Definite plans looking forward to the eventual incorporation of the City of Farwell were taken at 3 meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce last Thursday evening, held at the offices of the Sikes Motor Co.

A resolution was introduced and passed, asking that a petition be circulated calling for a special election to vote on the incorporation.

The motivating purpose of calling the ejection with the hope of incorporating the city is to further plans on the realization of a sewer system for Farwell. Discussion of an adequate sewer system has been under discuss on for the past several years and sentiment in favor of a disposar system has crystalized during recent

Attorneys and laymen alike who have looked into the procedure of installing a sewer system seem to be agreed that the most favorable plan is to incorporate the city and them take steps to vote bonds to retire the debt.

Engineer Bill Howren of Amarillo, who has just completed preliminary surveys of the city, has stated that a bond issue in the amount of around \$40,000 would be necessary to provide an adequate system. This amount, he says, would install the system and pay the cost of equipping a disposal plant at an old lake bed northeast of the city, now being used for a public dumping ground.

College, compares farm buildings to a specially designed machine and notes that the parts of the machine that will receive the greatest amount of wear are provided with special lubrication. He says farm buildings should get the same attention.

Improper roof and ground drainage, he points out, are chief causes for failure in farm building. Good management, he says, will include gutters and downspouts to take the water from the roof and away from the building and its foundation. Grading and drainage are mighty important items in prolonging the useful life of a building.

He points out that the use of wood preservatives and paint on farm buildings is a good investment and will add years to their useful life. Wood preservatives should be used on all parts of the building near the ground and too, termite proofing should be included in all farm building construction.

Roofs and roof coverings are most important, he adds. Selection of the roof covering should be carefully thought out and planned according to the needs and uses of the proposed building. If it is going to be a large permanent structure, a long-lasting type of roofing should be used. A cheaper type roofing can be used on the temporary structures. Regardless of the type of roofing used, he says it should be put on correctly and kept in good repair. Leaks can cause lots of damage to the structure as well as to the materials or products stored in the building.

Changes in farming operations call for changes in the type and kind of farm structures, points out Allen. This may mean that existing buildings should be torn down and rebuilt or may be a remodeling job would be cheaper. He says there is little excuse for putting up with inconvenient buildings on the farm. Either rebuild or remodel them and this may involve a new location.

He says that many farm and home accidents are caused from improper building management and maintenance. Don't wait, he says, until a building becomes a hazard to repair it. Periodic checks should be made on foundations, framing, roofs and other parts of the farm buildings to see that they are in good shape. If damaged or weak boards are found, make the necessary repairs and replacements. It will save you time and trouble later on and the accident you prevent may save a doctor bill or



A. If you are training under Pub lic Law 16 because of a service-in curred disability, you may have a private tutor if one is prescribed for you by VA vocational guidance counselors. No private tutor is avail able to you under the GI Bill which stipulates that a veteran must attend a state-approved school or training establishment to get V.A benefits.

Q. Will VA guarantee my loan for the purchase of residential property containing more than one family unit? I am a World War II veteran

A. Yes, but the total number of separate units in the apartmnt cannot be more than four if you are the only buyer. 



Old Dwellings Usually Need Plan Changes

A fully satisfactory job of re-modeling an old house often entails major floor plan changes because old dwellings ordinarily have small living rooms, inade-quate closet and storage space,

and poor kitchen arrangements. Partitions between rooms should be inspected to determine which ones could be removed without difficulty and which ones are bearing walls helping support the weight of the house. A first story wall usually is a bearing wall if it is directly underneath a wall on the second floor.

Removal of a bearing wall is more expensive than taking out a simple partition. A steel beam to support the weight usually must be installed. If an opening such as a large doorway or an archway is cut in a bearing wall, the load can be held up by a beam resting on posts at the sides of

Frequently, the most inexpensive way to enhance the appearance of the exterior of a house is to use color. A home can be painted in such a way that the best features are emphasized while attention is detracted from

less pleasing parts.
If the roof line is ungraceful, the trim along the edge of the roof should be painted an inconspicuous color, and dark asphalt shingles should be selected for reroofing. To draw attention to an attractive roof line, pick brighter asphalt shingles. By drawing the eye upward, a light-colored roof also will make a house seem taller.

