What the average small community needs is not more money from the people living in it, but it needs desperately the personal time, effort, and thoughts of all its citizens. There are not enough "Georges" in a small town; it must be YOU who provides the things YOUR town needs.

Final Plans Made For Farwell AJRA Rodeo

Final plans for the first AJRA rodeo ever to be held in Farwell were discussed at the Monday night meeting of the Farwell Roping Club. Announcement was made that a parade will be held on Thursday, August 3 at 5 p.m. to kick-off the three-day rodeo event. The parade will organize on the State Line Road near the Little League Softball Park (behind the fire station). From this point it will move east through town to the rodeo grounds. Persons desiring to participate in the parade should contact Fred Chandler, 481-3207, or the Rodeo Headquarters (Magness Real Estate Building), 481-3298. However, should you desire to participate in the parade and find yourself unable to contact one of the above mentioned parties feel free to come on and be in the parade anyway. Cars, bicycles, horses and various other vehicles are invited to participate.

First performance of the rodeo will get underway at 8 p.m. on August 3. Two other performances will be held at 8 p.m. on August 4, August 5. Fifteen events including bull riding, steer wrestling, pole bending, bareback riding, barrel racing, tie-down, break-away and ribbon roping will be featured. All entries must reach the Farwell Rodeo Association no later than Saturday, July 29. Entries may be brought to any member of the Association or mailed to Mrs. Mary Lou Harrelson, Clovis, Rte 2, or Fred Chandler, Farwell. The contestants will be divided into three age groups; 12 years and under, 13-15, and 16-19. All contestants must be single in order to be eligible to enter in the AJRA rodeo. Buckles will be given to the high individuals (boy and girl) in each age group and in addition, saddles will be presented to the best all-around cowboy and best all-around cow-

girl. We Gamble, Russians Build

A rather disturbing fact has been brought to light in a special analysis prepared for the House Armed Services committee by a highly prestigious military - scientific panel. The panel, headed by General Bernard A. Schriever, USAF Ret., former commander of the Air Force missile program, warned that the Soviet Union, despite peaceful overtures, is making steady progress in overtaking the United States in nuclear weaponry. They further predict that by 1971, the United States will trail substantially in total deliverable destructive force.

Before you discount the report as being the hysterical rantings of warmongering right wing radicals, I believe you should know that the report bore the signatures of such men as General Curtis LeMay, former Air Force Chief of Staff; Dr. Edward Teller, father of the hydrogen bomb; Admiral Robert L. Dennison, USN Ret, and former Supreme Allied Commander Atlantic; Professor Stefan T. Possony, director of International Studies, Hoover Institution, Stanford University; General Thomas S. Power, USAF Ret., former commander of the Strategic Air Command; and eleven other retired military commanders and scientists -- not radicals, but men whose job it is to know about warfare and weapon technology.

Quoting from the report: "The United States has, in recent years, demonstrated an inclination to disbelieve or to discount Soviet achievements and advances. This is particularly so with respect to the new ballistic missile defenses of the Soviet Union and to Soviet boasts of an orbital bomb capability."

The report goes further and states that in 1962, the United States could deliver between 25,000 and 50,000 megatons against an enemy while Russia's capability was estimated at 6,000 to 12,000 megatons. The report continues by stating that present day Russian capability ranges between 16,000 and 37,000 megatons, while deliverable American strength has slipped to 8,000 to 29,000 megatons. By 1971, the report warns that Russian strength will range between 30,000 and 50,000 megatons while U.S. strength will have fallen to 6,000 to 15,000 megatons. The conclusion is that the Soviet Union is building a missile force designed to win a nuclear war and not to deter one.

If nothing else, the report has certainly cast grave doubts on the wisdom of the policies of Defense Secretary McNamara and the Johnson administration, particularly on their decision to phase out manned bomber capabilities and to hold back on a decision to deploy an American anti-ballistic missile system.

McNamara argues that by relying on ballistic missiles to deliver a nuclear strike against the Soviet Union, a large sum of money will be saved. He further believes that an anti-missile system is not worth the cost of deployment. The administration's concern for the American taxpayer would be touching, if it were not for the fact that we are saving money at the expense of adequate national security. It becomes particularly nauseating when one considers that our security is being undermined in order to finance countless government give-away programs. One is forced to suspect a purely political motive in the administration's reluctance to maintain a clear military superiority over the Soviet Union. Welfare and federal aid programs have a far greater vote gathering potential among certain groups than do advanced weapon systems.

