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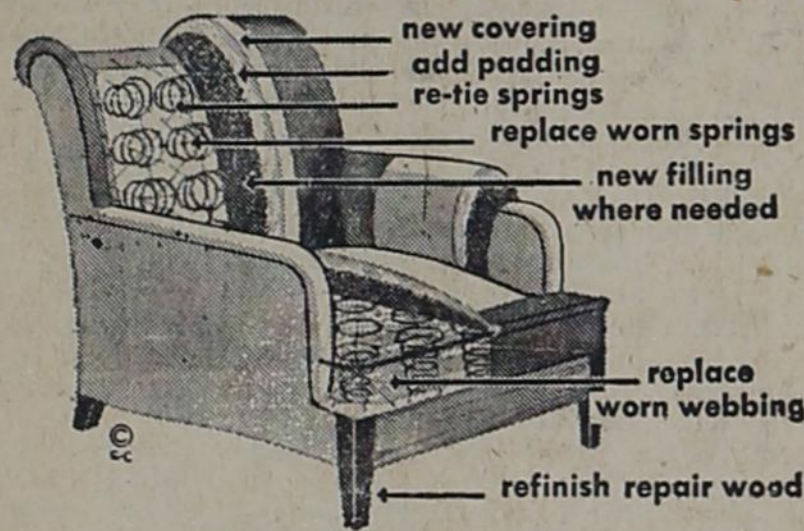
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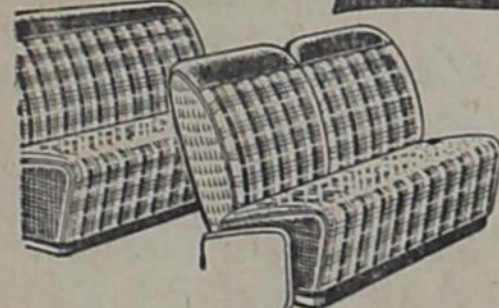
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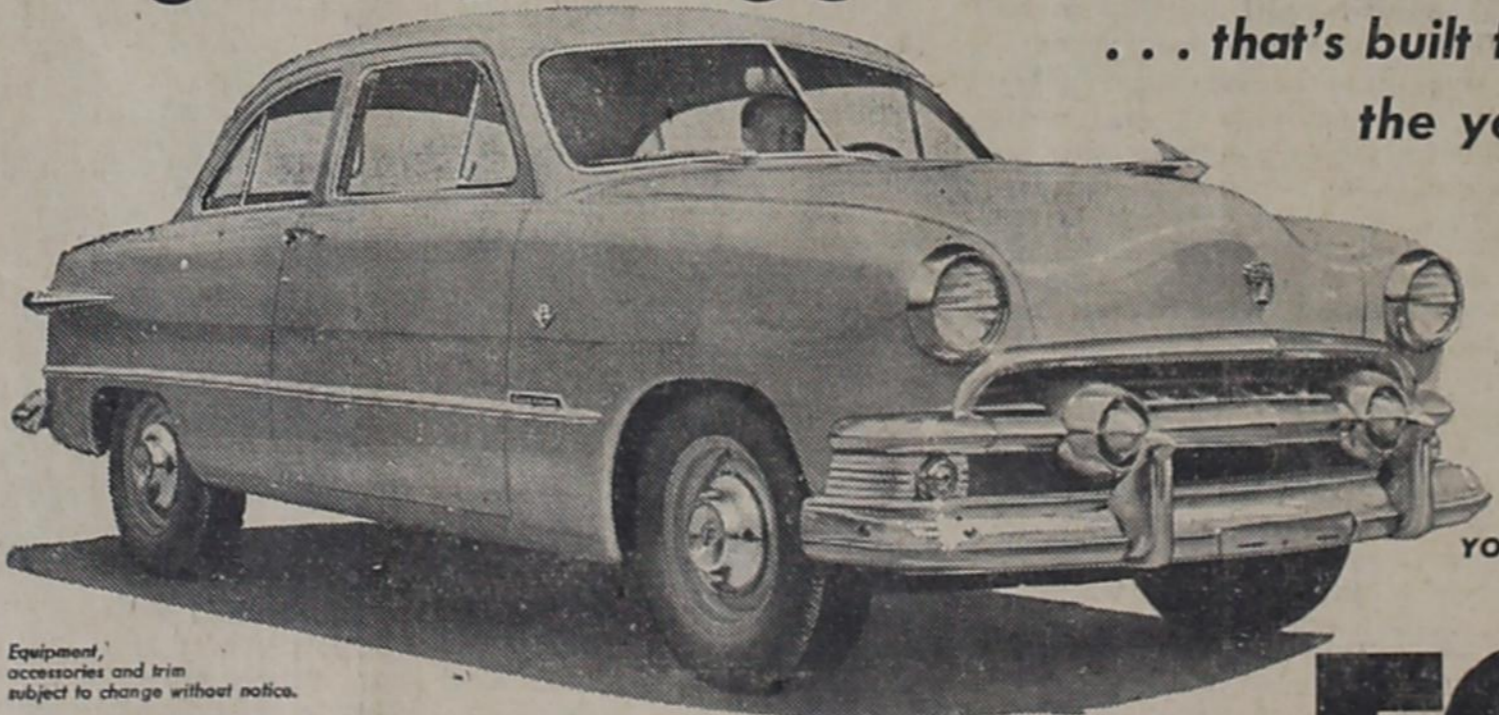
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Electric Cooperative Meet Is at Hereford

