He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of approval equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regulations and insist that resturants observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warn-

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle top state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having the milk served in its original container, with a covered cap and legal label,"

ELECTRICITY, AND WHAT IT MEANS TO THE FARMER

COLLEGE STATION,-"To farm ers who make full use of electricity every season is kilowatt season," say rural electrification sepcialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. 'The farmer who uses electricity has a full length start in the race with time and the elements in haying, harvesting, threshing of small grains, cotton picking, and the storing of

W. S. Allen and W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineers of Texas A. and M. College, point out ways in which electricity can be of help to Texas farmers. Take having, for example. A farmer can equip his barn with a hay drier and snap his fingers at the weather. In parts of Texas, the specialists point out, hay is cured direct from the fields with little or no loss of the valuable leaves. Better feed is obtained with properly designed and operated drier units, and these same units can be used to dry grains, peanuts and other crops, usually resulting in higher prices and greater profits. The motor that runs the drier will hoist the hay.

In small grains, an electrically operated elevator can save hundreds of man-hours where wheat, oats and are major crops. An elevator means no shoveling and hittle or no lifting. Electricity will move the grain after it is in the bin, too, leaving the farmer and his help free for other

To Farwell School **Patrons**

On Saturday, August 28th, an election will be held in the County Court Room in the Court House in Farwell, on two propositions:

- A. Whether or not to vote a tax rate of not to exceed \$1.50 in the district, as consolidated.
- B. Whether or not each part of the new district assumes the bonded debt of the remainder.

The Board has carefully considered both of these matters before submitting them to vote, and recommends that each be carried.

It is necessary to have some kind of a tax voted before we can levy a tax and carry on the school, and the board believes that a flexible tax rate, of not to exceed \$1.50. is the best tax to vote, as this rate will enable the board to set the tax each year at just what amount is needed for that year, within the \$1.50 limit.

The bonded debt is very small, and the board believes that a considerable saving in cost of assessing and collecting taxes and keeping books can be effected if we all assume each other's bonded debt, and levy only one general sinking fund tax and pay all of the bonds of the three districts concerned out of one account.





PROTECT YOUR GRAIN AGAINST WEEVILS

COLLEGE STATION,—"With the shortage of grain storage space, there probably will be a lot of corn and grain sorghum stored on farms in Texas this year," Dr. H. G. Johnston, extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College, points out. "The wise man will start early to protect his grains against weevils."

The first thing is to be sure that storage bins are weather and fumigant tight, Dr. Johnston says. If the grain is not in storage yet, clean the bins and spray thoroughly with five percent DDT spray.

Dr. Johnston recommends two mixtures for the fumigation process. The first is three parts of ethylene dichloride and one part carbon tetrachloride. One thousand bushels of grain will use six gallons of the fumigant. Sprinkle with ordinary sprinkling cans over the top of the grain.

The second mixture recommended is one part carbon disulfide (highlife) and four parts carbon tetrachloride. Again, six gallons of the mixture will fumigate 1.000 bushels of grain. Pour it in shallow pans and place around the bin-it will evaporate and the fumes soak through the grain.

"Weevil control is important," Dr. Johnston concludes, "not only from a grain-saving stand-point, but to protect your stored wheat if it is under government loan. August is a good month to get started on this important job."




