Rodeo Declared Success

The first AJRA rodeo to ever be held locally has been declared a huge success by rodeo officials, who indicate that the crowds which attended the rodeo performances and were on hand for the gigantic parade and barbecue meal by far exceeded expectations. Participants in the rodeo performances were from this immediate area, El Paso, Tucumcari, Monument, N.M., and various other towns in New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.

Winners of the best-all-around saddles were David Witt, Eunice, N.M., and Varda Radcliff, Dora, N.M. Resistol hats were presented to the winner of the sportsmanship award, Harold Roland, and to Wade Lewis, runner-up for the all-around cowboy award, Carol Miller was presented with an American hat as runner-up for the all-around cowgirl award, Janie Miller and Bill Hastings were each presented with one pair of Lee Riders as second runners-up for all-around honors. Hard-luck boy and hard-luck girl, Derek Garner and Debra Whitehead, were also presented with one pair each of Lee Riders.

Herbert Williams, a former Farwell resident, who was announcer for the entire rodeo show performances, was presented with two hat savers. High point boy in the 16-19 age group was Alan Brunson; 13-15 age group Joe Bill Edwards; and in the 12 and under group was David Witt who also took all-around honors. Buckles were presented to this group.

Three Teachers Hired, Three Vacancies Remain

Three vacancies remain on the Texico faculty at this time; however, three teachers were hired at the Tuesday night meeting of the board. Also at the Tuesday meeting, the resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Riddle were accepted by the board. The Riddleys are moving to California where they plan to teach.

Dale Paul, who comes to Texico from Farmington where he has taught two years, has been hired to fill the vacancy in the fourth grade created by the resignation of Mrs. Riddley.

Girls event winners were; barrels 16-19, Carol Miller, two runs 36,33; barrels 13-15, Debra Whitehead, 37,14; barrels 12 and under, Varda Radcliff, 38,06; breakaway roping girls 16-19, two calves, Linda Blackburn, 9,8; breakaway 13-15, Kathy Ritchie, 10,5; girls ribbons 16-19, Linda Blackburn two calves 42,17; girls pole bending 13-15, Debra Whitehead two runs 36,11; pole bending 12 and under, two runs, Diane Riley, 34,52; girls flags 12 and under, Paula Smith, 20,57 two runs.

Boys event winners were; tie-down 16-19 Wade Lewis -- two calves, 23,9; 13-15, David Wilson, 36,8; breakaway 12 and under, David Witt, 11,1. Steer riding 12 and under one ride, Buddy Cochran, 53; 13-15 one ride, Joe Bill Edwards, 53; and bull riding 16-19, Matt Gunn, 60, one ride. Steer wrestling Eddie Stanfield -- 16-19, 12,6; two steers; barebacks, Wesley Runyan, 16-19, 51; score on one ride.

Mike Ashley, 13-15, with a time of 38,40 was winner of the boys barrels; with David Witt winning the boys barrels with a time of 36,07 in the under 12 group. David Witt also won the boys flags with a time of 19,08 in the under 12 group.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Woodard, who has three years experience, all in Sherman, Tex., will teach English and Spanish and Mrs. Rena Smith, five years experience, will teach sixth grade.

Nephew Of Local Woman Killed In Forrestal Fire

Funeral services are pending in Dimmitt for George E. Wall, nephew of Lola Standefer, who was killed in the fire aboard the U.S. Navy ship, the "Forrestal."

The young navyman, 22 years of age, had been stationed in the United States since entering the Navy 18 months ago, until embarking for Vietnam on the Forrestal on June 4 of this year.

He had arrived at Tankin Bay on July 25 and his family received word of his death on July 29. They have received word that his body is enroute to the states, but are unable to make final plans for a memorial service until further word is received from the Navy as to arrival date.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wall, and a brother, Dana, all of the Dimmitt home, and a grandmother, Mrs. G.A. Shwen also of Dimmitt.

Merchandise Taken In Burglary

Officers in the Curry County Sheriff's office are still checking into the burglary of Rip's Western Wear which occurred on Thursday evening while the Twin Cities was occupied by the rodeo which was in progress.

