Yes, of course, it costs money. But did you ever know of anything worth while that didn't cost money? Farwell has been enjoying growing pains during the past several months. Some of the finest homes to be found anywhere have been erected here in recent months.

Just wanted to remind Willie Williams up at Bovina that he has just a few more days in which to be indicated as a weather prophet.

Willie really stuck his neck out early this month when he freely predicted generous rains during the month of March, always considered one of the driest months of the year in this region.

The expression is often heard that nobody in this country predicts rain except d--- fools and newcomers. Well, Bill ain't no newcomer.

Reading the other evening about the "operation hay life" in Nevada, where airplanes are being used to dump baled hay to snowbound and starving cattle over a wide area.

And then I began to reflect back over the years to the winter of 1919 when all this whole Plains country was snow-covered for months, during which time cattle died from starvation.

The range was completely covered by a heavy coating of snow and ice; only the tips of the beargrass pushed above the heavy snow. The result was that the cattle could find no grass whatever.

To make matters worse, stockmen were so completely snowed in that it was impossible to haul feed to their starving livestock. Cattle died by the thousands as the stockmen were forced to stand by helplessly.

Only when the snow melted the next spring could stockmen get out on the open range to survey their heavy losses. All that could be saved was the hides from the fallen animals, with the carcasses being left to rot.

It was not uncommon to see a full wagon load of hides, drawn by four husky mules, pulling into town to be sold to hide buyers.

Many stockmen would have been saved from financial ruin if "operation hay life" could have been available to them back in those tragic years.

Another thing that I cannot understand about this insurance racket in Texas is why insurance companies will insure a roof and collect the premium over a period of years when they know they will never pay for a loss caused by hail?

Small houses seldom sustain a loss that amounts to as much as \$100. With the hundred-dollar-deductible clause in their policies, the insurance gang is safe—they can't lose.

## New Cotton Gin Is Scheduled For Hub

G. W. Fleming of the Mills & Fleming Gin Company of Burkburnett, was here last weekend and announced his firm would begin the erection of a new cotton gin in Parmer County by April 1.

Fleming said his firm had purchased a 12-acre block of land one mile south of the Hub community and machinery for the completely new plant had already been ordered. "We will have the gin ready for operation by the time cotton begins to move this fall," Fleming told The Tribune.

He said that the new gin would be a Continental four-stand, 90-saw model, complete with double cleaning and drying equipment. A diesel engine will be installed to operate the plant, which will be lighted electrically from the REA lines.

Fleming said that at present he was operating a grain and seed business in Burkburnett and has had several years of experience in gin operations. He plans to remain at the site overseeing the erection of the gin when the machinery begins to arrive.

Announcement of the erection of a new gin in the Hub community is expected to stimulate cotton plantings in that section.

## Four File For Posts In Texico Election

With the deadline announced for 6 o'clock p. m. today (Thursday) only four candidates had filed for places on the Texico city election ballot, Clerk W. L. Freeman announced.

Four vacancies are to be filled when the voters will elect two councilmen, a mayor, clerk and police judge. M. C. Roberts has been filed as a candidate for mayor; Russell Johnson and Grayson Roberts have been listed as candidates for re-election as councilmen; and Sam Lewis is an avowed candidate for re-election to the post of police judge.

Freeman speculated there would be other filings before the deadline this evening. "But we never know until we get their names on the dotted line," he commented.

## Surcharge Goes Off On Post Card Prices

Responding to the flood of protests that have been piling up since the first of the current year, the Post Office Department has issued an order repealing the 10 per cent surcharge on government postal cards, effective March 22.

In addition to hiking the price from one cent to two cents on postal cards the first of the year, an additional 10 per cent surcharge was also added on purchases of 50 or more cards.

Under the recently-repealed rate, patrons could buy up to 49 cards at the rate of 2 cents per card, but amounts of 50 or more the 10 per cent surcharge was added.

## Bankruptcy Action Against Henderson

The Henderson Grain & Seed Company of this city, which has been in receivership the past few months, was thrown into involuntary bankruptcy last Saturday by Judge Frank Murry of Lubbock, of the bankruptcy court.

John E. Speer of Lubbock, has been named temporary receiver. He arrived here Monday to assume his duties as such and will act as receiver until the creditors name a permanent referee in bankruptcy.

The petitioning creditors named in the petition in Judge Murry's court are, The Texas Company, Olan U. Schleuter, E. H. Young, Western Cottonseed Oil Mill, and Scotty Stamps, Inc.

