Texico approves water ordinance

The Texico City Council last week approved a water conservation ordinance that all residents need to understand.

The ordinance approved penalties for folks disregarding the water usage standards that are in effect -- and other standards that may go into effect shortly. Here are the penalties for violations of this ordinance:

First violation, written warning; 2nd violation, \$20 fine; 3rd violation, \$50 fine; 4th violation, \$100 fine; and 5th and subsequent violations, \$300 fine.

There are four stages, and Texico currently is at Stage 1. It went into effect today. Stage 1 calls for voluntary water conservation. No watering of lawns or outdoor landscape between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Car washing is allowed anytime if bucket or shut-off hose is used. Water runoff from sprinklers, washing down pavement or sidewalks is prohibited. Odd addresses water only on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Even addresses may water only on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday.

Stage 2 will only go into effect if the City Council publicly announces that mandatory water conservation is in effect.

Stage 2 includes: no watering of lawns and outdoor landscaping between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Odd addresses water on Tuesday, Thursday or Friday; even addresses on Wednesday, Friday or Sunday. Handheld buckets and shut-off hoses can be used any time. Water runoff from sprinklers, washing down pavement, etc. is prohibited. Car washing is allowed any time with a bucket or shut-off hoses. Spas and swimming pools -- one initial filling for recirculating pools only; no draining and refilling. Water for ornamental fountains is allowed only if water is recirculated.

The next is Stage 3, which would go into effect only after an announcement by the City Council. No watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Watering on Tuesday and Friday only. Handheld buckets and shut-off hoses can be used any time. All vehicle washing at a residence is prohibited. Filling and refilling of spas and pools is prohibited. Pools must be covered when not in use. Water runoff from sprinklers, washing down pavement, etc., is prohibited. Filling and refilling of ornamental fountains is prohibited.

The last stage is Stage 4, again only going into effect if the City Council announces it.

Stage 4 includes: No watering except for trees and shrubs with shut-off hoses and handheld containers. All vehicle washing at residences is prohibited. Filling and refilling of spas and pools is prohibited. Pools must be covered when not in use. Water runoff from sprinklers, washing down pavement, etc., is prohibited. Filling and refilling of ornamental fountains is prohibited.

The council also recommended year-round water use restrictions. These are: Landscape watering is discouraged between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.; shutoff nozzles are recommended on hoses used for hand water; washing hard surfaces, such as driveways, is discouraged; and fugitive water shall not be permitted to leave the intended irrigated area.

1st Street drainage problem worked on

The Farwell City Council ISO rating. on Nov. 20 heard city inspector Lee Hutchins report that the drainage problem on First Street is

being worked at. He said the Burlington Northern Santa Fe with the help of Farwell's fire department and employees are cleaning out the culvert under the highway. This will help solve much of drainage problem.

Hutchins also reported:

-- Repairs have begun on the house at 410 2nd

-- A certified letter about the condition of the house at 413 2nd St. was sent to its owner in Clovis, but he has not responded.

An investigation committee of Hutchins, Mayor Jimmie Mace, city street Supt. Joe Servin and councilmen Wayne Gruben and Joe Stanton will now inspect the property to see if the house should be demolished. If they agree on that, the next step is for a legal notice in the newspaper.

-- Farwell has an ISO rating of 5, the same rating Texico has. The fire department is buying an additional ground nozzle for \$13,427 (the city to pay 80 percent and the fire department 20%) which will help improve Farwell's

The fire department has 16 on its roll, with 12

active each week. -- An engineering plan has proposed a water line survey to improve water

quality (and fire flow) in Farwell be undertaken before a possible grant request next spring.


The council also heard the monthly report from Police Chief Scott Burton.

Texico comes from behind to upset Dexter; to host title game

It was one of the greatest comebacks in Texico Wolverine history last Friday at the Field of **Hopes and Dreams.**

The Wolverines scored two TDs in the final 7 1/2 minutes to beat the previously-undefeated Dexter Demons, 15-14, in a state semi-final football game. The two teams had played in the first game of the season, with Dexter winning 13-0 at home.

