Josh Blocher Found Dead

Joshua Blocher, 85-year-old resident of Progress, 12 miles southeast of here in Bailey, was found dead in a cotton field on the Harold Mardis farm, 5 miles south and two west of Progress, at two o'clock Wednesday afternoon by Clifford and Cecil Mardis as they drove along a county road.

The Mardis boys said they had passed the spot where the body was found "ten or fifteen times" during the fourday period Blocher was missing.

Sheriff Hugh Freeman said the aged man had died after being dumped into the cotton field, only one row inside the field. Ground marks and torn down cotton stalks indicated clearly that he had put up a teriffic struggle before death. Dr. D. T. Green, who performed a post mortem on the body, was unable to state definitely how long he had been dead, further than to say, "he probably died sometime Monday."

Two large gashes were found on the back of Blocher's head, Dr. Green said, but the skull was not fractured, leading that physician to speculate that the victim had been rendered unconscious and left alone to die.

Officers, including two Texas Rangers, who are investigating the case, are of the opinion that robbery was the motive of the attack. Sheriff Freeman said that he felt certain Blocher had at least \$1500 in his one-room shack, where he lived a semi-recluse life. A glass jar containing \$195 was found in the shack by officers. But the junk-filled hovel had not been completely searched late Wednesday night.

Officers admit they are baffled by the case. One of the most baffling circumstances is that there is only one door to the old man's cabin, and it was locked with a padlock on the outside when he was found to be missing.

Blocher, who had been ill in recent weeks, disappeared sometime Saturday night. R. L. Brooks, who had been giving him attention during the illness, was the first one to report old "Uncle Josh" missing.

Blocher came to Bailey County in 1908 from Kansas, and is believed to have one daughter still living in that state. Efforts are being made to contact her. He established the town of Progress a number of years ago and succeeded in getting a postoffice opened there. He accuses "them Muleshoe devils" of being responsible for the discontinuance of



"It shall be unlawful for any refund dealer, or any employee thereof, to prepare or notarize any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer, or to act in any capacity as agent or employee of any claimant for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by keeping his books, records, refund claim forms or other documents to be used or intended for use by said claimant in the preparation of his tax refund claim, and the Comptroller shall not approve the payment of any tax refund claim, in whole or in part, in which the claimant has permitted the seller of the motor fuel upon which tax refund is claimed or any employee of said seller, to prepare, notarize or file his claim for tax refund, or to keep any books, records or documents used in the preparation or filing of said claim. Provided that the Comptroller may, after proper hearing as herein provided, cancel, suspend, or refuse the issuance or reinstatement of the license of any refund dealer who shall prepare or notarize, or who shall permit any employee to prepare or notarize, any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by the claimant thereof, or who shall keep, or permit any employee to keep, any duplicate invoice of exemption for more than seven (7) days after it has been duly issued to a purchaser of refund motor fuel."



Miss Short, Missionary From China, Visits Here

"It is so easy to love the Chinese people because of their responsiveness and warmth of friendship which might not be found in other parts of the world", Miss Jaxie Short, foreign missionary, who recently returned from five years in China,

Miss Short, who is originally from Shawnee, Oklahoma, was a house guest in the home of her cousin and husband, Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Snider, over the past weekend. She was accompanied by her sister, Eunice Short, and her mother, Mrs. W. T.

Miss Short attended Oklahoma Baptist university, where her sister, Eunice, is now an instructor, then taught school in Paden for two years. She then attended Baptist seminary in Ft. Worth, before her assignment to China as a missionary by the Foreign Mission Board of Southern Baptist convention.

Discussing her work, Miss Short said that she learned to speak Chinese after she went overseas. First you learn to talk the language by listening to the tones, then you learn to read, she says. Some of the characters have been Romanized to make the language easier to 'earn. To illustrate the meaning of some of the characters, Miss Short read parts of a letter to the Tribune reporter. She added that usually Chinese sentences are written from the top to the bottom of the page in columns, instead of from left to right, as the Ameri-

The complicated part about the Chinese language, stated the missionary, is that each character has nine different tones. Words ending in a consonent have only three tones, and words with a soft sound have six possible pronunciations. God is the unseen Worker who joins the eternal and the unlimited power of the universe to those who will pull together in high service. To join your fellows in prayer and in worship is to discover a fellowship in which human and divine powers are pooled for the good of all and for the glory of God. Don't be a chronic buster nor a puller in the wrong direction. Rather be a booster and a factor in a progressive cooperation.

> TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
> Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III
> of the Constitution of the State of Texas be nended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including one (1) continuously immediately preceding filing of such application; provided that the maximum

payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month, "Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value there-of, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expira-tion of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid

their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding

the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein sot forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and pro-vided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amend-ment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proglamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III. Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Com-missioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall here after be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the

Veterans' Land Board.
"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison Sys-tem, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person,

firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be pro-

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending De-cember 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds here-after issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Vet-erans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars \$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued, said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one un-marked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing

become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation

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
