**The Longest Year**

The year we now refer to as 46 B. C., was the longest year in calendar history. It contained 445 days, and for a very good reason.

Numa Pompilius supposedly created the Roman calendar in the seventh century B. C. This calendar was revised several times but by Julius Caesar's time, it was two months behind the sun.

When Caesar's experts devised the Julian calendar, which went along without revision until the 16th century, there was the problem of catching up with the sun before the new calendar could take over. So, two months were inserted between the months of November and December. Thus, 46 B. C. contained 445 days.

**Curiosity, Hope Greet New Year Hand in Hand**

Curiosity and superstition always have greeted the New Year hand in hand with mankind's bright hope for the future.

In olden times, families sought a glimpse into the year just beginning by observing the 'dipping' custom. With his eyes closed, the head of the house opened the family Bible and indicated a passage with his finger; the text, solemnly read and interpreted by the family, was indicative of the luck—good or bad—that was in store.

Probably one of the most widespread superstitions concerned the "first-footer," the first person to cross the threshold on New Year's

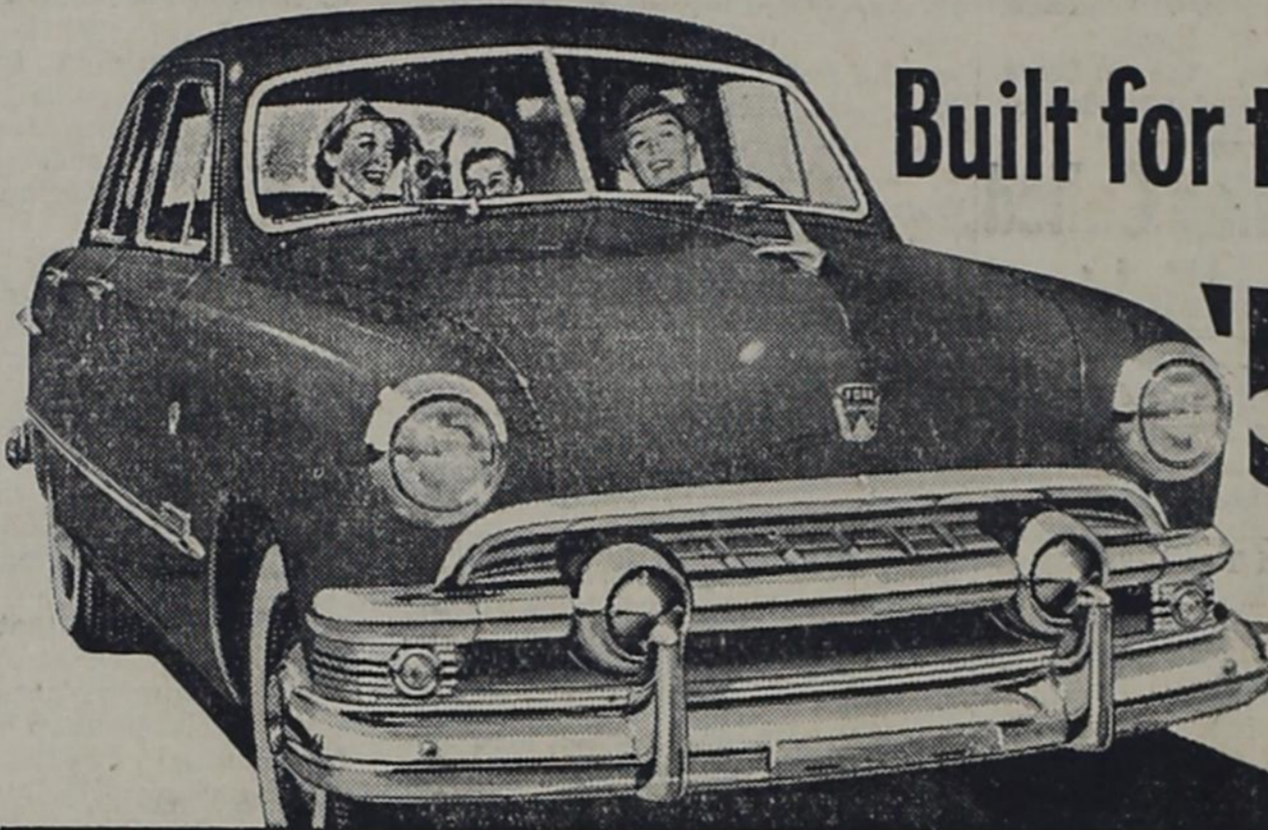
morning. Women and light-haired men were considered unlucky "first-footers," as were people who walked pigeon-toed.