Several thousand dollars worth of merchandise was taken by the thieves who entered through the back door after breaking the glass in the door. Apparently, the thieves simply loaded the merchandise into a truck and hauled it away, said Sheriff Nelson Worley.

Not Fire --

Storm Destroys Tire Factory

In last week's issue of the Tribune, we ran a picture of the old tire factory which was once one of the leading industries in this area. In running the picture, we stated that the factory had been destroyed by fire. However, we stand corrected on this statement by Mitzy Walling who was born and reared in Farwell and still makes his home here.

He recalls that a few years later, at time the first gymnasium was built at the Farwell school, much of the brick from the old factory was cleaned and used in the construction of the building. "I have spent many a day cleaning brick for use in the gym," stated Walling. He relates that anyone who wished could clean the brick and receive payment for same. During the summer prior to construction of the gym, Walling, his brother, Craig and many other young men in the Texico-Farwell area spent days cleaning the brick, making the handsome sum of \$3.00-\$4.00 per day (good money) for their labors.

In telling the story of the plant destruction, Walling fell to reminiscing and related how the old factory was once the "best place in town to hide if a boy (or girl) wished to play hookey from school." First

time I ever played hookey I went to the old tire factory -- for there were a lot of good hiding places there, he said. He recalls that one such trip to the factory almost ended in tragedy when a companion fell into the large pit filled with water. "We were all scared out of a year's growth," recalls Walling, who can tell many other such "Good" stories of the by-gone days in the Twin Cities.

Editorial

Riots Vs Responsibility

The events of the last few weeks - the burning and rioting in some of our largest cities, the inflammatory utterances of irresponsible individuals like Stokely Carmichael and Rap Brown - all point to one inescapable conclusion. The name of the game has changed from civil rights to civil war. Extremist Negro leaders now hold the reins of what started out to be simply a movement to improve the lot of the Negro. The so-called Negro "moderates" have faded into the background, content to criticize congress for failing to guarantee the Negro a life of complete luxury free from work in any shape or form. In the meantime, the black power movement grows.

In case there still remains any doubt about the meaning of "Black Power", the recent definition given by Stokely Carmichael while touring Cuba should help to clear it up. Carmichael defined "Black Power" as:

"The unified resource of all American Negroes who are fighting oppression of Negroes and who want to destroy imperialism and the capitalist structure of North America which puts us down inside and out."

If nothing else, Carmichael has certainly mangled the use of the English language. Aside from that, though, this definition of Carmichael's has ripped the mask off of the civil rights movement and has exposed it for what it is. What was once a justifiable movement has become a campaign to spread destruction throughout America and to kill the "hunkie."

Delegates to the recent Black Power conference held in Newark, New Jersey, following the riots there, adopted a resolution calling for the splitting of the United States into two nations -- one white and one black. They also supported paramilitary training for all Negro youth. Christianity even came under attack, being called a "white religion that had taken the diamonds and minerals of the world in exchange for the Bible." Among other things, the conference supported a "Black national holiday," in honor of "national heroes such as Malcolm X", who was, Stokely Carmichael charged, shot to death by the CIA. On the subject of the draft, their position is, "Hell no, we won't go!" To further demonstrate their stupidity, delegates also condemned birth control programs on the ground that these programs seek to exterminate Negroes.

If conferences such as this one, and the statement of Rap Brown that "Violence is as American as apple pie", do not serve to convince the public that the Negro no longer will be satisfied with simple equality, then dire times will soon befall us, for we will fail to deal with the situation in the manner in which it must be dealt with.

Much rah rah has been made lately of the fact that we must not become bitter about the situation, that we must strive to eliminate the "underlying" causes of the riots, namely poverty, slums, rats, etc. Blame for the riots has been placed on just about everything possible, from slums to heat, while the most direct cause of the riots has been overlooked. This is the attitude of the Negro citizen who takes part in them. No amount