If the proportions of a house are pleasing, its outline can be accentuated by painting the trim in strong contrast to the sidewalls.

Soft Water System Cuts Home Expense

Equipment for softening hard water cuts household operating expenses and provides longer life for pipes and drains, says American Builder magazine.

"It is estimated that the cost of hard water averages from \$75 to \$125 a year, depending on the hardness of the water and the size of the family," the magazine

The New York State Department of Health is quoted as saying, "The life of clothes washed in hard water is shortened 20 to 40 percent."

"Probably the most widely used water-softening systems are those which employ the zeolite process," American Builder says. "Zeolite, a white, durable chemical, is contained in a water-softener tank which may be installed in the home water system.

"Zeolite has an affinity for calcium and magnesium, the minerals which make water hard. The minerals are absorbed by the zeolite as the water passes through

the tank.
"When zeolite is saturated with
the minerals taken from the water, it must be 'regenerated,' or flushed with a solution of common salt and water. It is then ready to be used again."

Texans Like Their Home Gardens

COLLEGE STATION-A look at last year's annual extension report on horticulture shows how important home gardens, truck crops and orchards are to the state. According to associate extension horticulturist J. E. Hutchison of Texas A. & M. county agents reported that 513,047 home gardens were planted and used last year. Of this number, 308,144 were farm gardens, 191,967 were city and urban gardens and 18,168 4-H club gardens.

Production was good, and some or the increase can be tracted to improved practices. Inoculation and seed treatment practices were used by 19,000 more gardeners in 1949 than in 1948. About half of all the gardeners used commercial fertilizers in accordance with recommendations that came from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Truck crop demonstrations were conducted in 143 Texas counties and numbered 12,154. Principal crops involved were tomatoes, watermelons sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, on ions, cucumbers, cantaloups, spinach carrots, beets and peppers. Specia. training schools held at agricultura experiment stations in all sections of the state were used to bring truck growers and county agents up to date on the latest methods of production and new varieties of crops.

County agents conducted 895 plant bed preparation demonstrations and 686 demonstrations were used to introduce better strains of sweet potatoes. Agents also conducted 271 demonstrations showing improved practices that could be used in the production of cucumbers for pickling

The homemaker who is hunting bargains in food and has the freezing and storage facilities will be wise to take advantage of the present situation, says Lucille Shultz, associate extension foods and nutrition specialist.

She says eggs can be stored in the home freezer or freezer locker for six months or more and still be as good as fresh eggs. Only clean eggs should be used, she warns, for dist from dirty shells may drop into the eggs during the breaking process and spoil the keeping quality. Fresh clean eggs should be broken into a clean bowl and mixed thoroughly but do not whip in air. Fill moisture vapor-proof containers with the egg mixture and they are ready to freeze

If yolks are separated from the whites and frozen separately, she says you'll want to use corn syrup sugar or salt to prevent a gummy condition. For each cup of yolks, add one tablespoon of syrup or sugar or mended for whole-egg mixture. The whites frozen separately need nothing added and no mixing.

Honor graduates of Texas high schools in 1946, the boys were selected for Opportunity Awards by the college Scholarships Committee on the basis of scholarship, leadership, character and need.

Each of them received \$200 to \$300 a year plus a job to pay college expenses. The jobs they have held during school include those of waiter in the mess halls, fry cook in a cafe, stable boy, yard man, laboratory assistant, printer's devil and baby sitter. During summer vacations they have worked on farms and ranches, in offices, on the highways and as roughnecks in the oil fields.

Required to make above-average grades in order to hold their scholarships, they have ranked high in their classes. One has an almost perfect A average for his four years. The average of all grades made by the entire group in four years is above B.

They have won their share of honors in other campus activities. One was president of their Freshman class, another outstanding in intramural athletics, while another won a summer fellowship for leadership in campus religious activities. Five were elected to the top military honor organization, the Ross Volunteers, and six to top scholarship honor societies. Nine will graduate as Honor Military Students.

