**DHIA Tester Starts Work On May 1st**

Leo Bednorz, of Dimmitt, will begin official DHIA testing of dairy animals in Parmer County on May 1st, it is announced following a meeting of the county DHIA group the past Tuesday night.

Some twelve or sixteen herds have been listed for testing, officials of the organization reported, with approximately 284 animals involved. The county organization was officially organized some time ago and current officers include Levi Johnson, president; Don Burnett, vice president; Kay Miller, secretary.

Interested individuals who have not previously listed their herds for testing are invited to make contact with any officers of the association, Bednorz, or County Agent Joe W. Jones.

**Texico School Puts In Inter-Com System**

Installation of a new inter-communication system at the Texico school, with the master station in the office of Supt. Agrie Jones, and sub-stations scattered over the plant, has been completed at the Texico school.

John Adams, of the faculty, who has had experience in electrical engineering, has had charge of installation.

Equipped with sub-stations will be the agriculture department, the gym, music room, business education department, auditorium, and home economics room. Four more sub-stations will be distributed among the grade rooms.

The wiring is a three-way system, whereby substations may call the office or the school head may speak to any or all of the subs.

"Plans are to have six more sub-stations installed in the near future," said Agrie Jones, superintendent, "which will make the system complete with a station in every room."

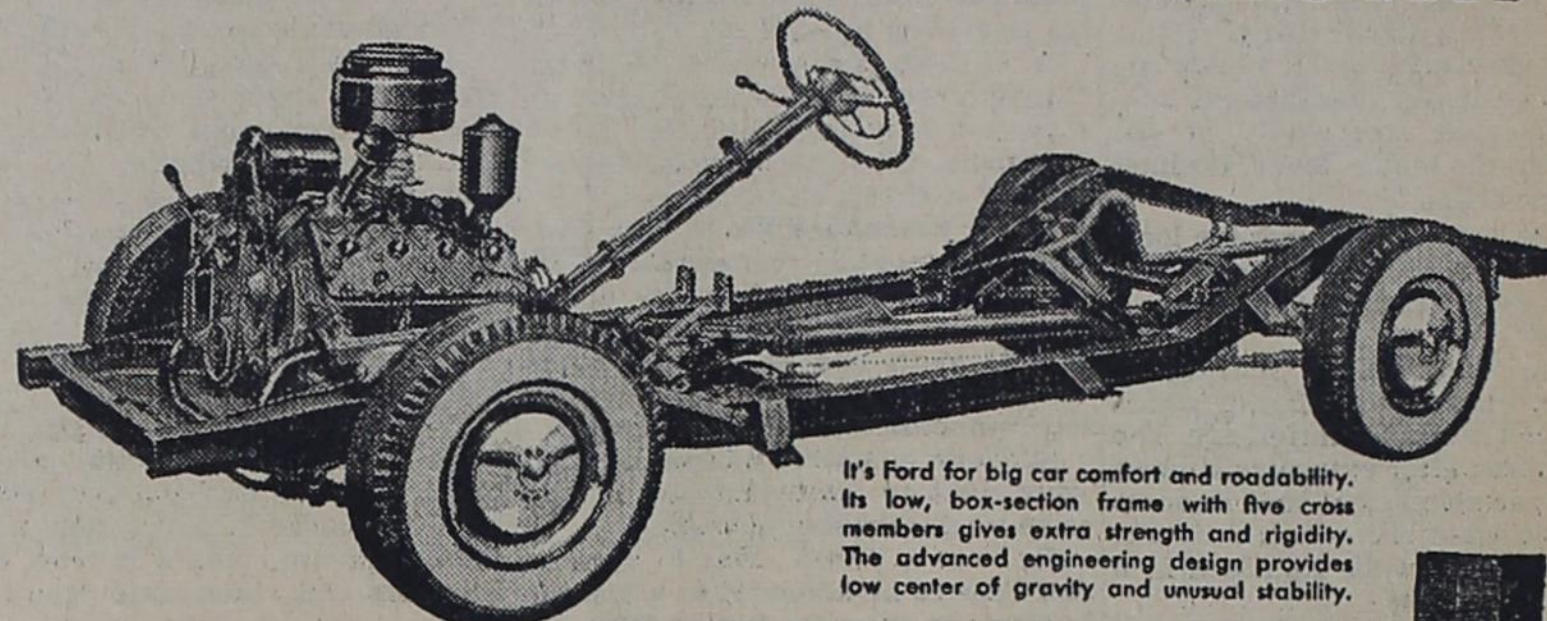

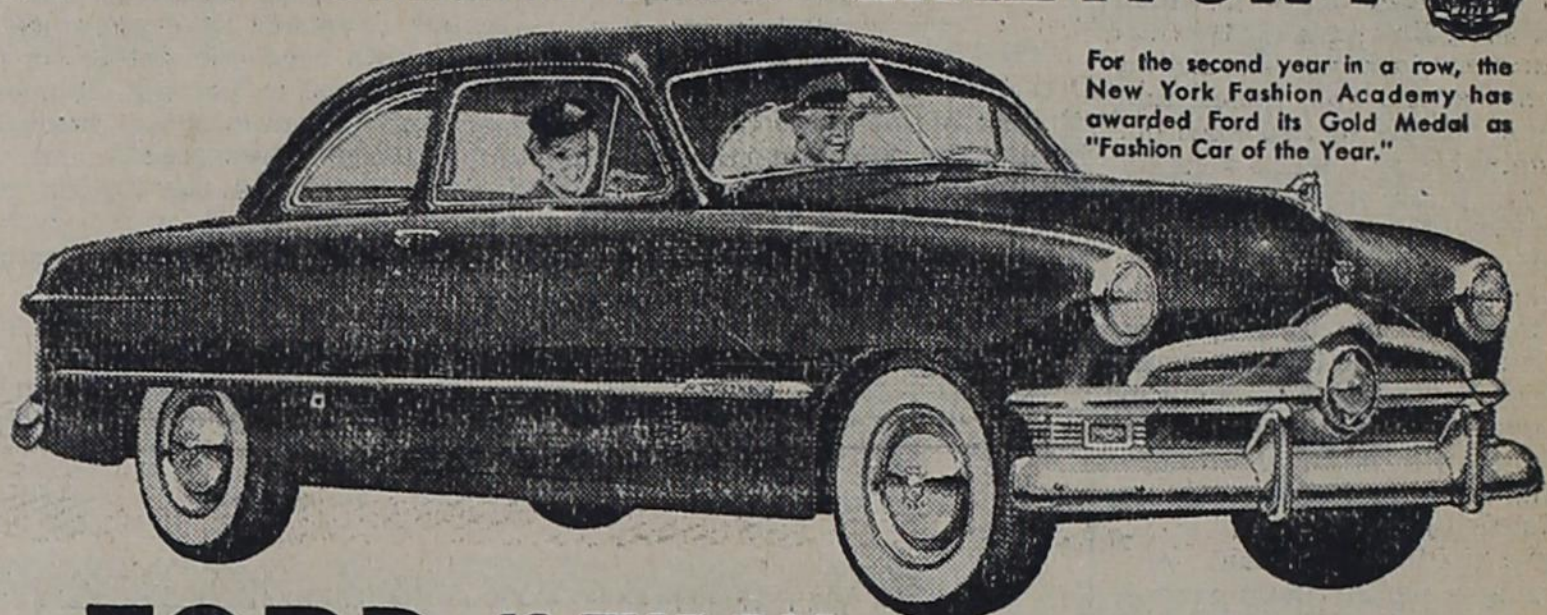

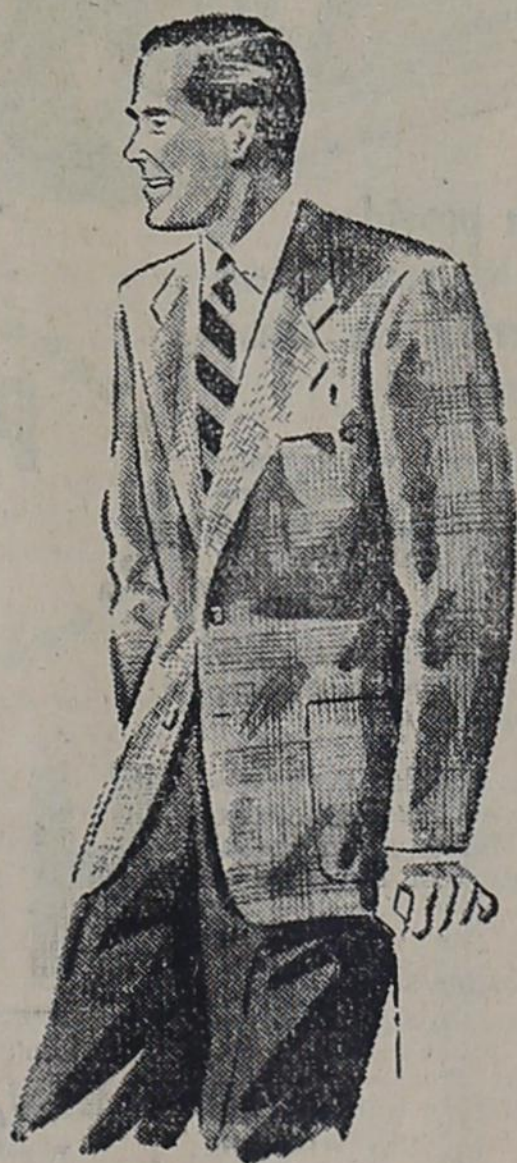

