An example of how population in West Texas increased during the past few years was brought to mind last week when I noticed that the poll tax payments in Andrews County for the current year would exceed 2000.

When I came to West Texas in the fall of 1914, I located at Andrews, where I published the Andrews County Times for more than three years. At the time I lived in that county, there were not more than 125 persons, including men, women and children living within its boundaries. We hardly had enough eligible men and women in the county to fill all the county offices.

Andrews at that time was strictly a ranching country with not more than a half dozen farms in the entire county—and nobody ever thought of oil. Oil discoveries in recent years have brought wonderful development to that section. Today Andrews boasts of one of the finest school plants in the entire state of Texas, and the courthouse is also outstanding.

Even today Andrews County is without a railroad. But the population and industries are served with trucks that travel over good paved roads.

Don't cuss your grocer about the high prices of coffee—he is not to be blamed. I saw an invoice of a coffee shipment the other day on which the grocer had paid 84 cents per pound for a shipment. And he told me that it had advanced another penny since he got the shipment in. I don't know who is responsible for the high price of coffee, but it certainly is not your grocer.

If he added his regular markup to coffee prices, you would more than likely be paying around \$1.10 per pound for your favorite breakfast beverage.

It begins to look as though Willie Williams' reputation as a weather prophet is going to be upheld at Bovina.

Last week when there was not a cloud in the sky and the sand was swirling around in its usual manner at this time of the year, Willie posted a large, hand-lettered sign on the front door of his place of business to the effect that generous rains would fall during the month of March.

The next day, clouds began to gather and during Sunday and Monday light rains fell over the country. But Willie is not satisfied and he says we will have additional rains, even heavy rains before the month is out, which is certainly out of the ordinary for the month of March.

Willie says if he had collected all the bets he had made on rain predictions he'd be the best dressed man in Parmer County—and would have enough money on hand to attend Grand Lodge at El Paso in April.

Why do local people use the term "up to Amarillo"? As a matter of fact Farwell is almost 1000 feet higher than Amarillo, according to all the elevation scales I have ever seen.

Amarillo is listed as slightly more than 3600 feet high, while Farwell is almost 4300 feet above sea level. Another thing I have often heard, but never have seen confirmed, is that Parmer County is the highest railroad point in Texas.

Does anyone know if this is true? Sure, there are higher points in the Davis mountains of Texas. But I am talking about the highest point traversed by a railroad.

Another thing, if Amarillo can boast of the "coolest summer nights" in Texas, why can't Texico-Farwell lay claim to this distinction since we are 1000 feet higher?

There ought to be a law against your friends telling about their wonderful vacation trips and how the fish were biting.

The customers declined the soup, whereupon Ed explained, "Ah, go on and eat it, it don't cost nothing—it just accumulates in the kitchen if you don't eat it."

## Patrons Observe Public Schools Week

Public School week is being observed this week in Parmer County schools. Parents and patrons are encouraged to visit the schools during the school hours throughout the week, superintendents say.

No special programs are planned in the classrooms in conjunction with the observance in Farwell, Supt. Jack Williams says. Work will continue as usual to give visitors an insight of how subjects are taught all the time.

During the week, no special guides have been designated to show parents through the school. The administrators feel that most of the patrons are familiar with the arrangement and know the way around. The schedule will not be disrupted in any way, patrons are merely asked to come up and visit classes, look around, and make themselves at home.

However, tonight (Thursday) an open house will be held at the school, so all departments may be visited. Special displays have been worked out by each individual teacher and by students in the classes.

The first tour will begin at 8 o'clock in the gymnasium and guides will show visitors the classrooms, both high school and elementary grades; the music department and the home economics department. Instructors will be on duty, and visitors may discuss any questions with the teachers.

Patrons were also extended an invitation to eat in the lunchroom this week, where the regular menu was served. On Wednesday, it was reported that approximately 50 guests had eaten in the cafeteria on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Menu for the week included: Monday—lima beans, pickles, sauer kraut and viennas, buttered carrots, peanut butter cookies, spiced stewed prunes, cornbread, butter, orange juice, milk.

