

BOND SALES IN COUNTY \$89,635 DURING YEAR

The people of Parmer County bought \$89,635.00 worth of U. S. Savings Bonds during 1948, according to a year-end report by Harry Owens of Dallas, state director for Savings Bonds, to Frank Spring, County Savings Bonds chairman. During the same period, the people of Texas bought \$196,448,587.50 worth of these securities.

Mr. Owens said that Texans now own more than \$1.5 billion worth of Savings Bonds which earned \$42,372,

000 in interest during the year.

To illustrate the practical aspects of thrift, as represented by the Savings Bonds program, Mr. Owens pointed out that the annual interest from bonds held by Texans, if converted into residential construction, would build 4237 homes costing \$10,000 each, or, if considered in terms of higher education or wages and salaries, would give a four-year college education to 14,124 students at the rate of \$750 per year, or provide an income of \$225 per month for a full year for 15,693 persons.

Mr. Owens said that of the state's

total bond sales last year, Series E, the "people's bond," accounted for \$139,591,216.25, or 71 per cent.

"There are more Savings Bonds in the hands of the people today than ever before," he said. "Almost 70 per cent of all bonds ever issued are still in the possession of their original owners. The sale of Series E bonds in Texas alone during 1948 was \$4,940,447.50 more than for 1947."

Friona Voters Okay Water Bond Issues

Friona voters went to the polls last Saturday to cast a decisive favorable margin on three proposed bond issues—totaling \$115,000—by which they hope to enjoy, within a year, an enlarged and improved water system and complete city sewage.

Three propositions faced the voters as they secured their ballots. No. 1 was for a \$15,000 bond issue for improvement of the waterworks system; No. 2 for a \$30,000 issue of water and sewer tax bonds, and No. 3 for \$85,000 of water and sewer revenue bonds. A total of 147 ballots were tabulated, with No. 1 receiving only 20 against, No. 2 drawing 24 opposition votes, and No. 3 getting 23 "no's" out of the total.

Mayor Mack Bainum said on Monday that the bonds had already been sold, and as soon as they are issued and approved by the attorney general contract for the work will be awarded. Preliminary engineering work, he added, has already been completed.

On the program, one move will be complete coverage of the city by water and sewer mains, and Bainum added that the sewerage facilities would be completely modern, with a disposal plant to purify waste water. Although the site has not been definitely secured, this plant will be located on the southeastern side of town, on Frio Draw.

In addition, a new well will be dug and put into operation, to supply the city with sufficient water to operate the sewage lines. The new well will be equipped with a 500-gallon-per-minute pump, Bainum said, adding that the two wells now in operation only put out 300 gallons, per minute, combined.

We hope to see the ditches being dug within the next two months," the mayor said in conclusion.

County Agent Plans Special Course In Farm Irrigation

County Agent Ollie Limer announced this week that he was making plans to attend a special farm irrigation school, to be held at the Lubbock Tech College, beginning on Jan. 14 and continuing until February 12, during which time he would be out of the local office.

Limer said that he would take courses in practically every phase of the work, dealing with farm irrigation in this locality, which will include such subjects as location of wells, pumps, motors, fuels, drilling, borders and ditches.

During the past few years, farm irrigation has stepped up considerably in Parmer County, and Agent Limer is taking this special course in order to be of more assistance to irrigation farmers of the county.

SCHOOL HEADS MEET WITH STATE SUPT.

Parmer County was represented by three school superintendents at Austin last weekend at a conference called by State Supt. L. A. Woods.

Supts. Jack Williams, Farwell; D. C. Caffey, Friona; and W. O. Cherry, Bovina; made the trip to Austin in one car to be present for the meeting.

Many phases of school operations were discussed at the meeting, attended by more than 2000 school superintendents of the State, with special discussions given to the proposed Gilmer-Aikin Act, now pending before the State Legislature. Supt. Williams said on his return here that those who discussed the Gilmer-Aikin proposal were all hand-picked by State Supt. Woods, and, as had been expected, strong opposition was expressed to the measure.