## WATER CONSERVATION IN IRRIGATION IS TOPIC OF DISCUSSION BY FARMERS

If you take a glass of water and place a straw near the rim, drawing out part of the water, the level of the liquid goes down. If you take two straws, one on each side of the glass, with two people drinking, the level goes down twice as fast.

Roughly speaking, the same thing happens to an irrigation well. If you sink a well in an underground water basin and pump out a million gallons a day, the water level will go down slightly. With a day or two of resting the well, the water level builds up again as nature replenishes the supply. If you sink two wells in the same area, the water level declines at a faster rate.

Farmers are learning that the location of their well—in relation to others—is a major factor in getting a good well.

For one thing, close spacing of wells sets up a sort of fight, which experts call mutual interference. The same experts, after extensive studies, came to the conclusion that in areas where the water level has declined, close spacing of wells has been in a large part to blame.

In places where there are a lot of irrigation wells, farmers already are experiencing the mutual interference problem. When two wells are close together, sometimes the well which starts pumping first gets all the water. When it shuts down, the other well can get water. That means that if the wells belong to two different farmers, they have to work together to figure out a fair system of taking turns—or else they have to re-locate their wells.

Some farmers don't need experts to tell them about well spacing. They've learned it the hard, expensive way, by having to move wells or lower pumps or by having to drill in unfavorable low spots to avoid interference and then piping the water up to high spots for distribution.

