(S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

## **CPR Training Is Possible** If Enough Citizen Interest

Training in a life-saving technique called Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) may be available in the Farwell area if sufficient interest is shown, according to Mrs. R.W. (Carrie) Anderson, who brought an article entitled "Could You Save Your Husband's Life?" to the attention of the State Line Tribune. The article is carried in the January 1975 issue of "Woman's Day" magazine.

A one-night workshop demonstration training course in this life-saving technique would be conducted by Dr. Jerry Don Gregory of Farwell, if enough interest and support materializes, stated Mrs. Anderson.



In this situation, a wife or anyone who is with the heart attack victim, can frequently keep the person alive by utilizing the CPR technique is shown.

until medical assistance arrives. Frequently CPR hinders irreversible brain damage which occurs after the heart has been stopped for several minutes.

Capt. George Waiser of the San Rafael County Fire Department in California initiated a program to teach wives what to do if their husbands suffer a heart attack. A growing number of towns and cities across the country now have programs to train the public in treating heart attack victims.