## New Owner In Charge Of City Cafe Here

## Highway Department Looks With Favor On Connecting Roads

Although it may take several months to work out all the details, the Texas Highway Department appears to look with favor on connecting Texas Highway 70 and New Mexico Highway 348 in Farwell.

This was the opinion gained by G. D. Anderson and Johnie Williams, members of a local committee who went to Lubbock last Thursday for a conference with District Highway Engineer S. C. McCarty. Williams said on his return from Lubbock that he "felt certain" the two highways would be connected as suggested by the local committee.

Some weeks ago, a meeting was held at the county courthouse at which time a plan was approved to ask the Texas Highway Department to tie the two highways together on a route which would begin at the Dayton home in the extreme southwestern corner of the Farwell townsite, run east to Sixth Street in front of the school property, thence north seven blocks to connect with Highway 70, the east-west highway through the main section of town.

McCarty told the local delegation that the first move necessary was to get the right-of-way for connecting length approved by the city council. Such approval has already been assured.

## Big Implement Sale At Bovina, March 31

Probably the biggest list of farm implements to be offered in one collection at public auction will go under the hammer at Bovina on Monday, March 31.

Most of the implements are being offered by the Bovina Implement Co., which is disposing of a collection of surplus machinery that has been accumulated through the past few months. Bedford Caldwell, firm manager, said today that all the offerings had been put in good operating condition and were "ready to go."

Other consignments, including 20 shafts, some farm machinery and miscellaneous items, round out the offerings.

Col. Dick Doshier, Farwell auctioneer, will be in charge of the sale, with Orval Francis and Vernon Symcox serving as clerks. A complete list of the offerings will be found in this issue of The Tribune.

## New Service Station Is Near Completion

The new and modern service station of Ed Meeks, being erected on Highway 70 in east Farwell, is nearing completion and will be open for business before long.

Meeks said today that five gasoline pumps and one diesel fuel pump was to be installed in the new station, which will be modern in every respect. The office building is being equipped with double rest rooms and other modern facilities. The office will face a large concrete driveway.

Meeks said he planned to handle Mid-Continental products.

## FRIONA MAN DIES OF HEART ATTACK

## Garbage Ordinance Drawn For Texico

An ordinance that will regulate the disposal of garbage and trash within the city limits of Texico has been drawn and will be presented to the town council when it meets the first Monday in April.

The ordinance provides, among other things, that each residence, apartment and business institution shall provide a garbage receptacle with a capacity of not less than 10 gallons nor more than 50 gallons with a tight-fitting lid.

Garbage shall be removed at least once a week, within the city naming a disposal man and inspector. Rates for disposal range from 50 cents per month one-family residences to \$2.00 per month for cafes and service stations. The common run of business houses will be charged \$1 per month.

Meanwhile, prospects for paving of Second and Third Streets continue to look favorable. Local civic leaders believe these two streets will be paved while the contracting firm is still on the grounds.

Representatives of the E. & E. Contracting Co. said this week that only a few contracts were out but expressed the belief that they would be closed up in due time.

## Rush Seen For New Auto License Tags

Attaches at the tax collector's office here braced themselves for the inevitable rush that is sure to develop during the few remaining days of March.

A check at the collector's office Tuesday morning revealed that "less than half" of the Parmer County autos and trucks had been licensed for the current year with the deadline rapidly approaching.

The 1952 license tags must be displayed on all vehicles in operation on April 1st. Most of the plates purchased to date have been for automobiles and commercial trucks. Many farmers, whose trucks are not in operation, are leaving their trucks unlicensed until they are put in use, it was revealed.

## Truck And Furniture Total Loss In Fire

A 1951 Chevrolet pickup and a load of used furniture valued at \$200, was completely destroyed by fire on Wednesday of last week. The furniture and truck was the property of The Furniture Mart of this city.

Ben Smart, store manager, said that fire evidently started when sparks from an exhaust pipe ignited overstuffed furniture pads in the truck. He said that Leonard Lewis was bringing in a load of used furniture from the Lazbuddie community when a rear wheel ran off the Chevrolet truck.

A wrecker, sent out by Karl's Auto Clinic, was bringing the disabled truck in when the fire flared up, resulting in the complete loss of the truck and the furniture. The fire occurred near the end of the east-west pavement just east of the twin houses in Parmer County.

Smart said that the loss was only partly covered by insurance.

