

No Water Crisis Seen from Hot Weather With Three Wells in Operation Locally

While a number of cities all over the Southwest, including some of the largest commercial centers are struggling along with an inadequate water supply, there appears to be no water shortage in store for Texico-Farwell in the immediate future, V. C. Venable, local water superintendent, stated today.

The local waterworks company now has three good wells in operation and none of them have shown signs of failure. "In fact, we've got more water now than ever before," Venable insisted.

While it appears certain that the water supply is adequate to meet all needs, Venable did say that there were still some "bugs" in the system. He named the small water tower in Farwell with a capacity of only 52,000 gallons. "And, in Texico, some patrons are not being serviced satisfactorily because of over-loaded lines. He mentioned one section in Texico where there were 28 customers on a two-inch line, and explained that service to those customers would not get any better until a larger line is installed.

Last Friday afternoon, the new Santa Fe water tower was connected with the system and service was greatly improved in much of the town of Texico where the mains are of sufficient size to accommodate the users. Venable said that a pressure of 65 pounds was now being maintained to the Texico lines, compared to 52 pounds in the Farwell mains. And even this high pressure does not force water through over-taxed lines, Venable pointed out.

Asked why he did not increase the pressure in Texico, Venable was quick to reply that he was fearful of "blowing out some of those old mains" in that distributed system. Only last week, one leak in a main developed and had to be repaired.

A by-pass valve, which has been on order for several weeks, is yet to

be installed at the Santa Fe tower. When that is done, Venable plans to hook the Texico system into the Santa Fe supply and Farwell will be served by the original system. In emergencies, he said, both systems can be tied together.

Asked about the reason for low pressure in the afternoon of late, Venable said that it was due to over-taxing the pumping facilities when only one pump was in operation. He pointed to last Sunday afternoon as an example. "At three o'clock I had a tankful of water, and two hours later when I went back for a check-up the tank was completely empty," he explained. Only one of the pumps at the Farwell tank operates automatically. When the larger pump was put to work, the pressure rose readily.

Despite the fact that we seem to have an ample water supply, Venable cautioned about wasting water uselessly. "There is no use to let the water run down the streets," he concluded.

Bookkeeping Service Ends for Oil Dealers

Effective Sept. 1, no refund dealer will be allowed to prepare or notarize and claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel or retain invoices of exemption for more than seven days.

This, say Farwell wholesale oil distributors, is made necessary by a paragraph in House Bill No. 285, recently enacted by the legislature.

"We would much prefer to continue doing our booking the way it has been done in the past, which is more convenient for our customers," one of the distributors said today.

"However, this is the new legislation, and we are going to have to abide by it now. It will mean some extra work for our customer, and we are anxious to help them all we can," he said.

WE, YOUR LOCAL WHOLESALE OIL AND GAS DISTRIBUTORS, regret to announce that a new legislative act will force us to discontinue a former service. Effective Sept. 1, we will no longer be able to fill out or notarize your affidavit for gasoline tax refund.

Also, we will not be able to keep any duplicate invoice more than 7 days.

HERE IS A SECTION OF HB NO. 285:

(e)

"It shall be unlawful for any refund dealer, or any employee thereof, to prepare or notarize any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer, or to act in any capacity as agent or employee of any claimant for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by keeping his books, records, refund claim forms or other documents to be used or intended for use by said claimant in the preparation of his tax refund claim, and the Comptroller shall not approve the payment of any tax refund claim, in whole or in part, in which the claimant has permitted the seller of the motor fuel upon which tax refund is claimed or any employee of said seller, to prepare, notarize or file his claim for tax refund, or to keep any books, records or documents used in the preparation or filing of said claim. Provided that the Comptroller may, after proper hearing as herein provided, cancel, suspend, or refuse the issuance or reinstatement of the license of any refund dealer who shall prepare or notarize, or who shall permit any employee to prepare or notarize, any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by the claimant thereof, or who shall keep, or permit any employee to keep, any duplicate invoice of exemption for more than seven (7) days after it has been duly issued to a purchaser of refund motor fuel."