Tuesday—baked ham, candied yams, cabbage and apple salad, cottage cheese, blackberry cobbler, tomato juice, milk and bread.

Wednesday—Chicken and dressing and gravy, mashed potatoes, green beans, salad, pecan pie, bread milk.

Thursday—Chili mac, blackeye peas, corn, lime vegetable salad, rolls, butter, honey, tomato juice and milk.

Friday—steamed bologna, apple sauce, buttered rice, English peas, banana pudding, bread and milk.

A record was not available on how many patrons visited the school at the first of the week.

The new building will not be open for the tour, Supt. Williams says, due to floor conditions. A dedication ceremony will probably be held later in the year, however.

## Ollie Boss, Aged Texico Resident, Hit By Car

Ollie Boss, aged Texico resident, is in the Memorial Hospital at Clovis receiving treatment for injuries received in an automobile mishap shortly after dark Sunday evening on the main street in Texico.

Boss, who will be 70 years old in May, sustained fractures of both legs, just below the knees when he was accidentally hit by a car driven by Billie Goldsmith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willie Goldsmith, as the aged resident was crossing the street in front of the Texico Hotel.

Witnesses said that the accident was purely unavoidable and the driver of the car was not held responsible. The car was moving at a very moderate rate of speed when Boss was hit. A drizzling rain which was falling at the time, is believed to have contributed to the accident.

Ambulance from Steed's removed Boss to the hospital, where he will likely be under treatment for some time. It is understood that the Goldsmith car carried liability insurance. Boss is one of Texico's pioneer homesteaders. He came here in 1903 and filed on a claim southwest of the city and has been a familiar figure locally for near a half century.

### DOG TAX DUE IN TEXICO

Texico officials today called attention to the fact that the 1952 dog tags are now on hand and should be attached to all dogs in the city. The fee is \$1 per tag for both male and females.

Officials also pointed out that the city ordinance requires tags on all dogs "harbored inside the city limits." Which is another way of saying that all dogs, even though they may be kept indoors, are required to be tagged.

## Texico Seeks Road Improvement North

At a meeting held Monday afternoon at the office of Roberts Seed Company, a movement was launched to get State Highway 108, running north from Texico to Rosedale, paved during the coming summer.

"We are starting work in earnest," M. C. Roberts stated to a Tribune reporter Tuesday afternoon, adding that one delegation would go to Santa Fe and another would go to Roswell his week to see what could be done to get the route paved.

Mr. Roberts said that Supt. Agrie Jones and George Wilson were scheduled to go to Santa Fe on Wednesday, and a second delegation composed of Roberts, Gene Lovelace, Rip Snodgrass and Les Means, were to go to Roswell Thursday to contact highway officials.

This piece of highway construction has been sought for the past several years. Aside from some grading, done at widely separated intervals, nothing has been accomplished. In addition to being along the school bus and mail routes, the road taps a good farming section in the Pleasant Hill and Rosedale communities. The local delegation will point out that a good road to those communities will shorten the distance to grain markets by several miles.

## Red Cross Campaign Launched In County

Parmer County Red Cross drive was launched in a meeting held Friday night in Bovina, and workers were named for Bovina, Farwell and Friona.

Attending the meeting were Vernon Estes, county chairman; Allen Romich of Friona; Hubert Ellison of Bovina; Loyde Brewer, drive chairman and Dick Matthews, field director of the American Red Cross from Lubbock. Workers include Estes for Bovina; Romich for Friona; and Clyde Magnes in Farwell. Helpers from the communities have not yet been named.

Goal for the 1952 drive is \$2000, one-half of which stays in the county with the other half going into the national foundation. The Red Cross has spent more than what was donated in 1951, Estes says, on hospital bills for county people.

Brewer announces that the Rainbow girls in the three towns will assist with the drive Saturday by placing booths in business houses in the towns.

## Conservation Practices Stressed At SCS Meet

Conservation needs for Parmer County were discussed in an all-day meeting at Parmer County courthouse Wednesday. Mr. Coover, with the State Soil Conservation service, was in charge of the session.

