Don Gerries Gets All 12 To Win Weekly Contest

Last week's Merchant's Football contest has the distinction of being the highest scoring week in the history of the contest with some 226 persons averaging nine plus on their correct picks.

Don Gerries of Farwell was the only person with a perfect entry, naming all 12 game winners in the contest and receiving the \$7.50 first place weekly check.

Services In Oklahoma For Berniece Underwood

Former Oklahoma Lane resident Berniece (Bert) Underwood died in an Oklahoma City hospital Friday, Sept. 23. She was a resident of Willow, Okla.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, Sept. 26, in the First Baptist Church of Mangum, Okla., with Rev. Dan Stillwell of the First United Methodist Church of Mangum, officiating. Burial was in Willow, Okla.

Mrs. Underwood was born April 27, 1920 in Sweetwater, Tex., the daughter of Arthur and Blanche Hartzog. She grew up in Parmer County and was graduated from high school at Oklahoma Lane, and received a college degree from Texas Tech.

She was married to John J. Underwood at Lubbock on January 19, 1951 and they moved to the Willow Community where they farmed.

Mr. Underwood preceded her in death in 1965, and she continued the operation of the farm, assisted Oklahoma State University in the development of certified cotton seed and was named Farmer of the Year.

She was appointed to the Western Oklahoma State College Board of Regents by Gov. David Hall in June 1971 for a seven-year term. She was reappointed in 1978 by Gov. David Boren, and her most recent appointment was made by Gov. George Nigh. It would have expired in 1988.

Mrs. Underwood was a member of Beta Sigma Phi and Epsilon Sigma Alpha sororities, American Legion Auxiliary, was present president of the Greer County Democratic Club, belonged to the Willow Farm Women's Club, served as director of the Mangum Chamber of Commerce, served on the Advisory Committee for the State Higher Education for Civil Rights and with Social Rehabilitation for Neglected and Abused

Children.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Mangum.

Survivors include a son, Jance Underwood, and a granddaughter, Jalissa, both of Willow; a stepson, John Jeff Underwood of San Francisco; six brothers, A.L. Hartzog, Sr., and J.B. Sudderth, both of Farwell, Billie Sudderth of Bovina, Melvin Sudderth of San Francisco, Sam Sudderth, Shawnee, Okla., and Don Sudderth of Alamogordo, N.M.;

Also, four sisters, Opal Sikes and Mary Ruth Redden, both of Clovis, Winnie Condron of Elgin, Tex., and Frances Hodges of Tullia.

