ed an extremely safe rodent poison, Poore warns that the usual precau-
tions should be taken to prevent accidental poisonings on the farm.
For the poison to be effective, it is
necessary for rats to eat warfarin successive days. Grain or cereal type
baits, which are not readily eaten by
cats and dogs may be mixed with the
poison, thus reducing the possible