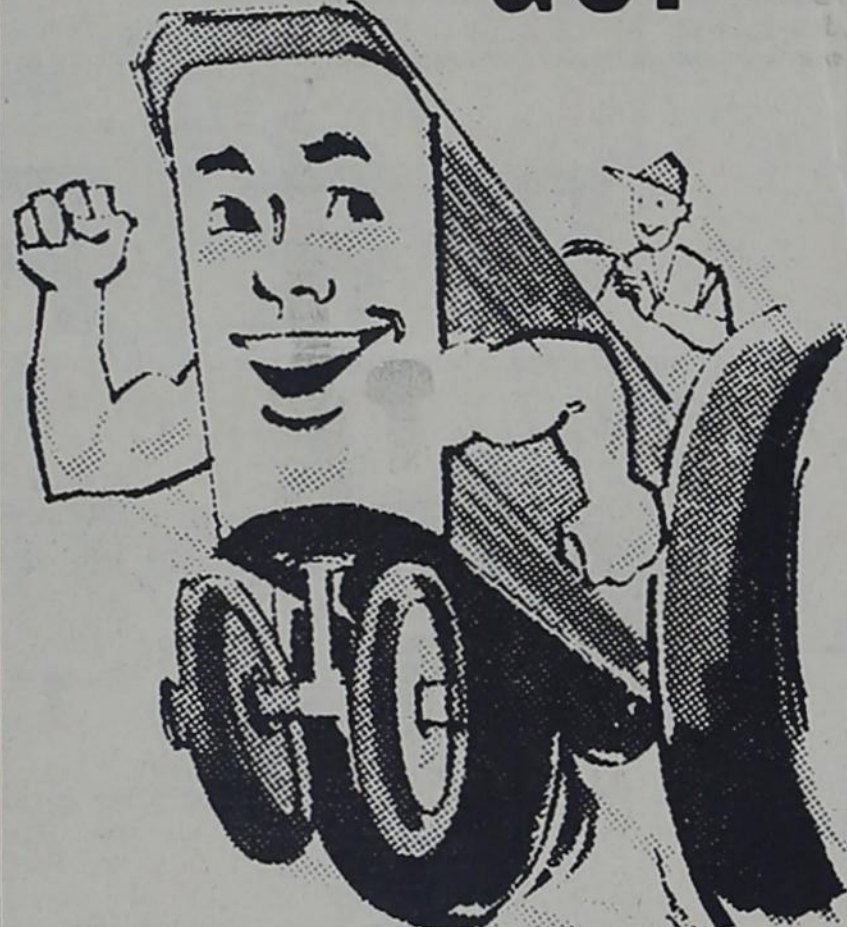

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however, that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

of federal aid, no amount of urban renewal can prevent riots as long as the Negro is content to sit on his can and not try to better himself. The truth of the matter is that the Negro is far better off in America today, than in any other place on the globe. He has every opportunity to get an education if he would take it. The law prohibits discrimination in hiring of Negroes, so he may find a job, if he would hunt for one. He could be accepted into the social structure of many communities, if he were not too busy "burning America" to try and become a respectable citizen.

Martin Luther King wants, among other things, a guaranteed annual income for Negroes, so that the majority of them would never have to do a day's work. Why in the name of Heaven doesn't anyone advocate trying to instill a little initiative in the Ghetto Negro, rather than handing him everything on a silver platter. The riots and burning will not stop until these Negroes learn that they must earn their place in society. They must come to realize that responsibility must accompany equality, and that they may not have one without the other. They have been given equality in the eyes of the law, but if they are to gain equality in the eyes of the public, then they must learn that equality by acquiring a sense of responsibility. Without this, they are nothing, and the riots will continue.

I suggest then, that instead of begging for handouts, the American Negro "get with it" and try to make their own way for a change. Thanks to the "capitalist system" which Stokely Carmichael wants to tear down, they at least have that opportunity. They might not elsewhere.

