Cotton Meeting Held At Oklahoma Lane

Oklahoma Lane School was the meeting place for a big cotton production meeting Tuesday night; the affair was sponsored by the Extension service.

Three men associated with the extension service were featured on the program.

Ed Busch, county agricultural agent at large, talked on cotton mechanization, including a discusision on strippers. He presented pictures showing the preparation of land for the use of strippers.

Fred Elliott, cotton works specialist, discussed seed and seed treatment, and urged farmers to check cottonseed before planting, especially when the planter saves his own seed or buys gin run seed. He emphasized that seeds should be treated with ceresan before planting, to help prevent angular leaf spot and seed USS Pine Island decay.

Mrs. Kaltwasser Becomes U. S. Citizen After Long, 5-Yr. Wait

"I was truly thrilled" stated Mrs. Walter Kaltwasser Friday when asked her reaction to becoming a United States citizen. It has been a long five-year wait for the English war bride.

Mrs. Kaltwasser went to the Federal Court in Amarillo Thursday to take a test on the United States constitution. Asked about the difficulty of the exam, she pointed out that it was "pretty stiff." Boone Allison and Charles Felts of Lariat accompanied Mrs. Kaltwasser as her two witnesses.

The young housewife explains that she isn't actually an American citizen yet, for her fingerprints must be sent to Washington to verify that she has no criminal record; and she also must take the oath of allegience. She was informed that she had passed the examination before she left Amarillo Thursday, however.

Asked if she was nervous when taking the test, Mrs. Kaltwasser admitted that she was. In fact, she points out, asked when the Declaration Independence was signed, she

stated 1876 instead of 1776. Usually, it takes a person who is married to an American citizen two years to get naturalization papers, otherwise, a five-year period is required. Mrs. Kaltwasser has been in the states since February of 1946. She made application for her citizenship papers then, but was informed that she must wait two years. She

A full schedule is planned for today (Tnursday) as the convention gets under way. Registration begins at 8 o'clock and a House of Delegates meeting is at 9.






