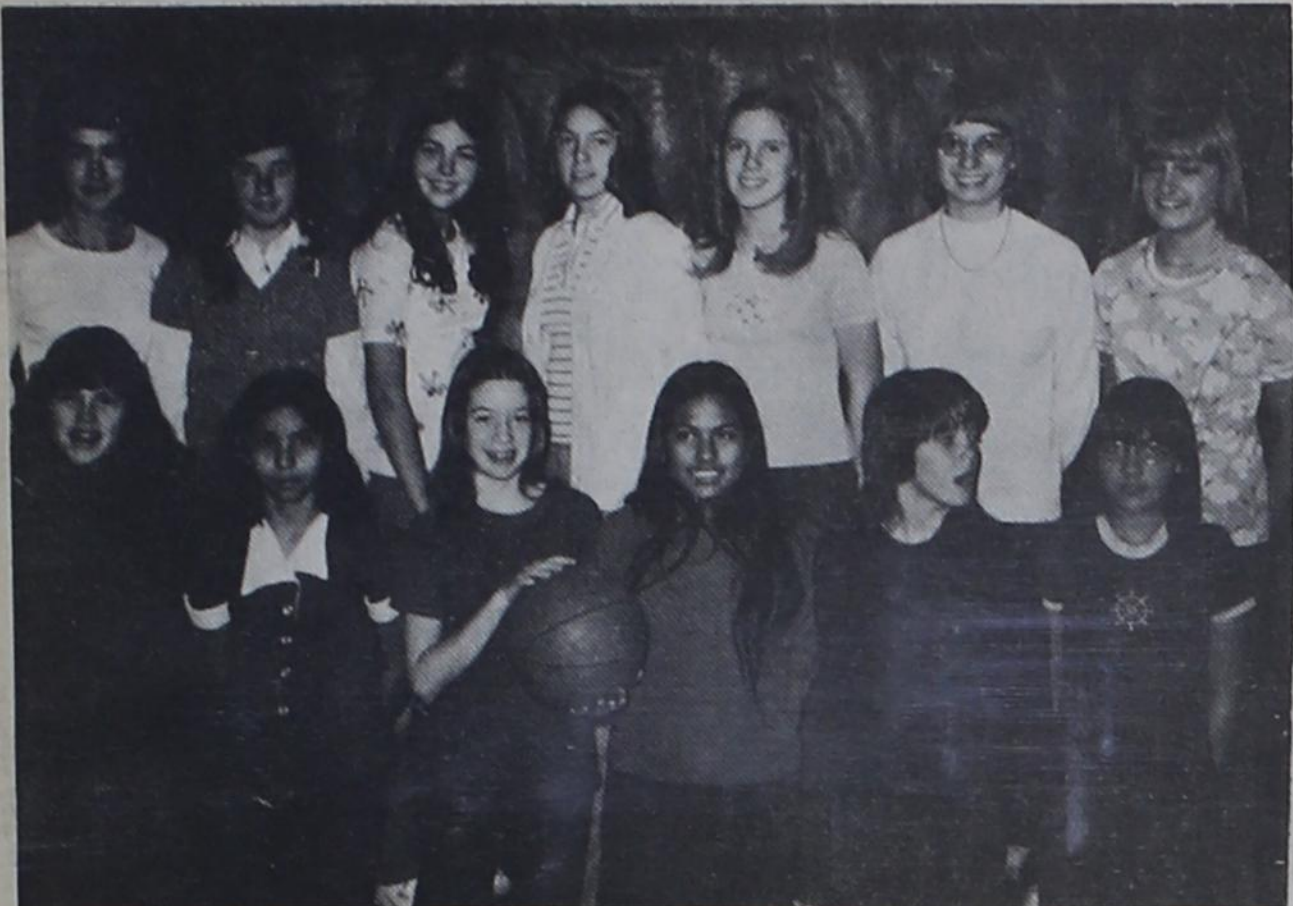

The Seventh and Eighth Grade Steerettes of Farwell Junior High School wrapped up their 1975 basketball seasons when they played their final games Feb. 3.

In a season review of the 7th Steerettes it is shown that two members of the team are credited with individually scoring over 100 points in season competition.

Leading season scorer for the 7th Steerettes is Jana Berry. The Steerette hit for a total of 156 points in competition with opponents. Her average score was 13 points per game.

