City Editor Lodge of the Clovis News-Journal, foresees "a war to end civilization" should the United States and Russia ever become involved in an actual hot war.

Lodge, speaking before the Lions Club gathering Tuesday night, deplored our lack of leadership in Washington, and strongly criticized the present administration for its policy of keeping the American public uninformed as to developments in dealing with the Korean situation.

"It has come to a sad state of affairs when we have to get our news from No. 10 Downing Street in London as to what is taking place in Washington," he declared.

The visiting editor said that if we are drawn into a war with Russia in Asia, we will lose, but if the war is fought in Europe, he saw a more hopeful picture.

With a reading of nine below zero early Wednesday morning, this immediate section was listed as the coldest spot on the high plains by H. C. Winburn of the United States Weather Bureau at Amarillo.

Other readings on the high plains ranged from two below to two above for the same period.

The mercury began skidding here early Tuesday morning when high winds from the north drove the temperatures down from a comfortable reading in the 70's Monday afternoon to 12 degress throughout most of Tuesday.

A light rain preceded the cold wave shortly after midnight Tuesday morning. A snow flurry, which is reported to have been very local in its scope, breezed in during the midafternoon. Both the rain and snow combined brought moisture enough to be of any substantial benefit to wheat fields.

FIRST XMAS CARD **ORIGINATED IN 1846**



COUNTY AGENT RECOMMENDS SLOW DEATH POISON FOR KILLING OFF RATS

Warfarin, a new rat killer released search Foundation, appears to be one of the most effective poisons avail- dy weather isn't helping the farm able for the control of rats and mice, er in his fight against the threatenand County Agent Joe Jones recommends the poison for local rodent control.

The active ingredients of the new the clotting of blood, says J. E. Poore, assistant district leader for the Rodent Control Service. Rats that have eaten warfarin baits for several days become less active, develop internal hemorrhages, and slowly bleed to death.

Poore says that one advantage of warfarin over many of the other rat poisons is that it is odorless and tasteless. Rats will continue to eat the bait until they die without detecting the presence of the poison. Another advantage lies in the safety with which it can be used on the farm. Warfarin is poisonous to all warm-blooded animals, but the amount recommended for controlling rats and mice is so small that there is little danger of farm animals or peaple being poisoned accidentally.

Even though warfarin is considered an extremely safe rodent poison, Poore warns that the usual precautions should be taken to prevent accidental poisonings on the farm.

For the poison to be effective, it is necessary for rats to eat warfarin baits over a period of five or more successive days. Grain or cereal type baits, which are not readily eaten by cats and dogs may be mixed with the poison, thus reducing the possible danger of poisoning these farm pets.

Warfarin is now on the market under the trade names of various chemical companies. Poore cautions that the warfarin baits should be mixed according to the manufacturer's instructions.

According to Poore, mixed bait can be secured in 100 pound lots from the Rodent Control Service at San Antonio. Rodent control service fieldmen and county agricultural agents and representatives of other public ser-
