Previously, the Roberts Seed Co. began operation of a feed mill and cube-processing plant, which also carries a good number of em-

The Farwell Hog & Cattle Co. is still in the process of completing its large feeding plant just south of plant reaches its full stride. A large crew of workmen are employed and a good market is offered feed growers of this area.

Still in the process of development the Texico Poultry Co. expects to be producing at least 5,000 frying-size chickens each week when full pro-duction figures are reached. Employment for some dozen local people is

being afforded. For the past several years, the cube-processing plant at the Roberts Seed Co. has afforded employment to a good sized payroll, and has been one of the mainstays in affording

Members of the State Welfare Board of New Mexico have announced that their next meeting will be held in Clovis on October 29th, at which time the board is to work with N. L. Tharp, of this city, on his proposal to turn the Tharp farm and ranch property into a home for the state's needy aged.

Tharp met with members of the board in Santa Fe last week to consider preliminary plans for the project, and the meeting next month in Clovis is to continue plans, according to State Welfare Director Alva A. Simpson,

Simpson, who recently visited the Tharp establishment, is reported enthusiastic about the prospects o working out the donors' plans, and said that after the home is completed the board expects to enter into a contract with the N. L. Tharp Foundation, a non-profit organization, for operation of the home.

Saturday, September 29th, is voting day over Parmer County, when resident owners of tax-rendered property in the county will cast ballots in local option elections to determine whether each voting district shall become a part of High Plains, Underwater District No. 1.

Relative to the pending election, a special meeting was held by interested residnts in Bovina on Monday night of this week. Bedford Caldwell, of Bovina, had charge of arranging the meeting, which was in turn handled by W. L. Edelmon of

County Attorney Sam Aldridge, who is familiar with the provisions of the conservation legislation, explained the law concerning formation of the districts, and Jess Osborn, temporary director of Precinct 3 (embracing Parmer county), along with John McFarland, temporary director of the Hereford precinct, were

on hand to answer questions. On Saturday, voters will decide if they want to be in a district; will name a precinct director; and will decide about giving directors authority to levy a tax not to exceed 5c per \$100 valuation. There will be three Halls, and at the courthouse in Farwell. In these cases, residents of the incorporated towns and residents outside city limits will vote in separate boxes.

The single-box voting place, according to announcement made here, will be at the Lazbuddy school.

Residents within the boundaries of the proposed district are eligible to vote if they have paid taxes. Voting will embrace all of four counties and parts of 17 others, with the district consisting of all or any part of that area, depending upon the number of boxes which return a majority in favor of the district.

Boundaries of the conservation district are determined by those of the underground water reservoir, as defined by the State Board of Water Engineers.

> Primarily, such water conservation districts are proposed to keep control-if it should ever become necessary-of irrigation water "at home". A trend toward federal control of underground water has gained much momentum, sponsors of the conservation movement point out, and cite this as another reason why the district should be approved to fix management of a conservation program at the local level.

As to that tax business, temporary directors (all of whom are irrigation farmers), have stated that a rate of from 21/2c to 3c per \$100 will be sufficient. The tax will be on renditions on the county rolls, and will be assessed and collected in the manner of regular taxes.

Purposes of the district are: to prevent waste of water and assure its beneficial use; to recognize individual ownership of underground water; to make a systematic search for a practical method of recharging the underground reservoir; to place in the hands of local people regulations to prevent waste, rather than giving such control to state or federal agencies.

If the district is approved, it will have no authority over wells used exclusively for domestic and stock raising purposes, or over those which cannot produce more than 100,000 gallons daily. Owners of non-irrigated land voted into the district will have their property excluded from taxes and rights of cities to acquire land for expansion of water supplies will not be affected.
