## Texico Will Host EPAC Track Meet

Texico's track field will be the scene of much activity Saturday, April 26, when the local school plays host to competitors in the Annual Eastern Plains Athletic Council (EPAC) Track Meet.

Preliminaries for the events will get underway at 8 a.m. MDT with finals scheduled to kick off at 1 p.m. Field events for the meet

open to high school boys are shot put, javelin, pole vault, high jump, discus and long jump. High school girls field events include high jump, softball, shot put, discus and long jump.

In competition for junior high girls events will be long jump, shot put, softball, high jump and discus. Junior high boys will be competing in field events including discus, pole vault, long jump, shot put and high jump.

Running events include: high school boys -- 120 yard high hurdles, 440-yard relay, 100-yard dash, 180-yard low hurdles and 220-yard dash; high school girls -- 50-yard hurdles, 440-yard relay, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 80-yard hurdles and 220-yard dash;

Also, junior high boys -- 70-yard high hurdles, 440-yard relay, 100-yard dash, 120-yard low hurdles and 220-yard dash; junior high girls -- 50-yard hurdles, 440-yard relay, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 80-yard hurdles and 220-yard dash.

Other events will include mile run for junior high boys, high school boys and high school girls; 880-yard relay, junior high girls, junior high boys, high school girls and high school boys; 440-yard dash, junior high boys and

girls, and high school boys and girls; 660-yard run, junior high girls; 880-yard run, junior high boys, high school boys and girls; 880-yard medley relay, junior high boys and girls, and high school boys and girls; two mile run, high school boys; mile relay, junior high boys and girls, and high school boys and girls; and 120-yard high hurdles for high school boys.

## Gayle Nicholas Resigns As Coach

Farwell Steerette Coach Gayle Nicholas this week announced her resignation as a member of the Farwell School faculty.

Miss Nicholas has accepted a position at South Plains Junior College in Levelland where she will serve as women's basketball coach. She will also be instructing physical education and activity classes.

The Farwell coach graduated from Olton High School and then attended Wayland Baptist College in Plainview. While at Wayland, Miss Nicholas was a member of the Hutcherson Flying Queens and was tagged an "All American" during her college basketball career.

She received her master's degree from North Texas State University in Denton and accepted her first coaching position at Farwell in 1968. During her eight years as

coach for the local teams, Miss Nicholas has seen several "good years" of basketball and had the honor of having one of her basketballers awarded a college basketball scholarship. The fete roundballer, La-Shawn Sheets, played college basketball at Weatherford, Okla., for one year.

According to the coach, the Steerettes had three really good years under her leadership. In 1973 the team held a record of 18-13, in 1974 it was 14-13 and during the 1975 basketball season the Steerettes had a record of 22-9.

"This year the Steerettes practically rewrote the record books for Farwell Steerette basketball in both team and individual standings," she commented.

Miss Nicholas' resignation will become effective during May as the 1974-75 school year ends.

## Texico FFA Awards Presented At Banquet

Texico Chapter of Future Farmers of America conducted its annual FFA Parent-Member Banquet at the Texico School cafeteria Saturday, April 19, with several members of the organization being honored as award winners.

Following the opening ceremony by the FFA officers and several opening remarks, Terry Reid began the presentation of awards with recognition of Foundation Award winners.

Each year Foundation Awards are presented to the persons who have done an outstanding job in certain agricultural projects including crops, ag mechanics, sheep beef, swine production and overall livestock.

Winners of the 1975 Foundation Awards were Don Cherry for crops, David Turnbough for ag mechanics, Rusty Rucker

for sheep, Ted Richardson for beef, Roy Hagler for swine and David Turnbough, overall livestock.

Cherry was credited with having 15 acres of wheat and 15 acres of milo. Turnbough took the ag mechanics award for his horse trailer and the overall livestock award for his 72 feeder pigs, 22 breeding hogs, six feeder cattle, eight breeding beef and four breeder horses. Rucker was recognized for his nine feeder lambs and nine breeder sheep, while Richardson was honored for his seven cows and calves. Hagler garnered the award for his four breeding swine and 20 feeder pigs.

Next on the program agenda was the presentation of Leadership and Scholarship Awards by Robbie Bradley. Each year the chapter gives a

scholarship award to the member with the highest grade point average for the year. The 1975 Scholarship award recipient was Terry Rucker.

The Chapter also presents a leadership award to the member with the most outstanding leadership in both school and chapter activities. This year a tie for the honor was recorded and the chapter decided to give the award to both individuals. Award winners were Roger Pace and Sammy West.