To justify their actions, the administration is placing rather heavy emphasis on the hope that the Soviet Union is mellowing in its foreign policy. This assumption is at best the height of naivness, and at worst, gross stupidity. There is absolutely no evidence to support this assumption. On the contrary, all the evidence points to the fact that Russia is more determined than ever to achieve world domination, by slow infiltration of governments if possible, by nuclear war if necessary.

Make no mistake about it, the world will not be totally destroyed by nuclear war. There will be a victor and a vanquished. Which one the United States will be depends on how well we are equipped to fight it. As matters stand now, our manned bomber force is totally obsolete, consisting of 600 mph B-52s which by the administration's own admittance are extremely vulnerable to Soviet anti-aircraft missiles. Rural Accidents Total Eight

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1967 there have been 1,476 traffic deaths compared to 1,396 traffic deaths for the first six months of 1966. 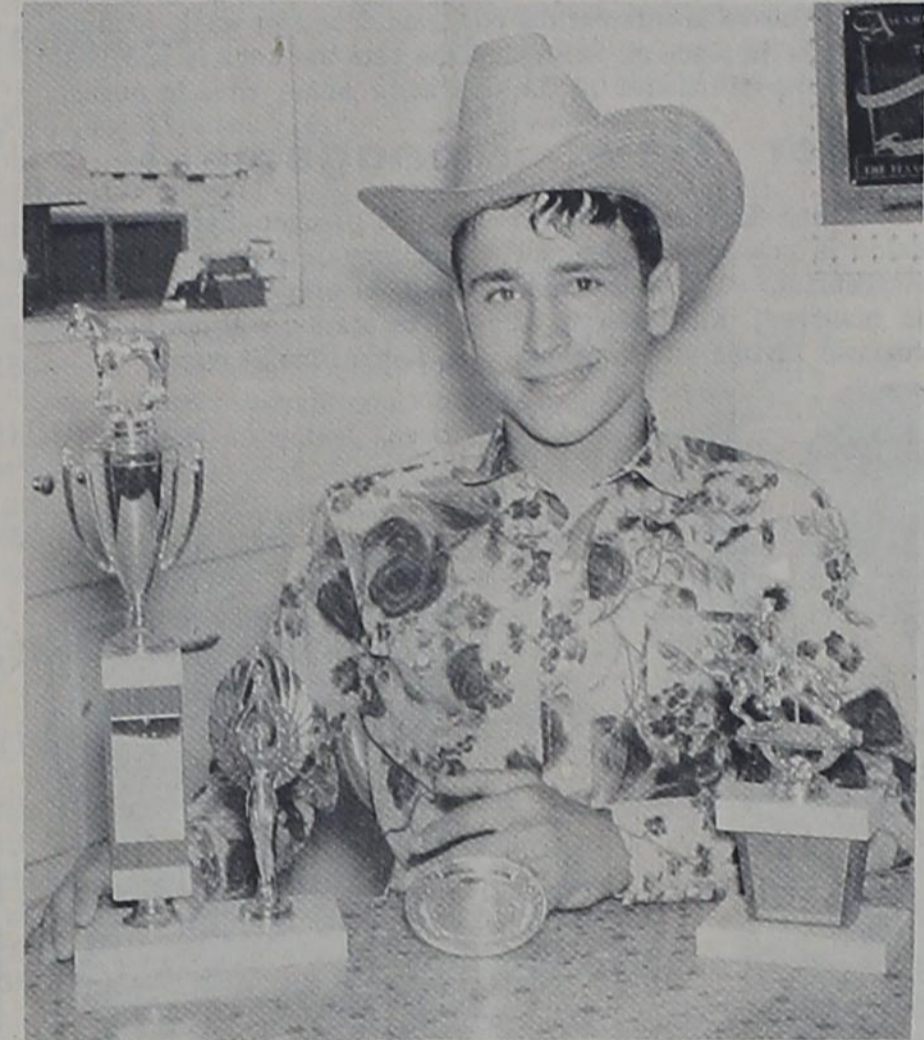

