# INCORPORATION VOTE WINS

## IRRIGATION MEETING WILL BE HELD IN BOVINA AUDITORIUM, MAY 17TH

Proper use of water, measures to control evaporation, seepage, and loss from waste water, and all the various whys, where, whens, and hows of irrigation will be brought to life next Wednesday night in the Bovina school auditorium, when a film entitled "Thirsty Acres" is slated to be shown.

County Agent Joe W. Jones, in announcing the meeting, said that all persons in the county who are interested in irrigation, whether or not they are active in such work at present, are cordially invited to attend the meeting, slated to begin at 8:30.

Ed Bush, extension service specialist on irrigation, is to be present at the gathering, and following the showing of the film will take the floor, inviting questions from the audience on any and all irrigation problems, Jones added.

The film to be shown, some 45 minutes in length, is "the best I have ever seen on irrigation", Bush stated to sponsors of the meeting, adding that it brought out many important phases of successful irrigation, and stresses control of watering, in order to eliminate waste.

Four irrigation practices, farmers and interested observers concede, are responsible for a good deal of precious water "going down the drain" as far as the crop is concerned, when an overflow runs out of the field and stands idle in barrow pits along the road. "To get the most out of irrigation well," sponsors of the meeting emphasize, "owners must use expert management in handling water, and we think this film vividly portrays some of the things that should—and should not—be done."

At present, Jones said, there are "about 400" irrigation wells in operation in Parmer County, with the number increasing every month as farmers turn to artificial watering to produce crops when Nature apparently forgets to turn on the hydrant. Asked as to the proportion of acres under irrigation, Jones estimated that the majority of owners try to handle "about 200 acres" per well, which would give a rough acreage of 80,000 acres being watered—compared to the total of 425,000 cultivated acres in Parmer County.

In addition to the irrigation discussion, Arlin Hartzog, Harold Carpenter and Bill Sherley, who recently made a trip to Washington, D. C. to sit in on the meeting concerning the 1951 cotton program, have been invited to make a report on their trip, Jones added.

## Parmer County Votes For Republican In Special Election

Along with a number of other counties in the 18th Congressional District, Parmer County voted for the Republican candidate in last Saturday's special election to select a successor for Eugene Worley, who resigned some months ago, and saw their choice put into office.

Ben Guill, the small-town real estate dealer of Pampa and former school teacher, carried Parmer County over his nearest opponent by a narrow eight votes when he polled

Although the turnout was exceedingly light, the citizenship of Farwell voted overwhelmingly in favor of incorporating the city in a special election held here last Saturday.

A total of 88 ballots were cast favoring the consolidation, while 80 voters expressed their opposition.

Along with the vote to incorporate the city, residents also selected their first set of city officials, who will take over the reins of the city government as soon as all details of the incorporation have been completed.

C. M. Henderson was selected as mayor; R. W. Anderson and M. A. Snider were chosen as commissioners. The three will compose the official body under a commission form of government.

The Commissioners Court, meeting here Monday, canvassed the returns and certified to the results of both the incorporation and the city officials.

John Aldridge, who has been retained as city attorney, said today that the incorporation election is effective as now, but it is generally the custom to wait 30 days to allow for any contest litigation that might arise. So far, there have been no rumors of a contest and it is considered certain that the incorporation will stand.

Realizing the dire need of a city sewer system in Farwell, the incorporation move was launched here some months ago in order that the city might be in a position to vote bonds to install such a system. It has been estimated that \$40,000 will be needed to install an adequate sewer set-up, and it is proposed that the amount be divided into two bond issues—\$20,000 in tax bonds and an equal amount in revenue bonds.

Persons who have investigated the matter claim that these two issues can be paid off in a period of ten years.

## Mary's Cafe Plans Grand Opening

Mrs. Mary Sudderth, owner and operator of Mary's Cafe in Farwell, is announcing her grand opening at her new location on Saturday, May 13.

Featuring the formal opening will be a one-cent sale of Borden's ice cream at the cafe fountain, and during the day any two Borden products will be offered for the price of one, plus one cent. In addition to the ice cream specials, Mrs. Sudderth said that she would serve free coffee and doughnuts to all visitors during the day and the youngsters will be treated to small candy favors.

The new location, in a building recently completed by Donald Watkins, has considerably more room and the building is kept comfortably cool by an overhead air conditioner.