She is followed on the scoring ladder by Lisa Hughes who also hit for over 100 points with a total of 125 to her credit, an average of 10.4 points per game.

In releasing individual statistics for the Steerettes' 1975 season, Coach Gayle Nicholas also lauded Steerettes Kim Marsh and Gayla Goldsmith. Steerette Marsh hit for a total of 85 points, 7.0 average, against the season competitors while Steerette Goldsmith is credited with 25 points, 3.0 per game.

bounders for the Farwell basketballers were Dondra Geris and Karyn Blain.

According to Coach Nicholas, the team's three district losses were to Springlake-Earth with two losses to Vega.

"We are a little disappointed that we didn't do a little better in district," stated the coach, continuing, "But, overall we had a good year. The 7th graders have been a very coachable and enjoyable group to work with and they have the potential of being a fairly good team in the future."

The 8th Steerettes' leading scorers for the season saw two of basketballers hit for over 100 individual points each. Leading 8th scorers were Paula Christian and April Coffman. A total of 163 points were hit by Paula Christian averaging out at 11.6 points per game. The record for April Coffman shows the roundballer pounded the hoop for a season total of 114, 8.14 points per game.

Also commended by Coach Nicholas was 8th Steerette Yolanda Martin who hit for 13 points.

"The 8th graders improved a

great deal during the season, especially our defense," commented Coach Nicholas.

"After their first win the team seemed to care a little more and worked a little harder which resulted in a fairly successful year," she concluded.

Farwell then scored again with 20 seconds remaining for their final two points of the game. When the final buzzer sounded, Shallowater had taken the victory, 58-52.

Curtis was tagged leading scorer for the Steers as he hit for a total of 24. Also scoring in double figures were Brad Jones with 11 and Gary Green with 10. Other Steers adding to the scoreboard were Billy Roberts and Russ Jones.

Rebounding for the Steers was led by Brad Jones with 12 rebounds followed by Russ Jones with 10.

A key factor to Farwell's Regional loss came in the form of a 6'5" post man from Shallowater named Jon Gates. Gates, it seemed was on top of almost every scoring play initiated by the Steers. 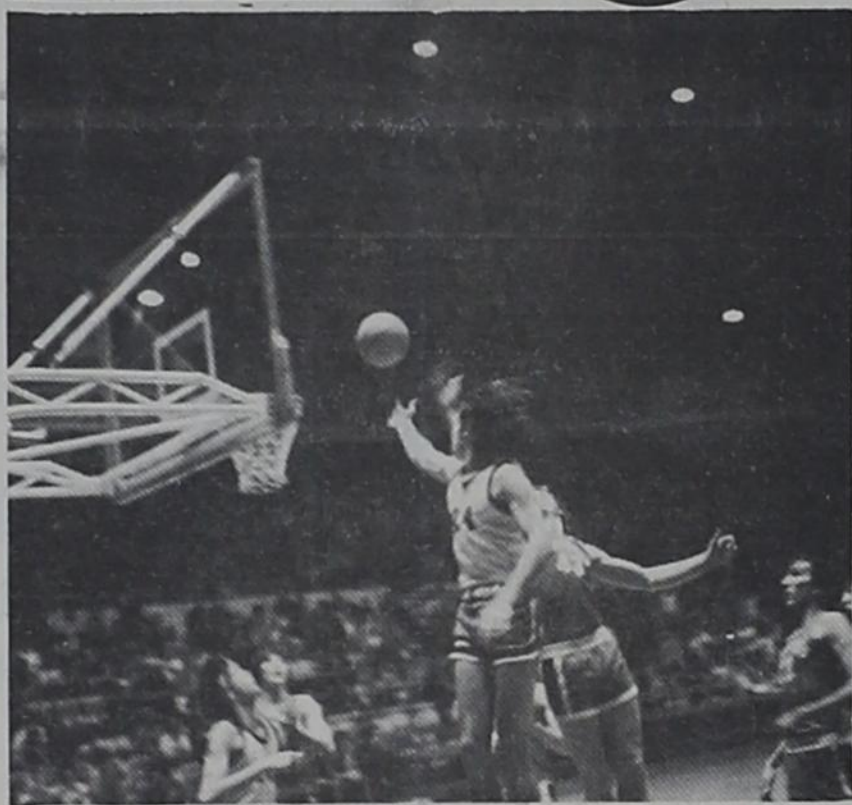
