# Forrest Speaks On RTA Program At Oklahoma Lane

# OUTLINE IRRIGATION DAY FOR COUNTY

The five Parmer county district supervisors of the Soil Conservation Service met in the Friona office last Monday night, to take care of varfous business of the district, county supervisor Bill Kennedy reported the first of this week.

Present at the meeting were A. L. Black, W. L. Edelmon, Buddy Jones, Henry Ivy and Henry Reynolds, supervisors; in addition to County Agent Joe Jones, the SCS personner, and Weldon Spinks, agricultural director of the Bovina school.

The particular business of the evening was the drafting of a report on the work conducted in Parmer County by the SCS and farmers during the period the district has been in existence, since April of 1949, Kennedy reported. This information is to be submitted to the state office for further study, he added. Irrigation Day Considered

At the same time, me five supervisors approved the sponsoring of an irrigation day for the county, in view of the steadily increasing interest in this phase of farming.

Tentative date for the affair has been set as February 15, with plans at present calling for a meeting to be held in the district court room in Farwell during the morning, followed by a visit to the N. L. Tharp farm, near Farwell, in the afternoon, so attendants may see the extent of irrigation work carried on there.

Tharp is one of the oldest "irrigation men" in this county, and is the only operator who has thus far gone to the expense of installing concrete conduits for his irrigation water, the advantages of which are expected to be fully explained at the demonstra-

Attendants will also have an opportunity to see the "border" machine, conceived and made by Tharp, which does the full job of floating and putting up a border around irrigated fields at the same time-with no annoying ditch at the edge of the border to send the water sweeping down the field, Kennedy said today.

All residents of Parmer county are urged to be on the lookout for announcement of the date of the county's irrigation day, and make plans now to be on hand to hear good speakers and see the work on the Tharp farm.

Current plans are to establish subtations in the central areas served, with automatic dial set-ups being used, and this, the speaker pointed out, will be the big bottleneck, because of scarcity of material. It would in all likelihood, take from eight to ten months to secure the unattended dial central stations-or even longer-but Forrest pointed out that if the cooperative is approved in the counties and a contract worked out, lines could be erected and things put in readiness for the arrival of the dialing system.

Considering the cost, Forrest explained that each user would have to subscribe \$50 before the program could get underway. Of this, \$45 15 considered individual share of the equity which the cooperative must raise in order to get the government. loan, with \$5 being already paid, im. be \$4.25, under the present plans, although long-distance charges would be assessed for all such calls.

Right now, one big obstacle is working out an agreement with the hree telephone companies operating in the three-county area-Bell, Mountain States, and Southern Association. It is hoped that the program can be set up so that ruras families will be able to call their nearest shopping center-via the operator-without charge, but there is no assurance that this can be accomplished at present.

The question was raised from the floor regarding the equity put in by each user, as to whether or not the money would be returned to him if he should move. Forrest answered "no", but went on to amplify the statement by saying that if the new purchaser wanted to buy the equity. it was agreeable to all concerned. The equity, he stressed, is not like a deposit paid for phone or utility service in town, which is returned by the company involved.

Shortly afterwards, I re-enlisted. rf I leave service before the end of the GI Bill unemployment allowance program on July 25, 1952 will I be eligible for this benefit after my discharge?

A. The law states that vets must apply for unemployment or self-employment allowances within two years after July 25, 1947 or date of discharge, whichever is later. You

Q. My entitlement for GI training I finish my semester. Is it true that VA will let me finish the semester?

A. So long as your entitlement carries you past the mid-point of a term, quarter or semester, you will be permitted to complete that term, quarter or semester even though you have no remaining entitlement.

## Winter Care Of The Storage Battery

COLLEGE STATION-A weak, battery on the automobile, truck or tractor means trouble for the operator on cold mornings. Cold and stiff oil makes motors harder to start and overworks the storage battery, says W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer of Texas A. & M. College.

Storage batteries that are left on motors which aren't used often tend to lose their charge and if they are not re-charged regularly, may freeze and crack when the temperature drops down around zero. Ulich says batteries should be removed from the engines that will not be used in winter months and stored where they will be protected from the weather.

> Cable connections and battery posts should be kept clean and tight, he says, if you want to get maximum, power. Ammonia or baking soda in water makes a good cleaning agent. Apply the cleaning agent and scrub cable connections with a stiff-bristle brush, rinse with clear water. The application of a coating of grease to battery posts and connections will help keep them from corroding and prolong life of cables and connec-

> He says with world conditions as hey are today, it is doubly important that every farmer take care of his farming tools and equipment. Replacements may be hard to secure and since agricultural production depends to a large degree upon mach inery and mechanized power, every effort should be made to get the maximum usage from every implenient and piece of equipment used on the farm. Then too, he adds, it is just good management and conservation practice to take care of the equipment used on the farm.







After 25 years in the hardware business, she still finds it the mos: fascinating work in the world, and wouldn't trade her job for anyone

At one time, she could take a breaking plow and tell a customer what practically every part was, and she still knows the hardware business "backwards and forwards."

"Lady Gaines" father opened the business 26 years ago while she was living in east Texas. After a short time, she moved back to Bovina and went to work for him.

She stated that she didn't know the first thing about the work, she had been a farm girl all her life. So she put her mind on what she was doing, and it was only a short time before she was proficient in identification of parts, nuts and bolts, and what have you.

Discussing the expansion of the business, "Lady Gaines" says "there hasn't been much expansion, we just crowded it in." Twenty-five years ago, the store handled implements. though this line has now been dis-

Her father also worker with grain. She remembers many mornings when she was up before the sun came up, and made out bill of ladings for cars of grain.







Bob Thurman, extension irrigation specialist of Lubbock, was in Farweri on Monday, at the request of County Agent Joe Jones, to make plans The Farwell girls' baske ball team for an irrigation school and demonstration in Parmer County.

In an interview on irrigation, Thurman stated that this is a good time of year for repair and preparation of pumping plants on irrigation

He emphasized that in all probability, pumps, well casings and other irrigation materials will not be as available as they have been in the pas, and added, "this situation requires the farmer to take better care of both the pump and motor on has well in the future, to increase its

Included in a group of precautions of wells against dust and dirt by well houses; and care should be taken to see that units are properly luvricated, "Lubrication failure at the wrong moment may cause a serious break-down at a critical time," he explained.

When the pump is idle, Thurman suggested that the exhaust pipe and breather boxes on the engine be and air cleaners and oil filters on first obtaining proper permission. the engine should be cleaned or changed after 100 hours of operation.

Discussing the irrigation problem further, Thurman stressed the point that now is the time to check the engine, and if the farmer contemplates an overhaul job, it should be done now rather than immediately before time to begin watering.

From the irrigation standpoint, the specialist said, farmers should check the sub-soil moisture. If too dry, the land can be watered to begin storage of moisture in the sub-soil. "Farmers might have to wet the soil profile to a 3-foot depth now," according to the specialist, "and make another light application just before planting. In his opinion, this gives the farmer a better chance for a bumper row crop.

About planning next season's irragation, Thurman added, farmers should carefully map out their irrigation system for more efficient use of both water and labor. Rows running straight up and down the hiii on steep slopes do not conserve rainfall and cannot be irrigated as enciently as rows that are on the level.

Farmers interested in bench leveling should contact the Parmer County Soil Conservation office for tecanical field assistance, Thurman add