**Overseas Traveler Shows Color Slides To Small Audience**

It was to an almost empty house that Aubrey Willard presented his collection of color slides to Thursday night at Farwell Schools. Willard, a brother of Vernon Willard, pastor of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist church, is back from two years in Athens, Greece and many other places in the Mediterranean area.

While there he made personal full-color photographs of innumerable historic and scenic places. In showing some of his hundreds of color slides, the traveller was able to give a fresh and personal account of every picture presented on the screen.

Willard is a sanitary health engineer with the U. S. Public Health Service and went overseas under the authorization of the MSA (Military Security Act). While in Athens, he was advisor to the Greek government on malaria control.

Willard, together with his wife and two children, spent slightly over two years in Greece. "We were at Athens most of the time," he said, "but once in a while we took a side trip and got to see quite a bit of scenery."

Included in the slides were many pictures taken in Greece itself, along with others from the Peloponnese, the Holy Land, Cyprus, Crete, Egypt, and Italy.

Mr. and Mrs. Willard described many of the pictures which were taken in these places, including photos of Salerno, Mt. Athena, Mt. Olympus, the ruins of Pompeii with Vesuvius in the background, Rome, the leaning tower of Pisa, the Parthenon, the Coliseum, birthplace of Christopher Columbus, Cario, the Nile, the pyramids and the Sphinx, and many scenes from Trans-Jordan and the Holy Land. A striking photograph of Michelangelo's "Moses" was included in the slides. This work of art is recognized as Michelangelo's masterpiece in sculpture.

Travelling is by no means over for the Willards. In April they will leave for the Philippine Islands. At present, however, Willard is not sure where he will be or how long he will be called to the South Pacific location.

At present, the family is living at the C. J. Henderson home in Oklahoma Lane. Mr. and Mrs. Henderson are Mrs. Willard's parents.

**Farm Bureau Directors Talk Over Problems**

Parmer County Farm Bureau Directors met in the county court room in Farwell Monday night. Arrangements were made for completing the bedding supply for the Spring Stock Show. Some of the directors had bailed hay at the Jake Jones farm south of Bovina two weeks ago. Melvin Sachs, who has some hay of better quality for topping out, was appointed to deliver about a hundred bales in a few days. Other directors and members will help him. Bedding has become one of the major material problems at show time.

With a view to avoiding possible repetition of grain losses to farmers through grain dealers, and with a determination to exert further effort toward aiding those immediately affected are solution basically as follows was adopted: Bruce Parr, County FB President, in conjunction with Reeve and Euler shall call State FB President Hammond Tuesday and ask for aid, in the person of qualified legislative officers of the state organization to secure certain facts necessary for ascertaining the rights of such elevator patrons and warehouse receipt holders.

Following a phone conversation between Hammond and Euler three weeks ago, a telegram concerning this situation was received from former CCC Vice President Wooley, now Farm Bureau Legal Counsel in

Washington. In concluding, he stated that facts related to specific cases would be necessary before definite procedure for recovery could be advised. It is for this purpose that State Executive aid is being requested.

A letter from Congressman Rogers was read in reply to Parmer County Farm Bureau's endorsement of his bill to increase personal income tax exemptions from \$600 to \$1000, and dependents from \$600 to \$750. There was also a letter from Conally, in which he pledged his support to farmers in keeping farm labor out of the jurisdiction of the NLR.

Present at the meeting were 10 directors, the Service Representative and County Agent Joe Jones.

**Three Registration Places Listed For 18-Year-Old Lads**

AUSTIN—Boys who reach the age of 18, required to register with the nearest draft board, can register in Farwell with Jesse F. Landrum at the office of Aldridge and Aldridge, in Bovina with Harry J. Charles at the Charles Oil Company, and in Friona with Miss Elda Hart.

The nearest draft board is Local Board No. 18, Hereford, which has jurisdiction over Deaf Smith, Randall, Castro and Parmer counties. Services of these registrars enable

Parmer county boys to register in their own county without having to go to the expense and trouble of travel to Hereford.

A local board is maintained for the four-county area because one board can take care of it under present circumstances and thus help keep down the cost of government.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said

today that "people should appreciate the services these registrars are rendering people of Parmer county. They do this job without pay as a patriotic service to the country." All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

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## State Representative Job Is Sought By Jess Osborn

In keeping with the nation-wide trend to put government back into the hand of qualified business men came the announcement this week that Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe will be a candidate for State Representative, 96th district of Texas.