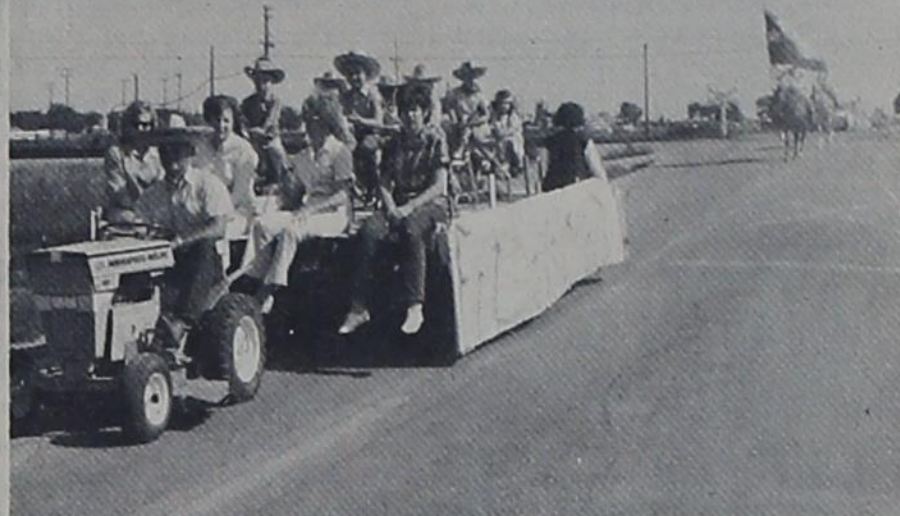

Faculty Almost Complete

The Farwell faculty is complete with the exception of a band and music director, according to Supt. W.M. Roberts who announces that an assistant coach and math and science teacher has been hired to fill the position recently vacated by Bill Adams.

The new assistant coach is Kenneth Good who is presently working at Pampa as a research chemist. However, Good has five years teaching experience with the last two years spent at Luedens, a Class B school (near Abilene) as head football coach. A graduate of Anson High School, he holds a degree from Hardin-Simmons University. The new coach is married and the father of four children, two of whom (boys) will be students at Farwell this year. Other children in the family are twin daughters, five years of age. The Good family is moving to Farwell this week and are making their home in the house formerly occupied by the Bob Hart family.

Supt. Roberts also announced that for the first time, a class in special education (retarded children) will be set up in the Farwell school. Mrs. Kathleen Walser will teach this special group of children. It will be a regular part of the elementary school.

The superintendent also announced that the school will operate on Daylight Time this fall.

First faculty meeting for the Farwell teachers has been set for Wed., August 30, 10 a.m.

All elementary and sixth grade students will register on the first day of school and registration dates and time for other students is as follows: Aug. 31, 10 a.m., seniors; Aug. 31, 1 p.m., juniors; Sept. 1, 10 a.m., sophomores; Sept. 1, 1 p.m., freshmen; Aug. 31, 10 a.m., eighth grade students; and 1 p.m. on the same day, seventh grade students. Football practice begins Monday, Aug. 14, with practice uniforms to be issued today (Thursday), Aug. 10, at 5 p.m.

Want To Go Back To The 'Good Old Days'

Who would like to go back to the "Good old days?" If you are one of that number, then read on - for according to a booklet which has recently come into possession of this writer, things were a "little" different then than now, at least in the school system.

At that time, the United States was involved in World War I and students were encouraged to buy stamps or savings bonds (one day each week set aside for this purpose) to teach the students "thrift", of course. Names of boys serving in the overseas theatre or on their way "over there" were listed. Included in the honor list were T.E. Allen, Willis Parker, John Younger, Jake Hopping, Coke Caraway, Roy Milligan, Charley Carter, Reese Smith, Horace Nichols, Willy Younger, Jefferson Thomas, R.N. Whitley, and Jack Dunn.

Included in the faculty of that era was a superintendent and seven teachers. Each teacher was in charge of two grades and the superintendent was in charge of athletics and could pick other teachers as assistants. He was held personally responsible for misconduct of any of the athletes on the playing field or in the classroom.

Teachers had a set of rules to follow including the following: They must be in the class-

room at 8:40 a.m. each day and stay until school dismissed at 4 p.m.; no teacher was allowed to leave the school ground from the time of arrival until departure time and must be on the school ground at recess and the noon hour (failure to do so was considered reason for dismissal). All teachers were held responsible for the conduct of their pupils and in addition were expected to be responsible for conduct of other students. All were expected to carry out the compulsory attendance provision and all other laws relating to school affairs.

