest should contact his office before moving out, expecting to find work, he said.

"I will be on the job until the wheat harvest is well in hand and can be handled by local operators," Knight said, "and anyone needing help or work can contact me at the Chamber of Commerce or County Agent's office in Dimmitt," he concluded.

**Texico Gas Dealers Meet Farwell Prices**

Filling station operators in Texico continued to hold their gasoline prices to the same level of 23 cents for regular and 25 cents for high test gas this week, despite the fact that an additional two-cent tax went on gasoline in New Mexico Saturday at midnight.

In maintaining the old prices, the Texico dealers are being forced to operate on a two-cent less margin than they formerly had, but dealers interviewed this week said they were forced to do so in order to meet the prices of Texas dealers in Farwell.

Efforts are being made to get an adjustment worked out whereby state line dealers will be given some consideration in the new tax, but there seems to be little hope for such relief. Under the present setup, Texico dealers are allowed a 2½ cent margin on the gasoline sales, and dealers contend that the shrinkage, especially during summer months, will amount to almost that much.

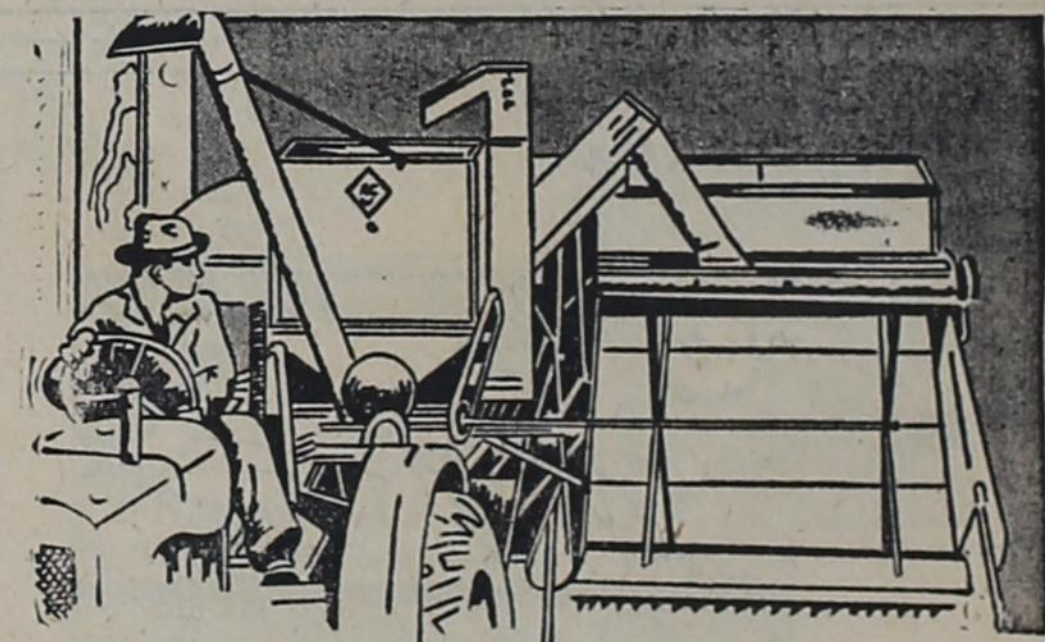

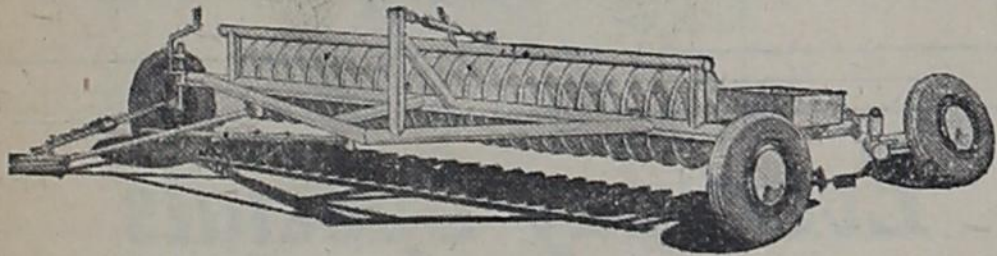

**Store Your Butter Now For Summer Months**

COLLEGE STATION — Good spring pastures mean lots of milk. And that leads to lots of butter. But dry pastures later on this summer may cut butter production.