In some villages, the superstition was taken so seriously that a dark-haired man was given the first-footer job and, going from house to house, he would be the first person to cross the threshold, thus preserving the good fortune of the community.

Anglo-Saxons, believing that something might happen when the New Year burst in often climbed upon the roof on New Year's Eve so as to have a good view of any such event.

And we moderns make as much noise as possible, presumably because our primitive ancestors believed that noise would keep evil influences at a distance.

# Happenings at Friona

## Four Friona Squads Play In Tournament

Four Friona basketball teams—A and B boys and girls— took part in the first invitation tournament of the season, held in the Lazbuddy gym during the past weekend, Coach Raymond Cook reported today.

The boys' squad from Hart took Muleshoe in the finals for the winners' cup, while the Three Way boys snagged the A string consolation, Cook said. In the girls' first-string, Spring Lake was acclaimed champion with a win over Bula, while the Muleshoe girls were consolation winners.

Opening their weekend of play, the local Chiefs took the Bovina string to a 32-25 cleaning, with Cleveland scoring 15 for the locals while Young led the Bovina aggregation with a total of 13. In their second round, the Chiefs were eliminated by the title-bound Hart quintet, score being 43-34. Robbins net a total of 12 for Friona, as Hawkins led the Hart scoring at 15.

Bovina's fast-moving sextette tumbled the local A girls in their first engagement, 36-19, Cook reported, as Pounds bucketed a total of 19 and Shaffer led the local parade with 9.

Moving into consolation play, the girls ousted Lazbuddy from competition, as Shaffer's 22 points led the Friona squad to a 42-21 win. Steinbock was high for Lazbuddy with 9. In their final consolation game, the girls lost to Muleshoe, 35-21, as Shaffer got 12 and Wagner topped her with a score of 16.

Turning to the B division, the girls dropped their opener to Hart, 25-12, when unable to stop Galyn, who hit 11 for the winners as Creel managed 6 for Friona. Their second engagement turned into a rout as Muleshoe pounded them 69-8, with Wagner hitting 29 while Marshall led Friona with 4.

The B string boys lost to Hart, 45-20, as Cruse scored 5 for Friona and Newman led Hart with 13, while in consolation play the locals dumped Bovina, 39-27 in the semi-finals and then lost the last match, 48-11, to the boys from Three Way.

Darrell Robbins, of the Chiefs, was named one of the all-tournament players at the conclusion of the meet, Coach Cook reported.

## Construction Work Proceeding Here

Construction work on two important Friona buildings, the high school auditorium and gymnasium and the Baptist church, is proceeding according to schedule, officials said the first of the week.

Brick-laying has been in progress at the church building for some time, and the work is beginning to move toward its finale, although Rev. T. B. Allen, pastor, said that nothing could be announced definitely as when members might expect to occupy the new sanctuary, one of the most modern and beautiful in the county.

At the school, workmen are going forward as rapidly as possible on construction of the auditorium, with hope expressed that the building will be available for graduation exercises, come next May. With the old auditorium, in the grade school building, having been converted into additional classrooms, the school at the present is without an auditorium.

The new gymnasium for the high school, which will be a separate unit from the auditorium, is not yet under construction, although steel for the framework has arrived. General opinion is that the old gym will continue to serve during the 1950-51 school year.