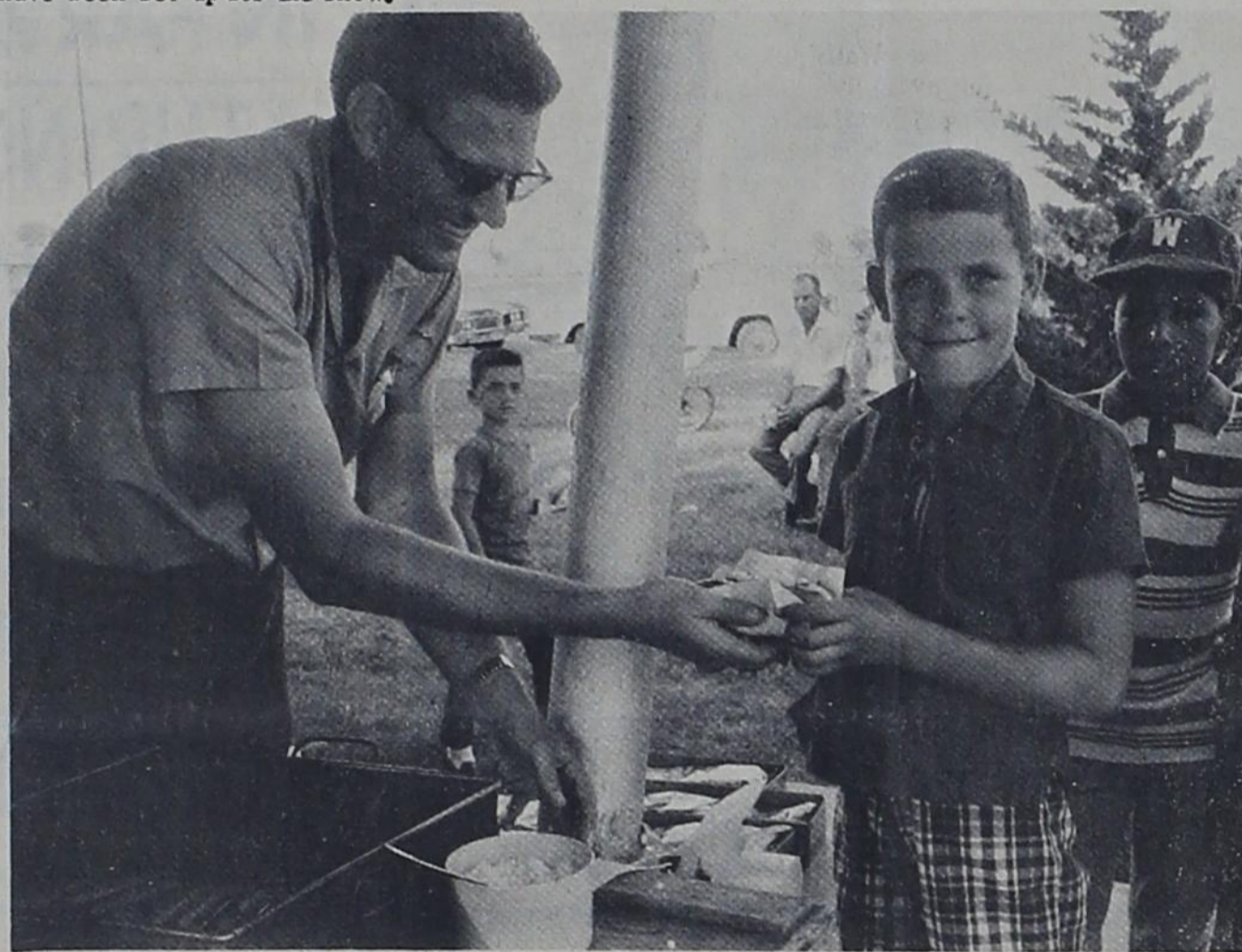
It is hoped that the swimming pool will be completed and in operation by end of the summer. The golf greens should be completed by October; however, they will not be in use before spring.