Texico now hosts Santa Rosa at 7 p.m. mt Friday, Nov. 30. Santa Rosa will be the favorite since they beat the Wolverines earlier in the season there.

Dexter, which had been seeded No. 1. finished its season at 11-1. Texico, which had been seeded No. 4, is now 10-2.

Coach Mike Prokop has been at Texico for 8 years. He has had the Wolverines in the playoffs each year, been in the state finals 6 times, and has won 2 state championships so far.

The game opened with Texico at its 21. Texico went 3 and out and punted to midfield. On defense, Billy Scott had a strong tackle, the first of many for him. Mario Posada made a TD-saving tackle at the **Wolverine 13 after Dexter** made a long run.

In the past month, police have answered 7 suspicious person calls, 4 domestic violence calls and issued 53 citations.

Police are investigating a rash of forgery cases (100plus checks) that have occurred here.

Vandalism has occurred at the school, including playground equipment and broken windows.

The "no trucks allowed" signs are now up and tickets will be given violators.

In other business, the council:

- -- Heard a problem about an alley at the east end of the city being used for hot rodding. The alley is now closed for traffic.
- -- Heard that a concrete bench in the city park was busted up by vandals.

-- Changed the wording in the lease for folks renting the Farwell Community Center. If the center lot is not also cleaned up, the deposit won't be returned. After a recent center use, the lot reportedly was a mess, with underwear, blue cups, and beer bottles found.

City Clerk Tanya Meeks was instructed to inspect the center before returning deposits.

- -- Heard that an anonymous donor will help fund a steam table at the new senior citizens lunch site at the community center. The cost is estimated about \$900 plus freight. The city will help with the cost.
- -- Since the senior citizens lunch site has opened, the city will give them \$90 a month instead of sending that money to the Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens group that meets in Texico.
- -- Will allow the mayor to handle a quitclaim problem dealing with properties on the east side of 5th Street. This will "clear up" the properties' problem.
- -- Hear that Anne Norton is putting together a list of veterans buried at the Farwell cemetery.



LIVE CATTLE: Higher cash cattle prices this week helped to support one of the best closes seen in the last several weeks. Prices had been caught trading inside a tight range for the last couple of weeks with no direction until now. Most trends have now turned positive and prices should continue to move higher at least into early December. Long term charts indicate another shot at \$1.00 basis the February and April contracts. Tight supplies are expected to support higher cash prices.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have also turned back higher along with Live Cattle prices. Although corn prices have also drifted back up into resistance levels, it seems as though feeders have basically ignored the corn. Feeders could possibly move back up into the low \$112 or mid \$113 area before turning back down. Expect feeders to continue to follow the Live Cattle price.

CORN: Corn prices were able to move above a 7 day sideways range over the Holiday's to close strong on Friday. The market is now expected to retest the \$3.93 high made just a few weeks ago. This should provide some fairly strong resistance over the near term, but a close above this level would be viewed as positive for prices. Supplies remain high and demand is on the

SOYBEANS: After hitting some long term targets around the \$10.90 level basis the January contract early last week was followed by new contract highs on Friday. Soybean Oil has been leading the soybean price higher coming mostly from demand in bio-fuel. The market has reached levels not seen in many years. There are few prices targets up here other than taking a shot at \$12.00?

WHEAT: The July KC wheat contract broke out to new nighs this week a the market was able to trade up into some target areas around the \$7.40 level. This seems to be mostly a weather related market. Most of the weather impacting prices has been related to the U.S. weather. Export demand over the last few weeks has been slow

with many cancellations. Market is still higher. COTTON: Cotton prices came under pressure about a week ago and prices did little this week except stabilize. Large stocks and the new crop coming in were to blame. Export demand remains weak as China has continued to stay on the sidelines. Next major support levels lie below at \$56.60 basis the December contract.


