Farwell Girls Take State Golfing Title

The Farwell Girls Golf Team traveled to Austin and returned home with the Class A State Golf Championship title when they dropped Stanton by 24 strokes Saturday, May 3.

Farwell's team score was 867, 24 strokes under second place Stanton's score of 891. Third place went to Flatonia with 1012 with Wallis Brazos scoring 1070; Elyson Field, 1092; Tatum, 1250; and Muenster, 1279.

Members of the State Championship team are Carol Vinton, Penny Hughes, Claire McFarland, Kathy Booth and Deanna Williams.

Sherri Haynes of McLean was individual medalist for the tournament with a 190 total. Finishing in a tie for second were Farwell's Penny Hughes and Carol Vinton. Carol won the playoff for the runner-up medal with Penny taking third. Both Steerette golfers shot a 193.

Individual scores were Carol Vinton, 193; Penny Hughes, 193; Claire McFarland, 213 for fifth place; Kathy Booth, 268; and Deanna Williams, 268.

In commenting on the championship Carol Vinton remarked "I was pleased that the team won, but I could have placed better. We didn't play the way we are capable at regional."

Penny Hughes said she didn't feel the team would win as it placed second to Stanton at the regional tournament. She remarked, "Friday's round was good for me, but I didn't play well Saturday. It's hard to believe we won. I played with Sherri (Haynes) today and she is just a super player and a super person."

Claire McFarland stated, "Stanton just couldn't take the pressure, but we did take it. The course was not as tough as I had thought. The heat and humidity got to me. It was

hard to get the ball down the fairway."

"We knew we had a chance when we led after the opening day," declared Deanna Williams, "Water hazards gave me a great deal of trouble both days."

Kathy Booth related, "We felt we could play better than we did at regional but Stanton had a good team. I played in the first round at regional and then competed in the regional track meet."

Golf Coach Vernon Scott stated, "We wish to extend a big thank you to the sponsors who took the girls to Austin and took very good care of them while they were there."

Sponsors accompanying the girls were Sharron Hughes, Alice Vinton and Superintendent W.M. Roberts. The group was joined in Austin by Maxine Williams.

15 Arrested - -

'Pot Party' Search Conducted Friday

Acting upon a tip, Texas Department of Public Safety Officers Glenn Fant and Jim Bishop entered a farm home located six miles east of Farwell about 11:30 p.m. Friday. The officers arrested 15 young men, charging them with possession of less than two ounces of marijuana.

According to the officers, what apparently started out as a beer party turned into a pot party. The boys scattered like a "covey of quail" when the officers entered the home.

The DPS officers were cruising in the area when they received the tip. They went to the farm home and received permission to "look around."

The young men were hauled into town and the Farmer County Sheriff's Department assisted with the investigation. All of the parents were notified and after questioning, the young men were released in the custody of their parents.

They were ordered to appear, with their parents, at a hearing at 10 a.m. Saturday before Farmer County Judge Paul Fortenberry. Eight were tried as juveniles and the others as adults.

County Attorney Johnny Actkinson pointed out that possession of less than two ounces of marijuana is a Class B Misdemeanor, punishable by up to six months in jail and a fine up to \$1,000. If they had had in their possession more than two ounces of marijuana, under Texas law, it would have been considered a Class A Misdemeanor and would have been a felony.

It was also pointed out to the boys and their parents that the juveniles could be tried in Juvenile Court, which in Texas is District Court, presided over by District Judge Pat Boone, Jr. of Littlefield.

County Judge Paul Forten-

berry talked to the juveniles and pointed out the seriousness of the offense. He recognized that this was the first offense for these boys and felt they were upstanding young men, caught in a situation. He told them that it was their "duty," once they recognized the presence of an illegal substance, to leave immediately and not stay.

The County Attorney pointed out that a second offense would automatically go to Juvenile Court for action and could not be dismissed.

Judge Fortenberry recommended to the County Attorney since this was the first offense for these boys, that the charges be dropped with the promise to the court they would not do it in the future. Upon leaving, each one shook hands with the Judge and promised not to repeat their actions in the future.

The adult offenders were similarly interviewed by the Judge and the severity of their action was pointed out to them. They were sentenced to three days in the county jail and fined \$25 plus court costs. The sentences were commuted, provided the youths pay the fines themselves and not have their parents do so.

