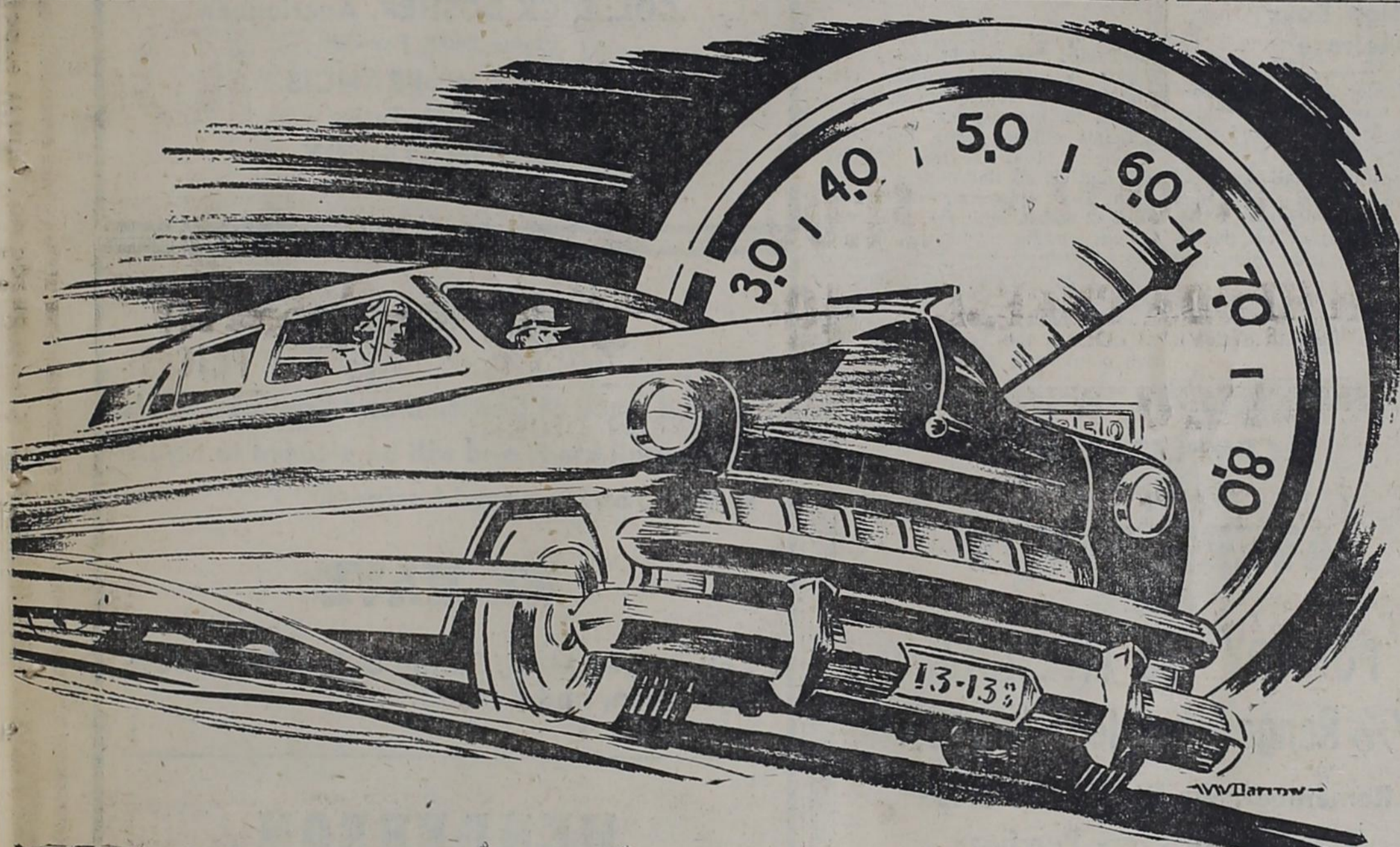

## How Valentines Day Originated

When you receive that box of candy from that certain person this St. Valentine's day, will you stop to wonder just how Saint Valentine's Day came to be?

It seems that there were two saints who lived in the third century, and died on the same day. One of them was a priest at Rome, and the other a bishop in Umbria. The traditional anniversary of their death, February 14, has become known as Saint Valentine's Day, and has long been observed as a lovers' festival with the saints. This has no connections with the saints, and the association of the lovers' festival with Saint Valentine is purely accidental. It seems to have really come from the fact that the feast of the two saints falls toward spring.

Several other explanations are given for the familiar custom of sending love tokens, cards of greetings, and other gifts to one's favorites. Some say that one Saint Valentine was accustomed to go around from house to house leaving food on the doorsteps of the poor. The custom of sending Valentine greetings at first were anonymously developed from that fact. Another explanation connects the modern celebration of the day which the survival of the Roman festival Lupercalia, which occurred on February 15. A festival of a similar nature was observed in Old England and Scotland, and to some extent in other European countries.