A successful banker, rancher and farmer, Mr. Osborn entered the race at the request of many friends over the newly formed, five-county district. Backers of Mr. Osborn say that although his interests are still extensive, he will have sufficient time to devote to the office. His election, friends feel, will be in keeping with the trend toward closer supervision of spending of state money, and the replacement of professional politicians and college students in Austin by the kind of men who made Texas a great state.

Born at Oklaona, Ark., Aug. 14, 1894, Mr. Osborn came to this area in 1924, when he became associated with the Friona State Bank. He remained in, Parmer County until 1931, when he went to Muleshoe with the Muleshoe State Bank. He is still president of the Muleshoe Bank, but is assisted by an active vice-president. In addition to the banking business, Mr. Osborn has also engaged in farming and now has a small herd of Registered cattle.

"I do not plan to make an active or extensive campaign," he said. "Many of my friends have come to me and asked me to make this race. If the people see fit to elect me to this office, I will do my best to represent these five counties honestly, to their best interests, and to the welfare of the State of Texas. If I could not go to Austin without obligation to any person or group of persons, I would not go at all. The campaigning will have to be done by my friends—and that's the way it should be. Like many of you, I feel that we must have some changes in our government, especially in regards to wild spending. If the people of the district want me to

try this job, I am willing to do the best and only way I know, the way I have always tried to live and conduct my own business."

Mr. Osborn has never before sought or held a public office, but has taken an interest in community and regional affairs.

Friends of Mr. Osborn say: "We got Jess into this race, because we think it's time the people who pay the bill take more interest. It will be a financial sacrifice on his part to accept, but he is willing on the basis of service. He is a successful business man, and we feel that more men of this type are needed in our government. If you want more information regarding Jess Osborn, just ask some of the folks who have known or been associated with him."

## Bro. Meyer Names Suggestions on Panel

The Rev. George E. Meyer of the Congregational church, speaking before the Parent Teacher Association meeting as a part of a panel discussion on "Bettering the Schools" led by the principal of the high school, Mr. Dilly Kelly, called attention to several ways in which religion in the schools might be developed.

In regard to music, Mr. Meyer suggested that "music" should not be confined to those who were in the bands or choral groups, but these together with those not otherwise in the music department, should be given an appreciation, at least subjected to those things which make for a greater appreciation of the great things in music. He included the great Oratorios, the great hymns of the church which includes hymns written by men of every phase of religion, Catholic and Protestant, many hymns of the Protestant hymnals having been written by Catholics.

The speaker suggested the possibility of the use of the great things of the Bible, the Psalms, the Proverbs, great dramas and all the rest as literature, using these things without denominational comment. And the placing of good books in the libraries of schools, these too without denominational "bent."

Mr. Meyer suggested that the school rooms of the land might well have scores of the copies of the great pictures from the brushes of the masters of all centuries on their walls, that there too could well be classes in "Appreciation" of these pictures. He claimed that the knowledge of the average high school student in regard to the great pictures was truly deplorable. At the close of the meeting, Mr. Meyer was given the task of seeing that there were religious pictures placed on the school room walls.

It was also suggested that the schools might observe some of the great religious holidays of the church as a whole, as well as national and state holidays. That a good time to begin would be with an observance of the most sacred hour of the Christian Faith, the hour between 2:00 and 3:00 p.m. on Good Friday. In which service the "Seven Words" of the Cross, from the Scriptures, and grand old generally accepted hymns might well be used.