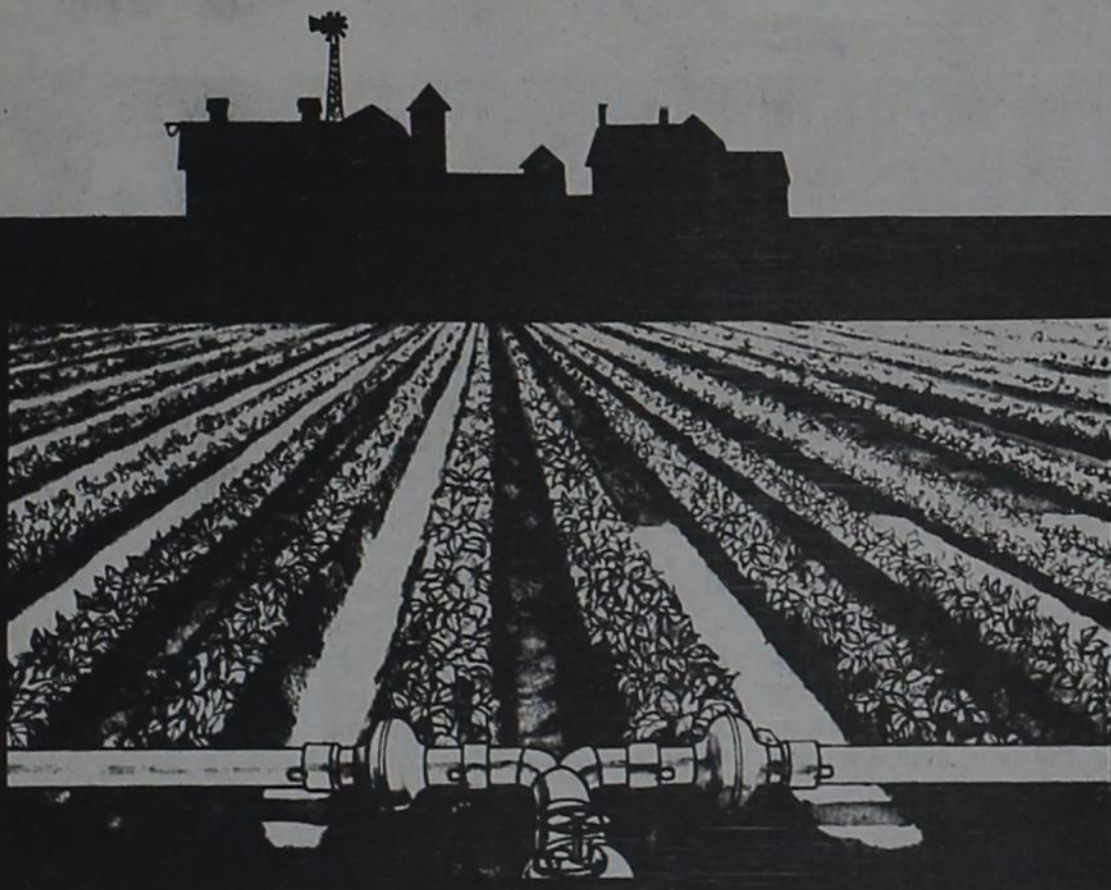

A&M leads South in private donations

COLLEGE STATION—Texas A&M University is the only institution in the South or Southwest ranked among the leaders in voluntary financial support, according to figures provided by the Council for Financial Aid to Education.

The national survey listed Texas A&M fifth among all public institutions in private gifts for 1981-82, with \$40.7 million in voluntary giving. The only public universities reporting higher contributions were (in order) UCLA, the University of Minnesota, the University of Michigan and the University of Illinois.

Texas A&M ranked 16th overall among all colleges and universities nationwide.

Arrest Made In Friona Theft Case

According to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan, a theft reported on Thursday, Sept. 29 by Jim Mears, who lives southeast of Friona, has been solved.

Mears reported the theft of approximately 10 gallons of gasoline and damage to a mail box.

Later that day, sheriff's deputies arrested Armando Perez, 25, of Friona in connection with the theft. Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts fined Perez a total of \$442, which includes his fine, court costs, and restitution.

In other action, Parmer County sheriff's deputies made three other arrests this week.

Jerry Sullivan, 30, of Ozona, Tex., was arrested Tuesday, Sept. 27, on charges of violation of probation. He was returned to the Parmer County jail pending district court action.

Esperanza Herrera, 31, of Friona was arrested Wednesday, Sept. 28, on charges of assault. She was fined \$25 plus court costs.

Terry Polk, 33, of Friona was arrested on charges of theft by worthless check, and on a Hereford sheriff's warrant for the same charges. He was fined a total of \$198.89 on the charges from the Parmer County Sheriff's office and a total of \$177.46 on the charges from the Hereford sheriff's office.

Several indictments were handed down during the October 4 session of the Parmer County Grand Jury.

Indicted for burglary of a habitation were Valentine Castillo, 18, Don Heiar, 18, and Jake Mascarenas, 17, all of Friona. They are in Parmer County jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond each pending district court action.

Heiar was also indicted for burglary of a motor vehicle and is also under another \$5,000 bond pending district court action.

Indicted on charges of aggravated robbery were Freddy Fulton, 29, and Willie Windom, Jr., 21, both of Clovis. Both are in jail in lieu of \$20,000 bond each pending district court action.

Richard Guy, 31, of Farwell was indicted on charges of theft. He is currently in jail in Portales pending extradition to Texas.