Attending the meeting were: John Aldridge, of the Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt; Bill Kennedy, soil conservationist of Friona; Wortham Seale, district PMA field officer of College Station; Walter Johnson of the FHA in Hereford; County Agent Joe Jones; Leonard Smith, county committeeman; H. T. Reynolds, soil conservation supervisor; and Joe Camp, PMA secretary.

Attendees discussed and recommended the number of each type permanent practices that are needed in this county.

## Farm Bureau Heads Hold Bovina Meeting

In a meeting held at the Legion hall in Bovina Monday night, directors of Parmer County Farm Bureau, decided to go to the J. T. Jones farm on Monday to bale hay, to be used as bedding for animals for the spring show in Friona.

Men were at the meeting to discuss grain under receivership, and group members called J. W. Hammonds, president of the Texas Farm Bureau to see if any action is possible to take grain into possession, Raymond Euler, member of the board, says.

Members of the group favored the increased income tax exemption bill which has been introduced to congress by J. Walter Rogers, Euler adds.

## Spring Stock Show Dates April 11-12

Annual spring livestock show for Parmer County 4-H and FFA boys has been set for April 11-12, Joe Jones, county agent, reported today. A meeting to begin preparations for the show, was held Tuesday night in Bovina.

Four new directors were elected to succeed Levi Johnson, Wendell Christian, Virgil Teague, and John Blackburn. New members of the group are: Martin Fulcher, Black; Gene Boggess and Raymond Euler, Friona; and Walter Kaltwasser, Farwell. Other members are Floyd Schlenker, Clyde Hays, A. L. Hartzog, C. M. Shaffer, and John Getz.

Dairy animals, beef cattle, swine, rabbits and sheep are to be shown in the show.

## Street Paving In South Farwell Is Making Progress

With the curb and gutter work scheduled to be completed this week, providing the weather is favorable, the five-block street paving in south Farwell is progressing satisfactorily.

Edgar Martin of the E. & E. Contracting Co., who is here supervising the work, said today that materials were being placed on the ground and spreading of the caliche base will begin as soon as the curbs were completed.

Meanwhile, the Second Street paving job seems to be hanging in the balance with only a few contracts being needed to assure the six-block stretch. Civic leaders expressed confidence, however, that these contracts would be forthcoming at an early date while the paving crew is on location. "It's the best opportunity we'll ever have to get our streets paved," one leader commented.

## March Brings Light Showers To Section

The month of March, usually featured by high winds and sand storms in this area, opened very pleasantly last Saturday with light showers over most of this section.

Rainfall during Saturday and Sunday has been reported as "spotted" with precipitation ranging from less than a quarter of an inch to more than a half inch. Locally, the reading varied from .15 to .25 of an inch. West Camp farmers report .60 of an inch, with a good rain reported in the Lazbuddy section.

Generally speaking, the rainfall over this immediate section is set at a quarter of an inch.

Farmers agree that the moisture will be of much benefit to wheat fields, but was not sufficient to do bring much moisture to freshly listed row crop lands. Additional moisture is being predicted before the end of the present week.

## Lariat Gins Nearly 5000 Bales Of Cotton

The Lariat Gin at Lariat, has just closed one of the most successful seasons of its existence with ginnings running just short of 5000 bales from the 1951 crop.

Reports received here early this week said that slightly more than 4700 bales had been handled by the five-stand gin at that place. It is estimated that several hundred bales of cotton were carried to other gins at Muleshoe and elsewhere during the rush season that normally would have been handled at Lariat.

Officials of the Town of Texico were making final preparations early this week to call an election on Tuesday, April 1, to submit to the voters a bond issue for the purpose of extending water mains in the town.

At a meeting of the Town Council, held Monday night, it was agreed to proceed with the special election after some detailed legal matters had been settled. Since an election of this nature cannot be called except at a regular meeting of the Council, Monday night's meeting was continued without adjournment to consider further details of calling the election.

The Council, after getting the figures on the town's assessed valuation, set the bond figure at \$13,684.00, which would be 4 per cent of the assessed valuation, the limit that can be voted in bonds in New Mexico.

