# 1,000,000 WORDS TELL 1951 NEWS

As has been the custom at the conclusion of December for many years, The Tribune staff digs back through the past 52 issues of the paper for highlights of the preceding year which were recorded in the news columns. This week, after much research and preparation, we present for our readers a panorama of the year 1951, written by Jeanne Dudley.

In recording significant events of local and regional scope in the year cities were numerous. In Friona, 1951, staff members of the Tribune bids were received for a new city have accumulated in excess of one million words, in papers for the entire year.

These words have told a story, from week to week, of the short twelve months since Parmer County heralded in the new year of 1951. Hoping for bountiful crops, civic improvements and other good things, citizens have seen the year edge by, and realize that time is catching up with



#### Nearly 5,000 Students Enrolled At Tech

LUBBOCK,-Final figures on enrollment at Texas Tech show the college has 4,906 students registered for the fall semester.

The figure is an increase from the spring semester's 4,660, but a decrease from the 5,400 registered at Tech a year ago.

A breakdown of the enrollment by divisions shows that the Arts and Sciences Division leads with 1,770 student; Business Administration is second with 1,018; Engineering is close behind with 1,010; Agriculture is fourth with 751; Home Economics has 357; and the Graduate Division has 571.

The total includes 3,446 men and

1,460 women students. The Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) program enrolled

1,060 men, including over 600 freshmen.