He was placed on probation for five years.

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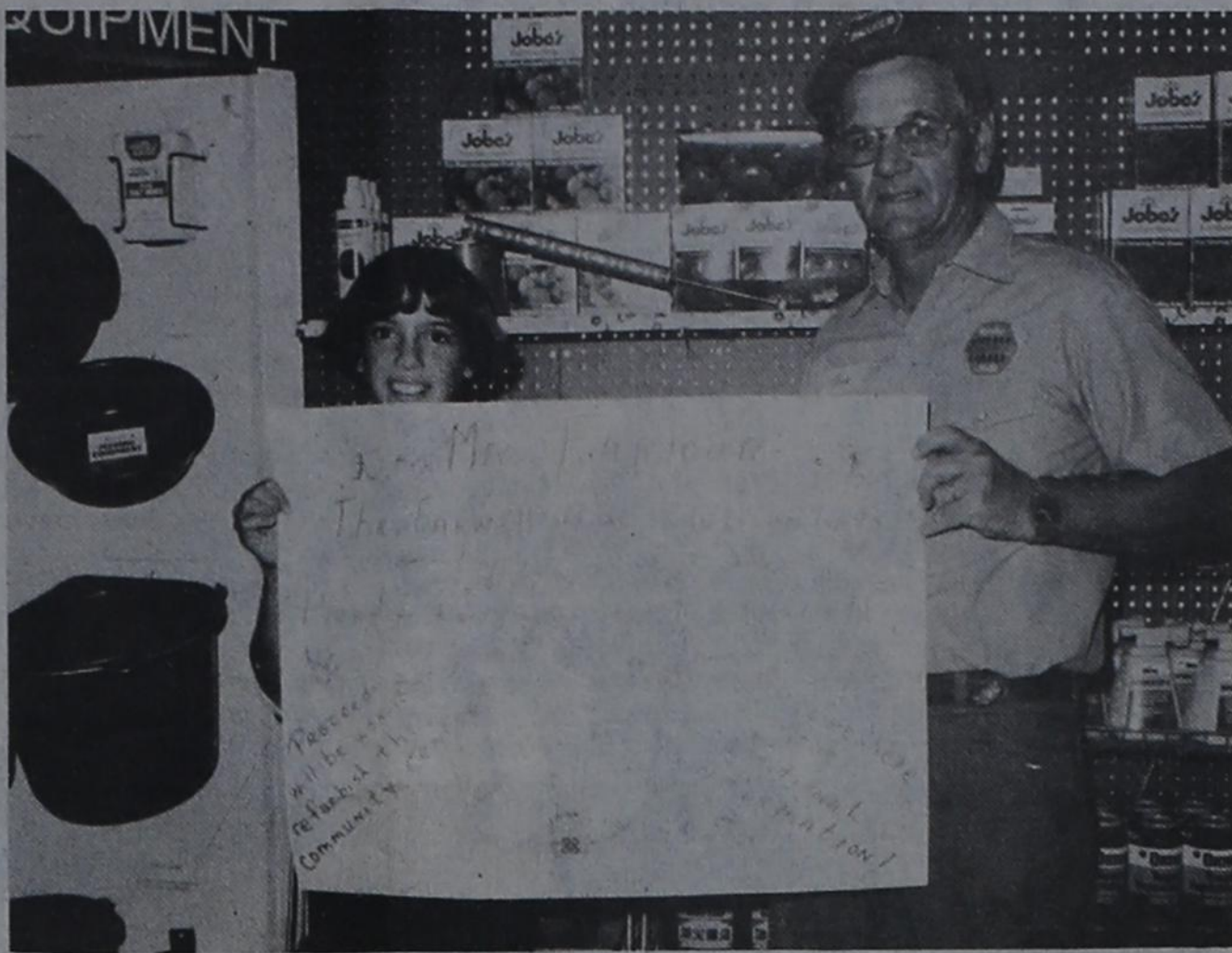
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Help Community Center

National 4-H Week Observed

"4-H: Building on Experience," the yearlong theme of the 4-H program across Texas and the nation, reflects on the rich past of this youth program. The theme will receive special emphasis during National 4-H Week, October 2-8.