Both Chaucer and Shakespeare refer the observance of the festival on the day in early spring when

birds first chose their mates. The custom long prevailed on that day with men drawing lots to decide which young woman should be his "valentine" during the ensuing year. The couples then exchanged gifts, and in some cases might even be regarded as betrothed. Later, the custom of making presents on Saint Valentine's Day was confined to the men.

It has fallen in misuse in Great Britain, but the sending of sentimental valentines and gifts of flowers and candy, on February 14, is still common in America.

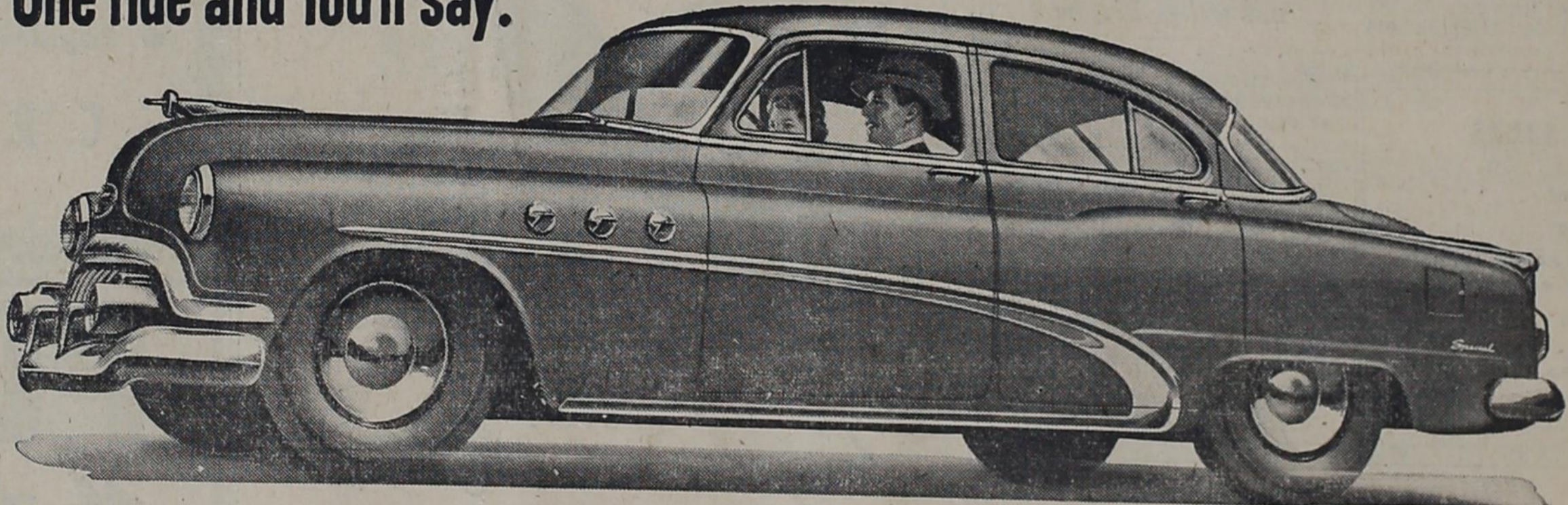

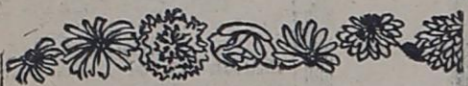

## Work On New School Building To Start Here Next Monday

Work on Friona's new high school building has been announced by the contractors, BMFP, of Lubbock, to start on Monday of next week, February 11th, Supt. Dalton Caffey said the early part of this week.

Mr. Ratliff, supervisor for the contractor, is slated to be in Friona the latter part of this week, working out the final details incident to getting construction work going, school officials added.

Steel for replacement of the building destroyed by fire just following the close of school last May was received during the first few days of this year, and work was expected to be started at that time. However, some material delays, plus weather conditions, has postponed the work until this time, Caffey added.

With the new unit will be an addition on the north end of the building, about the same in size as the old gymnasium (unhurt by fire) still in use on the south end of the building. A good deal of material was salvaged from the old building, it has been announced, and some cost will be cut down via use of such equipment.

The contractors previously announced that they were stockpiling material in Lubbock, with plans being that work would be continuous when workmen were moved in on the job. Providing weather conditions do not interfere too much during the coming months, it is hoped that the school building will be ready for occupancy this fall.

With completion of the new building, the local campus will show considerable improvement, since the old buildings housing the cafeteria band, and ag department will be removed. The cafeteria will take over its own new building, now being used for high school classes, and other departments will be moved into the new unit.