## Will Enter Vega Meet This Week

Boys and girls in the cage uniforms of the Friona school will be in Vega this weekend to take part in their second invitation tournament of the season, Coach Raymond Cook announces.

Bracket drawings show that the boys go into the tournament against a strong Adrian team at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, while the girls follow at 3 o'clock by taking on the Goodnight squad.

On Tuesday night of next week, December 12th, the locals are slated to entertain the high-flying Dimmitt cagers on the local court.

In games other than tournament play last week, the Friona teams lost two matches on Tuesday night to the Muleshoe aggregation, when they visited in that city.

Score for the boys' game was 36-17, with Robason hitting seven to lead Friona and Nickels getting a total of 11 for Muleshoe. The local girls were beaten 51-21 as Locker poured in the baskets to score 34 for the winners. Haws paced Friona at 14.

## SCS Crews Keep Busy With Routine County Work

Parmer County Soil Conservation Service men have been kept busy during the past few weeks with various conservation projects, Bill Kennedy, supervisor of the office, located in Friona, said on Monday.

In reviewing the work carried on by his crew, Kennedy outlined the projects of last week as follows:

On Monday the engineering crew ran 4,200 feet of ditch lines for Gordon Hough for improved water application on 75 acres; located an irrigation well for D. O. Robason and Roy Johnson; and ran 15,000 feet of ditch lines for Ralph Wilson for improved water application on 100 acres. That same day the farm planner was in the Chitwood-Young-Snyder-Long-Holt neighborhood for reports on conservation practices that have been done and work that still remains.

Tuesday, the engineering crew drew up a topographic map for J. S. Menefee, while the farm planner

outlined a farm plan with Glenn Robertson, near Black.

The engineering crew devoted Wednesday to drawing up a topographic map for W. E. Verner while the farm planner went to Bovina to line up for planning in the Fuller-Elliott-Ellison-McCutchan neighborhood. On Thursday a map for Jesse Osborn, in the southern part of the county, was started, and finished the following day, while also on Friday the crew located a well for R. L. Hobbs. The farm planner spent both days in the office, engaged in administrative work.

A special pageant "Why The Chimes Ring", will be presented by members of the Congregational Church at 5 o'clock in the afternoon on Christmas Eve, Rev. George E. Meyer, pastor of the church, announced today.

Rev. Looking forward to the holiday season, the pastor also reported that a watchlight service would be held on New Year's Eve, with final details to be announced later.

## High Winds Menace Wheat Crops Here

High winds which have blasted this area for the past several days are menacing the good-looking wheat fields of the area, farmers admit, as they cast longing glances at the skies in hopes of wet weather.

Wheat fields in general got off to good starts in early fall, due to an unusually wet September, but the complete dearth of moisture since then is beginning to show its effects on the fields, and the strong winds are creating concern over most of the district.

In several instances, farmers fired up irrigation motors last week and began pumping water to their dry fields, with others expecting to follow suit in a few days if moisture is not forthcoming in some other form.

With the completion of grain harvest, during which the majority hoped for continued dry weather, op-

erators over the area are ready and willing for the weatherman to score up a good rain or snow coverage for the crops.

Members of the Friona FFA group who recently won first-place honors in the district contests held in Hereford will be in Amarillo on Saturday of this week to take part in the area competition, Chapter Instructor J. T. Gee reported the first of the week.

C. Osborn Jr., to present their farm skill demonstration on immunization for hog cholera.

The junior squad, which likewise won first place in district competition, will give a demonstration on vaccinating, dehorning, etc., with the boys participating including Jimmie Dixon, Jackie Rule, Virgil Phipps, and Gary Crow.

## On New Year's Eve

Nobody goes to bed in Scotland on December 31. There are too many other things to do.

It is a great night for the youths who, reminiscent of ancient superstitions, go about switching the trunks of fruit trees and petitioning the gods of fertility for a "good howling crop."