So, here's a suggestion from Margaret Jackson, assistant foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. & M. College. You can freeze your butter at home and store it in the home freezer for as long as six months if it is good quality. This way, you'll have plenty of butter when the milk production drops off during the later part of the summer.

Miss Jackson says it's best not to

even try to freeze poorly made butter. It doesn't keep well, even in the freezer.

Before freezing the butter, wash it well to get all the milk out. Mold it and wrap it in parchment paper. Then press all the air out that gets caught between the paper and the butter. Then it's ready to pack in wax cartons.

The regular general purpose paper that's used in the kitchens isn't as good as the wax cartons because it allows air to get to the butter. And when that happens, you've got a pound of rancid butter you can't use.

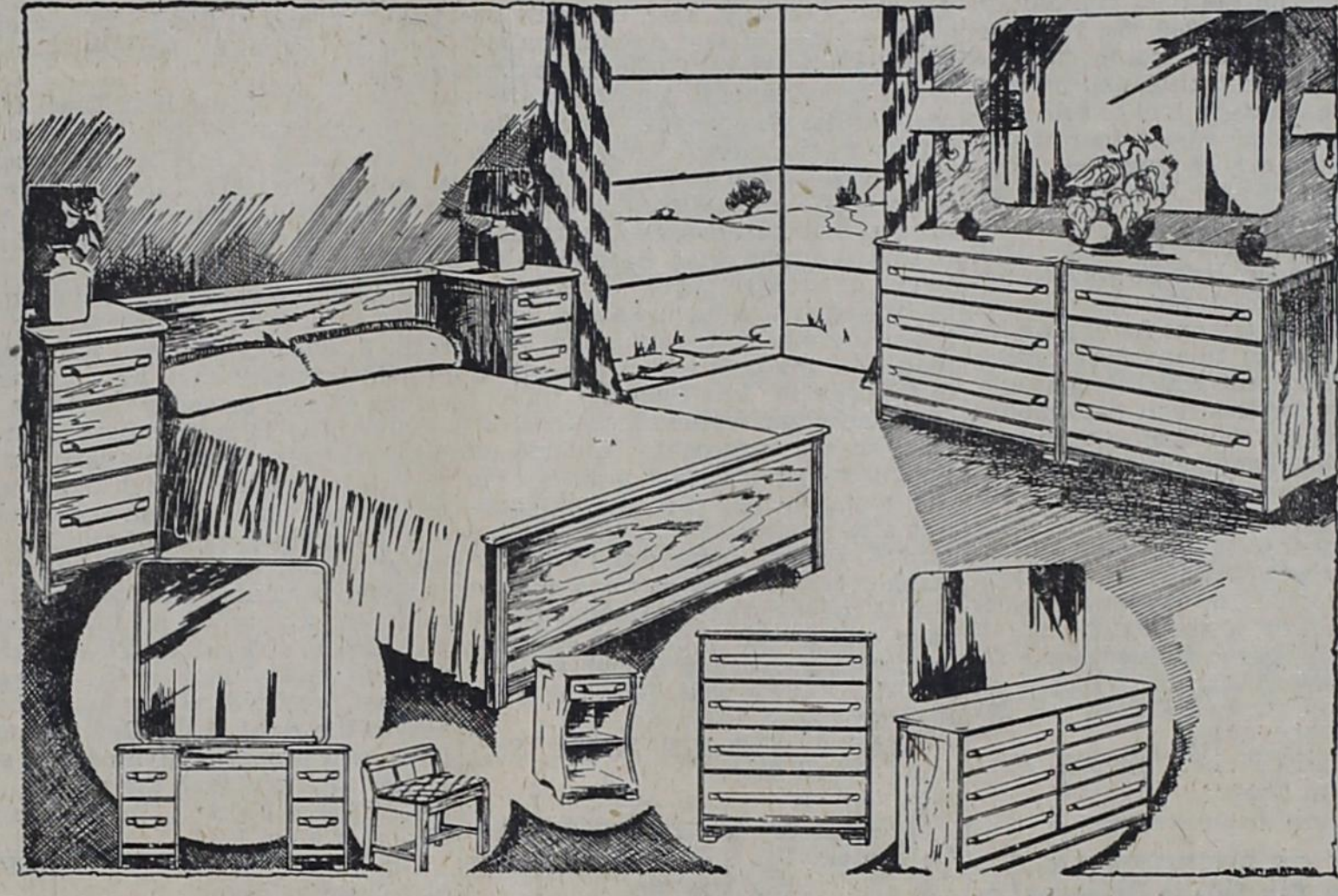

**Texas Grain Man Charges Government With Bungling**

DENTON—G. E. Blewett, secretary of the Texas Grain and Feed Dealers Association, today charged administration forces with deliberately complicating the grain storage situation for the purpose of influencing legislation that would permit CCC to launch an expansive program of building grain storage facilities and thus hasten socialization of the grain industry.

Speaking before the Kiwanis Club on the subject of "America at the Crossroads," Mr. Blewett stated in part:

"Much publicity has been given the grain storage situation in Texas and other southwestern states and the grain trade has been most un-

justly criticized. So without any qualifications or reservations, I charge and accuse CCC, PMA, USDA, Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan, President Harry Truman and other unknown bureaucrats of knowingly and wilfully, intentionally and maliciously causing the congestion that now exists in the grain storage situation by deliberately withholding sales and loading orders on old crop grains, thus keeping present storage facilities filled, thereby discrediting the grain trade for the sole purpose of influencing sentiment in Congress and in the public mind toward legislation now pending that would give the aforementioned greater power and more control over the grain industry.

"An impartial analysis and study of this situation and of the statistics clearly shows the aforementioned are wholly incompetent, completely unable and totally inexperienced to

conduct a grain business either in export or domestic, and I am going to urge Congress to turn the grain business back to experienced and qualified firms who are sufficiently capable and thoroughly competent to handle the grain business, both in export and domestic without burdening the American people with heavy taxation.

