Tuesday morning he reported that Fern had been taken to Plainview Sanitarium and Clinic where her condition was diagnosed as polio. He said she had shown some fever Saturday, but did not appear to be seriously ill. A Clovis physician reccommended her removal to the clinic in Plainview.

Fern contracted polio just one week from Kathlene, Fern's symptoms, as did Kathlene's, appeared over the weekend, and polio developed the first of the week.

### HEALTH NOTES

Expectant mothers have positive control of whether or not their babies will be born with congenital syphilis.

This is from State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, who characterizes the condition of a baby being born with syphilis as "negligent, unnecessary, and entirely preventable."

"All that's necessary is for the expectant mother to place herself under the care of a competent physician as soon as her pregnancy has been confirmed," the health official said.

He believes all too many Texas babies are being born with the affliction, passed to them by an infected mother during the prenatal period. Early prenatal care, he explained, would include a blood test of the mother to determine the presence or absence of syphilitic infection.

Dr. Cox charged that many times mother-to-be delays her visit to the doctor until a few weeks, or days, before she expects the infant. Then, he says, it may be too late to prevent the birth of the syphilitic child.

Almost 2600 cases of congenital syphilis were reported last year. Dr. Cox says he sees little indication that there will be any appreciable reduction in case reports this year. Incidence of congenital infection will probably remain at fairly constant levels, he predicted, despite a slight reduction in total of syphilis of all

"Advances in medical therapy for syphilis have progressed to the point where is it now possible to effectively prevent congenital infection-but not without the mother's complete cooperation," Cox warned.

The explanation is that even though a mother contracts syphilis just prior to pregnancy, she can be restored to health and the baby can be born sound and healthy, provided treatments are started within the first three prenatal months. Even after that time, a high index of profection for both mother and baby is assured, but the chances for a normal birth decrease with each week of de-

Prenatal clinics are held by all local health units for those women who would not otherwise have this care because of lack of financial resources, Dr. Cox said.

Farmers in the Panhandle and surrounding territory, blessed with an abundance of rainfall during July, when 7.72 inches were recorded here, wondered what happened to the rain in August that had virtually become a regular visitor every af-

In July, as one farmer put it, it seemed as though everytime some thunderheads could get together, "We would get the dangest rain you ever saw."

Not so in August, however. Row crops, many of which were reaching a critical stage in the county, were hard-pressed for additional moisture. They had become accustomed to the afternoon cooling showers, and were wing noticeably the strain of mid-afternoon heat.

Even irrigationists were noticing the lack of rainfall. A large number of row crop farmers with wells had more crop than their wells could care for without nature's assistance.

August was far and away hotter than July. Twice, the mercury soared into the upper reaches of the thermometer, breaking 100 twice in succession. Hot winds, the first all summer, whipped crops and greenery and parched farmer's dry fields.







### Seeking Data On Underground Water

I.ITTLEFIELD (Special) — The State Board of Water Engineers is seeking maps and written data giving evidence of the geographical area and extent of the underground water reservoir in a 21-county Panhandle-South Plains area.

The board made the request for written material following a recent 21-county hearing in Plainview at which it received oral testimany on the ground water supply.

They chiefly are interested in receiving information about areas which will, or will not, support irrigation wells producing at least 107 gallons per minute (or 150,000 gallons per day).

The dry areas, together with 160-

acre tracts of grazing land not irrigated, and areas where water is not suitable for commercial irrigation purposes, will be excluded from a proposed underground water conservation district.

### Bovina Farmers Follow SCS Closely

By JEANNE DUDLEY Owners of the Triplett-Pringle farm, located northwest of Bovina, are cooperators with the Soil Conservation Service. They are planning their irrigated pasture in coordination with the farm agency.

They realize that preparing the land for irrigated pastures is important. According to Joe Jones, county agent, a common mistake is to seed the pasture grasses on land that has not received proper preparation for efficient irrigation.

Seeding a pasture that cannot be properly irrigated is truly a waste of time and money, Jones says.

Workmen on the Bovina farm first began leveling the land to "get the humps out," which actually begins the process of smoothing land. After construction of the borders, the land between them is leveled by means of a wooden "float" so that water will be spread uniformly and not collect against any of the borders. Borders Tricky Job

Marking off borders is a job for Pringle farm, borders run southeast. The idea is to run the borders straight up and down the slope as near as possible.

Since water follows the slope, this new-type pasture. gives uniformity of distribution, Jones emphasizes.

Steep slopes can be irrigated successfully by this system only when properly engineered. For this reason, the Soil Conservation Service should be consulted before considering land preparation for perman- dy to border and seed. "They just ent irrigated pastures.

Space between the borders is 40 feet wide on the Triplet-Pringle farm. Small grass seeds will be planted 1/4 to 1/2 inch deep on good seed bed. The ground should not be allowed to crust until the seed germinates and begins to grow.

Owners of the farm plan to seed 5 pounds each of Southern bromegrass, perennial rye, orchard grass, and alta fescue to each acre, says






