Baptists Repay "Honor Debt"

Baptists in Arkansas are paying off a debt they do not owe. At least the federal courts say that the debt was settled in 1937 when the depression-harassed Arkansas Baptist State Convention paid off a million dollars worth of notes and bonds at 35 cents. on each dollar. The court wiped the slate clean, and the notes and bonds were cancelled.

Six years later, however, the Baptist got to thinking that a moral obligation still existed and they voted to pay the remaining \$700,000. The money is being raised through an Honor Club in which members contribute a dollar each month. Dr. B. L. Bridges, the denomination's executive secretary at Little Rock, says everything will be paid in full by 1950.