## Lose To Stratford, Win Over Lazbuddy

Four cage games held in the Friona gymnasium during the past weekend gave an even half and half break to the locals. Coach Raymond Cook reported today, with Stratford and Lazbuddy furnishing the opposition for the Friona squads.

On Friday night, two conference wins went into the books for the locals. The Squaws breezed along to take their game over visiting Lazbuddy, 35-26, while the Chiefs took a close win that left the crowd gasping for breath, with the final score 32-30.

Saturday night's encounters went to the visiting A and B strings from Stratford, with the B team winning, 49-17, while the A string manhandled the Chieftains, 57-36. Coach Cook reported.

At the present time, the coach ruefully admitted, his boys have only two conference wins checked up during the season, while the girls, on the other hand, have four wins against three losses in league play.

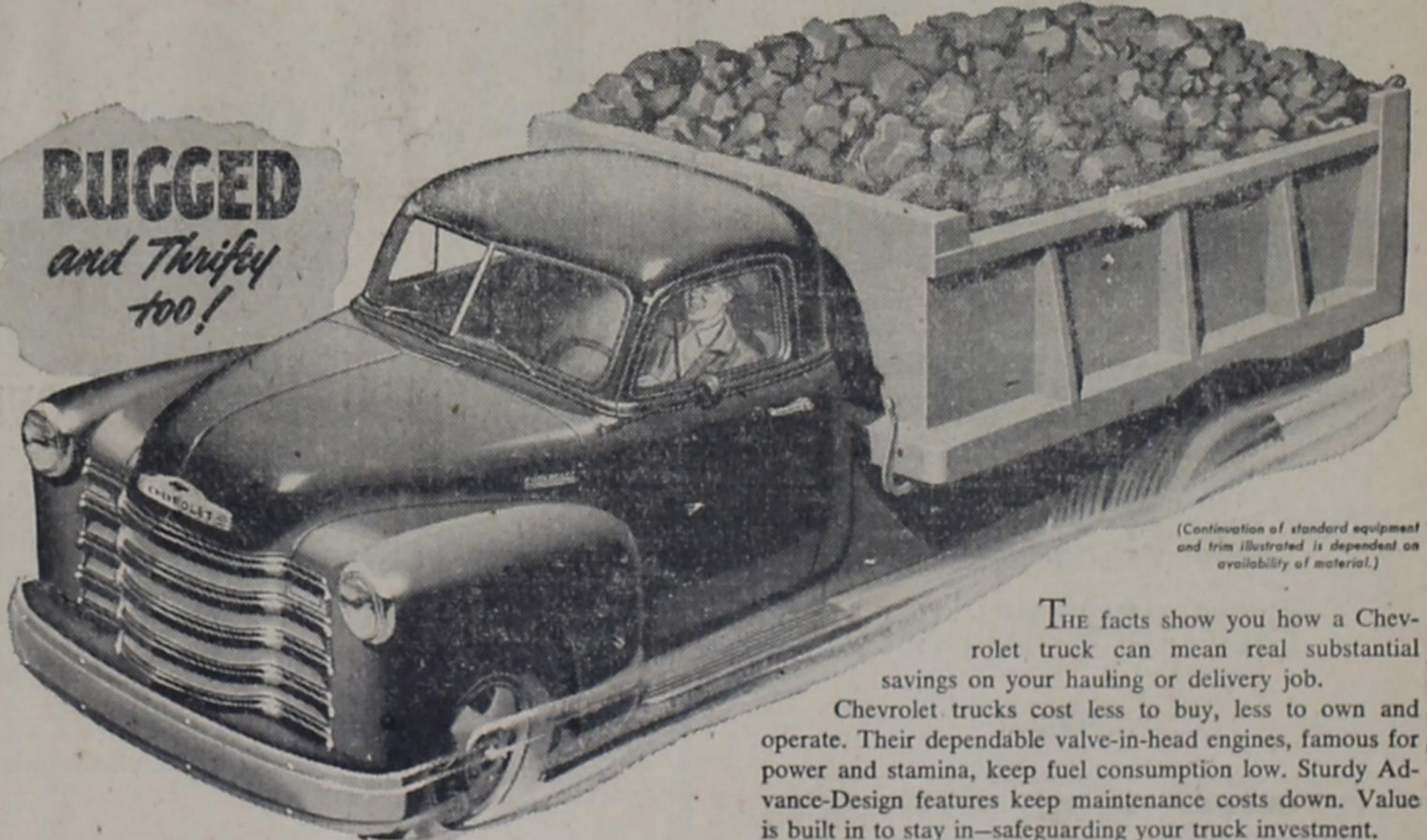