## Post Office, Tribune Slated To Go On Trial

The State Line Tribune and the United States Postal Service "will go on trial" with this issue of the Tribune in an effort to save both establishments manpower and give each a chance to economize.

Residents who receive their Tribune through a post office box in Farwell will notice this week that their stamped address has been omitted from the paper.

Early this week the Postal Service began tagging boxes of Tribune subscribers. This was done so Postal Service employees will know all boxholders who have paid subscriptions to the Tribune and will not have to look at each paper they handle to assure it gets to the correct subscriber.

This saves manpower for the Postal Service by eliminating the reading of individual addresses on each separate issue of the Tribune. It saves manpower for the Tribune in that we have been able to eliminate the individual addressing of each single issue to be received by Farwell boxholders.

The unaddressed papers will be delivered ONLY to Farwell boxholders at this time. Local subscribers with a rural route or Texico mailing address will still receive a paper stamped with their name and mailing address.

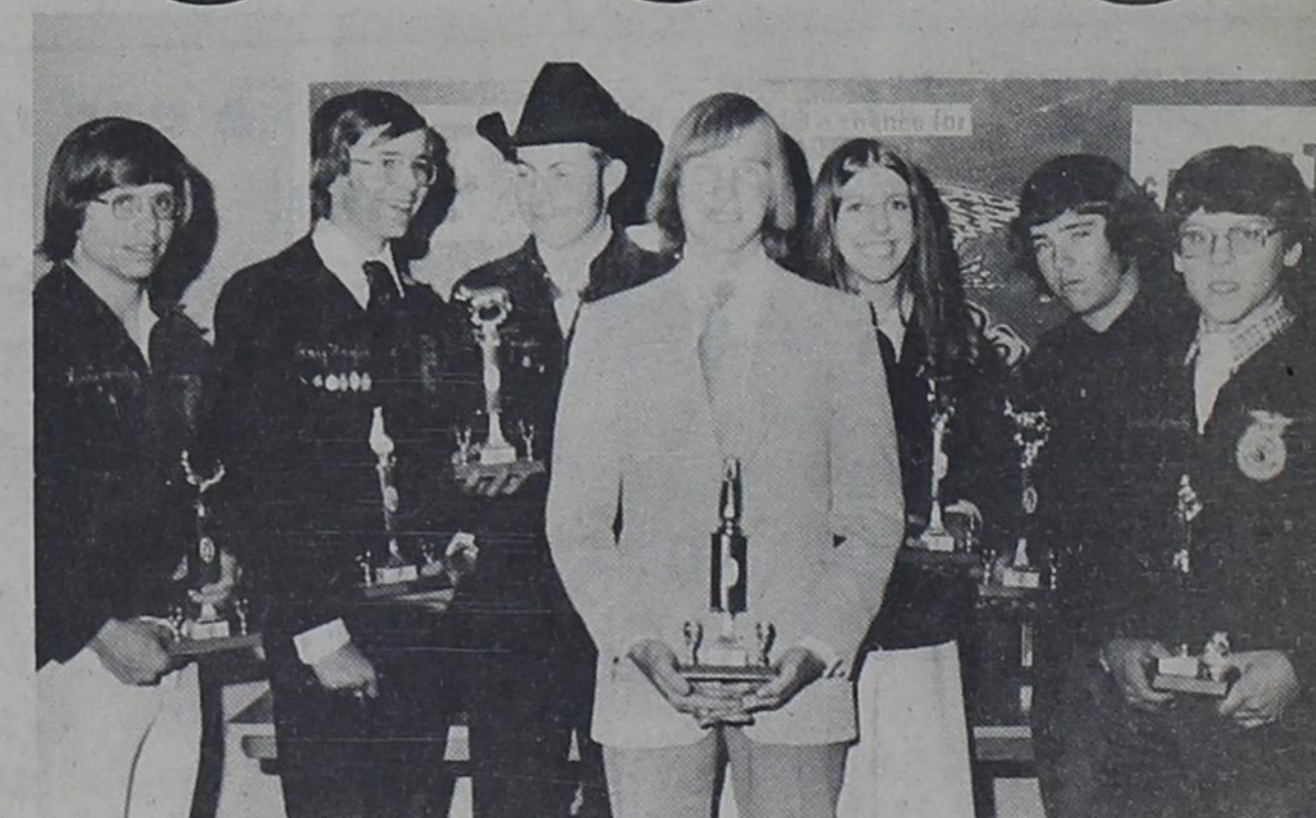

**PURELY PERSONAL**

Local law enforcement in Farwell is almost nonexistent. This is not the fault of the County sheriff's department. They are paid by the taxpayers of Farmer County to look after the whole county and not to give special attention to one community.