Before the advent of modern plumbing, teen-agers made quite a fuss about the "cream of the year" which was the first draught drawn



from the nearest spring immediately after midnight and supposedly entitled the drinker to anticipate a "luckier" year.

The Wassail Bowl is, of course, the center of adult festivities. Its origin is lost in antiquity, but tradition has endowed the Wassail Bowl with legendary romance. It is ornamental in design and decorated with branches of greenery. The mixture within is warm and sweet, and wine is sometimes added to the ale and sugar and spices.

After having enjoyed the concoction within the home among intimates at the stroke of midnight, the Scots pile into wagons or sleighs, with kettles full of the Wassail, mums, cheese and other food and set out to tour the community. The party stops at various houses and the refreshments go 'round at each stop. Nobody pays the least attention to the approaching dawn, because nobody goes to bed on New Year's Eve anyway.

## When Father Carved the...

# BOAR'S HEAD



WHAT ROAST TURKEY is to Christmas dinner today, the boar's head was to the Yuletide feasting of Medieval England.

Preparation for the feasting began during September or October when the boar's flesh was at its best. Hunters tracked the animal down with well-trained packs of boar-hounds and it was dangerous sport, attacking the ferocious beast with spears or surrounding him and driving him into a net.

His ear was his most vulnerable spot, but before the dogs could get a grip on it and pin him down, his sharp teeth often wounded—sometimes even killed—the hunter and his dogs.

Nevertheless, the pluckier the boar, the louder his praises were sung, the merrier the feasting, when his head was borne to the Christmas table.

## World's Christmas Legends Numerous

Multitudinous legends claim innumerable origins for the Christmas tree. One better known legend concerns an early Christian missionary, sometimes identified as St. Wilfred, who once came upon a group of Druids preparing to make a human sacrifice under a large oak.

He had the oak cut down and, as it fell, a young fir tree sprang up in its place. The missionary seized the evidence and made the fir tree a symbol of the new faith: henceforth, the tribesmen were to set this symbol of immortality in the halls of their lodges at Christmastime and surround it with feasting and love and the laughter of children.

The legend of the Faithful Pine which sheltered the Holy Family during the flight to Egypt is less well known perhaps, but so very charming and touched by the mysticism appropriate to the Nativity theme.

With Herod's soldiers in pursuit, Mary simply had to rest awhile and sought shelter within the hollow trunk of a huge fir tree. As the soldiers approached, the tree bent its branches to conceal the huddled little group. When the danger had passed, the baby Jesus blessed the old tree. And if you cut a pine cone lengthwise at Christmastime, you can still see the imprint of His little hand.

Nor has legend overlooked the bright baubles which bedeck our modern Christmas trees. The first Christmas tree was really an apple tree, according to legends collected by Florence B. Robinson. And, although the fir tree long since has supplanted its predecessor for Christmas use, the popular tinsel bauble of today is the representative of the fruit which for the early Christians symbolized the fall of man in the Garden of Eden and his reclamation by the birth of the Saviour.

**Questions & Answers  
Given for Veterans**

**Q.** I was the common-law wife of a World War veteran who died recently. If I meet income requirements, would I be eligible for a VA pension?

**A.** You may be eligible provided a

valid common-law marriage was established. File a claim with VA and at that time your entitlement will be determined.

**Q.** I expect to enter a VA hospital shortly for treatment of a 40 percent service-connected disability, and I understand I'll have to remain there for two or three months. Is there any way my family can get financial help from VA while I am hospitalized?

**A.** VA has no funds specifically available for such purposes. How-

ever, after you have been in the hospital 21 days or more for treatment, VA will pay you a 100 percent disability rating, which you will continue to receive thereafter for as long as you remain hospitalized for such treatment.

**Q.** I am planning to buy a home with a GI loan and am ready to make a down payment. What happens to my down payment in case a VA loan guaranty cannot be established?

**A.** Unless you make certain a clause is inserted in the purchase contract stating that payments are to be returned to you if the loan cannot be obtained, you may lose your down payment.

