Parmer County DHIA Gives Regular Report

Production records of Parmer County dairy herd for the month of July, were released this week by Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement association.

Out of a total of 16 herds, 392 cows were listed; and only 93 of the entire group were dry. Association totals were: milk production, 251040 pounds; butterfat production, 9394 pounds; average milk per cow, 640 pounds; and average butterfat per cow, 23.9 pounds.

The Holstein herd of W. E. Martin ranked first among the entire association with an average milk production of 1081 pounds, 34.6 pounds average for butterfat.

Two of Martin's animals were then listed in the 10 high cows for butterfat production and for milk production. "Pet" was listed in both groups with 2640 pounds of milk which tested 2.8, and 74 pounds of butterfat.

"Janet" was listed for milk production with 1660 pounds of milk which tested 3.13; and 52 pounds of butterfat.

Martin Fulcher's Brown Swiss Herd was second high ranking for the association, with 715 pounds of milk; an average of 33.6 on butterfat.

Fulcher's "Judy" and "Ethel" were listed among the ten high cows in butterfat production. Statistics for "Judy" were: 1470 pounds of milk, testing 4.5; 66 pounds of butterfat. Milk production for "Ethel" was 1330 pounds testing 5.4; and 72 pounds butterfat.

A Holstein herd belonging to Humphrey and Ells was third high herd, giving an average of 897 pounds of milk; 30.2 pounds average butterfat.

Two of the animals were among the 10 high cows for milk production; and three were listed among the 10 high animals for butterfat production.

Other owners with animals in the list of high milk production were: D. C. Burnett, Humphrey's Dairy, and Leo Witkowski. In butterfat production, animals belonging to D. C. Burnett, Humphrey's Dairy, Leo Witkowski, were on the high list.

As for individual animals, D. C. Burnett's "Florence", a Brown Swiss, was the only cow listed in the 80-90 class.

Farwell city commissioners were scratching their heads again this week, after surveying a report from Ray Mears that only four new additions have been made to the sewer lines during the month of July.

Mayor C. M. Henderson said that additions now number "one or two per week, and we cannot consider this as a favorable answer to the commission's appeal for more users."

No more formal action is planned for the present by the commission than another request that citizens hook on and use the municipal facilities available to them.

Drafting of an ordinance requiring property owners whose valuations above an arbitrarily set sum be required to join sewer users has been considered a last recourse that the commission does not favor at this time.

Bovina Service Station Looted by Burglars

Sheriff Chas. Lovelace reports that Paul Jones service station in Bovina was robbed of approximately \$150 of merchandise last week.

According to the sheriff, the lawbreakers took about \$60 worth of cigarettes and tobacco, a Motorola radio and various other items.

The burglars removed the screen from the back window of the station, and broke the window to gain entrance. Lovelace states that a similar robbery occurred in Texico, at both the Conoco and Allred's station, recently.

Bovina Gives OK Nod To Election Questions

Bovina citizens made it clear that they are in favor of a two measure totaling \$40,000 that will improve their city as they voted in the election by an overwhelming vote last Saturday in a special election.

In favor of the waterworks proposal, which will mean extended and improved lines for the city, were 97 of the voters who went to the polls. Opposition to this phase of the election numbered only 4.

For the first measure, \$30,000 was set aside for general obligation bonds.

The second part of the election, which set aside \$10,000 was adopted 98 to 4. It calls for construction and equipment for a new fire department building. At present, the city is renting housing for the department equipment.

In a breakdown of the election bonds, the city commission pointed out just where the taxpayer's money will go:

\$18,700 to retire outstanding indebtedness by the city; \$3500 for a new water pump on an extra well; \$8800 for water line extensions; \$8000 for a new city hall; and \$1000 for a house to cover city pumping facilities.