Recently several cases of rowdism and disturbance of the peace has come to our attention, and by the time someone in authority could be located and called to the scene it was over and the persons involved had left the area. It's time Farwell began to provide for the protection of its citizens and their property.

Of course the item of the cost of local law enforcement always comes into play. Admittedly it will cost the taxpayers of Farwell some money to provide these services, but we think the cost of crime is always greater than the cost of law enforcement.

So by thinking positively on the subject, we believe that the time has arrived for Farwell to adopt a city sales tax. Good grief, you say, not another tax. Yes, let's talk sales tax - what it is, who has it and what it could do for the town.

This type of tax will be paid by those who use the facilities of the community for their shopping. This will include many folks who do not live in town but enjoy the benefits of a shopping center close to their homes. It will extract some tax money from those who otherwise would obtain a free ride on what a town has to offer. It is a broad-based tax that causes everyone to pay a share of the load rather than soak the local property owner. We think it is a reasonable tax on all concerned.

This tax would be collected and remitted to the State of Texas along with the present state sales tax. The community shares would be returned by the comptroller of public accounts on a monthly basis less a small fee for handling. This would make it an easy tax for the city clerk to keep track of and not involve a lot of local book-keeping.

Who has it now? Well, 57 Panhandle cities and towns currently impose this tax. These include Bovina, Friona, Hereford, Muleshoe, Earth, Dimmitt, Hart, Morton. In fact, every town within a hundred miles of us now uses the city sales tax system. New Mexico has a "sales tax." It is on items on which taxes are not currently levied in Texas. Hence no saving to the West of us.

There is no place to shop within a hundred miles of Farwell without paying a city sales tax. Has our no sales tax oasis enjoyed a noticeable business boom on this account? The answer of course is a big "No!!"

Let's not delude ourselves any longer. Farwell can enjoy the proceeds of a city sales tax and not lose a dime's worth of business. It's long past time we got on the ball in this area.

What can it do for us? It can go a long way in defraying the cost of a local law enforcement system. That's what it can do. It cannot be "designated" for this purpose but we think our wise city dads would prudently use the proceeds for this purpose if it takes a city sales tax to get city law enforcement.

Do you want to discuss this sales tax - law enforcement idea? Write us a letter and we will publish it in the "Letters to the Editor" space.

We haven't asked our local school systems but would suspect that they are in the same boat as Lovington, N.M. The school system there is serving MORE free lunches each day than paid-for lunches.

Of course, now it's only a matter of declaring a "need" and no questions asked. This state of affairs is courtesy of "Big Daddy" on the Potomac. Those of you who "bled" last week as April 15th passed need not worry where your money goes. Our politicians take care of that minor detail for us.

Oh yes, the little tykes are not to be embarrassed over this fact. They can grow up thinking that sponging off someone else is the proper way of life. What's this about the establishment rip off? Sounds like ripping off the establishment is a government-sanctioned way of life.

### Parmer County Voters Approve Amendments

Voters in Parmer County joined voters throughout the state of Texas in going to the polls Tuesday, April 22, to cast ballots on two proposed Constitutional Amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Parmer County voters gave approval to both amendments in "a very light turnout of voters," according to County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

Constitutional Amendment No. One received the approval of 547 Parmer County voters, and received the disapproval of 323. A total of 517 voters approved Constitutional Amendment No. Two, and 356 voted against the measure.

A total of 877 persons voted in the Constitutional Amendment election, a very light turnout of the 3,700 Parmer County residents who were qualified to vote.

Constitutional Amendment No. One revises and consolidates provisions relating to

state and local retirement systems and programs and provides for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.

Constitutional Amendment No. Two sets the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and sets a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

Statewide results in the Constitutional Amendment election were not available as of press-time.

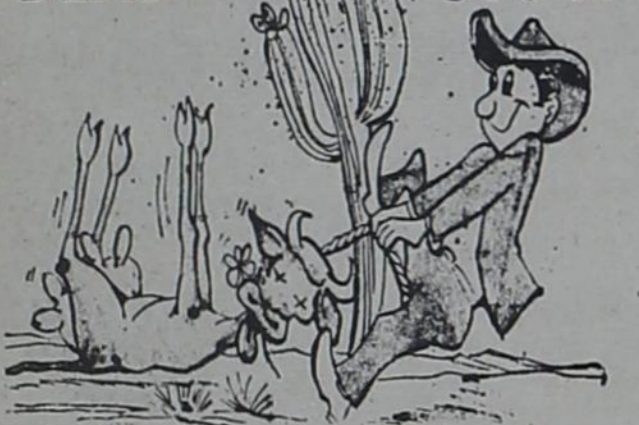

of confidence in people. He cited some of these as prejudice, sit-ins, student takeovers and riots, the Wounded Knee incident, killings on America's streets, and others. Continuing along the same lines, Kaneubbe said, "We need something to restore faith, trust and confidence in one another. We need love that produces faith and faith that develops into confidence in people."