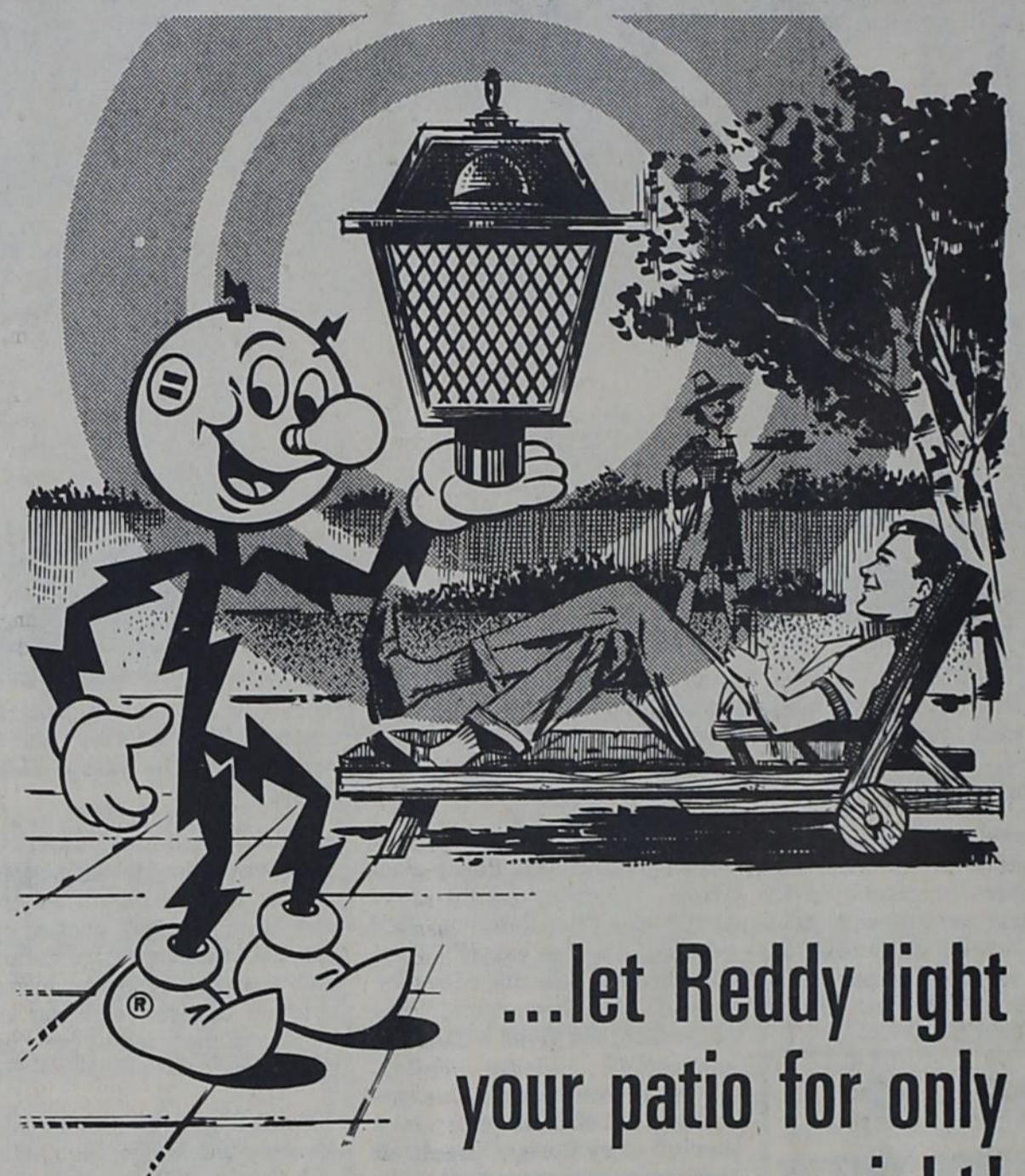

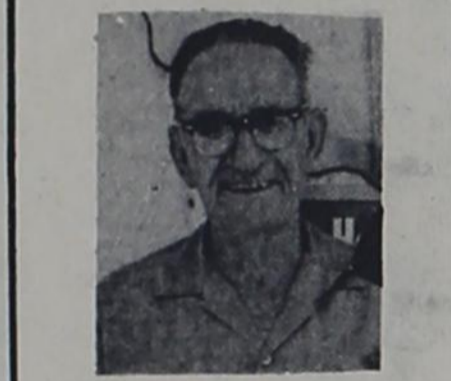