Besides the eight juveniles, officers arrested Hiram L. Perry, 18 of Portales, N.M.; George L. Garza, 18; Pablo Lucio, 19; John L. Wardlaw, 18; Larry W. Sutton, 18; David Cantu, 17; and Jubel S. Blair, 17, all of Farwell. All of the juveniles, one age 14, the others age 16, were from Farwell except one who was a Texico resident.

Willie Roberts made it by the proverbial skin of his teeth. With three weeks to go as a schoolmaster of some 43 years, he finally has been associated with a school that won a state championship. Of course Willie didn't have a great deal to do with the feat. It was pulled off by a small group of very dedicated young ladies with the perseverance of two active mothers.

A state championship is an honor that is hard to come by. In this case, as in all championships, hard work, diligence and attention to duty are key factors in the final win. This was evidenced by the hours of practice and hours of tutelage that went into the girls' golf program in Farwell.

This area gives a big "tip o the hat" and a hearty "well done" to the five girls and two mothers who brought home the big "State Champ" plaque from Austin.

Probably next on the community agenda will be consideration of a vote to ratify the enabling legislation recently passed by the Texas Legislature creating the Farwell Hospital District. This is a key item in local progress. We must do it for at least two compelling reasons.

First, we must have the vote to go forward with the nursing home project that is rapidly nearing fruition. Secondly, we must form a local district to keep us out of any other area's grasp in the event they wish to include us in a taxation district. We are extremely vulnerable from several sides to this possibility.

Hopefully we can announce in the very near future the date of this important election. Probably then an announcement will be made concerning the complete details of the financing, erection and leasing of this much needed civic addition.

Not many folks are aware of the huge amount of time, effort and money that the directors of the development corporation have expended in pursuit of this project. These directors are truly dedicated persons in the performance of their duties.

Directors, we salute you -- and we heartily endorse the Farwell nursing home project on which you have worked so long to bring to our area.

We have been asked several times why our hawkish column has not discussed the debacle in Southeast Asia. Our answer is that we are too sick in heart and spirit to calmly discuss the matter.

The national attitudes that brought about this international catastrophe bode so ill for the United States that we would seem like a latter day Cassandra were our thoughts to see print.

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Nursing Home Committee Has Meeting In Austin

Four members of the Farwell Development Commission, representing the nursing home committee, traveled to Austin last Friday to further discuss plans for the Farwell nursing home with two men in the nursing home business.

Traveling to Austin were Mr. and Mrs. Bob Anderson, Jim Berry and Maxine Williams. They met with Don Brewer, owner and operator of several nursing homes, and with Doug Pendergrast, a partner of Brewer's and also a contractor who specializes in nursing home construction.

The committee looked at one of Brewer's nursing homes, and Bob Anderson stated that the Farwell nursing home will be styled similar to the one

viewed.

Brewer and Pendergrast are tentatively scheduled to meet with the nursing home committee today, Friday, in Farwell to further discuss plans for the local facility.

According to Anderson, the nursing home committee is considering entering into either a lease-purchase or management agreement with Brewer. Plans are to secure a firm commitment from whatever management firm contract is entered with in an amount sufficient to pay off the bonded indebtedness.

Anderson also stated that a bond election for the nursing home facility will be called in the near future, perhaps within 30 days.

School Trustees Name Committees

During a lengthy meeting conducted Monday, May 3, members of the Farwell School Board appointed committees, approved plans for the senior class trip and adopted a school calendar for the 1975-76 school year.

During the session, a Board of Equalization was appointed, which includes Vernon Symcox, Lester Norton, David White, Webb Gober, Walter Hughes and Clay Henson.

Board members granted permission for the planned senior trip as it was presented. The trip is planned to begin immediately following graduation May 27. The class and its sponsors have scheduled a trip to Los Angeles, Calif.

A school calendar for the 1975-76 school year was adopted by the Board which is set up to give teachers a week of in-service work prior to the opening of the school year. The in-service week has been scheduled for August 18-22. School will begin August 25 and is to be dismissed for summer vacation May 29, 1976.

Board members R.J. Garner and Wilbert Kalbas were appointed to work with Jack Williams, high school principal, on the student handbook for the forthcoming year. The handbooks are distributed to students at the beginning of each school year.

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
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Texico Takes Second At Meet

Investigation Leads To Arrest

A Post, Texas, man, Edward Roy Baker, was arrested in Lubbock Tuesday, May 6, and posted a \$6,000 bond in connection with the Monsanto Chemical Company burglary in Friona around 3 a.m. Monday, May 5.