Students as well as teachers, were also required to follow a set of rules including: Prompt and regular in attendance, neat in attire, and respectful to fellow pupils and teacher. All pupils were required to do a reasonable amount of literary work and a refusal or failure to do so was deemed sufficient grounds to demote or punish such pupil, and upon persistent failure to do the literary work, he could be expelled from school.

According to the booklet, schools were often misjudged; therefore, teachers were reminded of this quotation from the Bible, "Be their fruits ye shall know them." We might put a different interpretation on the same saying by putting it "By what our pupils are do-

ing in life compared to what they would have been doing without training is the best way to judge our success."

Farwell was extolled as the place where the climate and altitude (4100 feet) makes it easier to study; where the citizens are better (coming from all parts of the United States and many foreign countries). The new citizens brought with them the newest in educational ideas and were not hampered by the old "Moss Backs"; therefore were able to put the latest in educational advancement into operation in this garden spot of the West.

It was during the school year 1918-1919 that two new departments were used for the first time in the Farwell school. These were Domestic Science and Manual Training. Plans were going forward to have a department in elocution and art as soon as proper arrangements could be made. Music was also available with students making arrangements with the teacher for prices and time of instruction. According to the booklet, "Music has made itself a place in all well regulated courses of study."

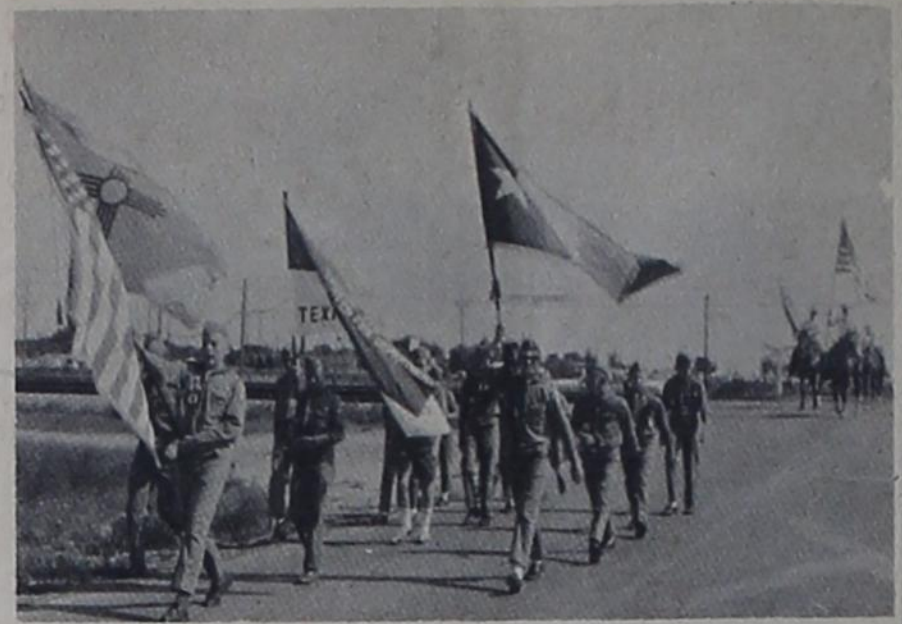
Prescribed courses of study in the first, and second, grades was reading, spelling, writing, language, numbers, drawing and music, and physiology and hygiene. In the third and fourth grades, students were required to add to those subjects previously listed, nature study and geography. From fifth grade

on, the students added history to their curriculum, with civics and agriculture added in the seventh grade.

In the eighth grade (high school), students were required to take English, history and mathematics and electives. Requirements for the next two years were much the same with English and mathematics required in the sophomore and junior years and English required in the senior year. A total of 17 credits was required for graduation. Electives included Latin, manual training, agriculture, physiology, domestic science, Spanish, physics, chemistry and bookkeeping.

Early day graduates of the school still living in the area include Tom Grady and Roy Melugin-1915-1916; Olin Walling, Barnie Harding, Lola Moss (Mrs. Sumner Davidson) 1916-1917.

Yes, it is nice to go back, but only in memory as any of the early day pupils in the Farwell Schools will be glad to tell you -- for much has been accomplished in the educational field since those early days and many changes have been made. "Whether all for the better or not, we don't know -- but you be the judge."