A county agent reports that several years ago, before these studies were made, he located five wells "within a stone's throw of each other." Today only two of those wells are producing. Figure the loss. Proper spacing could have prevented it.

With the increase in drilling activities—some counties are getting from 75 to 100 new wells each month more attention must be given to proper well spacing for the protection of all.

Getting back to the glass of water and two straws. Suppose one person decides to save his water. If the other one keeps on drinking, he eventually drinks up what is being "saved."

Here again, the same thing applies to irrigating. If one farmer, or a group of farmers, decide to practice conservation measures by proper well spacing, waste prevention, and re-charging, the water they save can be used up by others who are pumping from the same water basin.

The water we are using for irrigation on the High Plains all comes from the same big reservoir. If we conserve it, too. Otherwise they can waste what we have saved.

Conservation doesn't mean just saving, in the strict sense of the word, like putting something away and not using it. It means putting it to the best possible use, using as small amounts as we can to best advantage, and making it last as long as possible.

## Questions & Answers

**Q.** My grandchild, whose father served in World War I, is living with me instead of with her widowed mother. May payments of benefits from VA be made for this child?

**A.** Yes. Payment may be made to the legal custodian of the child if it is not in the custody of the widow.

**Q.** While in the Army during World War I, I had to have some teeth extracted. Am I entitled to dental treatment by VA?

**A.** If there is a record of teeth extractions while you were in the service, you may be entitled to dental treatment. Go to the nearest VA office for a check on your case.

