Extensive Tribune Survey Begun On Twin City Building Boom

Not for many a bygone annum have the Twin Cities experienced anything approaching the huge and lavish residential program now being experienced. Old-timers returning to the border cities from outer civilization usually profess their astonishment in glowing terms like "I've never seen anything like it!" and where do dry-land farmers get money to build homes like this?"

Well, the truth is, Old-timer, we really don't know. Leasing activity in Parmer and adjoining counties has taken on new activity during the past few weeks, with the result that an estimated 200 sections of land has been leased in Parmer County alone.

The increased leasing activity is believed to have been stimulated by two discovery wells brought in only recently. The Honolula well, west of Lubbock, and the Magnolia well, near Kenna., N. M., are two deep discoveries that have been announced only recently, extending the oil play far to the north and west of any previously known production.

To date, only the Mid-Continent and Sol Simon, an independent operator of Longview, have recorded any leases in Parmer County, but it is well known that other leases have been signed up in this county which have not as yet been recorded.

So far as could be learned, all the leases are being taken at \$1 per acre for rental, plus 50 cents per acre

Questions & Answers Given for Veterans

Q-I am receiving compensation For County and District Clerk: for a 20-percent service-connected disability. I married two years ago and now have a wife and child. Am I entitled to an increase in payments | For County Judge: because of dependents?

A-No. Only veterans whose service-connected disability is rated at 50 percent or more are entitled to increased payments for dependents.

Q-I was given a yellow discharge for my World War II service in the For County Commissioner, Pct. 2: Army. Am I eligible for any benefits administered by Veterans Administration?

A-A yellow discharge from the U. S. Army is a dishonorable discharge, and under the law does not entitle you to any benefits administered by VA, unless it is established to the satisfaction of the Administrator that you were not sane at the time of the offense which desulted in dishonorable discharge.

Q. My NSLI premiums have been | For State Representative: in waiver status for several months because I am totally disabled. Will VA notify me when the waiver is no longer effective and I must begin For Congressman: paying my premiums?

A. Your premiums will be in waiver status only as long as you are totally disabled. VA will notify you when total disability ceas-



Notes from the State Health Department

AUSTIN-It's a 50-50 bet that you ♥ have some sort of ringworm intection. Check to see. Chances are it will be in your scalp hair, on your groin, or on your feet-either on the soles or between the toes. If you dont find it, you're lucky, because while it isn't serious, its itching and persistence is very annoying.

A fungus-the same one that causes food to mold-causes ringworm. It's one of the world's most common ailments, with authorities estimating that half of the world's population is affected. It is more common this time of the year than at any other.

Animals get it too. As a matter of fact, cats, dogs, rabbits, mice, and fowls are frequently the source of infection in man. A child plays with an infected dog, the dog's hair brushes the child, and the child stands an excellent chance of ringworm in-

The scales which are formed can cause new infections on the body, so an infected person has to be careful to keep it from spreading. Advanced cases exude a clear, runny fluid-it "weeps," as doctors say, and the fluid can cause breaking out whereever it touches on the body. Children are especially vunerable to scalp ringworm. Epidemics usually are started in schools or institutions.

Swimming pools, locker rooms, and gymnasiums are potent sources of infection. Everyone has heard of "athlete's foot." It is nothing more than a type of ringworm. So is the so-called "barber's itch."

Preventive measures call for avoiding persons and animals known to be infected. Swimming pools, gyms, locker rooms, and the like can do their part toward ringworm control by boiling towels, swimming suits and their other public facilities for 30 minutes. Foot baths also givings, soon The Tribune will begin are worthwhile.

The best thing to do is to keep clean at all times. But if you happen to get ringworm, or if you have it now, it will be better for all concerned if you report to your family doctor immediately. He'll recommend medication designed to shorten the course and lessen the severity of the infection.

Of course, this is a hypothetical approach to the explanation of the Twin City building boom. The Texico and Farwell situation is not great deal different from similar building programs in large citiesexcept for one thing. The trend in the metropolitan area is a move from the business to a more suburban area, whille here we have a paradoxical farm-to-city migration.

Many Families Moved to Town In fact, the great number of new homes being erected here are for rural families who have moved to town. The logical explanation for this situation is the machine age, where transportation to and from the farm is rapid, efficient, and con-

The years following the war have been prosperous ones for the agricultural businessman. Especially has this been true of the wheat and small grain farmers of the Plains area. Bumper crop after bumper crop have swelled pocketbooks and raised gleaming elevators over the

Co. Agent Discusses **Means For Control** Of Wireworms

Since wireworms are the most common soil insect for Parmer and surrounding counties, County Agent
Joe Jones has advised farmers of a Joe Jones has advised farmers of a new and effective insecticide against these these pests.

Jones said the chief method now being used was a wettable powder formula containing 25 percent gama isomer of B. H. C. Farmers will recognize this chemical formula by its trade name of Lindane. It can be secured at drugstores.

Jones advised farmers attempting treatment of seed to dust at the rate of three or four ounces for each 10 pounds of seed. He said a sufficent amount of the insecticide would adhere to the seed without the use of water.

Chief reason for the effectiveness of this control the fact that 55 to 75 percent of the larger wireworms feed on the poisoned seed after it has been sown. However, the agent warned that the treatment would not affect wireworms that were deep in the soil. He said these worms remained in the earth until later in the season, probably after the crop is harvested.

Recommended crops for this treatment include beans, peas, and milo, using four ounces of 25 percent Lindane for every 10 pounds of seed. Cucumber, wheat, and corn may be treated with a formula using only eight ounces of the Lindane.
