

Deadline For Tax **Payments Nearing**

Tax payers have the remainder of January to make payments of their 1948 taxes, attaches at the Tax Collector's office warned today, adding that all 1948 taxes not paid on or before Jan. 31 would go on the delinquent list.

Payment of current taxes may be made during the remainder of this month without interest or penalty, but penalties are added when the taxes become delinquent. Furthermore, all delinquent taxes will begin to draw interest, with the interest mounting at the rate of 1% per nonth.

Freezing rain, sleet and snow, along with temperature readings that ave ranged from zero to 17 above have combined to give this section of of high plains some mighty unpleasant weather since early Sunday, and gave no indications of letting up at the time The Tribune was preparing to go to press Wednesday at noon.

However, the moisture in all its forms, had contributed very little badly needed moisture to the wheat fields and crop lands of this immediate section. Moisture recording instruments have remained frozen over since the storm hit with the results that no reading have been possible. But the most optomistic opinions place the readings at one-half to three-quarters of an inch.

Icy, glazed highways and farm roads have slowed traffic to a snail's pace and rendered all automobile travel extremely hazardous. School authorities over a wide section closed the schools when roads became so slipperv that bus operation was rendered dangerous. All schools of this county remained closed the first of the week on account of the road conditions. The Texico schools continued to remain open with the buse making their runs over the glazed roads.

Ice accumulation on telephone and electric lines has not interrupted service to any great degree and all lines throughout this area were reported to be open today. The gas pressure has remained adequate and no omerduring the seige of cold weather.