The thirteenth annual meeting of the members of the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative will be held in Hereford, Texas on Monday, April 30, 1951, A. T. Ford, electrification advisor, says.

The meeting will be in one of the Commodity Credit buildings located on the south side of the Santa Fe Railroad tracks, two blocks east of the Santa Fe depot, on South Lawton Street. Lawton Street crosses Highway 60 five blocks east of Main Street.

Registration of members and guests will start at 10 o'clock in the morning and the meeting will be called to order at 11:30 by President T. E. Seigler Jr. After the invocation by Bob Wear, minister of the Church of Christ and the welcoming address by Bruce Woddell, president of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, the members and guests will go to the adjoining building to enjoy a barbecue lunch.

Prior to the meeting, during the lunch period, and after the meeting,

the members will have a chance to view and examine the latest in electrical appliances for the home and shop at the appliance show that will be held in the same building which the barbecue will be served.

At the afternoon session, in addition to Normal Cooperative business and the election of directors, the members will vote on proposed changes in the charter and by-laws. Following the business session, those present will have the pleasure of hearing an address by Tom E. Craddock. Craddock, in addition to being manager of the B-K Electric Cooperative at Seymour, is secretary-treasurer of the national rural electric cooperative association, and is well known.

Although this is primarily a meeting of the members of the electric Cooperative, the telephone cooperative is so closely related that time will be provided for a short question and answer session regarding telephones.

Farmers with Cotton In CCC Loan for 1948 Crop to Get Checks

Cotton producers who placed 1948-crop cotton under Commodity Credit loan program and did not pay off their loan or sell their equity before August 1, 1949, will soon receive a

check from CCC for their share in the profits from the cotton.

No action of any kind need be taken by the producer unless he now has an address different from that shown on the loan agreement. Where change in address has occurred, the producer should notify PMA Commodity Office, Masonic Temple building, New Orleans 12, Louisiana, furnishing both the old and new address, number of bales involved, name of warehouse in which cotton was stored and, if possible, the warehouse receipt number.

According to Joe Camp, Farmer PMA secretary, approximately 3.8 million bales of 1948-crop cotton was pooled for producers account. All cotton in the 1948 loan has now been disposed of, and the amount remaining after satisfaction of the loans plus interest and expenses on conducting the pool is about \$67 million. Each producer will receive approximately 11 percent of the amount of the loan on the cotton.

First checks are already in the mail and the distribution should be completed within 8 to 10 weeks. Checks for individual producers will be prepared when the note card covering his cotton is reached.