## Conservation Fund Is Now Exhausted

After distributing \$159,000 in Parmer County for conservation practices since the first of the year, the money allotted to this county has been exhausted, Joe Camp, PMA secretary, announced today.

Camp added that there was no likelihood that additional government funds would be available in this county for conservation practices this year, but added that his office was still receiving applications for aid. He said the only remaining chance that some of these late applications may be handled is the bare possibility that some loans previously granted may not be taken up by land owners in the county. In that event, the secretary added, the funds will be allotted to late applicants.

221 ballots in this county. Mrs. Alta-vene Clark, runner-up, trailed with 213. Guill took three boxes in the county as Mrs. Clark led in four of the voting places.

Friena voters piled up a good lead for Guill over Mrs. Clark when they gave him 92 votes to her 59. Guill's majority at Bovina was even more impressive, when he mustered 51 votes as Mrs. Clark trailed with 28.

Aside from Guill and Mrs. Clark, the other nine candidates were "also rans" so far as the Parmer County voters were concerned. Either Mrs. Clark or Guill carried every box in the county with the exception of Lazbuddy where Woodrow Montgomery walked off with the lead, polling 26 votes as Mrs. Clark and Guill received 20 and 8, respectively.

Guill was the only Republican candidate in the field along with ten Democrats, who split the vote to such an extent that his triumph was virtually an easy matter. He will serve in Congress as the 16th District representative until Jan. 3, when he will either succeed himself or be succeeded by the winner in the November general election.

Normally, political observers point out, the Republicans poll about 20 per cent of the votes in the 18th Congressional district. Guill received approximately 22 per cent of the vote in Saturday's balloting. Opposition to Truman policies on the part of normally Democratic voters is credited with giving Guill the extra margin he needed to be declared the winner.

## Bovina Man To Face Penitentiary Term

W. C. Wasson of Bovina, who was convicted here in October of wife and child desertion, is being held in the Parmer County jail, charged with violating his parole, local officers said here today.

Wasson was picked up at Odessa and returned to this city by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace. He was given a suspended sentence of three years at the October term of court.

## JURY CALL CANCELLED

Sheriff Chas. Lovelace said here today that a petit jury that had been called for Thursday of this week in county court had been cancelled due to the fact that the case pending had been settled out of court. He said he hoped the jurors would take notice and not appear.

## CITY DADS REQUEST COOPERATION OF CITIZENS IN PLANNING FOR FUTURE

The newly elected Farwell City Commission issued a joint statement today, thanking the voters for the confidence placed in them in Saturday's voting, and at the same time soliciting the cooperation of the citizenship in mapping plans for the city's future under a commission form of government.

C. M. Henderson, the newly-elected mayor, acting as spokesman for other members of the Commission, R. W. Anderson and

M. A. Snider, said that the new city dads were anxious "to do our very best" in working out plans for the future development of Farwell, "but we must know what the people want," he added.

The City Commission pleaded for the cooperation of the citizenship in plans for the future of the city. "We can do nothing without the full cooperation of the citizenship," the statement said, "and we are open to suggestions at any time."

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**Water Conservation Association Formed**

The High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, meeting Thursday in Plainview, focused its attention on movements by water users in Dallam, Hockley and Lamb counties to organize underground water conservation districts, and commended the action.

Dallam and Lamb counties are represented on the executive board of the High Plains group, which also has affiliate organizations in Randall, Hale, Swisher, Lubbock, Parker, Bailey, Castro, Floyd, Deaf Smith, Briscoe and Crosby counties.

Among speakers at the meeting were James S. Guleke of Amarillo and Austin, member of the Texas Board of Water Engineers, and William L. Broadhurst of Austin, ground water geologist from the U. S. Geological Survey. W. O. Fortenberry of Monroe, president, presided at the all-day session in the Hilton Hotel.

Guleke reported that the Board of Water Engineers had completed its field work prior to designating a water reservoir in the Dallam County area, commenting that "Dallam County seems to be very anxious to organize a district."

Designation of the boundaries of a reservoir is the first step toward organizing a district under House Bill 162 passed by the Texas Legislature in 1949. After reservoirs and corresponding districts are determined, elections creating districts may be called.

Guleke told the group, "It is a pleasure to be working with home folks on this matter of water conservation. I am glad to be of service in trying to work out a planned course of usage."

