Watch For Swine Flu, Warns County Agent

Hog producers are warned to be on the alert for swine flu, Joe Jones, county agent says. The weather during this season of the year—warm days and cold nights—is favorable for flu development, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension veterinarian of Texas A & M College. Hogs should be protected from the elements. A well-bedded shed this is clean and properly ventilated is the best shelter for hogs at this season of the year. Better check to see that the hogs use the shelter you provide, because they will probably prefer to stay outside, says Patterson.

Swine flu, says the veterinarian, is seldom fatal, but the loss of flesh is mighty important. In addition to the losses on fat hogs, gilts that are being kept for brood sows may also be affected. Small, weak litters often result when the gilts have had a bad case of flu.

Whenever there is doubt about the diagnosis of sick hogs, Patterson suggests calling in a veterinarian, for there is a chance the hogs might have a disease that would prove fatal. Hogs that have flu should be provided with a comfortable house that is free from drafts and should be fed on a light, slightly laxative diet.

Patterson says it's a good idea to check all hogs daily, especially those running in the field. Prompt and proper attention for the sick animals is a must for all farm animals if they are to produce maximum returns for their owners, says Patterson.

NEW TERRACES CONSIDERED

S. G. Wilson of Stonon, Bill Waldrip and John McGehee of Hereford met with SCS men in the Lazbuddy community last Wednesday to consider the possibility of putting a terrace system on the Wilson farm. This was another of the more fortunate farms having a strip of native grass upon which to spill surplus water.

Farmers who have native grass strips next to steep cultivated fields should think twice before plowing up the grass. Man-made grass strips, usually called waterways, are hard to establish. However, it can be done in a year's time or less and there is a PMA payment for shaping and seeding waterways. Graded terraces or diversions cannot be put in without one of these protected areas to dispose of excess water. In many cases a neighbor across the fence is glad to get the water on his grass.

REQUEST CONTOUR LINES

A. F. Phillips and Floyd Firebaugh have requested contour lines. Phillips, one mile south of Farwell, needs lines on 640 acres, and Firebaugh, on C. W. Dixon's farm in Rhea community, needs lines on 2,500 acres.

Contour farming is the easiest and one of the best conservation practices for dry land farming. It catches and holds rainfall, reduces runoff and erosion, and distributes moisture uniformly. Two important conservation practices which should be applied at this season are contour listing and stubble mulching. The latter means leaving enough crop residue on the surface of fields to keep the land from blowing. Most farmers do this but a few graze the stubble down to bare ground.

In the 30-mile wind last Sunday, only one quarter in every 10 sections observed showed signs of moderate wind erosion. Louis P. Merrill, regional conservator in Fort Worth, has called for a wind erosion report every 15 days. He also wants to know the moisture conditions and areas in each county which are blowing.

COMPLETE TERRACES

Two and six-tenths miles of terraces were checked as complete for G. H. Lindop this week. An irrigation well was located for J. E. Knight, and a field mapped for Ear. D. Stevenson.

MORE LEGUMES

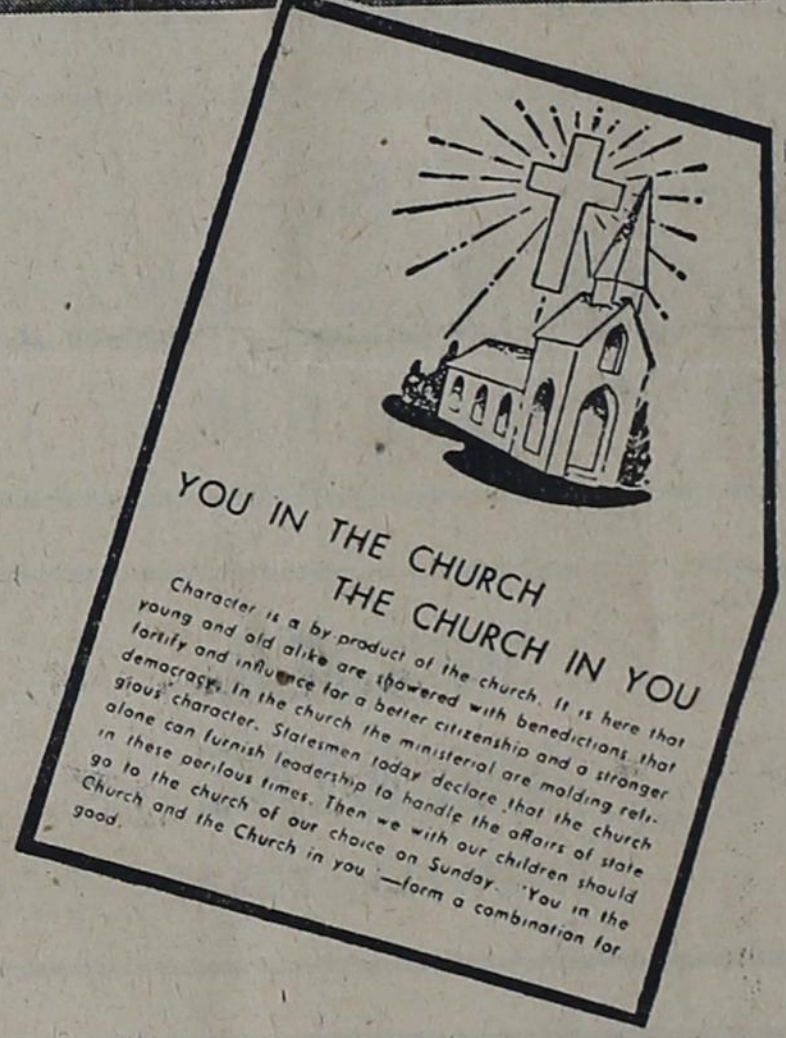
STRONG HAND of the LAW