**Q.** My husband, a World War I veteran, was receiving compensation for a service-connected disability at the time of his death. I was married to him 11 years and am now 33 years of age. Will age bar me from receiving compensation as his widow?

**A.** Your age has no bearing on your right to compensation if you meet eligibility requirements.

**Q.** I am a World War I veteran and hope to be admitted to a Masonic Home in the near future. Will the fact that I am the resident of such a home affect my pension?

**A.** Admission to a Masonic Home will not affect your pension.

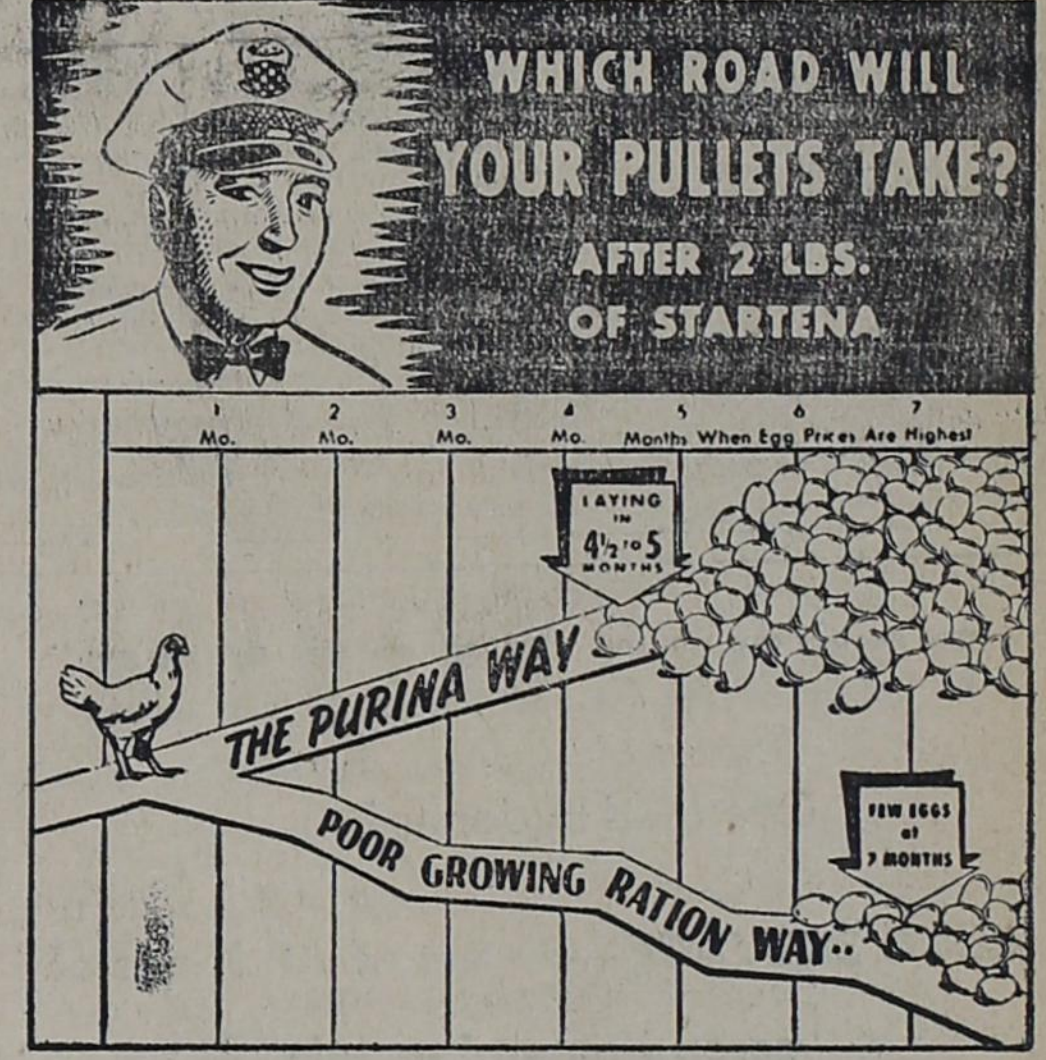

## FARWELL SECOND IN REGIONAL MEET POOL SETS NEW RECORD IN 100

The Farwell Steers, who swept over district competition like a blue and white wave some weeks ago, found the going tougher the past Saturday, when they competed at Lubbock in regional field and track events and came in second-best under the strong squad from White Deer.