"The 4-H program has long

taken pride in its roots and the practical learning experiences that it has provided for millions of youth," says H.T. "Tom" Davison, state 4-H program leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "In fact, 4-H is celebrating its 75th anniversary this year."

"4-H, which now reaches some five million youth each year in the U.S., actually had its beginning in Texas in Jack County back in 1908," notes Davison. "From the early corn clubs for boys and canning clubs for girls, 4-H has grown into the largest youth organization outside of schools that today reaches young people from all backgrounds and walks of life."

Conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service in each state and supported by each state's land-grant university and the U.S. Department of Agricul-

ture, the 4-H program is built around a "learning-by-doing" philosophy that has stood the test of time.

"We now have more than 187,000 Texas youth between the ages of 9 and 19 enrolled in 4-H, and they are engaged in some 50 project areas that provide a host of learning experiences to prepare them for the future," Davison points out. "These educational projects help young people gain practical skills, develop good nutrition and health habits, explore career opportunities, generate leadership capabilities, and become involved citizens."

From the traditional projects of field crops and livestock to baking and sewing, 4-H has expanded over the years into such areas as small engines, rocketry and veterinary science. And now computers are finding their way into 4-H.

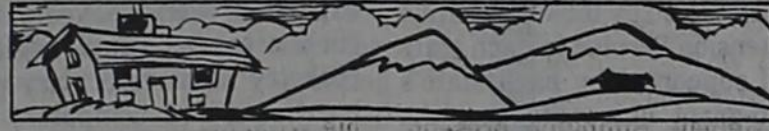

Victory Over Springer Puts Wolverines At 5-0

Texico Wolverines traveled to Springer last Friday night to take on the Class 2A Red Devils and came away with a 21-8 victory which ruined the Red Devils' homecoming and upped the Wolverines season record to 5-0.

The Wolverines won the coin toss and elected to receive and on the first play the Wolverines fumbled the ball and the Red Devils recovered.

A couple of plays later, Brad Steward intercepted a Springer pass which ended a serious scoring drive by the Red Devils.

Texico's offense was unable to move against the Springer defense, and the Red Devil offense had the same problem as the Wolverine defense held solid and at the end of the first quarter the score was 0-0.

Texico's offense took control of the ball at midfield and drove down the field with impressive runs by Billy Bibbs and Brad Steward and a 15-yard toss from Brad Steward to Kevin West.

Ronnie Galvan put the finishing touches on the drive as he plunged into the end zone from two yards out. The PAT kick was good by Brad Steward and the Green and White led 7-0 with 8:50 left in the second quarter.

Springer drove down to the Wolverine 20-yard line but fumbled the ball which was recovered by Tommy Boorman and Ronnie Galvan for the Wolverines.

The first half ended with Texico holding onto a 7-0 lead.

It didn't take long for Texico to score in the third quarter with powerful runs by Brad Steward and Ronnie Galvan. Joe Steward then scored from one yard out. The PAT run for two points was good by Galvan and Texico extended its lead 15-0.

The varsity team won the first of the matches 15-5, but lost the next two 15-5, 15-10.

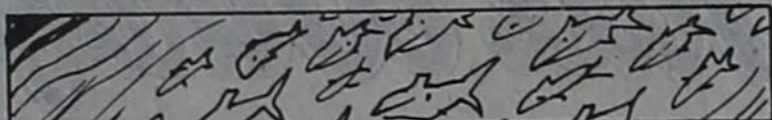

Although the game was closer than the score indicated, the Chieftains of Friona traveled home with the impressive victory.

