

Thousands of ready-to-harvest acres of grain sorghums were damaged, some wheat uprooted and property damage resulted here from the high winds that raged over this area last Sunday, and continued throughout part of Monday.

So far as has been reported, the only property loss occurred at the Roberts Seed Co. in Texico, where a new steel elevator is under construction. One of the steel tanks, standing 60 feet high, was crushed and crumpled as though it had been a tin can under the heel of a fair-sized man. mile clip, with gusts often reaching 45 to 55 miles per hour.

The extent of the damage done to mature crops will never be known. County Agent Ollie Liner reports that damage was "considerable". Ripe fields of grain, especially crops that had been injured some by lack wind. Liner said that the damage covered the entire county, with some farmers estimating that at least half of their grain crops were laid flat.

Harvesting of such crops will be extremely difficult, and the only suggestion that the Agent had to offer was for farmers to attach pick-up reels to their combines.

There was also some injury to the wheat fields of the county, but this fields that were planted in recent weeks and the fields had not attained suffificient growth to withstand the cutting winds. Fields seeded in August stood up fairly well under the pressure of the wind. Some rain accompanied the wind, being mostly confined to the northeastern part of the county. Only a light intermittent shower fell here during the day. 



Health Note Texas State Department of Health

AUSTIN-Lockjaw, or tetanus, is a very serious disease caused by a tiny germ that looks like a stick with a ball on one end-something like a microscopic lollipop, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This ball is called a spore and it is the seed of the germ. Lockjaw germs are found in the soil, especially in manured soil of the barnyard or garden; in blank cartridges; etc., in fact, just about everywher. These germs grow best in wounds where there is considerable tissue destruction and in which chips of glass, wood splinters or grains of dirt have been embedded.

Every accident seen by the physician must be considered from the lockjaw angle; and whenever there is any question, tetanus antitoxin should be given, for it is the antitoxin that has helped keep the incidoes not get rid of the lockjaw germs in the wound; and it does occasionally cause hives and other disagreeable symptoms for a few days, particularly if the subject has had previous injections. Should lockjaw develop, it requires much antitoxin and entails great expense; and even then, not all cases can be saved.

It is not possible to free the environment of lockaw germs, but now there is a method of active immunization. The subject becomes his own manufacturing establishment for antitoxin to combat lockjaw poison.

One nice feature about the treatment is that it can be combined with