20 Misdemeanors Pass Through Texico Court

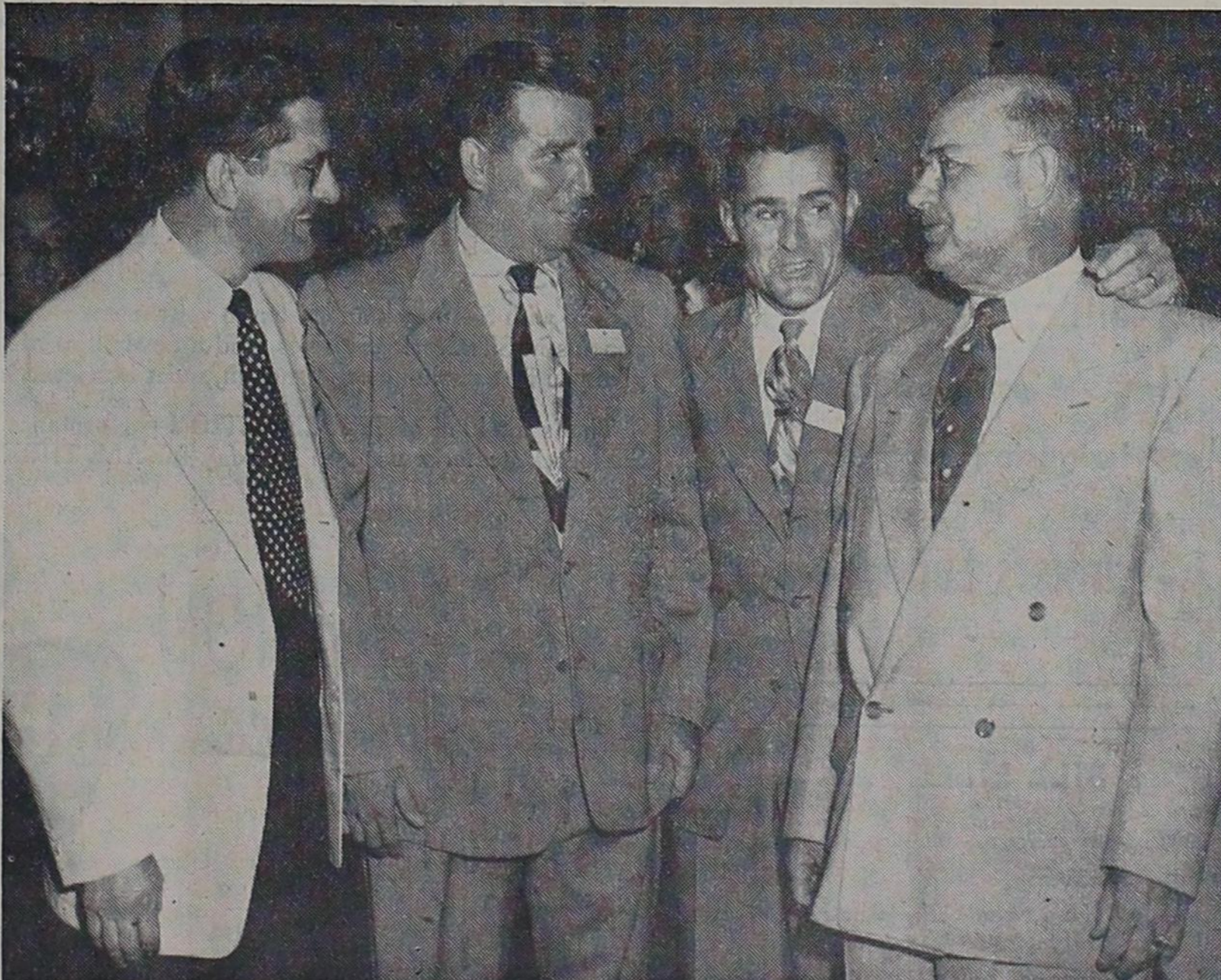

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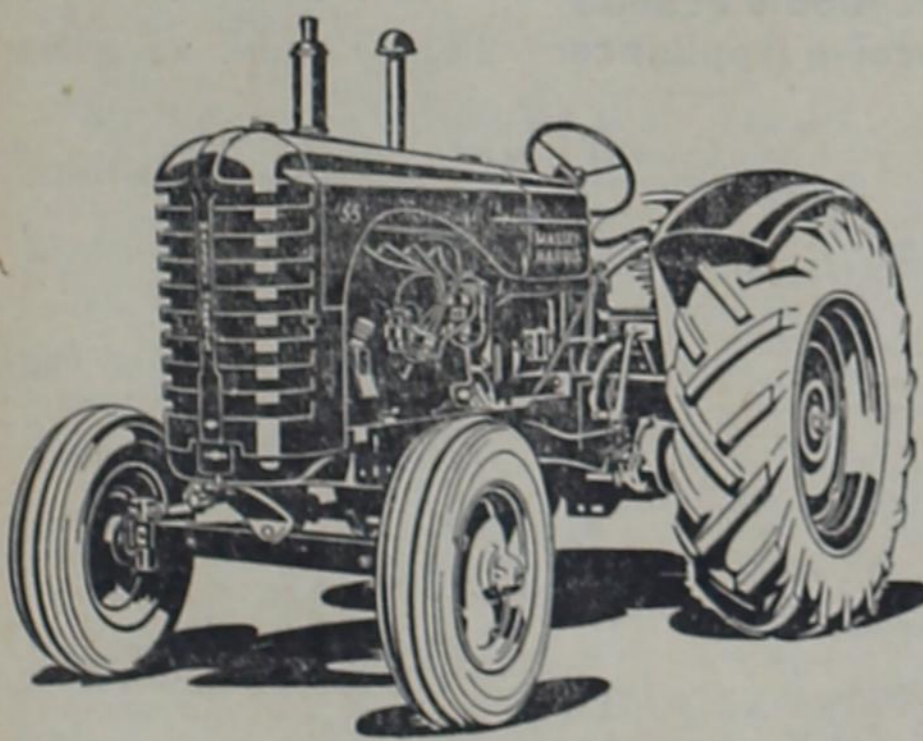

Texas 1952 Wheat Goal Set At 6,400,000 Acres

Texas 1952 production goals for fall-seeded wheat, barley, oats, and rye were announced this week by B. F. Vance, Chairman, State Agricultural Mobilization Committee. According to Vance, the State's goals for these fall-seeded crops are as follows: wheat, 6,400,000; barley, 200,000 acres; oats, 1,600,000 acres; and rye, 21,000 acres.

These goals apply only to fall-seeded crops. Goals for spring seeded crops will be announced later.

In making this announcement, Vance explained that these acreages are to be considered Texas' share of

the National goal, for each of these fall-seeded crops. The national goals for wheat of 78,850,000 acres; for barley of 12,865,000 acres; for oats of 6,035,000 acres and for rye at the 1951 harvested acreage, are in line with good land use and for all possible expansion of feed crops including hay and pasture.

The national wheat goal calls for a slightly larger acreage than was seeded in the fall of 1950 for harvest in 1951. The Texas goal of 6,400,000 acres is about the same as the acreage seeded last fall but less than 2,000,000 acres were brought to harvest.

Work on Farwell School Continues

Sixty-eight new windows which are to be installed in the old Farwell school building have not yet arrived, school authorities say.

However, other repairs are progressing rapidly. All ceilings are completed and recesses for lockers in each individual grade room have been installed. The steps have been repaired; and wiring and plaster completed, and the blackboards have been installed, it was pointed out.

According to the new transportation formula, the school will receive from \$1000 to \$3000 per year more than it has received on transportation, Sims adds.

In addition to the transportation audit, all records for the past years—1949-50 and 1950-51, were audited with the exception of the lunch room records. These records were examined earlier in the year.

All records were found to be very accurate, Sims reports.

