



AUSTIN-If public health is to contribute to health and happiness For County and District Clerk: in 1950, the people of the State need to gain a new knowledge of its significance and to convince their leaders of the importance of the support | For County Judge: of the people, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The State Department of Health is the state agency responsible by law for the health of all people in Texas. The working out of this responsibility, however, must be a joint affair shared by all.

The State Health Officer is the administrative and executive head of the Department. The field activities are organized in 18 different divisions. A division director with specific training and experience in For Commissioner, Pct. 4: one of the specialized fields of public health as well as in general public health measures directs the activities of each division.

COLLEGE STATION-Fires cost Americans \$2 million per day to say nothing of the hardships and tragedies they leave behind. This is the of the important keys that unlock time of the year when home fires are most numerous says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer-buildings of Texas A. and M. College. A major cause-all heating equipment is operating at capacity or above and thus the chances for fire are greater. He says overheated stoves or flues and overloaded furnaces and space heaters can easily start home fires. He points out that space or portable heaters should always be kept away from walls and from materials that burn easily and should never be placed where they can be knocked over. Kerosene nor gasoline should never be used for starting a fire and if you use a fireplace, he advises keeping a metal screen in front of it at all times. Coal or wood burning stoves should be set on a metal pad that has some insulation between it and the floor. He says the grate and ash pit should be kept clean and that only metal containers should be used for

New Near-Record Production In '49

COLLEGE STATION-The crop harvests of 1949 may long be remembered by Texas farmers. New records and near records were made for almost all field crops and yields were uniformly good. E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A. & M., says figures recently released by the Office of Crop Estimates, USDA, show just how good the 1949 Texas' crops were.

The total crop average in the state set a new record; 30,141,000 acres as compared with the 10-year average of 27,200,000 acres.

Miller says 5,900,000 bales of cotton were produced on 10,725,000 acres and this is the largest cotton crop ever produced in the state. The second largest crop was produced in 1926-5,628,000 baies, but it was harvested from 18,374,000 acres. The '49 per acre yield was 264 pounds and was the highest since 1894. Miller says last year's crop was more than, double the average production for the past 10 years.



Q. Is a VA domiciliary home a place where ailing vets may convalesce after illness?

A. No. A domiciliary home is designed to provide a home for these eligible veterans who have a chrcnic condition requiring minimal medical attention. For admission, vets must have no adequate means of support or must make an affidavit of inability to defray the expense of such care. Service requirements for admission are essentially the same as

Q. While going to school under the GI Bill, my hand was seriously burned in a chemistry class. Will VA pay the hospital expense in a local hospital?

A. No. Any disabilities incurred by a veteran while taking education or training under the GI Bill are considered nonservice-connected,. but you may be able to establish eligibility for hospitalization in a VA

Q. I was recently discharged from the Army bceause of a service-connected disability. If I should need hospitalization, how and where do apply for it?

A. See your nearest VA contact epresentative or apply to a VA retional office or hospital. In case of mergency you may call the nearest 7A hospital collect. VA representatives will handle mecessary applicatio nand other forms.

Q. I am the unmarried daughter of a World War I veteran who died recently. Although I am 30 years old I have been dependent on my fathor all my life because of a spinal injury when I was eight. Am I eligible to receive a pension?

A. If the facts are as you state, you may be eligible. Application may be made as a dependent child of the deceased veteran, after which your case will be adjudicated by VA on the basis of evidence submitted.