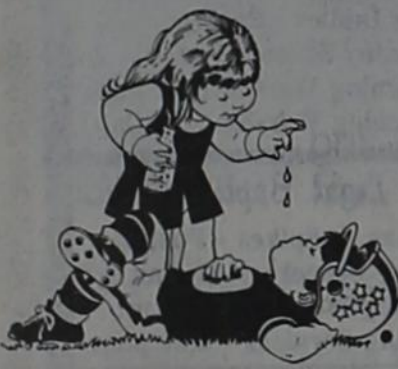
Entering district play tonight (Friday) the Steers boast a 3-2 pre-district record which includes big wins over several strong area football teams.

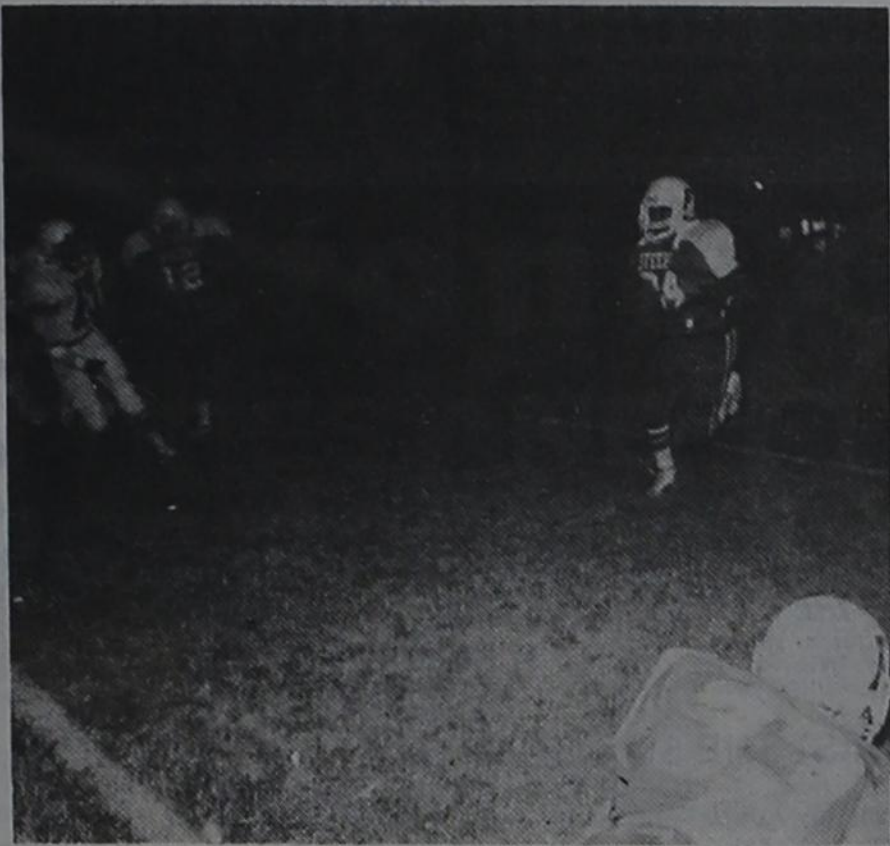

"Happy is one of the best teams in the district," Coach Williams said, "We'll have to play well."