Following the guest speaker, presentation of awards was made. Ann Ledbetter presented the Woman of the Year Award, in the absence of last year's recipient, Aileen Pearce, who was unable to attend the banquet.

The award was presented to Marie (Mrs. Bill) Christian, a very busy homemaker and mother, who is involved in school activities and community improvement projects. Mrs. Christian was born and reared in San Jon, N.M.

After graduating from San Jon High School, Mrs. Christian continued her education and graduated from Draughon's Business College in Amarillo. She later attended Eastern New Mexico University and graduated with a B.S. Degree.

She married Bill Christian on Aug. 21, 1955, and the couple has three sons, Steve, 16; Jeff, 14; and Jason, two. The Christians are members of the First Baptist Church of Texico. Mrs. Christian is presently a member of the Texico Planning Council, and past secretary, treasurer, current pres-

ident and president-elect of the Texico Woman's Club. Her current project as president of the Woman's Club is a safety project for improving traffic safety in Texico and making the railroad crossing between Texico and Farwell safer.

**Trustees Have Busy Session**

Members of the Texico Board of Trustees met in routine session Tuesday night, April 22, at Texico City Hall to consider and act on several items of business.

Trustee Ruby Goforth made a motion to re-adopt a resolution dealing with public meetings. All meetings of the Texico Board of Trustees are open to the public and everyone is encouraged to attend.

Mrs. Marie Christian, president of the Texico Woman's Club, appeared before the Trustees to advise them where funds and other help could be obtained on highways, streets and rural roads. She presented a list of federal and state agencies where assistance could be obtained.

Trustees nominated a person for the Distinguished Citizens

Award, a statewide award which is presented each year. Each city in New Mexico nominates a citizen as a candidate for the award, and judging is conducted at the state level. The person judged to be the top winner will receive the New Mexico Distinguished Citizens Award.

Lydick Engineers in Clovis and have that firm draw up a plat of the area that the City of Texico is contemplating annexing.

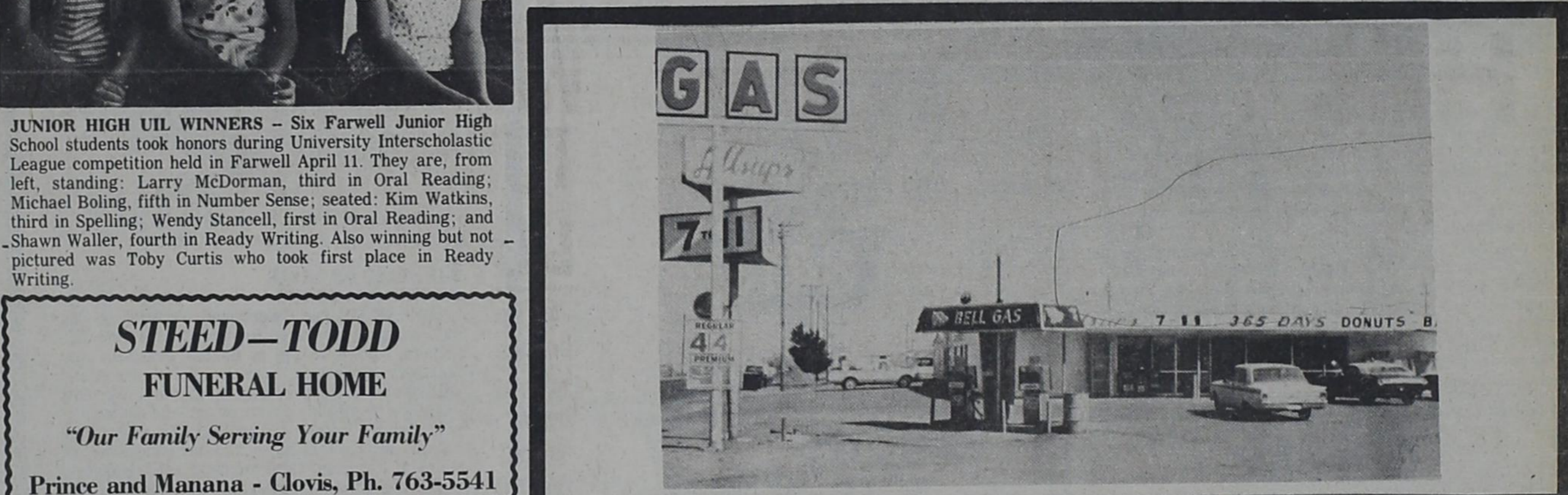

# Farwell Fireman Attend Annual Fire Conference

Ten members of the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department traveled to Lubbock Monday, April 7, and Friday, April 11, to attend two sessions of the 27th Annual Lubbock Fire Conference.