White Deer was a surprise winner, racking up 31 points to take the regional title as the Steers had 21 for second in the Class B parade. Dimmitt, 1949 champs, and Ropesville had 19 each, Turkey got 13, Union 10, Miami 8 1-5; Lazbuddy, 5; Pollett 4 New Deal, 3 1-5, Kress, 3 Shallowwater 3, Whiteface 3, Panhandle 2 1-5, Amherst 2, Dumont 2, Booker 2, Olton 1 1-5, Jayton 1 and Bovina 3.

One record was cracked by the Steers. Jerry Pool blazed his way down the cinders to clip 5-10ths of a second in the 100-yard dash maker, previously set by Toby Booth, also of Farwell. Pool's time was 10.3, compared to the old record of 10.8.

Another Farmer County contender, Don Briggs of Lazbuddy, took a first place and smashed a record. The Lazbuddian went high in the air on vault, clearing at 10 feet 4 inches, as against the old record of 9 feet, 6 inches set by Adcock of Panhandle and Davis of Whiteface.

Parmer County observers were highly gratified with the outcome of the meet, and local residents are particularly smirking over Pool's record run in the 100, after all the ballyhoo in daily papers concerning the speed of Gene Easley, of Dimmitt. Easley, incidentally, was bested by both Pool and Jerry Brock, of Shallowwater.

50-yard dash—Farwell, second. (Terry, Poteet, Christian, Ford).

Rules for the sports division qualify to state boys who placed first in the regional events, and Coach Louis Purvis said today that the Farwell representatives would be on hand in Austin on May 5-6 to participate in the state gathering.

Pool will be entered in the 100, and he, Ford and Poteet are definitely members of the relay squad.

Tryouts are being held this week to determine whether Melvin Terry or John Christian will be the fourth member of the relay group. Both of the boys have shown considerable speed on the track, and timing to see who covers the 110-lap in the least time will determine which boy will make the trip to state, Coach Purvis added.

There was no information available here from Lazbuddy, but it is thought probable that Briggs would be listed for competition in Austin.

## Basketball Training Now In Full Swing

Spring basketball training for the prospective girls' club of 1950-51 at the Farwell school is in full swing, Coach Jack Williams said today, with three practice games slated before the period winds up May 12th.

On Thursday evening of next week the graduating players, assisted by whatever outsiders they can recruit, will meet the coming ball club at the high school gymnasium, and the local fans are invited to attend. No charge will be made.

Two games with Muleshoe are also arranged. On Tuesday morning, May 9, at 10:30, the locals will meet the coming Muleshoe club in that gymnasium, and on Thursday, the 11th, at 1:30 p. m., Muleshoe will return the game here.

Some 35 students are coming out for positions on the team, the coach said, adding further that he had only two girls—Betty Foster and Janean Lunsford—of the starting six returning to duty.

## Vega-Bovina Will Play Ball Friday

## W. Tucker, P. Crooks Star For Texico At Track Meet

Wayne Tucker and Paul Crooks led the senior and junior divisions of the Texico school, respectively, when the annual Curry County track and field meet events were run off on the Clovis field the past Saturday.

Both boys were individual high men of their divisions. Tucker led the senior parade as he grabbed up four first places and two fourths in totaling 24 points, and Crooks—who got into the counting department in eight distinct events but took the blue ribbon only once—racked up 22½ points for his performance during the day.

The Clovis Wildcats and the Melrose Buffaloes were predominant in the senior department, with the defending champions, the Cats, hitting 67½ points to win over the Buffs' 60½. Texico, with 39, was third; Rosedale had 37, and Field failed to take a solitary point.

County Agent Joe W. Jones was in Lubbock the last of the week, attending a district gathering of agents and members of the State Health Department. Health problems of rural living were discussed, with the health department paying particular attention to location and proper care of septic tanks.