According to plans of the Council, a six-inch main would extend from the Furniture Mart north to Jack's residence, thence west to the school property, thence south to the main street of the town. Another six-inch main would run from the Houston Lumber Company to the Roberts Seed Company along main street.

In deciding on the use of six-inch mains, officials pointed out that they were trying to serve a two-fold purpose, that of meeting the requirements of the fire insurance underwriters and, secondly, providing assurance that water users will be adequately served.

For the past several years the water supply in the north part of the city has been inadequate on account of overtaxed small mains.

In setting the date of the election, Councilmen named the election officials who will preside at the bond election and also at the regular election for selecting town officials for the next two years.

Herschel Morgan and G. W. Atchley were named as judges of the election, and Mrs. Sam Lewis, Mrs. H. N. Poteet and Mrs. Mea Means as clerks.

## Texico Election To Name New Officials

A mayor, clerk-treasurer and two councilmen are to be elected by the voters of the Town of Texico on Tuesday, April 1, it was announced today by W. L. Freeman, clerk.

In addition to selecting four new officials, the property owners of Texico will determine the fate of a bond issue to expand the water distribution system, when they go to the polls on that date.

Officials whose term expires this year are, Mayor Orval W. Francis, Clerk W. L. Freeman, and Councilmen Grayson Roberts and Russell Johnson.

## Henderson Returns To City Thursday

C. M. Henderson, local grain dealer, who was taken into custody in El Paso early last week on a warrant issued in Kansas, returned to his home in this city Thursday afternoon, after furnishing bond in the amount of \$5000 in El Paso.

The local man faces a felony charge in Kansas, where he is alleged to have obtained \$45,000 personal loan from the Fidelity State Bank of Garden City, Kansas, with a "spurious warehouse receipt" as security. He said he planned to fight extradition to Kansas.

He left here Wednesday afternoon for Dallas to get Mrs. Henderson, who has been spending the past few weeks in that city, and stated they would return here in a few days, possibly Sunday.

## Milsteads Take Over Phillips 66 Station

A. (Shorty) Milstead and son, Floyd, have announced that they have purchased the interests of Weldon Rodgers and Ernest Brock, and will assume operation of the Phillips 66 Station east of the Piggly Wiggly in Farwell immediately.

**Beautiful Highway Marker Plot On 60**

The Highway marker plot on Highway 60 in the north edge of town is being beautified by the Bovina section crew.

An assortment of foundation plants and evergreen have been set out and flowering shrubs are to be added to the plot. Until last week only the large standstone marker bearing a map of the State of Texas, graced the plot.

The other marker on Highway 70 in the east part of town, which was erected in 1936, is one of the city's beauty spots and is a mecca for picture-taking travelers.

**REPAIR STREETS**

A maintenance crew of the State Highway Department was in Farwell last weekend making some repairs of the pavement at street intersections along Highway 70 that runs through the town.

**TAX LEVIED FOR WATER DISTRICT**

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Water Conservation District a tax levy was finally decided upon. The Board of Directors chose at random 5 of the 13 counties in the district to base an estimate of the tax income upon, after an annual budget had been decided, not including a recharge program. At present, the Board of Directors voted to levy the water tax at 3c per hundred, state and county valuation. This means that the tax would run approximately \$1.50 per section or approximately 40c per 160 acres of land.

It was the thinking of the Board of Directors that a recharge program might be considered in the near future if the peoples of the counties so desired. At present it is not on the program.

Two towns have shown interest in the location of the district office. It has been the intention of the Board of Directors to place the district office as near the center of the 13 counties as possible. The city of Lubbock has been considered to a great extent due to the services that have been offered to the water district free of cost. Several firms of engineers have offered their technical knowledge and assistance in any problem that might arise. It has been understood that Texas Tech College is willing to cooperate with the district in any research that needs to be carried out in gaining the maximum efficiency of water pumped.

The election of County Committeemen was held at the same time the new Board of Directors were elected. The County Committeemen are going to play a very important role in the activities of the new district. It is through them that all information and suggestions for the betterment of the district will come. If well spacing regulations are in-

acted this year the County Committeemen will make the decisions in their respective counties. This is a staggered board with one committeeman going off each year and a new one being elected. The committeemen for your county for 1952 are: Bruce Parr, Raymond Euler, and Tom Caldwell.