The week-long conference was conducted at the Lubbock Fire Department Training Grounds. It is a school instructed by volunteers and sponsored by Texas A & M

University and the Panhandle Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association.

Topic of the Monday session was "Rescue and First Aid." The three-hour session included instruction of power rescue tools such as saws for steel and wood, and also the extrication of victims from vehicles and first aid to accident victims.

"The session was all student participation," stated Farwell

Fire Chief Lee Hutchins, continuing, "The situations described in the sessions became real life situations as the volunteers simulated accidents and the students went into actual fire fighting and first aid administration."

During the Friday fire fighting session three types of fires were set and the conference participants were required to extinguish the blazes.

The first fire was a gasoline, diesel and J.P. 4 jet fuel fire on a gasoline transport truck. "The three fuels used in the fire all required different extinguishing methods," explained Hutchins.

A pickup butane fire was the second fire to be extinguished by the participants. According to Hutchins, a 1000 gallon butane tank mounted on a pickup was ignited by the volunteer instructors and then extinguished by the firemen attending the instructional conference.

A house and garage fire was then set to be extinguished by the students.

"Every fire at the conference involved a different type fuel to give the students a chance to experience the difficulties encountered by the different type fires," the local chief commented.

Hutchins also explained that a resolution has been passed in the Texas legislature to certify volunteer firemen.

"It takes 160 hours of training to be certified and our local firemen now have six hours of actual fire prevention and fire fighting training along with first aid instruction.

"To be certified, firemen must also have instruction in ambulance driving with a total of 18 subjects to cover before certification."

He further explained that fireman are eligible to be certified but as of the present time it is not a mandatory requirement by the state.

"The certification of firemen will serve to upgrade the fire service throughout the state," Hutchins concluded.

Attending the conference were 520 firemen from as far away as Channelview, Tex., located near Houston and Eunice, N. M.

Local volunteer firemen attending included Chief Hutchins, Assistant Chief Joe White, Fire Marshal Smokey Gast, Harold Travis, Gene Beavers, Jerry Utsman, John Curtis, Buster Gast, James Mast and Glen Fant.

## One Killed In Tractor-Pickup Mishap

Joe Dan Jones, 40, of Rt. 2, Muleshoe, was pronounced dead at the scene by Judge Melvin Berry of Muleshoe after he was involved in a tractor-pickup mishap. The accident occurred at 1:20 p.m. Monday, April 21, 9.6 miles northwest of Muleshoe.

According to Joe Young of the Texas Highway Patrol who investigated the incident, Jones was traveling east on a farm to market road in his pickup when he struck the tool bar on a tractor driven by Manuel Fabela, 21, of Rt. 3, Muleshoe.

Young reported that Fabela had been plowing in a field adjoining a field where hay was being burned. The smoke

resulting from the hay fire was apparently blowing across the road obstructing Jones' vision causing him to fail to see the tool bar on the tractor. When the Jones vehicle hit the tool bar it was smashed into the dash of the pickup forcing it into the cab of the pickup against Jones.

No citations have been issued as yet in the incident.

## One Arrested In Marijuana Confiscation

According to Texico City Marshal Mickey Fenn, one person was arrested recently for possession of over eight ounces of marijuana.

The man, Drew Ford of Farwell, age 19, was arrested by Marshal Fenn when approximately one pound, about 22 lids, of marijuana was found in his vehicle. The incident occurred on Wheeler Avenue in Texico.

Marshal Fenn reported that Ford had appeared before the Magistrate Judge in Clovis who set bond at \$5,000. Drew made bond and has been released with trial date pending.

# Soil Stewardship Week Scheduled For May 4-11

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water, and other natural resources, will be May 4-11 this year, Leon Grissom, Chairman of the Parmer County Conservation District announced.

This year's theme, "Test of Strength", emphasizes "how the many changes now occurring in the nation affect our continuing responsibility to be good stewards of the land," said Grissom.

Grissom also cited the energy shortage, environmental pollution, and the growing concern over land use as examples of changes and developments affecting the use of America's natural resources.

