Of course, this year, we are publishing this on faith. So far in good old October, we have seen very little of the "bright blue weather." We have every confidence that in a few days we will experience the delightful days that we associate with our marvelous fall weather on the high plains.

It is becoming our considered opinion that the higher in the management field a body becomes, the more difficult it is to get fired for bad judgement and incompetency. The examples of this are almost too numerous to mention. Let us look at a few "horrible examples."

Television network programming is a very visible example of this "old boy" proclivity in high level management. What we have seen so far this season for new offerings during prime time makes us think that that chimp manages as well as acts, and unfortunately he acts as well as some of the high paid

When we think of the millions of dollars wasted bringing this recycled, stale, juvenile drivel before the public in the name of entertainment, we are forced to reach for the paregoric.

Next let's look at the Chrysler Corporation. Between a supine management and a greedy union it is back on the same road that led it to the brink of bankruptcy. We predict that in a year or so, smooth talking Lee will again be reaching for the public teat for a transfusion of

the taxpayers' pelf.

The high level moguls of industry ought to have by now figured out that when they post their profit sheets, anything above a modest return on investment will soon be fair game for higher wages. Inflation is an ever-increasing cycle of higher prices, higher profits, higher wages, higher prices, higher etc., etc. Eventually the whole kit and kaboodle will go down the tube.

Our advice to avaricious management would be to consider trying to plow back high profits into lower prices for the consumer and insisting on wages being kept at a level that will allow everybody to buy the product.

Finally, high level boondoggling seems to be rampant in the big bucks banking business. Right now Uncle Sam is being cajoled and even threatened to fork over additional billions to keep those international bankers from going busted over their very ill-advised loans to socialist and communist countries.

Let us consider a question asked by Patrick J. Buchanan, a syndicated columnist. Writes Buchanan:

"According to UPI, Mr. Walter Wriston, the chairman of Citicorp, last year became the highest paid financial executive in U.S. history. . . . Now, if those enormous Latin loans were so clever as to justify a merit pay raise of \$377,000 for Wriston in 1982, why, nine months later, must those same loans be backed up with the savings of Wriston's doorman and chauf-

feur?" Similar questions could well be asked of any number of overpaid executives in today's business world.

A friend of ours in Clovis opined the other day that most folks throw enough stuff away to get rich on. He may be right inasmuch as the U.S. produces 3.9 pounds of garbage and trash per capita per day.

Former Oklahoma Lane resident Berniece (Bert) Underwood died in an Oklahoma City hospital Friday, Sept. 23. She was a resident of Willow, Okla.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, Sept. 26, in the First Baptist Church of Mangum, Okla., with Rev. Dan Stillwell of the First United Methodist Church of Mangum, officiating. Burial was in Willow, Okla.

Mrs. Underwood was born April 27, 1920 in Sweetwater. Tex., the daughter of Arthur and Blanche Hartzog. She grew up in Parmer County and was graduated from high school at Oklahoma Lane, and received a college degree from Texas of Tulia.

She was married to John J. Underwood at Lubbock on January 19, 1951 and they moved to the Willow Community where they farmed.

Mr. Underwood preceded her in death in 1965, and she continued the operation of the farm, assisted Oklahoma State University in the development of certified cotton seed and was named Farmer of the Year.

The varsity team won the first of the matches 15-5, but lost the next two 15-5, 15-10.





The Friona Chieftains spoiled the Steers Homecoming Friday night with a convincing 34-0 shutout of the home team. The Chieftains' tough defense held the Steers scoreless, even though Farwell came within yards of scoring on several occasions.

Friona opened the game quickly on their second possession and drove 54 yards for a touchdown, finished with a 15yarder by a Chieftain back.

Before the halftime homecoming ceremonies, the Chieftains had jumped out to a 21-0 lead with a four-yard run and a 31-yard sprint by the Chieftain quarterback.

In the second half the Steers still struggled to put some points on the board, and came very near on several occasions. Quick passes from Alan Eubank to Roger Robertson, including a connection for 40 yards, as well as 22 yards in three carries from Santiago Lucio (who also had a 50-yard sprint in the first half of play) helped boost the Steer offensive game, but the Chieftain defense held strong and did not allow Farwell to

Several good plays on defense, such as a Roger Robertson interception deep in Friona scoring territory, and an impressive number of tackles behind the line of scrimmage by Jesse Anzaldua, helped slow, but not stop the powerful Friona

Friona still managed to score on two more opportunities with their final touchdowns set up by runs from the Chieftain back field for 15, 17, and 20 yards. Short runs of three and one vards added the 13 points to Friona's already commanding

Although the game was closer than the score indicated, the Chieftains of Friona traveled home with the impressive vic-


