



Most farmers in the path of the storm report heavy rain and some hail, but a pretty fair cross-section of brief interviews among them reveal little damage in this locality. Local hail insurance agents report that only a few losses have been reported, none of them heavy.

On the other hand, reports reaching here early this week are to the effect that severe losses from hail occurred north and northeast of Friona, where some of the county's choicest wheat fields are located. Extensive damage south of the Hub is also reported here.



AFFECT LOCAL PATRONS L. L. Gracey, local manager, in an interview in his Clovis office stated that no increase in rental rates was being sought in Texico-Farwell. However, an increase on long distance calls is being asked in the new rate structure.





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

One Out Of Every Two Classed Without Cost

COLLEGE STATION—One out of every two bales of cotton ginned in Texas the past season was classed without cost for mearly 97,000 farmers in Smith-Doxey improvement

This same service will be available again this year, John L. McCollum, southwest area manager, Production and Marketing Administration's cotton branch, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Dallas, announced.

Participants in Texas was higher last year than at any time since the program went into operation 11 years ago and prospects indicate it will be even higher this season, Mc-Collum pointed out.

Latest count shows farmers ginned over one and a half mllion bales on which they received classification and market news service both without cost. Total ginnings for the state amounted to more than 3 million

Any organized improvement group which adopts a variety of cotton, files application, arranges for sampling and meets certain other requirements is eligible for this service on the coming crop.

Applications should be filed as soon as members have planted their cotton, but not later than July 1 for all counties lying entirely or for the most part east of the 100th meridian, and July 15 for those lying entirely or for the most part of west of the 100th meridian. Latest date which applications may be received is August 1 for the eastern block of counties and August 15 for the western

block. Instructions and application blank may be obtained from county agricultural agents, offices of Production and Marketing Administration, the area cotton branch office, or cotton classing offices in Austin, Dallas. Galveston, Lubbock and Abilene, McCollum explained.


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

Counting the Cost

A careful and fair examination of the proposed bond issue to be voted on May 28 for the construction and maintenance of a county-wide road system for Parmer County leads one to wonder how the county can afford to be without the benefits it will bring. If we were to eliminate all taxable values from consideration and assume that only the farm and ranch lands were to carry the entire debt load for the entire bond issue, we would find that \$21.80 per 1/4 section would retire the debt in the 30 years, but when we realize that the farm and ranch land is only 50% of the assessed value of the county, and that utilities, railroads, personal property and city properties pay half of the total debt, it is evident that the greatest possible cost to the landowner will not be more than \$11.00 per 1/4 section per year. To check these figures, divide the \$1,150,000.00 bond issue into 30 equal payments of \$38,333.33 and a maximum interest of 31/2 %, which would be \$40,250.00 for the first year and reduced by \$1341.65 for each year thereafter. Divide that amount by the 900 sections making up the county. This would make \$87.30 per section if no other taxable values were used, but the lands would need to carry only onehalf of the tax load, so it is quite crear that the greatest

possible tax on the land would be less than \$11.00 per quarter section.

All the above figures are based on the assumption that the entire issue would be sold, but there is a good possibility that state and federal funds will continue to come to the aid of the counties that try to help themselves and in this case the cost to the county would be reduced further.

The question immediately arises, "Why not let the state build these roads and let the county save its money?" It is quite clear from the progress of the last eight or ten years, in which time 22 miles have been built in Parmer County, that the present voters of Parmer County cannot outlive such a program.

When we consider the benefits the individual will receive in operating an automobile, or marketing his products, we wonder how he can afford to pay the higher costs of doing without the paved roads. Add to these benefits the value of the roads to the operation of the school buses and we can see enough savings to more than offset the costs of the roads. In addition to the savings that will be effected by the completed road program,

there is to be considered the increase in property values which will be seen even before the roads are completed. The increase in value of property in the county will not be limited to that adjacent the roads, either. As proof of this viewpoint, try to buy comparable property in counties with adequate paved roads.

A further consideration in the matter of cost is the fact that in 1951 the present state ad valorem tax of 44c will be removed by the constitutional amendment which was passed at the last general election. This reduction would leave the total increase in taxes after the issuance of the entire bonds at a figure less than \$7.00 per quarter section. This same amendment permits the counties to levy a 30-cent tax for road purposes, but when we consider the uncertainty of such a program and the meager amount that could be done with \$18,000.00 per year, we can see the folly of such a play as compared with the proposed program.

Inasmuch as this is the first really united and concerted effort on the part of Parmer County to secure a fair and equitable county-wide road system, let us join with our neighbors and take our boot straps and come out of the mud!