**Q.** Does the new law enabling Spanish-American War vets to get out-patient medical care without regard to service-connection also apply to dental care?

**A.** Yes. Spanish-American War vets may be eligible for full dental

care in VA clinics or from hometown dentists with VA approval.

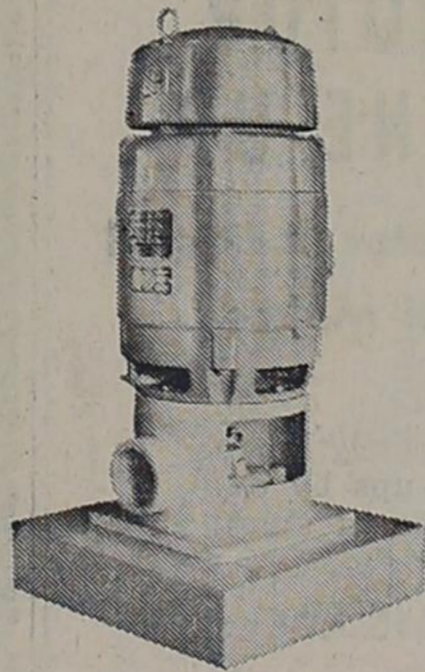

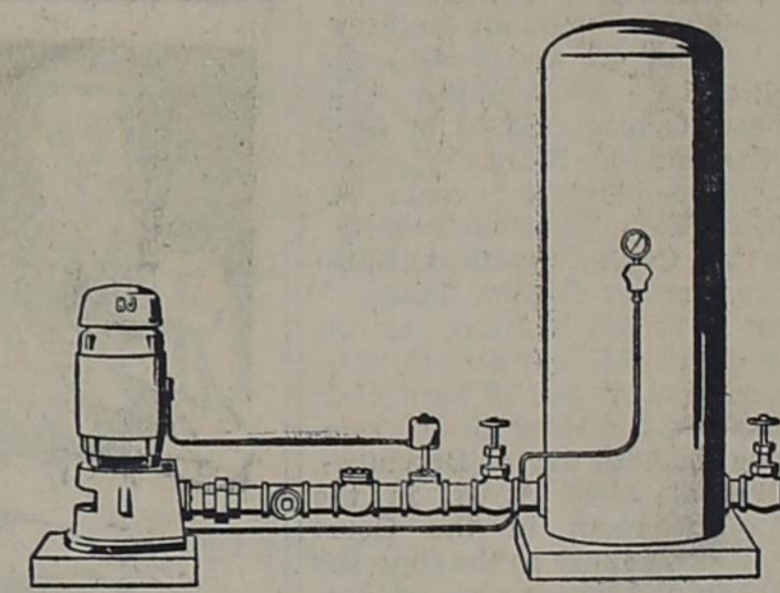
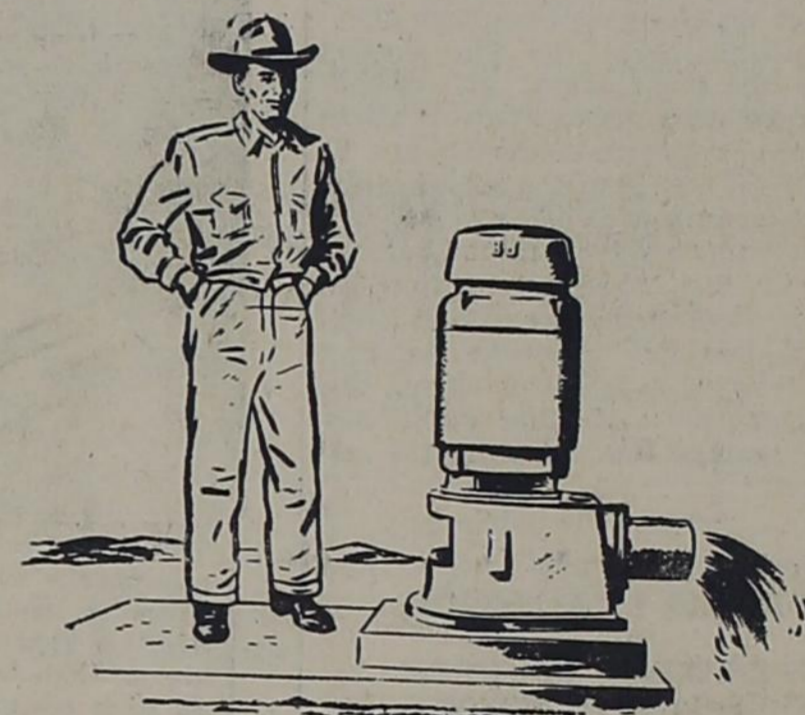