Miss Short, Missionary From China, Visits Here

"It is so easy to love the Chinese people because of their responsiveness and warmth of friendship which might not be found in other parts of the world", Miss Jaxie Short, foreign missionary, who recently returned from five years in China, says.

Miss Short, who is originally from Shawnee, Oklahoma, was a house guest in the home of her cousin and husband, Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Snider, over the past weekend. She was accompanied by her sister, Eunice Short, and her mother, Mrs. W. T. Short.

Miss Short attended Oklahoma Baptist university, where her sister, Eunice, is now an instructor, then taught school in Paden for two years. She then attended Baptist seminary in Ft. Worth, before her assignment to China as a missionary by the Foreign Mission Board of Southern Baptist convention.

Discussing her work, Miss Short said that she learned to speak Chinese after she went overseas. First you learn to talk the language by listening to the tones, then you learn to read, she says. Some of the characters have been Romanized to make the language easier to learn. To illustrate the meaning of some of the characters, Miss Short read parts of a letter to the Tribune reporter. She added that usually Chinese sentences are written from the top to the bottom of the page in columns, instead of from left to right, as the Americans do.

The complicated part about the Chinese language, stated the missionary, is that each character has nine different tones. Words ending in a consonant have only three tones, and words with a soft sound have six possible pronunciations. Miss Short was very impressed with the beauty of the language, which she described as "a sing-song language."

When speaking Chinese, a person also talks deeper in the throat, "I worked so hard at first to give new sounds, that I actually suffered from a sore throat," the missionary added.

Concluding her discussion of the language, Miss Short stated that each character has a meaning of its own, then there is a combination of characters. "I am supposed to know how to write approximately 1500 to 2000 characters, and I can read most of the new Testament in Chinese."

In China, a person's personality and education is judged by the way he writes. Their writing of characters is much more important than penmanship in America, Miss Short states, adding that "I wouldn't dare hand-write a Chinese letter to anyone but a close friend."

Miss Short went to China in 1946, and traveled on to Canton, where she worked for four years. Her last year was spent in Hong-Kong, both of which are located in South China. Hong-Kong is a British crown colony

at the tip of south China.

The Oklahoma woman taught in one of the missionary schools in junior and senior high school. She states that most of her students were about the same age as high school students in America, although a few were older, who had missed school during the Japanese war.

The response to teaching was just as individualistic as in America, she states. Some of the students in the missionary schools are not Christians, however. They attend the schools because they are eager to get the best education possible. When a student in China finishes high school, he has already studied the equivalent of college geometry and other heavy courses, the missionary points out.

"I am not a preacher, just a teacher," states Miss Short, as she explains that "I do want to do all that I can while in the states, to help the American people to love the people of China so they will pray for them more."

Discussing the Chinese people further, Miss Short says that the principal

Chinese dress for women features a high collar, straight cut lines, which makes a dress quite form fitting. The girls, who are very slender, look always neat and well-kept. There is no such thing as ready-made dress, they are all made to order, Miss Short adds.

"No matter what material the Chinese girls dress is made from, she is always dressed up", the missionary adds. Since the dresses are all alike, a girl can have one pattern and make all her clothes from it.

These people have living down to "very utmost simplicity," according to the missionary. Because of their straight cut clothing, they can pack enough clothes for a week's trip in

a make-up kit while Miss Short states that such a trip would require several bags for her.

Grade school children and some of the high school groups do wear foreign made clothes. The junior and senior high school girls love to wear slacks, she states. They wore light blue overall type slacks for gym suits at the school where she taught.

As for the people in the working class, many wear short jackets with trousers. This clothing is also very straight. When washed, they are dried flat and require very little ironing. The Chinese do not use clothes pins, they have learned to do without them. "I've never seen people who know how to conserve as

they do", says Miss Short.

Miss Short describes the climate in south China as "very hot". She adds that approximately a month of cold weather is an average winter. Most of the time, the temperature is above 90 degrees and the days are very humid.