Since this "pilot" group entered school in 1946, the Opportunity Awards program has grown. There are now 148 boys enrolled at Texas A. and M. College on these scholarships, with sixty or more expected to be granted opportunities next September.

25.550 CHICKS STARTED, 25,144 RAISED

Chick mortality at the Ralston Purina Research Farm is extremely low, records for a calendar year show, when 25,550 chicks were started with 98.41 per cent, or 25,144, raised, it was announced recently.

In one lot of 2,000 chicks moved from the brooder house at 6 weeks of age, the livability was 99.6%. These were fall chicks, generally regarded as more difficult to raise.

Purina researchers in charge of the poultry unit say this record of low mortality was possible only be-cause they used good chicks, followed good practices in management and sanitation, and because the feed supplied was adequate for the needs of the chicks.

The important factor about this record of high livability, Purina offi-cials point out, lies in the fact that experiments in building Chick Startena and Broiler Chow rations have not been handicapped by either disease or mismanagement.

Recipe Of The Week PUFFY OMELET

Four eggs, one-fourth cup top milk or light cream, one-half teaspoon salt, speck of pepper, fat.

Seperate eggs. Beat the yolk slightly, add liquid and seasonings; then beat until thick and lemon colored. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Heat frying pan, add fat enough to oil sides and bottom of pan. Turn in omelet mixture. Spread evenly over pan and cook slowly. When well cooked and delicately browned underneath, put in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) and cook until top is dry and firm but not brown. Loosen omelet with spatula, fold and turn onto a hot platter. If desired, instead of cooking on top of stove, place in oven for entire cooking period. Four

Seven-Steps Cotton Program Steps Out

COLLEGE STATION—The southwide 7-step cotton program, because of the reduction in cotton acreage, will receive even more consideration than in the past, says Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist of Texas A. and M. College. The reduced acreage, he says, means a greater concentration on better methods for greater production from fewer acres, for now, it will be the efficient producers who will continue to make a profit from his cotton operations.

The seven steps include: fitting cotton into balanced farming; taking care of the soil; using the best variety; making your labor count; control. ling insect and diseases; picking and ginning for high grade and selling for grade, staple and varietal value. Bascially, says Elliott, this is just a good farming program that individual farmers can carry out on their own farm. It is not new but it does emphasize the basic practices and methods that can lead to greater and cheaper production per farm and at the same time the soil can be improved and built up.

Elliott says the Texas Extension Service has had the active support of all allied cotton interests in the state and this cooperation on the county and state level has been responsible for making the program successful.

Last year, more than 7,000 farmers in 87 counties cut their losses from root-rot by planting legumes, principally sweet clovers. In 146 counties, farmers planted cotton following phosphate and legumes and barnyard manure was used on nearly 8,000 other farms in 124 counties in the state.

Elliott says cotton farmers are planting better seed. Higher yielding varieties of superior fiber are being bred by the Agricultural Texas Experiment Station and the seed breeders of the state. In 1949, nearly 600 one-variety associations produced better cotton on approximately 5 million acres.

Mechanization has saved labor and has cut the cost of production for the cotton farmer. The rotary hoe, the stripper and mechanical picker have been widely and successfully used. He reports that farming last year really went after the bugs. Cotton farmers used more than 50 million pounds of insecticides, as dusts and sprays, on 5 million acres of cotton. This insect control program was a contributing factor to the high state average yield in 1949. The best per acre yield since 1894.

He reports that more than 100,000 cotton farms in 167 counties were





During the three-month period ending February 28th, Sanderson said the social security office in Amarillo answered 2650 inquiries about old-age and survivors insur-

Emphasizing the purpose behind this Federal program, Sanderson explained it is designed to give working families a measure of financial protection when regular income stops due to retirement after age 65 or when the worker dies at any age. "Benefits are in no sense charity," he pointed out. "They are paid as a matter of right, the same as private insurance payments."