# COUNTY AGENT RECOMMENDS SLOW DEATH POISON FOR KILLING OFF RATS

Warfarin, a new rat killer released by the University of Wisconsin Research Foundation, appears to be one of the most effective poisons available for the control of rats and mice, and County Agent Joe Jones recommends the poison for local rodent control.

The active ingredients of the new poison is coumarin, a compound found in sweetclover which affects the clotting of blood, says J. E. Poore, assistant district leader for the Rodent Control Service. Rats that have eaten warfarin baits for several days become less active, develop internal hemorrhages, and slowly bleed to death.

Poore says that one advantage of warfarin over many of the other rat poisons is that it is odorless and tasteless. Rats will continue to eat the bait until they die without detecting the presence of the poison. Another advantage lies in the safety with which it can be used on the farm. Warfarin is poisonous to all warm-blooded animals, but the amount recommended for controlling rats and mice is so small that there is little danger of farm animals or people being poisoned accidentally.

Even though warfarin is considered an extremely safe rodent poison, Poore warns that the usual precautions should be taken to prevent accidental poisonings on the farm.

For the poison to be effective, it is necessary for rats to eat warfarin baits over a period of five or more successive days. Grain or cereal type baits, which are not readily eaten by cats and dogs may be mixed with the poison, thus reducing the possible danger of poisoning these farm pets.

Warfarin is now on the market under the trade names of various chemical companies. Poore cautions that the warfarin baits should be mixed according to the manufacturer's instructions.

According to Poore, mixed bait can be secured in 100 pound lots from the Rodent Control Service at San Antonio. Rodent control service fieldmen and county agricultural agents and representatives of other public service organizations can order the new poison.

# Low Production Cows Are Not Profitable

A butterfat production of more than 200 pounds a year is necessary for a cow to be a profitable animal in the dairy herd in 1949, County Agent Joe Jones says, presenting statistics of Texas A. and M. Extension Service.

A. M. Meekma, assistant dairy husbandman for the service says that the proof of his statement is shown by production records in Dairy Herd Improvement Association herds, as

compiled by the USDA's Bureau of Dairy Industry over many years.

Cows that average 200 pounds of butterfat in the Association herds in 1949 consumed \$131 worth of feed and returned \$121 over feed cost. Since the feed cost represents 50 to 60 percent of the total cost of keeping a cow, the return from these cows was about \$10 less than the cost of keeping them.

In fact, Meekma says that the Bureau's DHIA analysis shows that in most areas, a cow should produce substantially more than 200 pounds of butterfat a year to make a profit for her owner.

At higher levels of milk production, the cost of production per gallon is less. For instance, the average butterfat production for all cows enrolled in the Association in 1949 was 359 pounds. These cows consumed \$156 worth of feed and returned \$234 over feed cost to their owners, a net income of \$78 per cow.

Meekma points out also that cows which averaged 600 pounds of butterfat the same year consumed \$208 worth of feed and returned \$473 over feed cost, a net income of \$265.

Rise of 37 percent in school costs per pupil is noted.

Texas cotton producers are at the cross-roads so far as the 1950 cotton crop is concerned and the wet, cloudy weather isn't helping the farmer in his fight against the threatening insect.