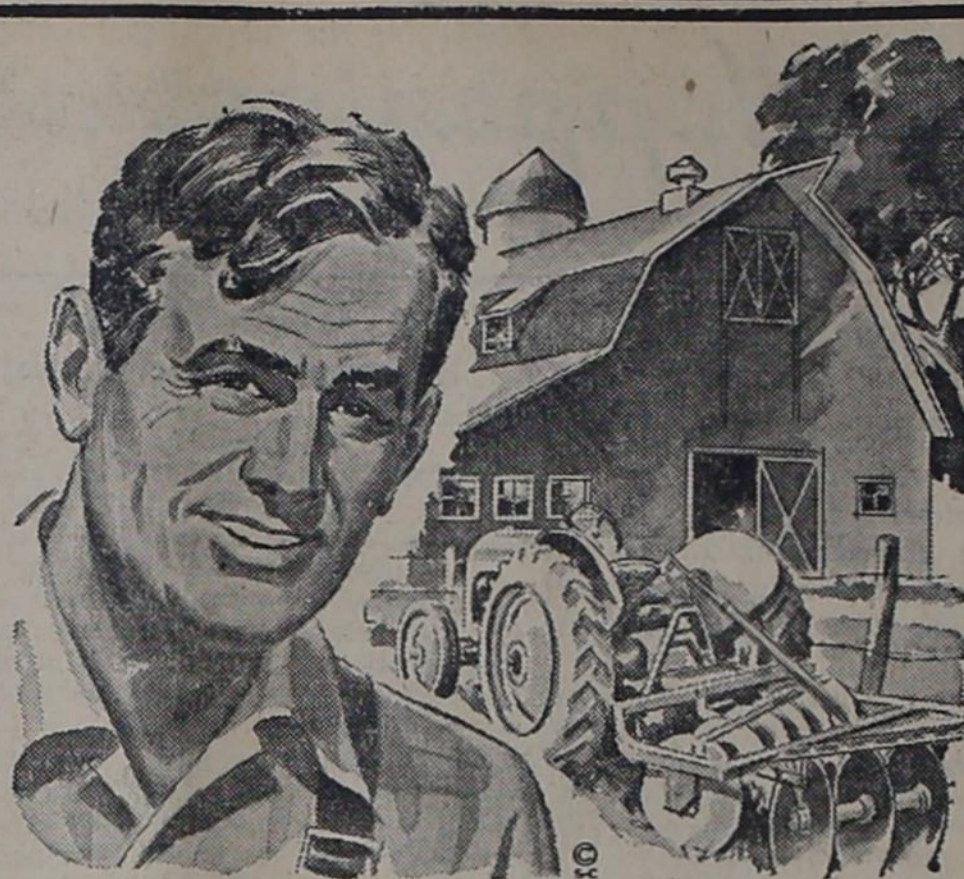

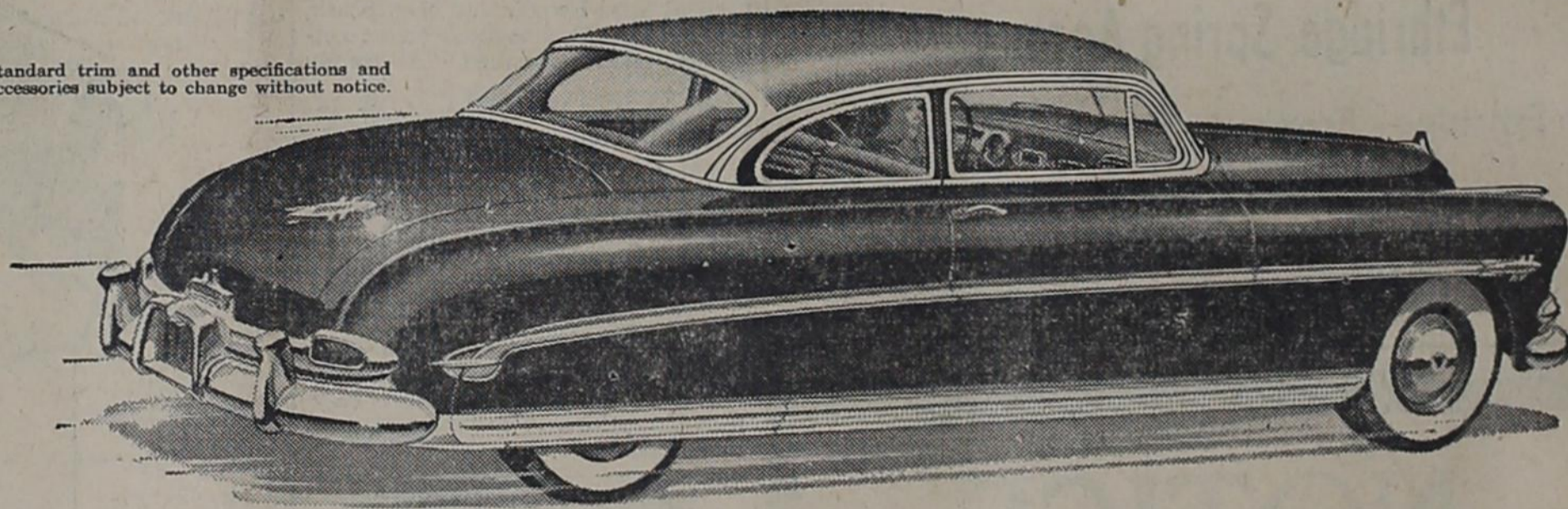