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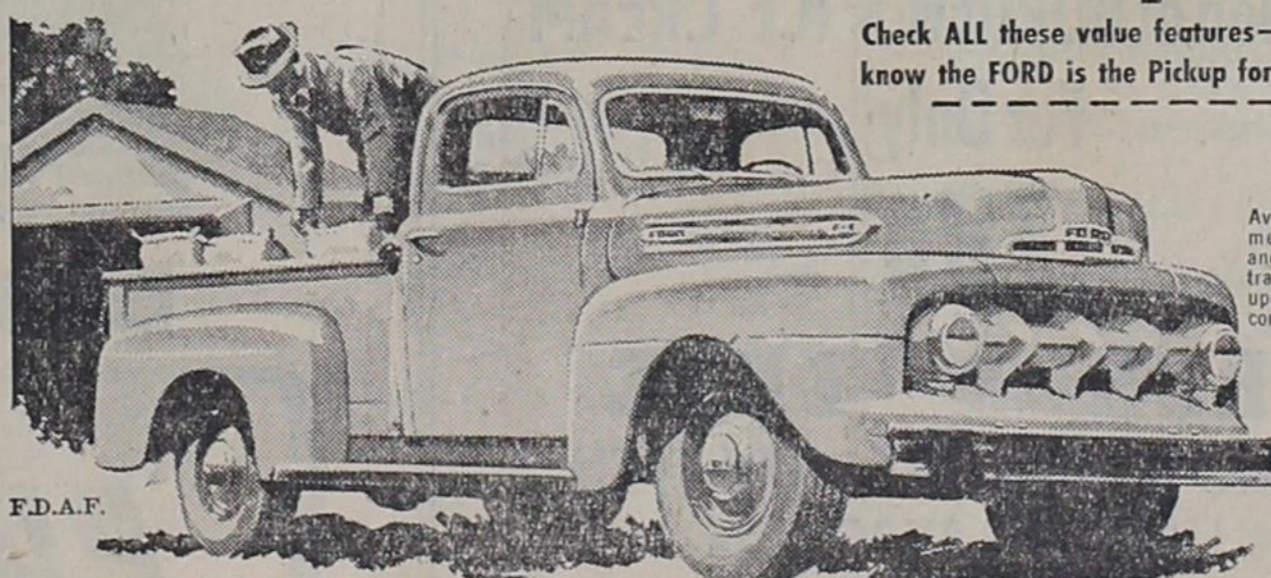

Mr. and Mrs. Willie Williams Return From Alaska, Have Had Interesting Experiences

"We had a fine time, but someone else can take the next one," stated Mr. and Mrs. Willie Williams, who returned Wednesday of last week from a trip to Alaska, where they attended the wedding of their son. They took their new daughter-in-law Maxine Ford, to Alaska.

One of the interesting facts to Mr. and Mrs. Williams was the high salary and price scale in both Canada and Alaska. However, Mrs. Williams adds, "some things are extremely high, others aren't." For instance, she points out, shoes are about the same prices as in the states. Canned foods aren't so expensive, but fresh vegetables and fruits "cost a fortune."

Quoting some of the prices on various commodities, it costs approximately \$1.50 an hour to wash your clothes at a laundry; gas in Canada was 75c in places, and was 42c a gallon in Fairbanks. One could purchase a hamburger almost anywhere for \$1.25.

The Williams and Miss Ford left Farwell on Friday morning, July 6. They took their son's car, and a trailer house, to him. The entire drive took nine days.

Staying in Denver, Colo. the first night, the group traveled on to Yellowstone Park Saturday, and saw about 100 to 150 miles of the scenic place.

"We didn't tarry while going through the park, but we hit it lucky," explains Mrs. Williams as she tells of seeing "Old Faithful" erupt.

By Sunday night the travelers were in Great Falls, Mont. Resuming their travels the next day, they "got caught" in the Calgary Stampede, which is supposed to be the greatest rodeo in the world. The local people thought the Indians, and cowboy dress of the participants was very colorful.