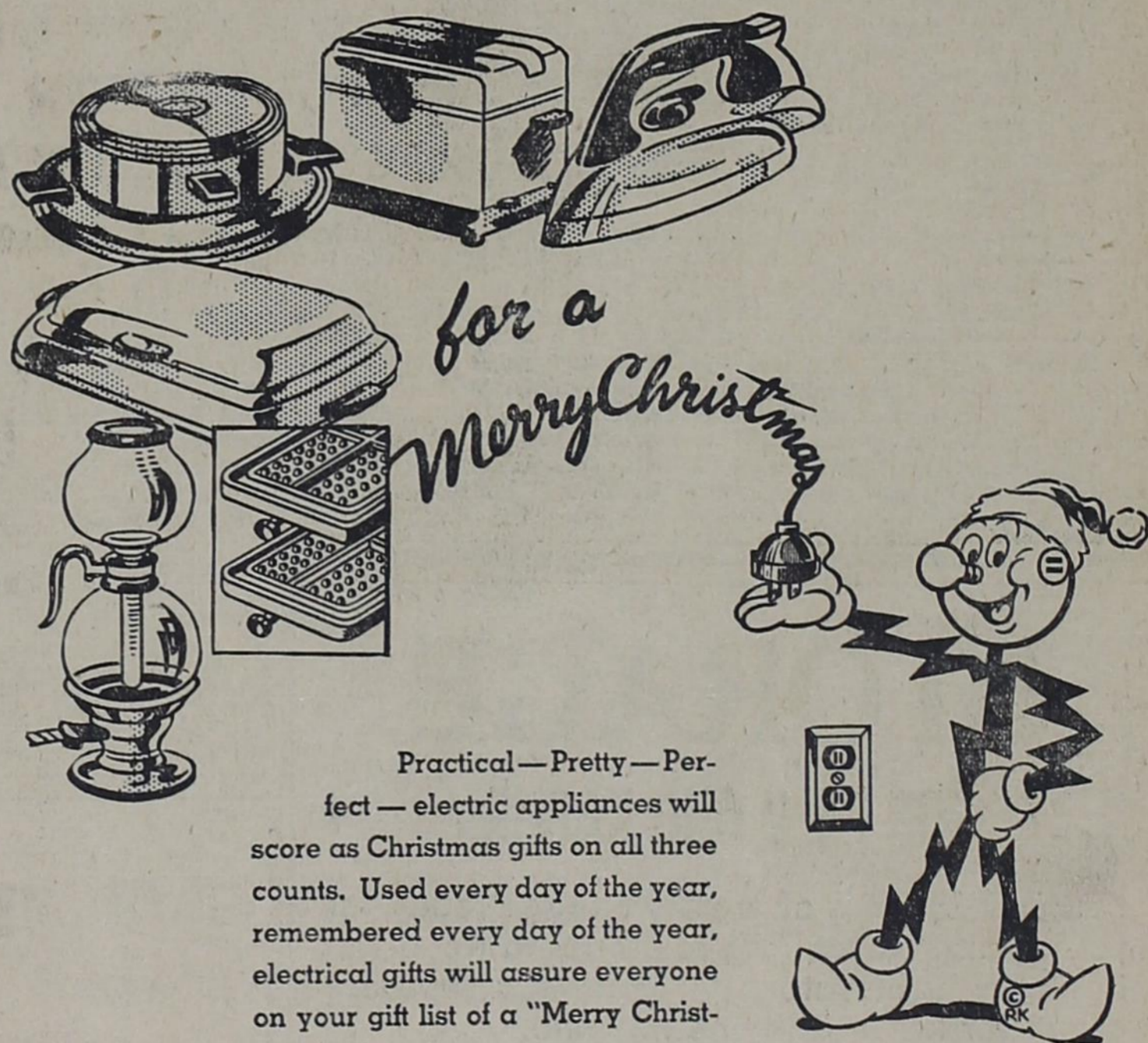