Broadhurst told of experiments conducted by ground-water geologists in re-charging reservoirs. He admitted that recharge possibilities in some areas are negligible, but gave the opinion that in many other areas the ground water supply could be replenished successfully. One of the powers of water districts is to recharge.

He added that experiments on irrigation methods carried out by water districts would be valuable in gathering information for farmers, who singly could not afford the expensive

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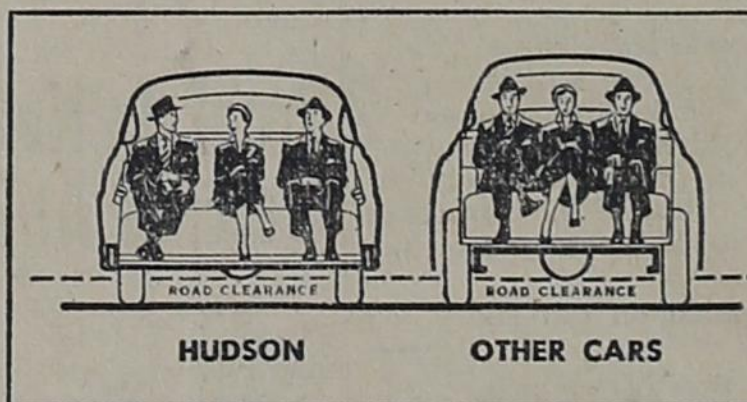
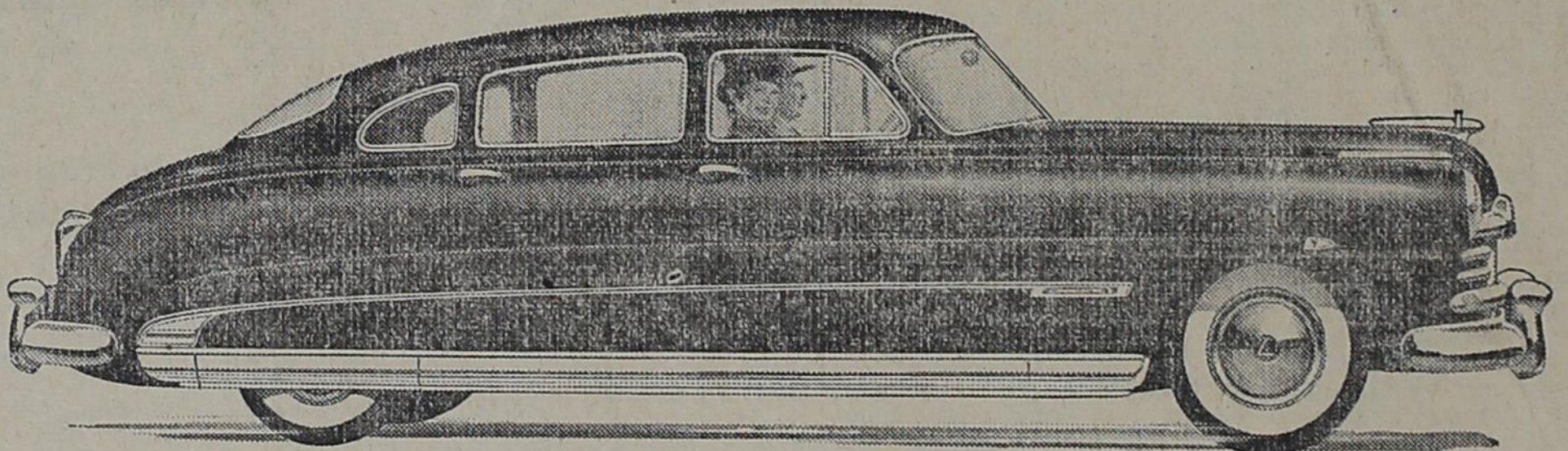
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### TOP STUDENTS IN TEXICO SENIOR CLASS

The trip will be made by bus and the group will return home on Saturday, June 3rd.