According to Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace, a Friona Police Department patrolman was cruising the area when he noticed the doors of the chemical plant open and remembered passing a pickup from the company moments earlier. "The pickup had turned off the highway and was found abandoned behind a house in Friona, with about \$2,400 worth of weed killer chemicals still loaded in the company pickup," said Sheriff Lovelace.

The suspect is alleged to have broken into the warehouse, found the pickup in the building, loaded the weed killer on the pickup and allegedly drove off in the pickup.

Further investigation led to the discovery of a 1965 Dodge pickup stuck in the mud not far from the area. A vehicle check on the abandoned vehicle showed it as being registered to Baker.

Baker is also charged with stealing a 1963 Chevrolet truck from the Tri-County Grain Elevator at Black. This truck was found at Hereford.

Baker has been charged with stealing the pickup from the Monsanto Chemical Company in Friona, burglary of this company, and stealing the truck from Tri-County Elevator in Black.

He has other burglary charges pending, according to Sheriff Lovelace, and a previous indictment of the burglary of the Tide Company in Farwell.

He is presently out on three bonds, two in the amount of \$6,000 each and \$3,500 for the Tide Company burglary.

The arrest was made in Lubbock on Tuesday, May 6, and Baker made bond there.

In other business, the Parmer County Sheriff's Department is presently conducting an investigation in the matter of a post office box being broken into in the Farwell Post Office. The box belonged to Willie B. Ory.

Sheriff Lovelace stated that a U.S. Treasury check in the amount of \$59 made out to Ory is missing, and may have been

taken from the box.

The incident was reported to the sheriff on May 3.

The burglary of Corbin's Trailer Shop in east Farwell is also under investigation by the Sheriff's Department.

The incident was reported on April 30 but is alleged to have occurred on April 23 or 29. Four truck tires and wheels, all mounted, were stolen from the trailer shop. The loss was estimated at \$400.



The American Legion Auxiliary Department of New Mexico sponsors Girls' State. Its program has been designed to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age and afford them the opportunity to live together as self-governing citizens. It will inform them of duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities of American citizenship, so they may understand and participate in functions of government, helping them grasp the meaning of responsibilities which they must assume when they become adults. They will have their own state and city governments, including their own senate and house of representatives and city councils, where they will present and argue their own bills.

Hit And Run Driver Sought By DPS

W. E. Wells, sergeant of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Hereford, has issued an appeal to area residents in aiding the department in locating a hit and run driver who was involved in an accident Friday afternoon.

According to Jimmy Humphries, Texas highway patrolman, at approximately 2:35 p.m. Friday, May 2, two construction men were working on Highway 84, 5.6 miles east of Farwell when Cecil Baugher, 23, of Amarillo was struck by a car.

According to Humphries, Baugher in the company of a flagman was working on the highway when a west bound

vehicle, believed to be a light green or light brown car, possibly a Ford Galaxie, with New Mexico license plates, hit Baugher. Humphries related that the car skidded before hitting the construction worker and after impact. The car then hit a median and was turned about 180 degrees.

Driver of the vehicle then started the car again and passed by the injured worker. He then made a U-turn around the victim and a pickup which was parked close to Baugher and "sped on" toward Clovis.

Driver of the vehicle is believed to be a young Spanish male of medium size and medium length hair. He is also believed to have been wearing a moustache.

Baugher suffered a fractured right leg, head lacerations and several lacerations to his left arm as well as numerous bruises and skinned area. He was first taken to Clovis Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Sgt. Wells commented, "We are looking for anyone who might know a man or car fitting these descriptions or anyone who was traveling the road at that time of day who might have noticed the vehicle, or anyone around Farwell who might have seen the driver pass through Farwell at a pretty good rate of speed."

"Anyone, a farmer or contractor or other employer, who might have such an individual in their employ is encouraged to check on the possibility of that individual being involved in the accident."

"We think the public will want to help us locate a man

who will commit this kind of act - to run a man down and then drive back by him twice and leave him lying in the road.

"We will keep any information from an informant confidential if they so desire," Wells concluded.

Anyone with any information which might lead to the apprehension of the driver of the hit and run vehicle is asked to contact the Department of Public Safety or the Sheriff's office in Farwell at 481-3303.

At the conclusion of the program, first and second place performance ribbons were awarded participating students.

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


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Eight Qualify For State 4-H Roundup



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


needed items are donated from local merchants and other interested citizens. Though they have only been redecorating rooms at Girlstown for the past two years, they have helped Girlstown for many years.