"We hope," stated Grissom, "that during Soil Stewardship Week, millions of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibilities for the protection and use of the Lord's earth."

The district, upon request, will provide local churches with copies of this year's observance booklet. The material was prepared by the National Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of the National Association of conservation Dis-

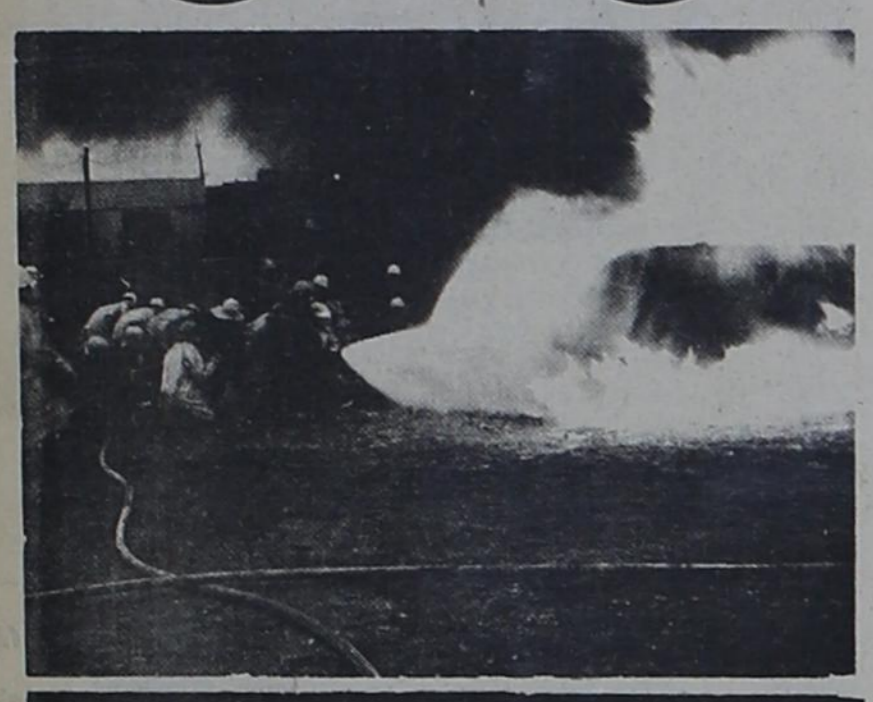
tricts. The advisory committee is composed of churchmen of different faiths.

This year, 1975, nineteen-seventy-five will be the 20th consecutive year the Parmer County Conservation District, along with almost 3,000 similar districts throughout the nation, has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week. The custom of setting aside special "Rogation Days" for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in France when French peasants prayed

