"There is hardly a chance that our cotton acreage for 1950 will be increased," Arlin L. Hartzog, president of the Parmer County Cotton Growers, said in an interview here, Tuesday morning.

Hartzog, accompanied by Bill Sherley and Harold Carpenter, all of whom are members of the Parmer County Cotton Growers Association returned home last Thursday from he national capital, where they had one to protest the cotton acreage allotment for Parmer County for

Since the bill governing the farm program has already passed both houses of Congress, there is little prospect that the cotton acreage for the county can be upped this year he explained, but added, "We are hopeful that our trip will bear fruit in next year's allotments.'

Asked for a statement covering the group's trip to Washington, Hartbelow was given Zeke Brown, farm editor of the Amarillo Times:

Meanwhile, Mrs. the present acreage allotment plan be guaranteed 60 per cent of the 1942 allotment, not to exceed 15,000 acres. Second we asked that any unplanted acreage be returned to the county PMA committee so it can be reallocated to growers who produced crops in 1949 or to new growers. Parmer county had an allotment of 24,600 acres in 1942 but received less than 5,000 acres in 1950. In 1942, the county only had 11 irrigation wells while now there are some 400 wells.

The Parmer County Commissioner's Court has received many complaints about the illegal practices of dumping trash and rubbish upon the public roadways, streets, and off of bridges, etc., in the county. You are reminded that the law provides for penalties by fine up to \$200.00 for anyone caught doing so. It is the opinion of the Commissioner's Court that this law should be enforced, and anyone caught dumping such trash or rubbish on other than public dumping grounds will be subject to prosecution.

Also, it is ordered by the Commissioner's Court, meeting in Regular Session this 13th day of March, that no waste paper, cardboard boxes or other such trash that will blow be dumped in the dumping grounds, but that such be destroyed by burning before taken to the public dumping grounds.

### Planning And Shopping Urged For Remodeling

COLLEGE STATION-Shopping around for materials, labor and credit, when needed, often cuts down on the expense of remodeling a home To get the best job for the money, W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer-builder of Texas A. & M. says it is advisable to draw up a careful plan in advance. Then consult workmen, dealers in building supplies and lending agencies if a loan is needed, he added.

Remodeling plans should be just as specific as the plan for a new house and should include scale drawings of structural changes such as new doors and windows or an added room. Making changes on paper in advance is easier and cheaper than making them after construction gets

Once the plan is drawn, Allen says you'll be wise if you get cost estimates from many sources -masons lumber dealers, electricians, heating contractors, dealers in equipment and supplies or local purchasing cooperatives. Then compare prices and the merchandise each has to offer.

Generally, he says, it pays to employ skilled labor for cabinet work,

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
