sugar if desired. 5. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Remove from baking sheet immediately. Makes 3 dozen cookies.

#### BUTTERSCOTCH PIE

One-eighth inch baked pie shell

11/2 cups brown sugar

2 tablespoons white sugar 3 tablespoons enriched flour

3 tablespoons cornstarch 11/2 cups water

2 egg yolks

3 tablespoons butter

One-eighth teaspoon vanilla Mix brown sugar, white sugar, flour and cornstarch. Add water and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add slightly-beaten egg yolks and cook 1 minute longer. Remove from heat; add butter, salt and vanilla, Cool. Pour into baked pie crust. Cover with meringue and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 12 minutes or until slightly browned.

#### SINGLE PIE CRUST

- 1 cup sifted enriched flour
- 1 teaspoon salt 4 to 6 tablespoons lard
- 2 to 4 tablespoons cold water

Add salt to flour. Cut lard into flour until crumbs are about the size of small peas. Add cold water, a little at a time, mixing quickly and evenly through flour with a fork until dough just holds in a ball. Use as little water as possible. Roll to about one-eighth inch in thickness. Line 8-inch pie pan. Bake in hot oven (450°F.) for 8 to 10 minutes.

- 1/4 cup flour 2 tablespoons lard or drippings
- 2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire
- 4 tablespoons ketchup 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 cup raisins

8 prunes Dredge lamb shanks with flour and brown in hot lard or drippings. Season. Combine remaining ingredtients and pour over meat. Cover and cook in a slow oven (300° F.) for 2 hours or until tender. Remove to platter and serve with the sauce! over meat. 4 servings.

- 1 pound ground veal 1/2 pound bulk pork sausage 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon salt One-eighth teapoon pepper 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 cup lard or drippings Combine meat, bread crumbs, salt and pepper. Shape into 6 cutlets. Roll in flour and brown in lard or drippings. Cover closely and cook on top of range or in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes or until done.



Land sakes but our co-op is certainly a busy place. It used to be that us women folks didn't know about business. Nowadays, our co-op helps us all understand how it works.

First, the government has loaned us money to help build lines. We are repaying it all plus interest. And don't let anyone tell you that we are owned by the govern-

I see in the papers that the government is loaning money to big steel companies and defense plants in much the same way. You probably are borrowing money to buy your house, and have it secured by FHA. We all buy on credit and the government has been able to help lots of us this way.

Then, our manager says that the 900 rural electric cooperatives in the United States are spending more than six billion dollars for building lines, farm wiring and electrical equipment . . . washers and ranges, you know. That is certainly lots of money spent by us rural folks.

He says that money is spread out from coast to coast and it helps pay the labor people, the manufacturer, wholesaler and your own local merchant.