"Had the grain trade been in charge of the grain business, this vast accumulation of old crop grains would have long ago disappeared in commercial channels, for the grain trade cannot afford to take losses by carrying old crop grains into new crop deliveries, but the bureaucrats in Washington are not in the least concerned about how much money they lose as these losses do not come out of their pockets, but out of the pockets of the taxpayers of America."

**Wheat Guarantee Officially Set At Seven Cents**

Farmers will be allowed a storage-on-the-farm compensation of seven cents per bushel of wheat by the Commodity Credit Corporation, announced Joe Camp, Farwell secretary of the ACA.

This allowance will be made on 1949 wheat, when the grain is turned over to the CCC in satisfaction of the loan. The set-up is under the direction of the Price Support and Loan program.

Camp concluded that the idea all boiled down to mean that the CCC storage allowance provisions under loan programs will be continued for another year.

**Keeping Draft Board Informed Still Duty Of All Registrants**

Selective Service Board No. 18, with offices at Hereford, which includes the counties of Parmer, Castro, Deaf Smith and Randall, issued a warning to all men who have received their questionnaires to return them at the time listed for their return. Registrants who fail to comply with this regulation will be reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Many veterans think that because they have served their time with the armed forces that they are exempt from this regulation; but they are under the same law as the boys who have never seen any service, if they are within the age group of between 19 and 26 years.

Furthermore, all registrants are required to keep their Local Board informed of their latest address, and to notify the Local Board of any fact that might change their classification.

Men on reserve, either active or inactive, are required to register. The following Parmer County registrants are reported delinquent at the Hereford Local Board office; anyone knowing their whereabouts are asked to notify the Local Board office at Hereford.

**Growers Cautioned To Check Wheat Moisture**

Terminal elevators, where the space can be found, have sounded a warning that no wheat will be accepted where the moisture content exceeds 14 per cent, and all grain in excess of 13 per cent moisture will be subject to dockage.

Grain intended for dead storage, where it cannot be turned and aired, should not exceed 12 per cent moisture, local buyers said. It was suggested that samples from the field be submitted to buyers for moisture tests before harvesting conditions are begun.