for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

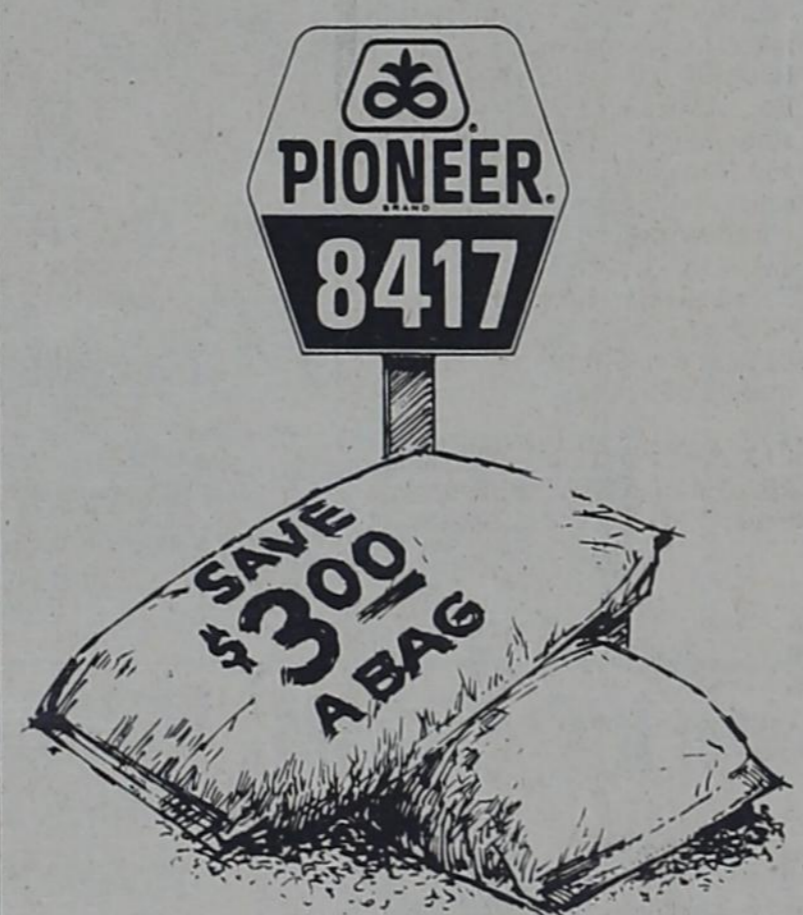

## Marine Sgt. Dan Huffaker Proud Of Chosen Career

Marine Sgt. Dan Huffaker, son of Mr. and Mrs. C.J. Huffaker of Farwell, is home on leave for two weeks prior to being stationed in Lima, Peru, where he will serve with the American Embassy there as a Marine Security Guard. He is presently assigned to the Marine Security Guard Battalion in Washington D.C.

Sgt. Huffaker attended Farwell High School, class of 1965. Following high school he served in the U.S. Army for five years, including a tour of duty in Vietnam, reaching the rank of Captain. After his army service he enrolled at Texas Tech University, majoring in Business Administration for three and one-half years. Then Huffaker enlisted in the Marine Corps.

He has been a Marine for about a year now and is extremely proud of his chosen career. In fact, though he is not a Marine Corps Recruiter, he would like to interest young men and women in the Marine Corps while he is home visiting.

Marine Sgt. Huffaker pointed out that on "November 10, 1775, in a place called Tun Tavern, a few good men got together and today a few good men are still getting together. They call themselves the United State Marine Corps," he said.

"Today the Marine Corps still maintains the high standards that were set 199 years ago, but in today's Marine Corps, educational and job opportunities are much greater," explained Sgt. Huffaker.

Sgt. Huffaker continued, "The Marine Corps believes that every young man or woman wants to start off in the right direction - toward the kind of work that will suit them best, the kind of skills that will stick with them for life, the kind of opportunities that will lead them to a rewarding career."

"For the young man who can qualify for the new Marine Corps option programs, you will have the chance to choose the right direction. After you have completed recruit training, you will be on your way to the kind of occupational training that will serve you best,

both as a Marine, and in a civilian career after your military service.

Women were recruited into the Marines during World War I, to free a Marine to fight. They performed only clerical duties and were assigned to some recruiting stations around the United States.

Today they are not a separate organization. They serve on an interchangeable basis with male Marines in noncombat occupational fields while representing one percent of the total strength of the Corps. There are approximately 2,300 women Marines including 300 officers and 2,000 enlisted women on active duty.

"This is the time of year that seniors are about to graduate and are looking ahead to their future careers. I would like to suggest to the men and women of this area that if they would like a rewarding career that is challenging, both mentally and physically, that they give due consideration to the Marine Corps," stated the Marine sergeant.

"This June is especially important due to the fact that there is a bill pending in Washington that after the end of June all persons who enter active duty after the first of June will probably lose their funds available from the GI Bill for college education, which comes to approximately \$12,000.

"I personally enjoy the Marine Corps due to the fact that I do belong to an elite organization. Not only the field I am in, but the people I meet. I have lived in parts of the world that most people dream about and I have made friends with people all over the United States. We in the Marine Corps consider ourselves proficient and in good physical shape, which leads to pride. You can sum this up by saying that we are professional," he said.

Sgt. Huffaker invites anyone interested in learning more about the Marine Corps to feel free to contact him while he is home on leave. This includes both men and women.

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**THE WATER OF LIFE**  
For almost twenty-four hours, Chicagoans had to boil their drinking water! Millions of small fish had jammed the water intakes far out in Lake Michigan, and had died there. It was, of course, a major operation to clear them all away and make sure that Chicago's drinking water was uncontaminated.  
It is of the utmost importance, always, that the water we drink is pure and fresh, and this is no less so where spiritual matters are concerned. The Bible has much to say about stagnant water, and foul water, and poisoned water, but the spiritual life of those who trust in Christ for salvation is called "the pure water of life," doubtless because it is so wholesome and refreshing.  
Perhaps the reader will recall the picture our Lord drew for that sinful Samaritan woman at the well of Sychar. John 4:10-14 tells how He and the Samaritan woman discussed Jacob's well. Somehow she seemed to sense that He was contrasting her vain pursuit of pleasure with eternal life, when He said:  
"Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again, but whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him, a fountain of water, springing up into everlasting life" (Vers. 13,14).  
How true this is! The pleasures of this world do not satisfy. Men keep pursuing them to keep from being bored, but the everlasting life that God gives to those who trust in Christ is a never-ending source of refreshment and joy. And it provides the greatest incentive to serve Him.  
Those who possess the joy of sins forgiven and of peace with God naturally long to serve and please Him, and God desires no service except that which springs from genuine gratitude and love. "We love Him because He first loved us" (1 John 4:19).