The hardest day's drive came Tuesday. Recent showers had bogged the graveled roads which had just been worked. "However, if we had started a few days earlier, we would have been held up a week, so we hit it lucky again," they relate. The group stayed in Grand Prairie in Canada that night.

Wednesday night, the group was in Fort Nelson, and Thursday, they stayed in Rancheris. Mrs. Williams stayed in Rancheris. Mrs. Williams full scenery during the Canadian

drive. "We never did learn the name of the place we stayed Friday, but it was just before we got to the Alaska border," the Williams say. Then on Saturday, they arrived at their destination, in Fairbanks. They had no trouble at the port of entry, and found the officer there to be quite a pleasant person. He seemed to derive a great deal of enjoyment from teasing Miss Ford about the boys from the states marrying the native girls.

The Williams had told him that their purpose in going to Alaska was to attend their son's wedding.

"Who is he going to marry—a native" was his query. Miss Ford, quite perturbed, immediately entered the conversation with "No, he is going to marry me!"

The Williams stayed in a trailer court in Fairbanks. According to Mrs. Williams, there were no tourist courts in the city, though there were a few small hotels. The houses are constructed of wood siding, with no stucco, brick or rock. The houses are very well insulated.

Another thing that amazed the local couple was the extremely long daylight hours. "It was light all night," Mrs. Williams quips, adding that "you could read a newspaper at 12 or one o'clock." She explains further that the sun doesn't go down until around 11 o'clock at night, and then comes up again about 2 o'clock. "When we first got there, I couldn't sleep, I kept waiting for the sun to go down," the local woman says.

People were especially friendly, according to Mr. and Mrs. Williams. They met a woman who had taught school with W. M. Roberts of the local school system.

The chaplain at the base was related to the late Alpha Doshier, and the minister who performed the wedding ceremony had an uncle who had lived in Farwell many years ago. "It's a small world," say the Williams.

The weather was not a great deal different in Alaska. Two days, the temperature was in the 80's in the day and about 55 degrees at night. A cold front was scheduled the day the local people left for home.

The Eskimo people dressed much as people in the states do, though the men would show a tendency for plaid skirts; and women wore big

