Installation of a new inter-communication system at the Texico school, with the master station in the office of Supt. Agrie Jones, and sub-stations scattered over the plant, has been completed at the Texico school.

John Adams, of the faculty, who has had experience in electrical engineering, has had charge of installa-

Equipped with sub-stations will be the agriculture department, the gym, music room, business education department, auditorium, and home economics room. Four more sub-stations will be distributed among the grade rooms.

The wiring is a three-way system, whereby substations may call the office or the school head may speak to any or all of the subs.

"Plans are to have six more substations installed in the near future,' said Agrie Jones, superintendent, which will make the system complete with a station in every room.'

When two wells are close together, sometimes the well which starts pumping first gets all the water. When it shuts down, the other well can get water. That means that if the wells belong to two different farmers, they have to work together to figure out a fair system of taking turns-or else they have to re-locate their wells.

to tell them about well spacing. They've learned it the hard, expensive way, by having to move wells or lower pumps or by having to drill in unfavorable low spots to avoid interference and then piping the water up to high spots for distribution.

A county agent reports that several years ago, before these studies were made, he located five wells "within a stone's throw of each other". Today only two of those wells are producing. Figure the loss. Proper spacing could have prevented it.

With the increase in drilling activities-some counties are getting from 75 to 100 new wells each month more attention must be given to proper well spacing for the protection of

Getting back to the glass of water and two straws. Suppose one person decides to save his water. If the other one keeps on drinking, he eventually drinks up what is being

Here again, the same thing applies to irrigating. If one farmer, or a group of farmers, decide to practice conservation measures by proper well spacing, waste prevention, and re-charging, the water they save can be used up by others who are pumping from the same water basin.

The water we are using for irrigation on the High Plains all comes from the same big reservoir. If we conserve it, too. Otherwise they can

waste what we have saved. Conservation dosen't mean just saving, in the strict sense of the word, like putting something away and not using it. It means putting it to the best possible use, using as small amounts as we can to best advantage, and making it last as long as possible.

Feather-bedding scheme of Firemen's Union to put an additional fireman on diesel locomotives has been

Fact Finding Boards appointed by Presidents Roosevelt and Truman have said these demands were "devoid of merit" and they were

Now the Firemen's leaders seek to paralyze railroad transportation to compel the railroads to employ a wholly unnecessary additional fireman to ride on diesel locomotives. This scheme is plain

LEADERS OF the Firemen's union have called a nationwide strike starting with four great railroads on April 26. These railroads are the New York Central, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, and Southern.

The union claim that a second fireman is needed on grounds of safety is sheer hypocrisy. Safety has been dragged into this dispute only in an unsuccessful effort to give a cloak of respectability to vicious feather-bedding demands.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman . . . upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

> Safety Record of Diesels is **Outstandingly Good**

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding."

The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands. "The Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good . . . '