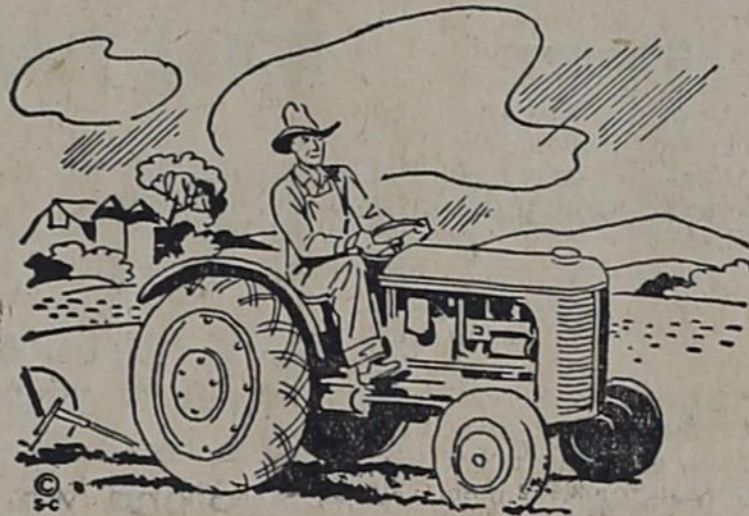
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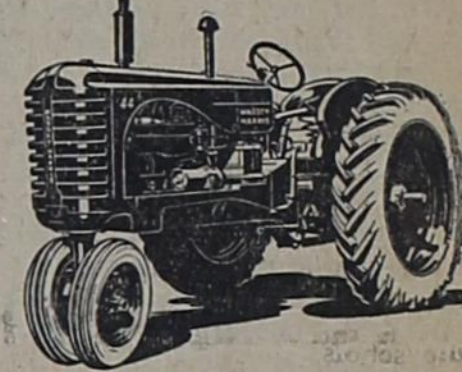

Engineers Start Work On Rural Circuit

From The Hereford Brand

Directors of the West Texas Rural Telephone cooperative met at Hereford last Wednesday night to put their stamp of approval on preliminary engineer's diagrams for the new 535-mile rural phone network designed to serve rural patrons from Dawn to the New Mexico state line.

The preliminary work will be sent to Washington along with substantiating material to seek a release of funds so construction of the lines may be approved by the REA.

Leo Forrest, manager of the Deaf Smith County REA, said the WRT has, he believes, sufficient equities to secure a release of funds for construction needed at this time. At the present time, 606 subscribers have paid their \$50 equity payment and another 239 have paid their initial \$5 application fee and are considered as good prospects for the service.

Adequate room is being left on the system for inclusion of these 239 plus additional patrons. Plans call for capacity to allow 1050 to 1100 patrons on the line. Subscribers who have not paid their full equity may get connections on the line by prompt action, Forrest said.

At present, there will be five exchanges located near the wire centers indicated by present diagrams. They are at the following locations:

Three miles west of Hereford; between Dawn and Progress; three miles north of Friona; three miles northwest of Bovina; and one or two miles northeast of Lariat. These locations are still tentative, Forrest said.

The original plans for the system called for 750 miles of line, but the inability to reach connecting agreements cut the line to the estimated 535 total. Room will be left when engineering the system to increase the capacity by 30%.

Cost of construction has advanced since the original allotment was set aside for the local cooperative, Forrest said, but funds will be sought for the mileage to be constructed at the present time. A hold order will be requested on the rest of the money.

Forrest said the following number of equities (full \$50 were received in the exchange area listed:

Dawn, 127; west of Hereford, 167; north of Friona, 161; north of Bovina, 56; Oklahoma Lane (Lariat), 95.

The 239 who have paid their original \$5 but not the remaining \$45 are listed in the following areas:

Dawn, 46; west of Hereford, 72; north of Friona, 43; north of Bovina, 31; and Oklahoma Lane, 42.