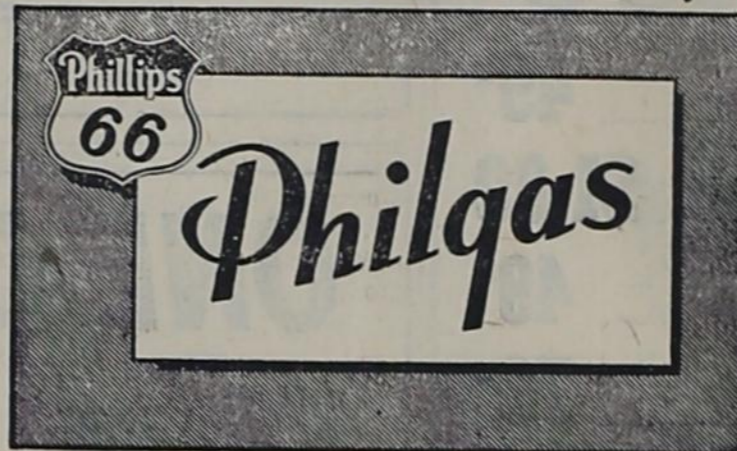
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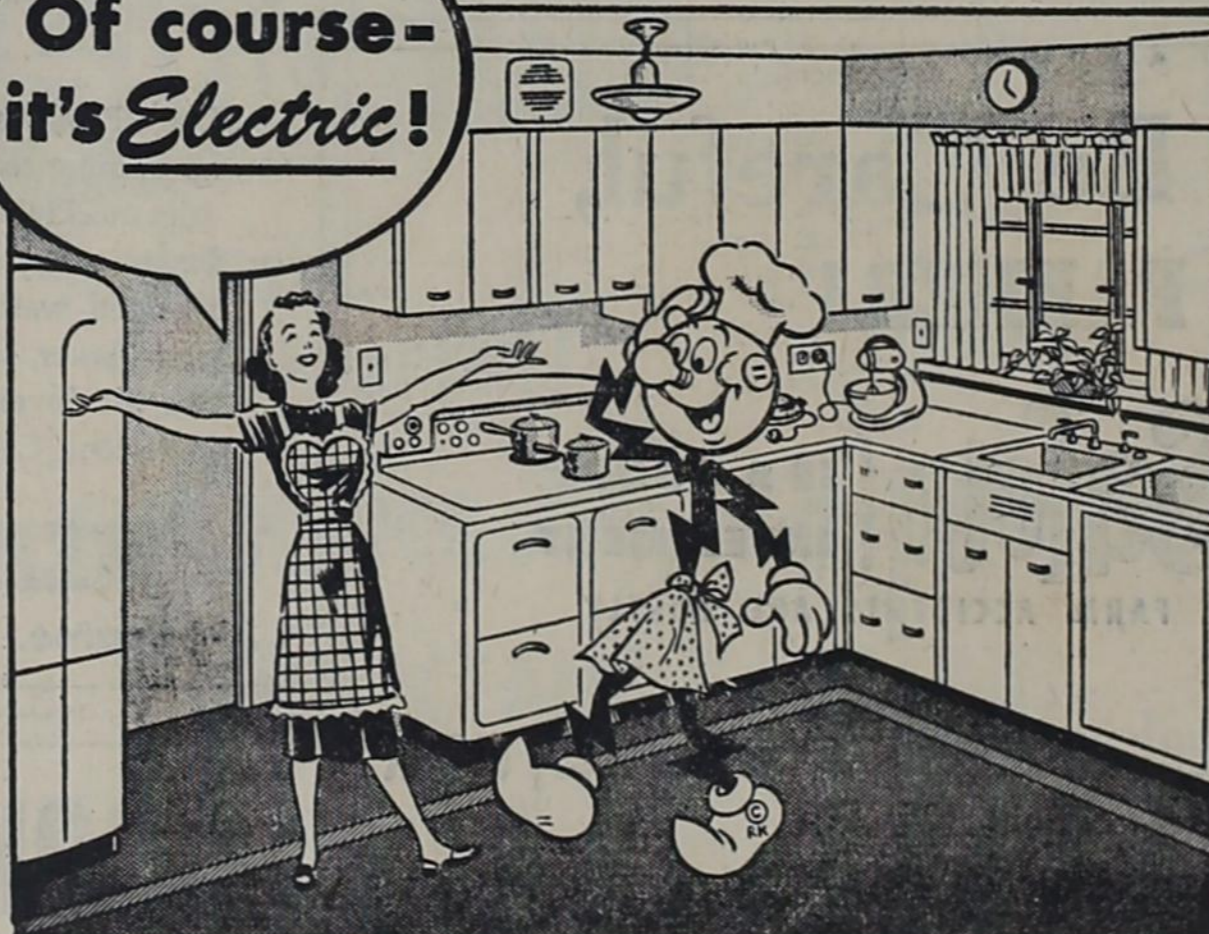

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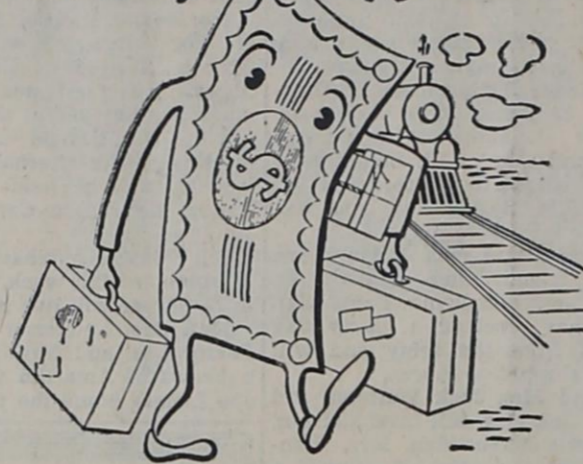