"During the rainy season, the cover on a Bible can mildew overnight," according to the American woman. They don't dare make closets, she continues, because of mildewing. She further adds that people wear cloth shoes because leather will not hold up in the climate. Some of the poorer classes, however, wear wooden shoes.

The missionary emphasizes that

everything included in her story is about South China, the portion where she worked. Other parts of China probably vary, she states.

In pointing out the uses for the money contributed for mission work in China, Miss Short recalls one instance, as an example. A large number of huts were burned down in Hong-Kong. Money contributed over here was used to build "dobe brick huts for the homeless people. The new sector is called "Village of Brotherly Love." This is an example of really expressing the love of Christ in something concrete, Miss Short says, in her concluding remark.

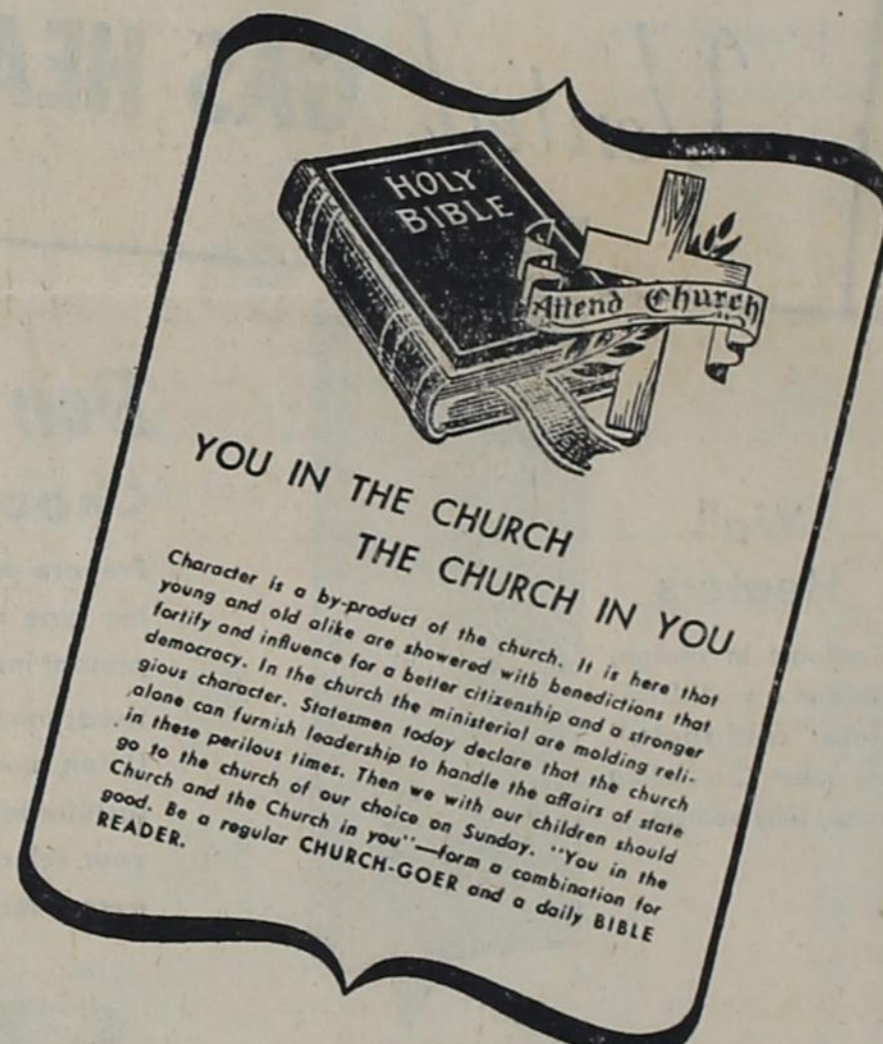
AGAINST EVERYBODY!

To join your fellows in prayer and in worship is to discover a fellowship in which human and divine powers are pooled for the good of all and for the glory of God. *Don't be a chronic buster nor a puller in the wrong direction. Rather be a booster and a factor in a progressive cooperation.*



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
