When you might be inclined to complain about what the newspaperman has to charge you for his products such as advertising, job work, and subscriptions, you need to become acquainted with the expense account involved in operating a newspaper.

This was brought to our minds only this week when we were forced to dig up \$147.50 for the services of a specialized mechanic for less than two days work.

Printing machinery, paper and salaries used in getting out a newspaper are in the higher brackets and the newspaperman must have a good margin on his products if he is to remain in business.

Bar ditches are a necessity for proper drainage and when we clog them up we are defeating the purpose for which they were constructed. Much of the water along Third Street now flows down and over the pavement because of these bar ditch obstruc-

Top ranking pigs issued to Parmer County 4-H clubbers by Sears Foundation were among the winners in Amarillo at the Tri-State Fair competition this week, County Agent Joe W. Jones reported on his return.

Homer Brumley, swine judge at the Parmer fair, named the county representatives to Amarillo: Dwain Menefee, gilt; Jamie Tidenberg, boar; and Troy Christian, pen of three.

Around 18 counties were represented at the Sears showing, Jones said. Menefee's gilt won third prize of \$40 tian's pen took second and \$35.

An estimated number of approximately 20 per cent more hogs and cattle were shown at the Parmer County Fair this year than were entered in 1949 and barns were overflowing even a year ago.

About 125 head of cattle, 96 hogs and over 100 pigs were crammed into the arena and tied outside, every possible bit of space was utilized.

Interest leaped this year with more entries in practically every division, especially Brown Swiss cattle and the Home Arts department. The show was also more county wide than ever before, the object of the fair is to make it even more so.

In the agriculture products department, Farwell won for the second straight year in community exhibits with 638 points. Jimmy McGuire, Alec Bateman and John Aldridge were members who prepared the entry.

Oklahoma Lane won second place with 643 points and Friona had 633 points. Other communities entering exhibits were Black, Lakeview, Rhea, Bovina, and Lazbuddy. All of these teams received fourth place ribbons.











Clean Range Looks **And Cooks Better**

COLLEGE STATION-The housewife who keeps a clean range has the reputation of being a good housekeeper. A clean range not only looks better, but it also cooks better than one which is allowed to gather grease, spilled food, dust or rust.

Cleanliness of a range is important for a full, even, efficient heat. Mrs. Bernice Claytor, home management specialist for the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, says that re-flecting surfaces must be kept shin-ing so they will do their job of throwing out heat. She points out that a clean range also helps keep the kitchen clean and free of unnecessary smoke and odors.

Mrs. Claytor recommends wiping up spilled and spattered food promptly with a dry cloth or paper. If acid foods are not removed promptly, they may eat into the enamel surfaces on the range. Other foods scorch on and removing them is difficult and may be hard on the range surfaces. Grease comes off most easily when it is fresh and hot.

After the range cools, the metal and porcelain surfaces can be washed with a moistened cloth. Mrs. Claytor warns that using a wet cloth on a hot range is a hazard to the housewife's hands and may crack the enamel on the range. She points out that many good housekeepers make an after-the-dishes habit of washing the range. Do not use gritty or abrasive agents.

Any charred particles of food on the burners or heating units, or in the bottom of the oven, can be brushed out after the range cools. Mrs. Claytor suggests using a metal hair pen or wire to clean the gas burners if they become clogged.

She points out that ovens are often neglected in cleaning because they are closed and out of sight. However a dirty oven often smokes when heated, giving the food an unplea-

Scorched-on grease in ovens can be removed by applying dilute ammonia with a cloth, or leaving a dish holding an ammonia-soaked cloth in the oven overnight will loosen the scorched food, and it can be easily removed by scouring lightly with very fine steel wool or fine scouring powder. Mrs. Claytor says that leaving the oven open to cool helps keep it clean and fresh and prevents rusting from closed in steam.

Light laundering of a garment before it becomes badly soiled will increase the life of the material by removing the dirt, dust and perspiration before they become embedded in the fabric.