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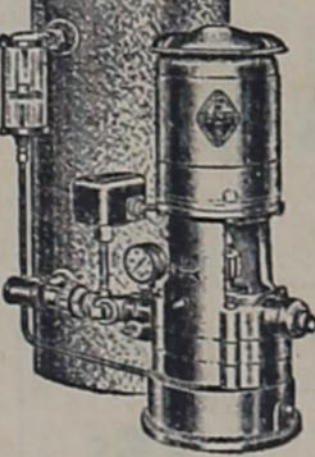
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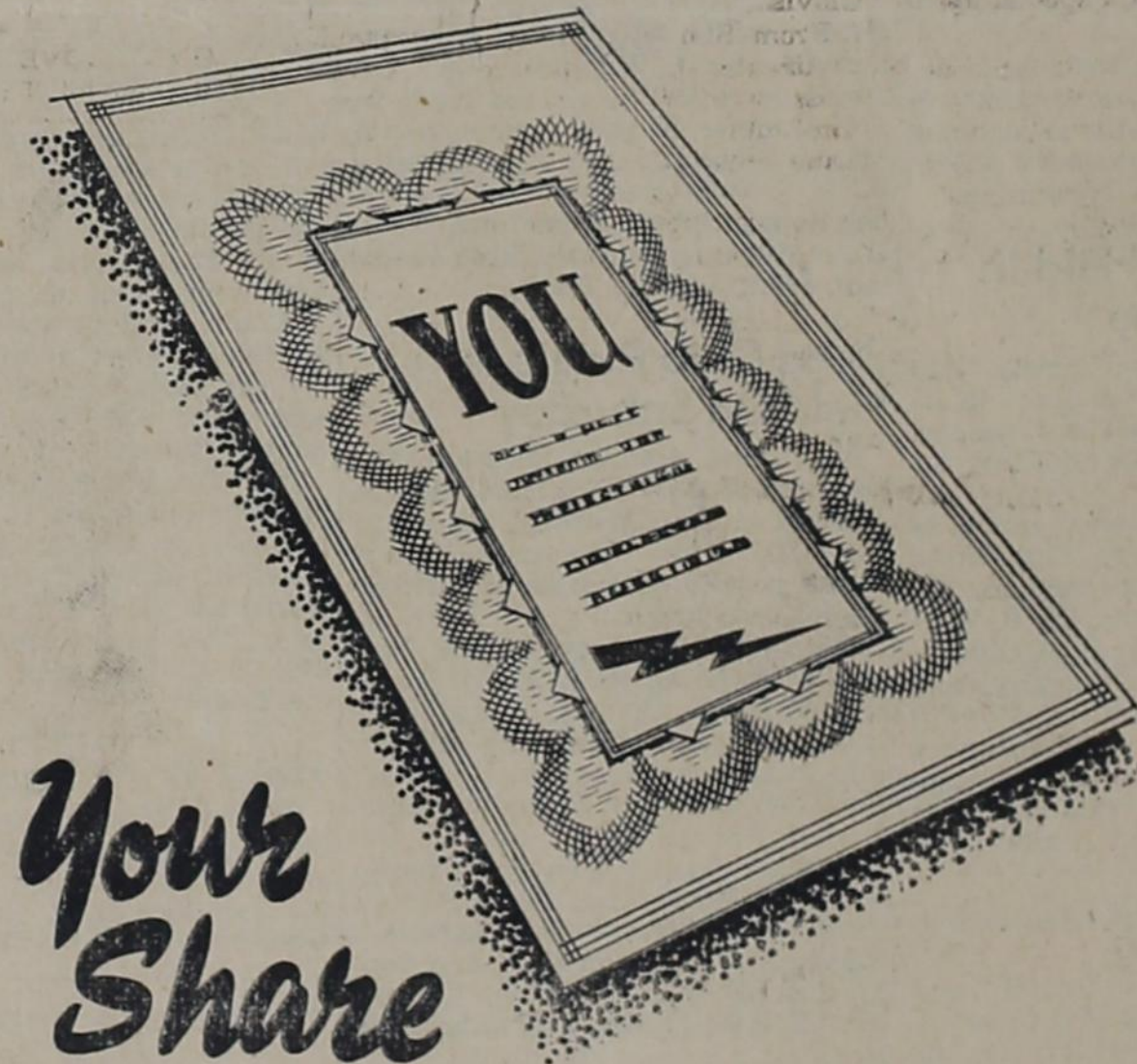

1/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.

Sift flour, measure and sift with baking powder, sugar, salt, and cinnamon. Beat egg, add milk and melted shortening. Pour into dry ingredients. Add the chopped raw apples and mix well. Turn into a well buttered 8-inch square baking pan. Mix together ingredients for the streusel topping to make a crumbly mixture, and sprinkle over top of batter. Bake in a 400-degree F. oven about 30 minutes or until done. Serves 6.