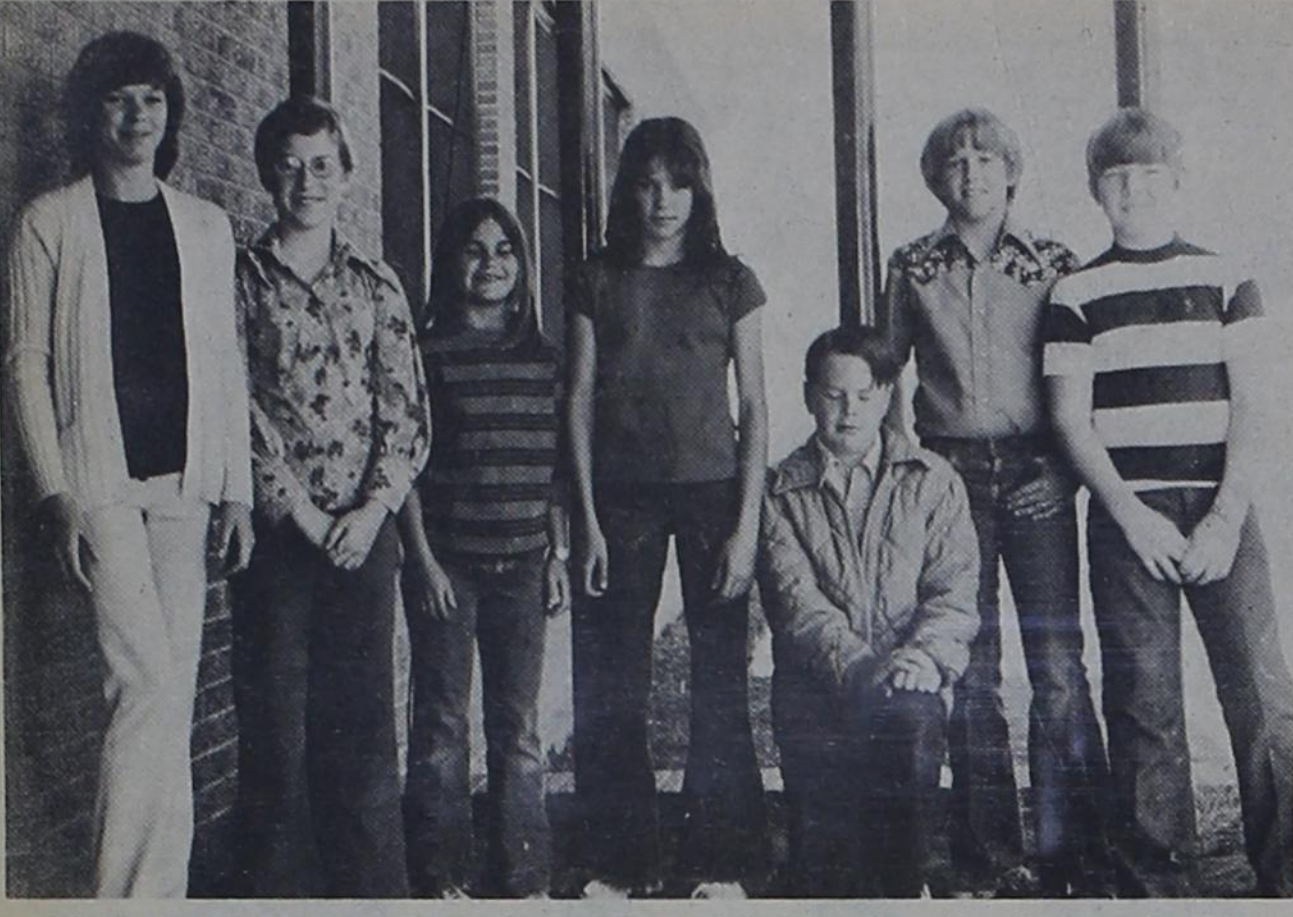

### Farwell FFA To Host District Competition

The Farwell High School Chapter of Future Farmers of America will host the Littlefield District FFA Public Speaking and Talent Contests, and FFA instructors conference Tuesday, April 29, beginning at 4:30 p.m. in the Farwell High School.

Sixteen schools within the district are scheduled to have FFA chapters participating. District FFA officers will be in charge of the contest. Gary Blair, Farwell FFA member, is serving as district parliamentarian and will join with the other district officers at the meet.