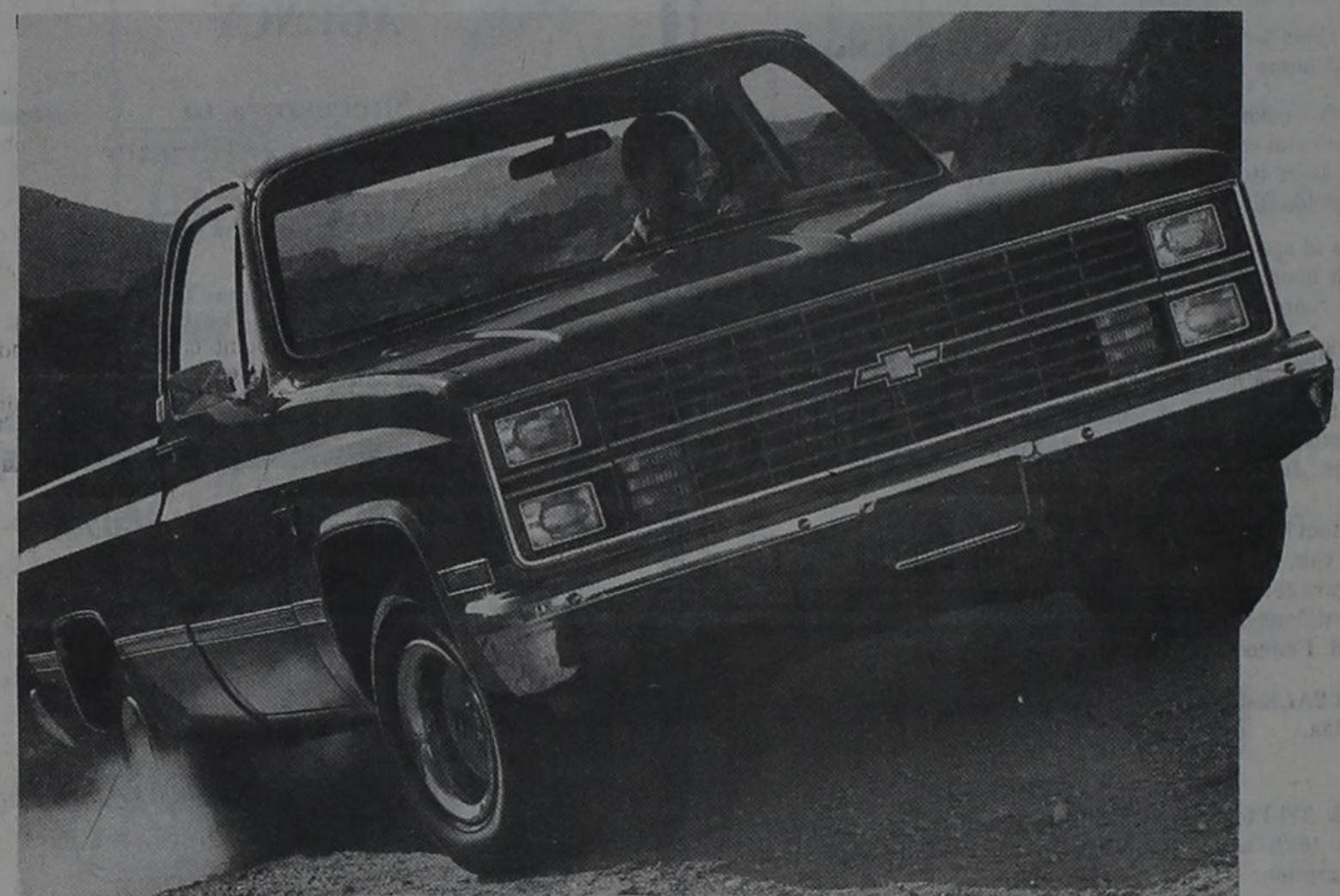

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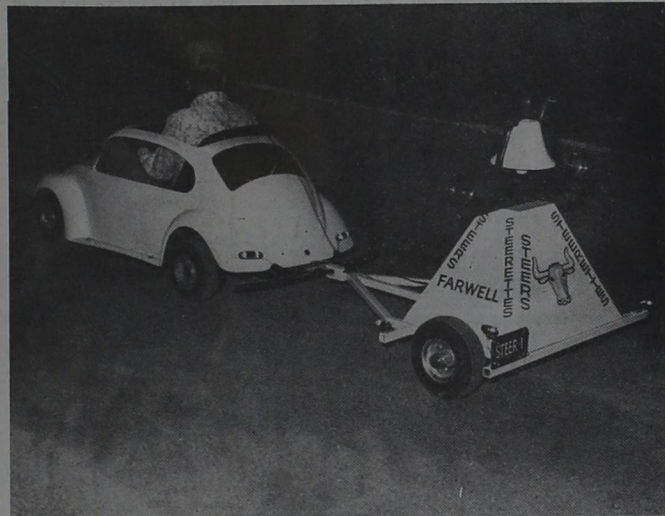
Cheerleading -- 50's Style?