The Board of Director wish to apologize for the lack of information that has been given to the members of the district. It is the intention of the board now to keep semi-monthly stories in your local newspapers of what is happening, and what difficulties are being encountered. Any questions that are not clear can be readily answered by your Precinct Director or County Committeemen.

Regular Legion meeting is planned on Tuesday night in Dimmitt, with the host group planning a program. The April meeting of the group is slated in Farwell.

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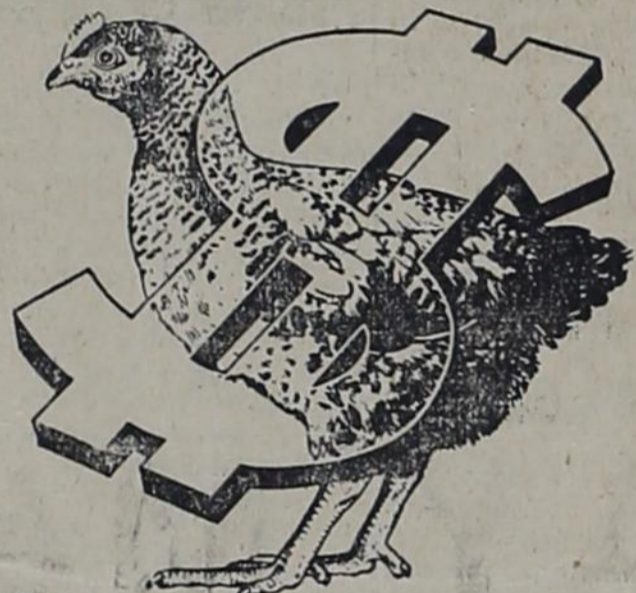

## LETTERS from Our Readers

Dear Hop,

I called on the Roy Fullers last week and had a long talk with Roy and his wife.

They live in a little house at 401 Hickory and have a darling baby boy, age 7 months. The house is fairly comfortable and Roy says, "I'm getting better every day." He was lying on the bed fully dressed even to cowboy boots and western belt. It was his birthday and on a table by his bed were two huge birthday cakes with candles.

Roy can move his head and one arm, the rest of his body is paralyzed. He told me that when he was in the hospital at El Paso he got down to 62 pounds, and I doubt if he weighs very little more now. He also said he was happier at home and could eat better and that when he gained to 110 pounds, the doctor would fit him for braces.

As for finances, they get a small welfare check and have received and are receiving help from nearly all of the organizations in Clovis. The only things I found that they didn't have much of was fresh milk, eggs and meat. His milk bill has been paid by Campbell's for the month of March and I have had one man tell me he would pay for April, so if anyone else or any group wants to take care of it after that just call Campbells or tell me and I will see to it that the milk is delivered.

I think it is wise that we in Bovina get organized and not do too

much at one time, after all, it doesn't take a lot of food for two people. If someone from here could just take one package of meat a week, it would help.

He said his doctor was giving him therapy treatments and that the polio foundation paid his doctor bill and for his medicine. He certainly thinks the Foundation has done a lot for him.

He is getting a hospital bed soon, and his sister bought him a wheel chair, though he said it needed to be worked over because the back was too straight and he became tired in it.

It is being arranged for Roy to have a magazine agency soon. It is about all he can do to make a living and he realizes his responsibility and wants to be independent if possible.

I think the greatest help the people of Bovina could be is to go see him, not only will we help him, but he'll help us. His outlook on life is wonderful. If someone could go at least once a week, I know it would mean a lot to him.

He is very appreciative of everything that is being done and has been done.

I have just learned that his address for the next two weeks will be 416 Ash, but after that, he will be at 401 Hickory, June Rhodes, Bovina (Editor's Note—Referring to the wheel chair in the above letter, Mrs. Ken White, Curry County Chairman of the Polio Foundation, said today that the Foundation would have been glad to provide a chair, made especially for his individual case, had the Foundation been so requested.)
